




















B-52s Make First-Ever Landing in Indonesia to Join Air Exercise

Two Air Force B-52s made history with the bomber's first ever landing in Indonesia on June 19—a gesture of partnership with the strategically important southeast Asian country.

"This specific deployment of the B-52s to Indonesia highlights the importance of working with our allies, partners and other U.S. joint military units as we bolster our collective ability to support a free and open Indo-Pacific," a Pacific Air Forces spokesperson told Air & Space Forces Magazine, confirming the mission. The War Zone first reported the B-52 visit, citing flight tracking data.

The bombers are assigned to the 23rd Expeditionary Bomb Squadron out of Minot Air force Base, N.D., and are in the region as part of a Bomber Task Force deployment. When they landed at Indonesia's Kualanamu Airport, it marked the start of their involvement in the Cope West exercise, during which U.S. and Indonesian fighter pilots will train with each other from June 12-23.

"This training enables our Airmen to become familiar with other theaters and airspace, and enhances the enduring skills and relationships necessary to confront a broad range of global challenges in support of the National Defense Strategy," the PACAF spokesperson

The world's fourth most populous country and 10th largest economy, Indonesia is a growing power in southeast Asia. Historically it has maintained good relations with both western countries and China, but the country's traditional policy of non-alignment may be tested as tensions grow between China and the United States, according to the Harvard International Review.

"It is unlikely that Indonesia and other partner countries would join the United States in using military force against China in the event of a significant escalation," wrote Air

War College professor Dr. Stephen Burgess in an April paper on U.S-Indonesian relations. "Although challenges exist, with the right amount of will and creative effort, the United States and Indonesia can overcome them and strengthen their relationship."

One of those efforts may be advising and augmenting the Indonesian air force through exercises like Cope West.

"The USAF and PACAF can play a leading role in developing this partnership, while avoiding a transactional and paternalistic approach," Burgess wrote.

The arrival of B-52 bombers, one of the U.S. military's most powerful platforms, seems to underscore that idea. The PACAF spokesperson said the bomber deployment is part of a larger effort to "deter, deny and dominate aggression" and promote a free and open Indo-Pacific.

"Integrating strategic bombers, such as the B-52, in operations and exercises enables different types of strategic bombers to operate

forward in the Indo-Pacific region from a broad array of overseas and continental U.S. locations with greater operational resilience," according to a PACAF statement. "Bomber missions contribute to joint force lethality and deter aggression in the Indo-Pacific by demonstrating USAF ability to operate anywhere in the world at any time in support of the National Defense Strategy."

The Minot B-52s are among

several U.S. bomber deployments meant to send similar messages around the world. On June 19, a pair of B-1 bombers landed in Sweden for the first time in an effort to show strengthened ties as the Nordic country bids to join NATO. In May, two B-1s were met by a Russian Su-27 when the bombers operated in the Baltic Sea region as part of a four-ship Bomber Task Force mission meant to support "NATO deterrence initiatives." according to a U.S. Air Forces in Europe press release.





It was a big day on the parade field at F.E. Warren Air Force Base as Col. Johnny Galbert assumed command of the 90th Missile Wing replacing Col. Catherine Barrington. It was almost picture perfect. In the past several months we've had a lot of work done on our house and greenhouse. New kitchen cabinets, some electrical rewiring in the greenhouse and house and new plumbing in the kitchen.

It's all but finished now but it brings to mind how critical the trades are and how short they are of personnel.

We were lucky to get skilled people who had been here before. But that was easier said than done. And when each of them was here to take care of their respective part of our house, each one of them told us how that particular trade is in

desperate need of warm bodies.

The carpenter who installed the kitchen cabinets only does that kind of work. Pardon the cliché, but finding him was like finding a needle in a haystack. But after months of calls and denials, we finally found someone who was willing to tackle the job.

He showed up promptly, gave us a rundown on what he would be doing each day and got after it. When he was done, it was worth the wait and the chaos. This man is a true professional and did an outstanding job.

