Wise Guy Returns to Service

Approximately 13 years ago B-52 60-034 left Minot Air Force Base, headed for Arizona as part of a reduction in forces. The number of planes that had the same destiny as Wise Guy numbers between 10 and 15 according to sources at Minot Air Force Base. Expectations were that these planes may not see active duty again, but those expectations were proven wrong. Never say never as they say.

On Tuesday, March 9th, almost 60 minutes early of an announced 1330 arrival at Minot Air Force Base, Wise Guy would touch down on the runway where this B-52H would have flown from for almost 20 years, once again. With a fresh coat of paint and almost 2 years of refurbishing and modernizing, Wise Guy would taxi slowly to the once active "Alert Area" where B-52's stood sentinel during the cold war of the late 60's and 70's. Aside

from the welcoming party for Wise Guy, the area is now vacant.

SMSgt Chris McCauley, now the Maintenance Superintendent for the 5 BW, remembers Wise Guy from the first tour of duty the jet had. "I have worked on B-52's all of my career" says McCauley, he joined the Air Force in September of 1999, and arrived in Minot on April 1st of 2000. For McCauley, it would be hard to remember just one B-52, "especially if they weren't hard to work on. You know, some planes just seem to be more difficult" says McCauley, but he is convinced that Wise Guy was probably a "good plane when it was here the first time" as he couldn't remember Wise Guy being one of those difficult planes to work on.

On the flight line to welcome Wise Guy back to Minot was CMSgt Ryan Thompson of the 5th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron. Chief Thompson was

sent to Davis-Monthan AFB to begin the regeneration process on Wise Guy about 2 years ago. The length of the reclamation period was determined both by the amount of maintenance that needed to be performed, and the budget. "For example, Wise Guy took the place of the B-52 that was destroyed at Tinker

AFB for PDM (Programmed Depot Maintenance). The first B-52 that was regenerated, Ghost Rider, by chance happened to be at Tinker as the same time as Wise Guy undergoing the PDM, a maintenance procedure that takes place every 4 years. In Wise Guy's situation, the PDM was the end of a 3- stage process of regeneration.

"It took us 3 months to get Wise Guy ready to fly to Barksdale AFB to begin regeneration" according to CMSgt Thompson, "after that it was Barksdale and then Tinker."

How soon will Wise Guy return to the fleet? "We are anticipating 21 days until Wise Guy is back on line" according to Thompson.





Bomber Task Force mission to Middle East

U.S. CENTRAL COMMAND PUBLIC AFFAIRS

SOUTHWEST ASIA -U.S. Air Force A pair of "Stratofortresses" flew a multinational patrol mission across the Middle East, March 7 to deter aggression and reassure partners and allies of the U.S. military's commitment to security in the region.

Multiple partner nations and U.S. Air Force fighter aircraft accompanied the U.S. bombers at different points during the flight, including Israel, Saudi Arabia and Qatar.

The U.S. Air Force routinely moves aircraft and personnel into, out of, and around the U.S. Central Command area responsibility to mission requirements, and to train with regional partners, importance underscoring the of strategic partnerships.

Temporary long-range deployments bomber into the region dates back 2015. This was the fourth bomber deployment into the Middle East this year.



International Women's Day: Honor the Past and Secure the Future

March 8, 2021 marks International Women's Day, a celebration of women and their contributions to society. For the women of the Air Force, and especially Team Minot, the day is an important reminder of the strength and determination of military females and their predecessors.

To celebrate the day, the Minot Air Force Base Women's History Council hosted a leadership panel at the Jimmy Doolittle Event Center. Airmen and civilians were invited to gather, ask questions, and celebrate women's journeys in the Air Force. Three panels spoke throughout the day, including female leadership from the from the 91st Missile Wing, 5th Bomb Wing, and an opening statement from Brigadier General Stacy Huser, Principal Assistant Deputy Administrator for Military Application, National Nuclear Security Administration, Department Washington D.C.

Huser, who helped pioneer the first all-female alert crew at Minot AFB, N.D., in 2016, is a prominent advocate for women in the military.

"When I first joined the Air Force, I didn't really care about women's representation in the military... I was perfectly happy being the only woman in the room," said Huser. "About ten years in, something in me changed, and I got mad when I was the only woman in the room. I said 'Well, where are the women? Why aren't they here?' Ever since then, I've been passionate about women serving in the military."

The all-female alert crew was the first of its kind since women were allowed to join the Air Force in 1948 and allowed to become missileers in 1986. Since then, the event has become an annual celebration of Women's History Month.

As with many efforts made by women throughout history, the alert was not free from criticism. "As soon as we said the words all-women's alert, the trolls came out," said Huser. "I sat down with my squadron commanders, who were all four men, and I said 'Never mind, we can't do this. The comments are already too ugly; I give up.' And it was them who said, 'No, this is important. We need to do this.""

