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# Allie Takes Center Stage Sings National Anthem at Brass Band Concert

On Sunday afternoon a Staff Sergeant from Minot Air Force Base took center stage at the Brass Band of Minot concert and proudly led the audience in the National Anthem, the opening of the Brass Band of Minot Patriotic concert. Her name was SSgt Allie Payne, member of the 5th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron where she is a weapons load crew chief.

Music has always been a part of Allie Payne's life. The Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania native got her first guitar at age 11, from her Dad. "I grew up in an environment of music. My Dad sang and played in a band. My Dad and I communicated through music, not around the kitchen table like some people do." Payne sang in choir all through high school, but when she was 17 she had made up her mind that she would enlist in the Air Force, and the summer of 2018, after graduating from high school, she was headed to basic.

It was on February 1st of 2019 that she arrived in Minot for her first assignment at Minot Air Force Base. "Yes, I remember it was so cold. There was a polar vortex, and the temperature was 50 below!" remembers Payne. "My first day we only worked half of a day because of weather."

As tough as those first few days were, Payne has grown to love Minot. "I am going to PCS to Korea in February, and I am just going to hate leaving here," she said. "This is where I grew up, here. I grew up in the Air Force and I grew up to be the adult I wanted to be." But the assignment to Korea will allow Payne to work on F-16s, which, according to Payne, is "something that I've wanted to do."

The call to perform the National Anthem at the Brass Band of Minot concert happened because of her singing Karaoke for fun at a local lounge. The DJ at the lounge was Trust Tate, who knew that the Brass Band was looking for someone from Minot Air Force Base to do the anthem, and he recommended Payne. From there, the arrangements were made and on October 1st, Payne was able to practice with the Brass Band. The Patriotic Concert was scheduled for October 8th at Anne Nicole Nelson Hall. Not only would Payne lead the audience in the National Anthem but would also lead the audience in God Bless America.

Payne took center stage at 4 PM, and as the Brass Band performed behind her, she led the audience. "It happened so fast. It seemed like just two seconds, and it was over," said Payne. "I really, really enjoyed it. I was so nervous, but I realized that I really missed that kind of setting... being involved in music."

At the end of the concert, Payne was able to make her way down to the auditorium floor "and just meet people. They are all so nice. It was such a healthy environment to be in."

Allie Payne will also remember October 8, 2023, as one of the highlights of her time in Minot. Soon she will be headed to Korea.

When not on duty Payne enjoys the outdoors. "I love camping. I love backpack camping. [In my time off] I go to the gym, read books and take care of my three cats. You know it's kind of like having three toddlers."

For Payne, the opportunity to perform with a band like the Brass Band of Minot, in front of an auditorium filled with people, will be a moment she remembers, and shares, for quite some time.

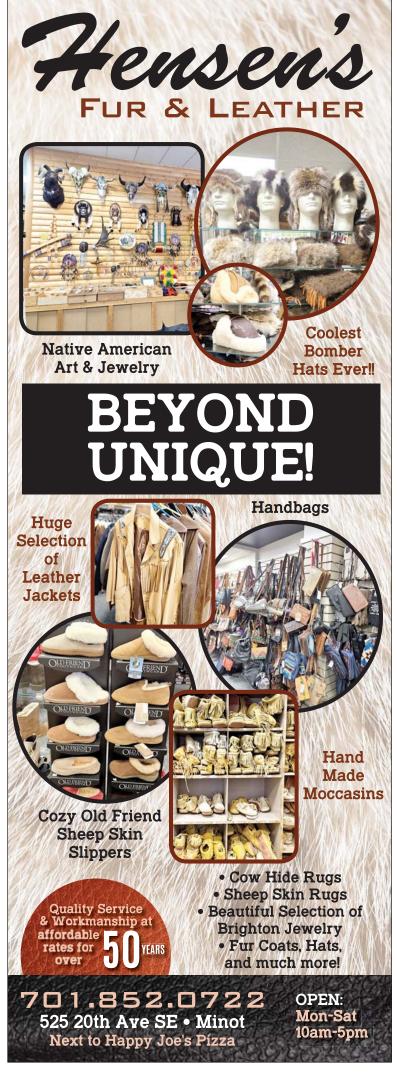

BISMARCK, N.D. – Oct. 8-14 has been proclaimed Fire Prevention Week in North Dakota by Gov. Doug Burgum.

The theme of this year's campaign is "Cooking safety starts with YOU. Pay attention to fire preventionTM." According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), cooking is the leading cause of home fires and home fire injuries in the United States. Unattended cooking is the leading cause of cooking fires and deaths.