There just aren't a lot of specialty carpenters like him and those who are out there are stretched so thin, they're backlogged months in advance. We got booked quickly because of a cancellation.

Our plumber has been in his trade for many years and is very good at what he does. He mentioned on one of four trips to our house that he will be retiring soon, adding there are a number of plumbers just like him who will be calling it a career in the next three

to five years.

What is that going to do for plumbing in North Dakota? You think it's bad now. Wait until all these guys retire out. The shortage could become catastrophic, unless something changes real soon.

There seems to be plenty of plumbing firms, but I'll bet each of those firms is short staffed. Our plumber never said that, but he implied it numerous times. How do you maintain a business when you can't keep up with the demand? These guys are human and can only work so many hours in a week.

Electricity is much the same way. There are electricians out there, but too few and they're aging like plumbers, like farmers. A lot of people don't like working with electricity so they go into something else.

The thing is, however, if you have even a slight curiosity of how electricity works, you can pretty much start a good paying career in your early 20s.

There just aren't enough

electricians to go around and in a state like North Dakota, many of them who do exist are working in industrial settings because they earn a lot more money that way. So finding an electrician to work on your house ... well.... good luck with that!

Our electrician happens to be a young guy who has been in the business just a few years but he has a lot of confidence in what he is doing, which makes him a rare individual.

Because he had done work on our greenhouse in the past, he was quick to answer a service call when several outlets and electrical appliances stopped working. To him, it was easy. To us, it was still quite cold and had anything else gone wrong, we could have lost a lot of young plants.

Because he did such good work, we asked him if he could rewire some lights in our kitchen when the cabinets were finished. He told us he is a commercial electrician and is used to working in much larger places such as warehouses.

But, he decided to take it on and are we ever glad he did. Even though he had numerous challenges in our 1910 house, he got the job done promptly and professionally.

As I said, we were lucky. But how many people don't get the service that we did simply because they can't find enough people to work or the firm isn't taking on new clients.

Salaries are quite generous and trade schools don't take nearly as long as a bachelor's or master's degree. And when you finish school, you aren't saddled with the debt that traditional college students face. In addition, you start making a good wage right out of school.

The trades seriously need young people to get involved. If you are just getting out of high school or starting college, consider a trade. You could have a career path in two years and start with a great salary.



Minot Airmen strengthen bonds with Brazilian Jiu Jitsu

Through Task Force True North's Warrior program, 115 Team Minot Airmen come together three times weekly to train in Brazilian Jiu Jitsu. Instead of other martial arts that feature striking, Jiu Jitsu takes place on the ground and utilizes chokes, grabs, grapples, and locks. They say it has changed their lives, and holds enormous benefits not only for the body, but also for the mind.

The Warrior program is open to any active duty Airman or spouse who wishes to learn Brazilian Jiu Jitsu. They often compete in tournaments in North Dakota and Minnesota, and several of their members have won regional awards for their skill.

Airman 1st Class Rachel Chi, 5th Communications Squadron communications security accountant, has been a member of the Warrior program since August of 2022, and has practiced in martial arts such as Taekwondo since she was nine years old. As a communications Airman, she must keep her body in good physical condition. She says practicing and competing in Jiu Jitsu helps her do just that.

"Jiu Jitsu has been amazing for me," said Chi. "On top of regularly going to the gym, the Warrior club has also boosted my confidence. It feels really great because I use muscles that I didn't even know existed."

Chi says Jiu Jitsu and the Warriors club has taught her many other things, such as strength through camaraderie.

"Jiu Jitsu has saved me," said Chi.
"I found a great community who cares about me. It feels amazing to fit in. I kind of see it as a safety net where we all check in on each other, on or off the mat."

Airman 1st Class Keoliani Tran, 5th Bomb Wing Chapel Corps religious affairs Airman, is also a member of the Warrior club. She has been training in Jiu Jitsu with the Warrior club since September of 2022. Tran says it has taught her countless life lessons, like how to be responsible and accountability. "It's a great outlet for me," said

Tran. "I can be myself and feel no pressure or judgment from anyone else. It's given me discipline, and has shown me that it's okay to care for myself and my needs."