Huser stressed her gratitude to her fellow male leaders for encouraging the all-female alert. With their motivation in helping the women of Team Minot put on a show of strength and solidarity, the all-female alert moved forward with confidence. "I reached out to the other Operations Groups and they joined in. I reached out to the Bomb Wing, so they flew female crews that day. The 625th STOS flew a female crew. Our awesome Public Affairs team at Minot had an all-women's team covering the event, it was just huge!"

"When we started the women's alert, it was to honor the women who came before us. We stand on the shoulders of giants. It was to honor them and to hopefully inspire a future generation, ¬" she said.

While the month is an

inspirational celebration of women's accomplishments, it is also a time to sit down and think about the work that still needs to be done to make the world, and the Air Force, a more inclusive environment for all.

As recently as 2016, all jobs in the Air Force were finally available to females, opening up nearly 4,000 positions that women were previously not allowed to hold. And while integration in many job fields is possible, it does not always happen right away.

SSgt. MaKinzie Nester, a Missile and Space Facilities Technician for the 91st Missile Maintenance Group, is one of many women to join a male dominated field: maintenance. "With my job, I do a lot of diesel mechanic type work, HVAC work, and electrical. All throughout history, that's just been seen as more of a man's job. It's not very feminine, you could say," said Nester.

"But, we're not all meant to work at a desk. We can get our hands dirty; we can lift and do all the heavy maintenance that any guy can do," she said. For Nester, having the will and determination to succeed are important traits for women in male-dominated careers to possess.

Another female working her way up in a previously maledominated career field is Lt. Col. Sandra Bates, Commander of the 91st Missile Security Forces Squadron and Women's Day panelist. Bates was joined by SMSgt. Yucari Brown, First Sergeant of the 5th Security Forces Squadron, and MSgt. Adrian Galcik, First Sergeant for the 91st Security Forces Group, for the second panel of the day.

Bates recalled one moment that helped shape her determination for becoming the leader and woman she is today.

"I came into Minot pregnant, and I was losing my mind thinking what is my commander going to think?' My commander at the time was very accommodating and understanding. But then, it was looking like I was going to get selected for command again and he says, 'Well you know you probably shouldn't be pregnant again at your next command.' He said, 'So what are your plans for having a family, do you think you're going to have another kid?' I was shocked. Would he be telling a guy he couldn't have another kid? What would be wrong with me having another kid? It's like, you can go command or you can have another kid, but why do I have to choose?" said Bates.

Fellow panelist MSgt. Galcik didn't choose between family and career, but instead pursued both dreams. Now, she raises a thriving family of five children all while being a First Sergeant. While family care often falls on the woman's shoulders in society, these leaders are living proof that women can balance successful careers, family life, and a personal life. They truly can do it all.

Many working women, even outside of the Air Force, feel that others sometimes perceive their workplace confidence and assertiveness in a negative way. So how does one navigate this?



Brown said, "How others perceive us may not necessarily be how we are. You've got to be the best version of you."

Time, education, and inclusive policies are all key factors in helping to remove negative stereotypes surrounding women in leadership roles. Brown believes that it's also important to remember where people come from and what makes them unique in order to understand their personality as a leader.

One other important question asked during the panel came from one of the few male attendees in the room. "When it comes to men in the military, what can they do to improve their relationships with their fellow women and be better co-workers and supervisors?"

The main response was emotional maturity. Listen, learn how to respond to them, and also know the female regulations. "Connect with them on a different level. Get to know their family life. Have that open communication as well. Because that's one thing, a lot of females sometimes don't feel comfortable talking to a

male about issues going on. If you're unable to help them with that mentorship, guide them to another female that can hopefully mentor them, and hopefully that mentor can help you with some of the things that are going on," said Galcik.

The conversation topics of the day revolved heavily on women's experiences in the Air Force and the rise to leadership as a female, as well as ways to set themselves up for success. The Air Force has also set up many policies to help women on the path to success, including discarding many height standards for pilots, designing new gear to better fit women's bodies, and implementing policies to benefit pregnant and postpartum Airmen. However, there is still work to be done, and conversations like the ones held during Women's History Month are important for progress to be made.

The leadership panel is one of many events being held by the Minot AFB Women's History Council this month. According to many of the participants, the all-female alert will face some challenges due to COVID-19, but the women of Minot AFB still hope to celebrate to the best of their abilities.

In her closing remarks, Brig. Gen. Huser left the women of Team Minot with an encouraging message that applies to females everywhere. "I hope you use Women's Day to also celebrate you. The women we have now are the most intelligent, courageous, authentic, inclusive, diverse, group of women that I have ever seen. You relish in your uniqueness. You're brave, you're unapologetic for who you are, and you also relish in your unity! You know that you're stronger together, you support each other, you look out for each other, you lift each other up; it's just amazing. Yeah it's great to celebrate the women who came before us, but you are writing history right now. My daughters are going to be celebrating you, because you are inspiring them. You're paving the way. You're the ones showing them that there are no limits to what they can do."