"This is an important time for the fire service as we work to educate North Dakotans about fire safety and taking precautions now to prevent, or at least limit the impact of, fires," said State Fire Marshal Doug Nelson. "Every home should have a fire safety plan. Make sure everyone knows where to go if a fire breaks out."

In North Dakota, approximately \$48.6 million worth of property and possessions were lost due to fires in 2022, the most lost in a single year over the past ten years. Last year, 19 fatalities were reported due to fires across the state. In all, 2,727 fires were reported in North Dakota in 2022.

"We all can make a difference in protecting one another by taking practical steps to lessen the risk of fire in our homes and businesses. I encourage North Dakotans to engage with their local fire departments and support their efforts to protect all of us. They are our neighbors, friends and relatives who want to keep us safe," said Insurance Commissioner Jon Godfread.

The State Fire Marshal offers these tips to help reduce the risk of cooking fires:

- Watch what you heat. Always keep a close eye on what you are cooking. Set a timer to remind you that you are cooking.
- Turn pot handles toward the back of the stove. Always keep a

lid nearby when cooking. If a small grease fire starts, slide the lid over the pan and turn off the burner.

• Have a "kid- and pet-free zone" of at least 3 feet (1 meter) around the stove or grill and anywhere else hot food or drink is prepared or

Residents are also encouraged to test smoke alarms and replace batteries if needed.

#### Une grows, one shrinks.

Consider these similarities, which makes this even more of a puzzle.

Both communities are about the same distance from the nearest city. Langdon is 114 miles from Grand Forks and 110 miles from Winnipeg while Morden is 79 miles from Winnipeg. Langdon has a North Dakota State University Extension Research Center and Morden has a Manitoba Provincial Agriculture Experiment Station.

In addition, the newspaper I worked for in Langdon, the Cavalier County Republican, closed in December 2021 and the Morden Times closed in May 2020.

One thing Langdon doesn't have is a bigger community next to it. At one time Langdon and nearby Cavalier were both growing communities so there was robust competition between the two county seats in northeastern North

Ten miles to the east of Morden is Winkler with nearly 15,000 in population. Over the years Winkler has built an impressive industrial complex and I suspect that a number of people live in Morden and work in Winkler.

It reminds me of what Hazen and Beulah were like in the early 1980s. Beulah had all the industry with two massive power plants being built and Hazen was more of a traditional North Dakota community while Beulah continued to grow rapidly.

It appears the only obvious difference in Langdon and Morden is the Morden Community Driven Immigration Initiative.

The initiative offers eligible skilled workers an opportunity to immigrate to Morden through the Manitoba Provincial Nominee strategic Program, initiative pathway with the formal support of the city of Morden.

The website for the initiative also states that only people outside of Canada may apply. In other words, Canadians from one part of the country who might want to move to Morden can't use the initiative. But those outside of Canada, especially Europe, are encouraged to apply.

And right now, many of the applicants are Ukrainian and totally by design in cooperation with the city of Morden, the province of Manitoba and the Canadian federal government.

Nothing like that exists in Langdon, or anywhere in North Dakota that I'm aware of, except maybe Luthern Social Services resettling refugees from war, which is mostly taking place in the city of Fargo.

Perhaps small communities and the state of North Dakota, should take a look at something like this. We continue to complain that our small towns are shrinking and that nearly every business right now is short staffed.

Take a day trip to Morden and see the difference for yourself. This is a community about the size of Jamestown and if you compare those two communities, it's like night and day. Morden is lively and robust and Jamestown simply

An initiative like this is one way to "manufacture" growth. It could save a lot of small North Dakota

The place was absolutely crazy. The noise was deafening. The packed stadium went wild as the baseball soared over the centerfield fence at the old Metrodome in Minneapolis. Put four on the board for the Minnesota Twins!

It was a World Series game against the St. Louis Cardinals. Twins first baseman Kent Hrbek sent the crowd into a frenzy with thousands of enthusiastic fans twirling those white cloths above their heads. It was 1987, the year of the Homer Hanky.

Sports fans find all sorts of ways to show enthusiastic support for their favorite team. There's special chants, foot stomping, loud cheering, signs, virtually anything that's favorable to the home team and maybe even a little intimating, annoying perhaps, to the visitors.

That was the thinking behind the Homer Hanky which proved to be the biggest hit for Twins fans, other than having their team in the Series, since Mudcat Grant beat the Los Angeles Dodgers in game one of the 1967 fall classic at old Metropolitan Stadium. A bit of history here, that's now the location of the Mall of America.

That bit of trivia aside, it's especially playoff baseball, baseball, that brings out fan loyalty by the buckets full. It's wonderful.