Chief Master Sgt. Jason Kornelis, 891st Missile Security Forces Squadron senior enlisted leader, says Brazilian Jiu Jitsu has countless benefits to the body and, potentially, even more to the psyche.

"When the team comes together to practice, it turns Jiu Jitsu into a safe environment to hone the 'fight or flight' response," said Kornelis. "The Warriors program attempts to take the stress from life and work and transform it into something we can use on the mat."

Kornelis says that the program wasn't always this successful. He says he had to work very hard with several different agencies for months to get it where it is today, with 115 members and eight instructors.

Strong Airmen prepare for any challenge that may arise, while being able to endure and overcome situations of adversity. For Team Minot's Task Force True North Warriors, preparation includes rigorous hand-to-hand sparring and grueling training. With the help of Task Force True North, 115 Team Minot Airmen have been enabled to come together to train in Brazilian Jiu Jitsu. These Airmen have found their passion, and say they have found their home.

July 4, 2023 — On this day in 1865, the newly united United States of America celebrated its first Independence Day after four years of civil war. Although far from the battle fields of the war, Dakota Territory was also affected by the conflict, especially its isolated soldiers. After spending the duration of the Civil War in Dakota Territory's sparsely populated plains, the officers and soldiers of Fort Rice found the reuniting of their nation a meaningful reason to celebrate July 4 with new found excitement.

The men of Fort Rice suspended all business for one day to properly acknowledge America's day of independence. The events of this day were carefully and colorfully detailed in Fort Rice's newspaper, the Frontier Scout. A newspaper written and published by and for the soldiers at the fort.

On the morning of July 4, 1865, the men of Fort Rice welcomed sunrise with a 13-gun salute, and found the day to be cool, blustery, and damp with occasional sprinklings of rain. Far from dreary, the camp was decorated with soldier-made adornments; the mottos "4th July", "1776", and "Peace" painted on yellow scrolls, and two large wreaths bearing the initials of "George Washington" and "Abraham Lincoln" were hung at the entrance of the camp.

Surrounded by the patriotic art work of their fellows, the soldiers and officers of Fort Rice listened as Captain Adams compared the American people to Noah of the Old Testament. Just as Noah and his family were delivered, said Adams, so has the nation been delivered. "The ark of our liberties resting on a mountain forever immovable...the rainbow of peace extending from the Atlantic to the Pacific sea."

Speeches were quickly followed by the eagerly anticipated games of the day. The men of Fort Rice enthusiastically competed for money prizes in several contests, including a mile foot race, a blindfolded wheel barrel race, and

As the games finished, the mock dress parade began. Each soldier

dressed himself in outrageous gear and armed himself with whatever he could find; pokers, brooms, and crutches, dresses, face paint, and three-foot-tall hats.


As the day came to an end, one officer wrote, "the thirteen guns of evening, as in the morning, shook the dirt roofs of Fort Rice, and waked far echoes in the hills and ravines around, and the sun set on the happiest Fourth of all time, past, present, or to come." The men of Fort Rice then shared a feast of salmon, oysters, clams, peaches, and champagne; deliquesces rarely, if ever, seen at the fort.

After four years of division,

America was celebrating her Independence Day as one nation. The men of Fort Rice honored their country, and celebrated the end of the war, in the best way they could; with games, good food, and true comradery.

The Tots opened up the series





NORTHERN SENTRY

Since it's one of the base's most used spaces in the summer, let's get some common questions answered about the Minot AFB base pool.

Ms. Suzanne Larson, Interim Chief, Community Services Flight at 5th Force Support Squadron took some time to help explain how patrons use the pool wisely and the most efficiently over the next summer months.

Northern Sentry: Can base residents bring non military guests?