CAPTAIN ALYSSA FORD

This is Captain Alyssa Ford! She is one of two squadron weapons officers and her specific job is overseeing training for the entire 742nd Missile Squadron. She helps manage a shop of 6 instructors who give missile simulation rides to crew members, track trends, and develop supplemental training products for crew members. She has been here since 2015 and She absolutely loves it!

Capt. Ford believes International Women's Day is a day to reflect on the achievements of the trailblazing women that came before her.

This may sound corny, however, specifically to her, it is a day she gets to take alert with all of the women in the 91st Operations Group and it feels awesome knowing that there are enough women who can pull nuclear alert. It didn't used to be that way, when ICBMs and alert duty came to fruition, women were not able to pull alert duties. It wasn't until the 1980's that women were able to pull alert and take part in this unique mission; so she feels very fortunate to have the ability to pull alert.

Capt. Ford also feels very fortunate that her current shop has four women in it (not including her!). She gets to work with some extremely high caliber people who push her to do better each and every day! This might be a hottake, but she doesn't particularly like the question of "what does being a woman in my career field mean to me", because to her, her job is her job and what she does for her career field is not defined by her gender. She knows her gender does not define what her limits are in this career field, nor

make it easier or harder to operate in her environment.

However, Capt. Ford notes that some very amazing women have come before her and she constantly look up to them, they are: Captain Erica Weitgenant, Captain Kate Grimley, Captain Carolyn Hockaday, Captain Emily Gill, Major Traci Davis, Major Liz Neary, General Stacy Jo Huser. Capt. Ford expresses that she is very lucky- some of them don't probably know that they made this list, but she admires every single one of these women and they have

been integral to her development as an officer and a human being. All of them have given her guidance and been a part of her two major accomplishments in her career, which are: competing in Global Strike Challenge in 2017, and winning the McAdoo Trophy for Best Weapon System Score, as well as graduating Weapons School- as a part of Class 20A- last year. She is extremely humbled and grateful for where she is in her Air Force career as well as life. She couldn't do it without those

other awesome ladies!





AMN EMILY HANNA

Amn Emily Hanna works in the Facility Maintenance Section. She is currently the FMS scheduler, an FMS tool room trainer, a tool room shift lead, and is the program lead for their shops' extensive bench stock program.

Amn Hanna takes the time to train and mentor the new tool room airmen on their many roles and responsibilities, has created and implemented a new system of organizing their supply section, and conducts needed parts research for the missile complex. SSGT. AMANDA WEST

SSgt. Amanda West, a California native, is the NCO in charge of Aircraft Maintenance Unit scheduling. She makes maintenance schedules for maintainers on the flight line and distributes it throughout the squadrons.

"There are so many women in the military making big changes right now," said West. "I am just out here proving that I can do my job just as well as anyone else."





SRA ALEXIS WHEELER

SrA Alexis Wheeler is a training instructor for the 5th Security Forces Squadron. She trains 600 SF Airmen every week, reinforcing their tech school education, and ensuring that they retain the knowledge needed for their career field. Being the only female instructor on her team, Wheeler says she works just as hard as any of her coworkers.

"I don't want that stereotype of the female that's not as capable. I don't want women to be better, I just want us to be even," said Wheeler.

Wheeler says that she holds a strong voice and tries to assume leadership positions in order to stand out from her peers.

"I just try to have a lot of face time,"

said Wheeler. "I'm an instructor so the 600 people who need training already see my face once a week."

Wheeler said her goal is to commission and become a pilot. She was accepted into the Airman Scholarship Program for military justice and will commission afterward.

"Change people's minds," said Wheeler. "Show them there's no difference between men and women."

Wheeler said her inspiration is her mother. Having served as a security forces Airman in the Air Force for 23 years and continuing to serve as a government contractor, Wheeler says her mom has been a very strong female role model.





CAPTAIN TARINA CROOK

Captain Tarina Crook is an Air Force Academy graduate with a Bachelors of Science in Legal Studies. Upon graduating she spent a year traveling the country to assist the Air Force Academy with diversity recruiting before joining the missileer family. Tarina is currently working on her Masters degree in social work, she has a 4.0 gpa while interning over 320 hours at a women's shelter in Minot. She has recently been induced into the National Honor Society for social work.

Captain Crook is passionate about her job. She says she feels like she is part of a giant Air Force family all around the world and feels a sense of love enveloping her when she puts on her uniform. Tarina is passionate about diversity and championing progress for women. She feels

empowered at work as a crew commander to grow and mentor the newer generation of missileers. Captain Crook enjoys teaching and is excited to take on her new role as an instructor in the near future.

