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Dickens facts:

•Second of eight children.

•He was forced to leave school at the age of 12 to work in a boot blacking factory along the River Thames when his father was incarcerated in a debtors' prison.

 In 1833, he began submitting sketches to various magazines and newspapers under the pseudonym "Boz."

•Dickens began writing "A Christmas Carol" in October 1843. It was finished by the end of November and was published in time for Christmas.

*Dickens and his wife, Catherine, (Hogarth) had 10 children before the couple separated in 1858.

Who is Charles Dickens?

Born in Portsmouth, England February 7, 1812, Charles John Huffam Dickens was an English writer and social critic.

He created some of the world's best known fictional characters and is regarded as the greatest novelist of the Victorian era.

His works enjoyed unprecedented popularity during his lifetime, and by the 20th Century, critics and scholars recognized him as a literary genius. His novels and short stories enjoy lasting popularity.

Despite his lack of formal education, he edited a weekly journal for 20 years, wrote 15 novels, five novellas, hundreds of short stories and non-fiction articles, lectured and performed extensively, was an indefatigable letter writer, and campaigned vigorously for children's rights, education, and other social reforms.

Dickens's literary success began with the 1836 serial publication of The Pickwick Papers.

Within a few years he had become an international literary celebrity, famous for his humor, satire and keen observation of character and society.

His novels, most published in monthly or weekly installments, pioneered the serial publication of narrative fiction, which became the dominant Victorian mode for novel publication.

The installment format allowed Dickens to evaluate his audience's reaction, and he often modified his plot and character development based on such feedback.

He died of a stroke June 9, 1870, leaving his final novel, The Mystery of Edwin Drood, unfinished.

He is buried in the Poets' Corner of Westminster Abbey. Charles Dickens | Feb. 7. 1812 – June 9, 1870

Dickens, the beginning

The Dickens Village Festival has come a long way.

The event kicked off in 1994 with a lighting ceremony in the city park after a community-wide Thanksgiving church service. Lights in the park were financed with money from memorials.

The first play, performed by a Sakakawea Area Council for the Arts cast, was a musical featuring 56 people.

The Main Street of Garrison came alive with a handfull of street vendors. The first street vendors were the Potato Man and the Garrison Fire Department hawking pickled fish.

House tours were of the Robin's Nest Bed & Breakfast, now a private residence, and the rural Norlan Nelson home. The first Dickens ornament was ordered.

The First Congregational Church hosted a Victorian dinner and tea, which since has developed into the now-famous English High Tea, Nov. 29 & 30 of this year's festival.

The lit-up jingle bell lights on Main Street were later replaced with wrought iron brackets on light poles. In preparation for each festival, the poles are decorated with garland and bows.

Today, it's estimated that at least 1,000 people attend each day, sometimes as many as 3,000. A survey by the University of Mary in 2009 showed the festival generated an average of \$175,000 each day.

Yeah, we've come a long way.





Queen Elizabus

A few years ago when the Dickens Committee showed a picture of the bus to a bus manager in England he said, "Oh, she's a Majestic Old Beast."

She's majestic and we love her. And we're even more proud of her since she underwent a complete makeover and facelift. It was way more than a Mary Kay cosmetic night!

The windows were removed, the interior and exterior were sandblasted and then sanded for painting. Holes were patched, all the inperfections were smoothed. Painting began and today -she's a beaut!

Besides the paint, the seats were upholstered and improvements were made to the heat and PA system and all new weather stripping was applied before the windows were reinstalled. We still have a little work to do before next year's festival. The carpeting and interior wall upholstery were complete and we will more adequately recognize the contributions that made the bus improvements possible. We also had a building erected in 2010 to house the Queen Elizabus throughout the year.

The efforts to improve the bus were all part of a major fundraising effort that involved the individual "sale" of seats, corporate donations and the generosity of the Garrison Sales and Use Tax Committee.

Since the arrival of the bus in May of 2005, she has been worthy of her name, Queen Elizabus, which she was named before arriving in Garrison.

The cherry red double-decker 1960 English bus first appeared at the Garrison Chamber of Commerce's annual kick-off to summer in 2005. Since then the Queen can be spotted at many local events, wedding, area community celebrations and open houses.

True to its origin, the bus sports a Union Jack flag on each side. The driver of the bus also sits on the right side, again something that's very British.