Ms. Larson: Anyone who can access the base, can swim at the pool. However, should the pool reach maximum capacity, the priority system may come into play meaning pool use would be restricted to military members and their dependents.

Northern Sentry: Will the snack bar open? If so, what types of snacks will be available?

Ms. Larson: A very limited snack bar is in the plans, offering items such as popsicles, bottled water and other snacks. As with most other businesses, staffing is a challenge so the initial focus was on hiring and training lifeguards so the pool itself could open and the snack bar will open when staffing allows and training has been completed.

Northern What Sentry: determined the open hours? (M-F 11am-6pm, Saturday 11am-6pm and closed all day on Sunday)

Ms. Larson: The operating hours were established based on usage numbers from last year and to accommodate the staffing levels. Last year the pool was closed 2 days a week so we are happy that for now, we are only closed one day a week and are open the hours that are used most by our customers based on historical data.

Northern Sentry: Can residents host after hours parties/events?

Ms. Larson: Unfortunately, at this time due to staffing constraints, after hour parties are not available.

Northern Sentry: What are the age requirements and stipulations for children coming to the pool alone?

Ms. Larson: Per our DAFI, Children under the age of 10 must be accompanied by an adult. Children 11-13 must be attended by an adult unless they pass a basic water skills test administered by the lifeguard. Children aged 14 and over, with proof of age, can come to the pool alone.

NOTES ON BEING SAFE

Workplace Safety for All of Us

'Workplace Safety Topics' - Maybe these 3 words put together in one sentence will make little sense to you. It is rare that we see workplace safety being given enough importance in our working lives. And that is why we talk about it! Workplace safety facts state that maintaining workplace safety is as important as maintaining safety at home. But why is safety at the workplace important? Think about it, we spend a major portion of our day at work so shouldn't we be assured of high levels of safety there? And how will you maintain those levels of safety if you don't know what you're supposed to maintain? That is why the following article will talk about some key safety tips and workplace safety topics that you should be looking into, if not already.

SAFETY TOPICS FOR THE WORKPLACE

For a start, take a look at the types of hazards that you may face in your office. Here is a list to help you out with determining what some of the workplace safety topics are.

SLIPS AND FALLS

Slipping, tripping and falling over are some of the most common accidents that can happen in the workplace. Why do these happen? It is probably because there are no proper delegated places that are allotted for things. There might be loose wires that are lying on the floor which are like an open invitation for falls. Along with that if there are no storage places for personal items such as briefcase and gym bags, then they will just be in the way and people will trip. Spills on the floor that are not cleaned can cause slips, so also the negligence of putting up signs that indicate when floors have been mopped can lead to the same.

There needs to be strict instructions given that informs employees to keep things in their delegated places and not keep them lying around. Also, if anyone sees any spills they need to inform the maintenance personnel and get them cleaned. There needs to be further instructions given like workplace safety slogans put up that tells employees to maintain certain decorum and make sure that their drawers and the like are kept properly closed in order to prevent anyone crashing against them and falling.

PORTABLE LADDER SAFETY

Twice as many falls occur stepping down compared to going up ladders. The main cause of falls from straight and extension ladders is sliding of the ladder base. For self-supported ladders or stepladders, the main cause is tipping sideways. Just remember that many workers carrying ladders hurt their backs, as well. If possible, have two people carry ladders.

ELECTRICITY MALFUNCTION

Where there are so many machines present, there is always the danger of electrical malfunction happening. Regular checkups and maintenance

of the electrical appliances has to be of primary concern for the matter of electrical safety. Too many wires plugged into one socket can lead to short circuits, frayed wires, and electric shocks become common place when there is no standard maintenance involved. That is why all employees need to be informed as part of workplace safety topics for meetings that they need to constantly be aware of the machines that they are using and if they find any problem with them, even if it is any doubt, they should inform the concerned personnel.

Along with that there need to be strict instructions given that there will be no inclusion of foods and drinks around the machines. Food and liquid spills can cause the malfunction to happen faster and put all the employees at risk. This could even lead to fires taking place, making this one of the most useful of workplace safety tips.