Captain Crook thinks one of the most important aspects of her job as an officer and as a soon to be social worker is changing the narrative of people's lives who are disenfranchised, marginalized and underrepresented. She wants other girls to know they too can pursue their dreams and pave the way for others. Captain Crook says she is humbled, awed and inspired by the other women she works with of all ranks. She says "when one woman wins, all women win."

All-women crews lead strategic deterrent forces on International Women's Day

BARKSDALE AIR FORCE BASE, La. --

As it has since 2016, Air Force Global Strike Command recognizes Women's History Month by coordinating all-female alert crews to dispatch to the missile field, and all-female bomber crews at some of its bases.

This year, all three intercontinental ballistic missile wings are posting women to the field on alert for International Women's Day. In addition, bases across the command will have will have all-female command post teams, maintenance teams, and helicopter and security forces crews as well.

"It is important for us to recognize the important role women play in our military today, and International Women's Day is the perfect opportunity to do that," said Col. Anita Feugate Opperman, 341st Missile Wing Commander. "When I came in 27 years ago, we would have barely been able to put together a couple of female crews, and now we are doing it across all three missile wings as well as some of our bomber wings as well. We want the American public to know that women directly support our mission every day."

Women's History Month commemorates the vital role of women in American history and its future. From manning the home front during the world wars to propelling suffragettes to demand the right to vote, women's contributions in society has been, and is, constantly evolving.

Posting female crews has become an annual tradition at AFGSC as a way to recognize the

contributions women make to the command and its mission.

Air Force Global Strike Command is comprised of more than 33,700 Airmen and civilians assigned to two numbered air forces, 11 wings, geographically-separated squadrons and one detachment in the continental United States, and deployed to locations around the globe. The Command oversees two-thirds of the Nation's nuclear weapons including all bomber and Intercontinental Ballistic Missile operations for the U.S. Department of Defense. How Often Should You Change Engine Oil

Every automobile engine needs oil, but not just any oil will do. Modern engines are designed and built to exacting standards and require oils that meet very specific industry and automaker specifications to ensure a long service life. Failure to use the right type oil, and document its use, could void your new-car warranty.

Most late-model cars require synthetic-blend or full-synthetic, low-viscosity, multi-grade, resource-conserving oils that minimize friction and maximize fuel economy. However, choosing the right oil is not always easy. The proper oil for your make and model of vehicle must have the correct SAE viscosity grade, meet performance standards set by the API, ILSAC and/or ACEA, and comply with any unique specifications established by the automaker or engine manufacturer. These requirements are detailed in your vehicle owner's manual, and your auto repair shop can provide information on your vehicle's recommended oil specifications as well.

Depending on vehicle age, type of oil and driving conditions, oil change intervals will vary. It used to be normal to change the oil every 3,000 miles, but with modern lubricants most engines today have recommended oil change intervals of 5,000 to 7,500 miles. Moreover, if your car's engine requires full-synthetic motor oil, it might

go as far as 15,000 miles between services! You cannot judge engine oil condition by color, so follow the factory maintenance schedule for oil changes.

Oil Change Intervals – Older Cars

Older cars typically have oil change intervals based on mileage, and have two maintenance schedules, one for cars driven in "normal" operation and another for those used in "severe service." The latter category involves operating your car under one or more of the following

Primarily short trips (5 miles or less) Extremely hot, cold, or dusty climates Sustained stop-and-go driving Carrying heavy loads or towing a trailer

If your vehicle use falls under the severe service definition in your owner's manual, maintain your car using the more rigorous schedule. However, if you drive your car under normal conditions, be wary of spending hard-earned money on oil change services and other maintenance work your car may not need or benefit from.

Oil Change Intervals – Newer Cars

Most newer cars are equipped with oillife monitoring systems that automatically determine when an oil change is needed and notify you with an alert on the instrument panel.

Early simple systems are time and mileage based, but current advanced designs analyze actual vehicle operating conditions to identify when the oil will begin to degrade. In fact, the owner's and maintenance manuals for many newer cars eliminate "severe service" recommendations altogether because the oil-life monitoring system automatically shortens the oil change interval when it detects heavy-duty operation.

Whenever you have your car's oil changed, the service technician should reset the oil-life monitoring system. If you change your own oil, you can reset the system by following the instructions in the vehicle owner's manual.

Less frequent oil changes on newer engines make it essential that you check the oil level monthly and top it up as needed. While many engines will use less than a quart of oil between changes, others can consume as much as a quart every 600 to 700 miles. Maintaining proper oil levels can help you avoid costly car repairs; engine wear or damage resulting from low oil levels will not be covered by your new-car warranty. Note that if you do not put many miles on your car, most automakers recommend an oil change every 12 months, even if the maintenance reminder has not come on.