The double decker came to Garrison as part of a brainstorming session by



Fort Stevenson State Park Manager Dick Messerly and local business owner Mike Gackle. After exploring on the World Wide Web, they found out such a vehicle existed, and they searched for one that was affordable and able to transport to Garrison. The closest bus to Garrison was in LeMars, Iowa.

After hearing about the idea, the Dickens Village Festival Committee decided to purchase the bus, without even looking at it. The next step was to pick up the Queen.

The trip from Iowa to Garrison could have been an actual scenario from a big screen comedy.

Local resident John Kallberg was enlisted, along with Dick Messerly, to retrieve the Queen. John had the proper license to drive the bus, however, he had never driven a vehicle where the driver is situated on the right side.

"The trip was definitely interesting,"

said Kallberg. He said it took him a little while before he got the hang of it. Messerly followed in his vehicle. One unexpected visitor Kallberg was joined by was a mess of bees that had built two hives in the bus. One of these hives was directly above Kallberg's head in the driver's compartment. Entering the bus through the ventilation system did not make the bees happy, nor did it put our heroic driver in a good mood. Stopping the bus, the two men shooed the bees out.

The trip was a great eye popper. People waved and stopped the two travelers along the way back to Garrison.

Since its arrival, people have been really enchanted with the bus and the committee has had many requests to use the bus. Besides using her in the festival, she's been rented out for festivals, weddings and celebrations.

A few facts about the Queen

• 1961 Bristol Lodekka (FLF Model – flat bottom floor, long body and front entrance). Built in England through a contract with the English government as part of the first double-decker bus fleet.

• Only 1,867 FLF models were built between 1959 and 1968. It is unknown how many are still operational.

+ 24 volt electrical system

• 4-speed manual transmission system (constant mesh.)

• 70 passenger capacity.


• 6-cylinder Bristol diesel engine.

• Top speed is 40 miles per hour.

• Steering wheel is on the right side of the bus with no power steering and gear shift is on the left side of the driver.

• Originally painted green in England because it was a non-London bus; only the double-deckers in London were printed the typical red.

• Brought to the U.S. In 1980 by a Denver, Colo. Company. It was then sold to a company in Georgia, then a company in Iowa and finally to the Dickens Village Festival for \$5,000 in 2005.

Who's that dressed in red?

The many names of Ole St. Nick

Who's that in the long white beard and flowing red cape? Why it's none other than Father Christmas.

Watch for Father Christmas, who will appear on Main Street at various times throughout the Dickens Village Festival.

Garrison's very own Don Vetter has played Father Christmas during the Dickens Village Festival for four years.

The legend of Father Christmas began in England during an old English mid-winter festival. The attire of the time was green. Red-attired Father Christmas first appeared in the mid 1870's.

The history of Father Christmas says the character is based on St. Nicholas who was a saint in Myra in the fourth century.

St. Nicholas was called Sinter Klaas in Dutch and Santa Claus came from a distorted pronunciation of Sinter Klaas.

St. Nicholas was shy and helping the poor without disclosing his identity was not an easy task. One day he climbed up the roof of a house and dropped down a purse full of money through the chimney, which landed in a girl's stocking.

This is probably where the idea of St. Nicholas (or Santa Claus) giving gifts in stockings originated.









SUPPORT THE URCHINS

Coppers? Coppers, please. Don't be shy, the little urchins wandering the street aren't begging for pennies and spare change to buy a candy bar or treat; they're raising funds for Garrison's Gifts from the Heart campaign.

The program, which is sponsored by the Garrison Chamber of Commerce and supported by local churches and businesses, prepares food baskets and gifts for individuals and families in Garrison, White Shield, Max and Douglas. They have been serving the community since 1986.

Gifts from the Heart organizer Janis Sloka has been part of the community since 2007 and is in charge of rounding up street urchins to roam the street during the festival. He contacts church leaders and other various children's groups in the Garrison area to ask for volunteers to be "Urchins." The Boys Scouts and Girls Scouts are usually involved, as well as other groups around the area.

Each year, volunteers gather just before Christmas to pack food baskets for less fortunate families in the area.

Food baskets include the ingredients for a holiday meal – turkey, ham, flour, sugar, potatoes, pop and bread.

They also include donated canned goods and other nonperishable items.

Money collected by the urchins also helps buy Christmas gifts for the needy as well.