FIRE SAFETY

Fires might happen either due to negligence or due to a genuine problem. In case it is caused by negligence then the employees need to be given proper instructions on how to maintain fire safety (taking care of electrical appliances and wiring). In case of a fire, all employees should

be well informed of all the escape routes, the places where all the fire extinguishers are stored and the numbers of the fire department should be put up in bold where employees have had an opportunity to see and memorize them. Taking these precautionary steps along with workshops held on how to prevent and deal with fires will make the office a much safer place.



The pair of cats are currently being quarantined, as is common with all animals coming into the zoo. The difference this time is the new Amur Leopard Forest habitat that includes multiple exhibits and holding areas. This has allowed the zoo to manage the new residents separately in keeping with quarantine, but also allowing them access to individual outside spaces.

The male, Jordan, arrived from the Hogle Zoo in Salt Lake City, UT. Jordan was born on Christmas Day, 2021 making him about 1.5 years old. The Female Anya, was born on April 21, 2022, making her about 4-months younger than Jordan. Once the pair complete their quarantine they will be introduced and share exhibit space from that point forward until breeding occurs.

Clover, the zoo's resident Amur leopard, is seeing spots. She has spent the past three years living in the tiger building and tiger habitats.

The arrival of Jordan and Anya has been a welcomed sight to see cats with spots instead of stripes. Clover is much older than both cats at over 13-years old. She will not be introduced to the young pair but will remain at the zoo with visual access to them.

While Jordan and Anya are still too young to breed, the zoo is hoping for a breeding recommendation in the upcoming year or two as they mature. Until then, all three cats will be on exhibit and enjoying the new Amur Leopard Forest Habitat.





BAKED CHICKEN CORDON BLEU

INGREDIENTS

4 EA (4-5 OZ) BONELESS, SKINLESS CHICKEN BREASTS **8 SLICES PROSCIUTTO OR HAM** 8 SLICES SWISS CHEESE 1/3 CUP ALL-PURPOSE FLOUR SALT, AS NEEDED FRESHLY GROUND BLACK PEPPER. 1 CUP DRY BREADCRUMBS, 1/4 CUP GRATED PARMESAN CHEESE **2 TBSP MELTED BUTTER** 2 TSP FRESH THYME LEAVES 2 EGGS

Spray a baking sheet with nonstick cooking spray. Set

Butterfly each chicken breast and place between two pieces of plastic wrap. Evenly pound with the flat side of a meat mallet being careful not to tear the chicken, until chicken is 1/4-inch thick.

Lav each chicken breast on a fresh piece of plastic wrap. Season chicken with salt and lav 1 to 2 slices of cheese on each breast followed by prosciutto or ham, then 1-2 more slices of cheese.

Roll the chicken breast up like you would roll a burrito. Using the bottom piece of plastic wrap as an aid, fold the bottom of the breast up about an inch, then fold in the sides. Roll tightly.

Wrap in the plastic wrap and tightly twist the ends to shape and compress the chicken. Repeat with the remaining chicken breasts. Chill in the refrigerator for 60 minutes

While chicken chills, season the flour with salt and pepper and put in a shallow dish

Combine the breadcrumbs, parmesan cheese, butter,



and thyme. Season with salt and pepper and put in a second shallow

Whisk the eggs in a separate third

Arrange your workspace in this order: flour, eggs, breadcrumbs. Put the prepared baking sheet next to the breadcrumbs.

emove the plastic wrap from the chicken breasts. Coat each lightly with flour then dip in the egg.

Finally, roll in breadcrumbs, patting them to make them adhere. Arrange on the baking sheet.

When ready to cook, set the temperature to 375° and preheat. lid closed for 15 minutes.

Place the baking sheet with the chicken on the grill. Bake for 30-40 minutes, or until the coating is golden brown and the chicken is cooked through.

Serve whole or slice crosswise into pinwheels with a sharp serrated knife. Enjoy!