Air Force finalizes PT uniform design; will begin production process

WRIGHT-PATTERSON AIR FORCE BASE, Ohio (AFNS) --

After numerous tests and feedback from Airmen around the world, the Air Force Uniform Office has finalized the design of the new Physical Training Gear uniform, or PTG, and is preparing to begin the production process.

This is the first update to the PT uniform in more than 16 years, and more than 150 Airmen participated in testing the uniform.

"Our main requirement (from Air Force leaders) was to develop a PT uniform that people really wanted to wear and is as good as, if not better than, commercially available athletic wear," said Tracy Roan, chief of the Air Force Uniform Office which is aligned under the Agile Combat Support Directorate's Human Systems Division. "The new uniform now includes all of the great performance features that you find in athletic wear today.'

In addition to improving performance, the uniform is designed to accommodate various athletic interests.

"In the past, there was one uniform for all athletic pursuits, whether you were running, playing basketball or lifting weights," said Col. Paul Burger, 88th Air Base Wing Mission Support Group commander, one of the test participants and an official with the Air Force Marathon. "The approach the Air Force has now taken, is to develop a uniform that is earmarked for runners or running and one that is better designed for some of those other athletic activities."

With the new gear, Airmen will be issued a jacket, a pair of pants, T-shirt and shorts.

The ensemble will have improved fabrics that include soft, quick-drying material and have antimicrobial technology that helps with moisture and odor control.

significant changes Other include the design of the jacket.

"With the 'notorious' track jacket, we've made updates to the fabric to minimize the noise it makes during workouts," said 2nd

Lt. Maverick Wilhite, the uniform office's program manager for PT gear. "The jacket will be sleeker looking, so instead of having a bulky jacket, you'll have a fit and tailored design. In addition, the jacket will have a zipper chest pocket for holding things like your CAC (common access card)."

The workout ensemble will include two variations of shorts; a shorter running style, and a longer all-purpose short. The allpurpose shorts are unlined knit with zipper hip pockets you can close. The runner's short is a lightweight stretch-woven fabric with mesh side panels to improve airflow and improved stretch liner for modesty. The performance shirt is designed to be untucked during workouts or tucked as required by command.

Overall, the entire PTG uniform has updated styling with stretch materials to provide comfort and increase performance.

The new uniform will be available to Airmen in 2022, and there will be a four-year transition period for mandatory wear.

"Minot is like a second home to me," Steiger said. "All of us technicians are super close here too. Since Minot is a smaller base, you have to make the most of it, and you get really close to each other and it really is like a second family."



FRIED HALIBUT FISH STICKS



INGREDIENTS AS NEEDED, EXTRA-VIRGIN OLIVE OIL 1 1/2 POUND HALIBUT 1/2 CUP ALL-PURPOSE FLOUR

1 1/2 TEASPOON SALT 1 TEASPOON GROUND BLACK PEPPER 2 LARGE EGGS

1 1/2 CUP PANKO BREADCRUMBS 2 TABLESPOON DRIED PARSLEY 1 TEASPOON DILL WEED, DRIED

When ready to cook, set grill temperature to High and preheat, lid closed for 15 minutes. For optimal results, set to 500 ° F if available

Place a dutch oven inside the grill to preheat (about 10

minutes) with enough olive oil to fry fish. Rinse all fish fillets and pat dry. Cut fillets into 1" strips. In one bowl combine the all-purpose flour, salt, and pepper. In a separate bowl, beat eggs. In a third bowl, combine the panko, parsley and dill.



Dip fish fillets first in the flour mixture, then the eggs and then the panko mixture. Place fish sticks in oil and fry for about 3 to 4 minutes, or until they reach an internal temperature of 130 ° F.

Companions for Children

Companions for Children is a local non-profit organization that connects Minot's youth to adult mentors in order to create a positive environment for growth and learning. The organization, which was founded in 1972, aims to give children the tools they need to grow into emotionally healthy, productive adults.

The program is available for children ages six to 18, and matches youth with a suitable mentor to spend time together and participate in a variety of free or low-cost activities such as crafts, going to the zoo, and other fun pastimes that the child might enjoy.

According to Companions, youth who regularly spend time with a mentor are often less likely to participate in harmful behaviors such as substance abuse. On the other hand, they are more likely to participate in healthy behaviors to set them up for success, such as enrolling in college, playing sports, and volunteering.

"Role models are so important for children to have in their life," said Heather Cymbaluk, Executive Director of Companions. "We're seeing a growing need for volunteer mentors, and we have kids on our waitlist who are ready and waiting to have a mentor."

The mentors who join Companions have valuable life experience and are able to offer that to the youth that they spend time with. A mentor is an adult friend, guide, listener, confidant and resource for the child. Mentors are asked to meet up with their mentee every other week for a minimum of four hours per month, for at least one year. They are expected to stay engaged in their mentee's life to maintain a healthy, happy relationship.

ongoing and seemingly pressurefilled position, it has a variety of benefits for not only the youth, but the adults as well.

"A lot of mentors tend to be hesitant at first. It's a little nervewracking meeting a new kid. You feel expected to be this great role model for them," said Cymbaluk. "But I always hear from mentors down the road saying, 'That year went by so fast, and I just really enjoy getting to be a kid again myself!' They find it to be a very rewarding experience as well."

Each pair is matched through a rigorous process in order to partner youth with compatible adults, and vice versa. Things such as interests, background, and time on the waiting list are all taken into consideration.

Adults 20 years of age and up who meet Companions' requirements are eligible to become mentors, but the organization is currently in immediate need of male mentors. Service members from Minot Air Force Base are encouraged to volunteer, given their unique life experience in the military that also brings the local community together with the community on base.

Many mentors, including Airmen, continue to stay in contact with their child even after leaving Minot. The program is simply a stepping stone to a worthwhile friendship that can help local youth start their lives off on the right foot.

"It is a long-term commitment, but it has so many long-term benefits for the child," said Cvmbaluk.





Moose on the prairie

It seems moose missed the memo they're not tender shoots and leaves of trees. supposed to like life in the wide open spaces of North Dakota.

People typically envision moose — the largest member of the deer family — as a massive creature munching on their favorite meal of woody browse in forests or wading above their ankles in swamps nibbling on aquatic plants. They're even in heavily wooded mountains.

But, really, should they be standing alongside a shelterbelt in wide open North Dakota?

It seems moose are more adaptable than what folks realized. Historical accounts of moose across North America talks about traditional woodlands interspersed with swamps and small lakes – and it's not in North Dakota.

Yet moose have almost always lived in North Dakota since the end of the Great Ice Age. It's just that their traditional habitat of forests and swamps was limited to north-central North Dakota around the Turtle Mountains and northeastern woods of the Pembina

Their numbers dwindled to the point that in a 1909-1910 biennial report of the agency that was the forerunner to the modern day N.D. Game and Fish Department stated, "Our law makes no mention of elk or moose, presumably for the reason that normally we have none of these animals in the state..."

However, moose returned to the state, filtering down from their traditional range in Canada and over from wooded northern Minnesota. Generally they stayed in areas where people envision moose around the Turtle Mountains and Pembina Hills.

But it seems moose adapted to North Dakota's changing landscape. As row crops such as corn and sunflowers became more commonplace across the state's rolling plains, people began seeing moose in places no one thought imaginable — even in areas as far south as Interstate-94.

They found the woody bottomlands of the Upper Missouri River and Lake Sakakawea around the Williston area.

They found shelterbelts and cattails embracing wetlands and small lakes dotting much of the Prairie Pothole Region. It seems they found corn and sunflowers stalks to be quite tasty, maybe similar to

The bottom line is moose in North Dakota have adapted to a much broader habitat than biologists could have initially envisioned.

Today, they're now one of what could be dubbed "the Big Three" when it comes to North Dakota big game hunting. Moose, elk, and bighorn sheep are once-in-a-lifetime licenses for hunters living in the Peace Garden State.

Hunters had limited options on where they could hunt moose when the state opened its first season in 1977 with 10 licenses.

In 2021, 10 licenses are available in one unit alone — Unit M6. Unit M10 in northwestern North Dakota has a whopping 190 licenses – 70 "any" and 120 antlerless. Triple digit licenses are also available in two other units, M9 (a total of 120, 45 "any" and 75 antlerless) and M11 where hunters can apply for one of 130 licenses, 55 "any" or 75 antlered.

Unit M5 has five "any" licenses available while Unit M8 has 15 "any" licenses.

Ironically, the areas of North Dakota first open to moose hunting have been closed in recent years. Like Minnesota's moose populations, numbers in those two areas remain low.

In the meantime, moose populations in other areas of North Dakota are doing fine.

The number of available licenses in 2021 is the same as 2020.

With chronic wasting disease (CWD) identified in parts of units M10 and M11, hunters should consider the fact they must follow CWD transportation regulations when selecting their unit options.

The carcass, spinal column, or head can't be taken out of those two units. While getting an entire moose out in one piece is rare at best in most areas of North America, it's fairly common in North Dakota.

That's because moose are often in more open areas compared to their traditional range so it's easier to access with a pickup and trailer. Just remember to obtain permission first if hunting on private land and it's posted as closed to hunting.

Application deadline is March 24. North Dakota residents can go online to the Game and Fish Department website, (gf.nd.gov) to apply.

ADLS training transitions to "myLearning" in first step for new force development learning management system

IOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO-RANDOLPH, Texas – As part of Air Education and Training Command's efforts to aggressively and cost-effectively modernize education and training, Airmen and Guardians can access the "myLearning" digital platform on the Air Force Portal beginning March 18, 2021.

The AETC Learning Services division is launching the new secure learning management system (LMS) that will enable student learning, automation and reporting for roughly 800,000 Total Force users in three phases, with the first phase consisting of a modernized and interactive training platform that allows Airmen to access training modules previously found on the Advanced Distributed Learning Service (ADLS).

"Our training systems that support Force Development must be relevant to today's Airmen so we can accelerate the change we need to keep pace with the fastpaced virtual learning world," said Maj. Gen. Jeannie Leavitt, AETC director of operations and communications. "To develop an Airman's competencies to out-think and out-perform any adversary in complex operational environments, we need to leverage modern information technology... myLearning helps us modernize how we train our force."

Users are advised they should complete all training coursework in ADLS not later than March 10. The ADLS website will be inaccessible to users March 26.

"Users who log in to myLearning March 18 may not initially see their historical training transcripts reflected in the system," said Denise Padilla-Rorie, AETC myLearning program manager, said while emphasizing patience with the new system. "The transcript data is scheduled to migrate into myLearning."

According to Padilla-Rorie, the platform's vision is to centralize LMS platforms across the force and allows the student to access multiple databases and training curriculum with a single login, which eliminates the need for Airmen to have multiple passwords for access.

"How and where Airmen learn continues to change and we must account not only for "learn-from-work," but also "learn-from-anywhere," said Floyd A. McKinney, AETC chief of learning services. "If we are

going to meet the challenges of an uncertain future, we need to bring learning to Airmen instead of sending Airmen to learning there has never been a better time to innovate.'

Phase two of the rollout is slated to begin this spring when the Enterprise Blended Learning Service (EBLS) is migrated to the new system, Padilla-Rorie said. Phase three will begin later this year and involve added system capabilities and additional integration of other learning systems.

"By the end of phase III, the goal of myLearning is that the system will meet Airmen for training where they are, whether it's on a network computer or a tablet in the comfort of their own home, giving them control over the time and place training can occur," said Rotary Green, AETC myLearning product development program lead.

Currently, users must login with their Common Access Cards, but officials are working to add two-factor authentication





Air Force Security Forces Center to improve US government-wide working dog programs

JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO-LACKLAND, Texas (AFNS) --

The Air Force Security Forces Center-led Government Working Dog Category Intelligence Team aims to improve the cost, process and procurement of government working dogs across 14 federal agencies.

The team recently submitted the Working Dog Category Report, Intelligence which looked into the requirements of maintaining working dogs within the Department of Defense, Department of State, Department of Homeland Security and the Department of Justice, in an effort to identify gaps and opportunities, recommend more effective and efficient sourcing strategies, close gaps between current practices and share government and industry best practices.

Scott R. Heise, team lead and director of Air Force Security & Protection Category Management's Program Management Office for AFSFC, said "The report identified some crucial gaps, such as the procurement process."

"All of us have the same need for working dogs, but the way we source them is very different," Heise said. "Even our requirements are different and this inconsistency makes it difficult for the vendors to try to keep up and maintain a supply of high-quality working dogs. Simple things, like the age of the

dog or the type of socialization it gets prior to delivery, present challenges for the vendors.'

"If all the agencies give vendors one integrated demand forecast, then the vendors can develop a better plan to meet our needs and satisfy the demand," Heise added.

"The improved procurement process will allow Air Force Defenders the ability to better manage their MWD programs, making them healthier and stronger at the tactical, operational and strategic levels," said Master Sgt. Steven Kaun, AFSFC Military Working Dog program manager.

"This streamlined process will pair up more canines with more handlers across the Air Force and allow garrison, and even up to combatant commanders, to have more assets on hand to accomplish their missions," Kaun said. "And it also helps give some of our older, hard-working dogs a much deserved, timely retirement."

In addition to the procurement process, the report provided six recommendations to improve the GWD program:

- 1. Establish an annual purchase forecast to both the contiguous United States and outside-CONUS vendors, which will help with the breeding and preparation process
- 2. Implement acquisition best practices to guide agencies during the procurement process
- 3. Provide the Customs and

Border Protection Agency opportunities to work with OCONUS vendors, which will give the agency more options to source working dogs

- 4. Establish a small business breeder communication plan to help develop a larger U.S. vendor
- 5. Build standardized U.S. government-wide working dog travel requirements for airlines
- 6. Develop a national emergency response plan for explosive detection working dogs.

"What we expect from these recommendations is continued growth and maturation of the working dog program not only for the Air Force, but all 14 agencies," Heise said. "We also see great potential to build the U.S. industrial base for government working dogs and ensure the participation of small businesses, and advance the goals of category management."

Category management is an approach the federal government is implementing to help standardize procurement functions and share best practices across its agencies in the hopes of providing savings, better value, and efficiency. It is divided into 10

The AFSFC originally started a Category Intelligence Report on the Air Force-led DoD Military Working Dog program, but Heise saw opportunities to look beyond

the services and include other federal agencies.

"Once we started, we saw how closely TSA worked with DoD on Lackland AFB, so I recommended to the Federal Category Manager that we make the CIR a government-wide effort," Heise said. "She agreed and assigned me as the Government-wide Working Dog Team lead for the Security and Protection category."

The newly-formed multiagency team then researched presented the recommendations in the final Category Intelligence Report to Jaclyn Rubino, the governmentwide Security & Protection manager. Rubino Category


approved all recommendations and teams will now be assembled to create a category execution plan for each.

"This is the Air Force's first interagency category management and Category Intelligence Report effort, and it's an honor to be part of the team that will not only bring change to the Air Force, but other federal agencies as well,' Heise said. "I feel it speaks to the Security Forces Center's mission, but on a larger, cross agency scale – to train, equip and manage program execution and provide expertise, and drive integration, innovation and advancement of Security Forces mission sets."

PT test pushed to July, updates to scoring, physical components ahead

WASHINGTON (AFNS) --

Physical fitness assessments will now resume for Airmen on July 1. Testing was initially delayed

from October 2020 to April 2021 to ensure the health and safety of Airmen during the COVID-19 pandemic and to ensure social distancing practices remained in place.

When assessments resume, the three-component fitness test (1.5 mile run, 1 minute of pushups and sit-ups) will be reset with scores calculated on a new three component scoring table. In addition, work is underway to separate scoring into five-year age groups as opposed to the previous ten – for example, age groups will start at <25, 25-29 years old, 30-34, years old, etc.

These changes come in addition to other modifications to the physical fitness assessment.

In December 2020, the waist measurement as a pointdriven component of the fitness assessment test was removed.

It will still be administered to determine compliance with body composition standards, as required by Department of Defense Instruction 1308.3.

As testing resumes, scores earned on the three-component fitness test will be redistributed. Final decisions on percentage component breakdowns will become available in June.

Additionally, the Air Force Fitness Working Group has explored alternatives to the testing components and scoring measures. As mentioned by Chief of Staff of the Air Force Gen. Charles Q. Brown, Jr. in December, there are on-going studies and reviews to determine a list of alternative strength and cardio components for the physical fitness assessment. For example, some alternative options being explored for the current components include the 20-meter High Aerobic Multishuttle Run (20M HAMR), row ergometry, planks, burpees and

other alternatives.

If necessary, commanders may delay official fitness assessments beyond July 2021 based on the

recommendation of local public health officials, the continuation of closed fitness centers and extended statewide restriction of movement and gatherings.

"We are also conducting a holistic review of policies associated with the physical fitness assessment program to determine if they are still a good fit for today's Air Force," said Lt. Gen. Brian Kelly, Air Force deputy chief of staff for manpower, personnel and services. "This includes a review of who's accountable for conducting our testing and how it gets administered."

In addition to scheduled Air Force Fitness Management System (AFFMS II) maintenance and updates, the Air Force is exploring replacing the system with a newer, more flexible application.

In addition to the updates above, diagnostic testing is now available for Airmen to choose when they are ready to test. If an Airman completes a diagnostic physical fitness assessment or a mock test with the Fitness Assessment Cell or Physical Training leader, and passes, he or she can decide to make the mock test an official test

score. According to AFMAN 36-2905, Air Force Physical Fitness Program, the FAC, PTL and Unit Fitness Program Manager are able to conduct the physical assessment for all Airmen, either inside or outside of their unit. Airmen can make their test official by initialing next to their total score and fitness category section, prior to leaving the testing location. If the member fails the mock test, it will not be officially counted.

Airmen may determine their next fitness assessment due date by visiting the Official Physical Assessment Due Date Matrix on myPers which will be updated and available shortly. Fitness assessment due dates will primarily depend on the date and score of the last official test.

Space Force will follow these policies until service-specific fitness policies are developed and

OOK BACK THIS WEEK IN USAF HISTORY

FIRST FLIGHT OF SIKORSKY HH-53B HELICOPTER MARCH 15, 1967



On March 15, 1967, the "Super Jolly Green Giant," or the Sikorsky HH-53B helicopter, made its initial flight. At the time, the HH-53B was the largest, most powerful, and the fastest helicopter in the United States Air Force. The maiden flight of 66-14428 took place in Stratford, Connecticut and was piloted by James R. Wright and Patrick A. Guinn. The helicopters were then sent to the 37th Air Rescue and Recovery Squadron at Eglin Air Force Base, Florida and Vietnam to perform combat search and rescue missions, as well as special

operations. The aircraft were key participants in the Son Tay Raid, where joint military forces flew a covert night mission to a POW camp in Vietnam to rescue American prisoners. By 1988, the HH-53s were modified to a new special operations configuration. In 2007, 66-14428 was retired to The Boneyard in Tucson, Arizona, and all of the models