I was in the stands for Hrbek's monstrous home run, a real game changer. It was a special time in so many ways. It was my first World Series game, and I had my dad alongside me. Better yet, I think he was the most excited fan in the place.

When the Twins loaded the bases, the entire crowd knew they had a chance to break the game open. As Hrbek was leaving the on-deck circle and heading to the plate I was about to tear the wrapper off a Grand Slam candy bar. Dad put a hand on my right shoulder just as a fan behind me grabbed my left shoulder. In unison they said, "Hold it up!"

With that dad grabbed my Homer Hanky and began twirling it. I was waving a Grand Slam

candy bar. The fan on my left gave me a thumbs up. It was a little Slice of Life, a great memory of a great moment in Twins history!

When the Twins made their way through the playoffs and into the World Series again in 1991 the Homer Hanky came back too. When the hanky was first introduced in 1987, they were snapped up quickly by rabid fans who liked the idea. They became hard to get. A second printing was necessary to meet demand.

The 1991 Homer Hanky, a simple white cloth with a Twins logo on it, was smaller than its predecessor but just as popular. When the Twins took the field in the Metrodome against the Atlanta Braves it seemed every fan in the building was waving one. Incidentally, the Twins won both World Series.

This year the Twins are in the playoffs again. They even broke an 18-game postseason record losing streak. How far they will go I cannot say, but there's a new Homer Hanky being waved at Target Field. It's red, not white, but Twins fans seem to be just as enthusiastic about them as they were in '87 and '91.

I hope fans get plenty of chances to wave them. Baseball creates memories and fans want to be a part of that. I understand it. I've outgrown Grand Slam candy bars, but fathers and fans and special moments make for special games, and memories that last forever.

### WATCHING FOR THE WHITE TAILS:

#### TIPS TO AVOID DEER COLLISIONS

There is no doubt that the fall and winter seasons are the most common time for a person to hit a deer while driving, mainly because this is the time of year that deer are out looking for food. As with any other type of automobile accident, however, the good news is that there are many ways for you to prevent yourself from hitting a deer.

The steady increase in North Dakota's deer population has been felt on vehicles as well as driver's pocket books across the state. Vehicle mishaps involving deer strikes have had a steady increase of 34% since 2000. In 2007, there were 4,118 mishaps in North Dakota that involved deer, with 43 people injured and two people killed.

Typically the month of November has the highest number of deer strikes crashes. In 2007, there were approximately 31 per day in November. Deer strikes occur most often between 7 a.m. and 8 a.m., and again in the evening from 6 p.m. – 10 p.m.

According to Linda Butts, NDDOT Deputy Director of Driver and Vehicle Services "Drivers should always wear a seat belt whether driving on a highway or a rural road, and need to be especially vigilant during the early morning and evening hours."

#### AVOID HITTING A DEER BY DRIVING SLOW

If you want to avoid hitting a deer, the first thing that you will start doing is driving slow - or at least slower than usual. The main reason is because you will be more likely to slam on the breaks and bring the car to a stop before your car comes close to hitting the deer. You will allow yourself more time to react to a deer crossing the road when you drive slower than if you were to drive faster. Following speed limits, or doing lower than the speed limit in areas where you know that deer may be spotted frequently, is one of the best ways to prevent hitting a deer this winter.

#### AVOID HITTING A DEER BY USING HIGH BEAMS

It is important to keep in mind that using your high beams is not allowable in certain areas, such as highways or main roads, however, there are many areas where you still can use your high beams, such as secluded back roads or wooded areas - which are both places where deer enjoy hiding out. The reason that using your high beams is likely

to help you prevent hitting a deer is because you will be able to see further away than if you used your headlights alone. This will give you much more time to react and to be aware of the fact that a deer is crossing the road in front of you.

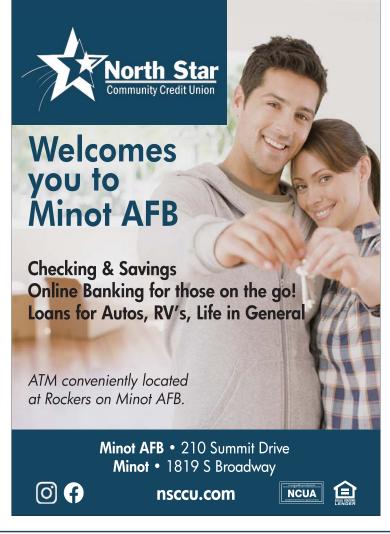
One of the best ways to prevent hitting a deer is to avoid distractions. This includes talking on a cell phone or fumbling with the cd player while you are driving. As with any other type of car accident, you will be giving yourself less time, if any time, to react to situation when you have too many distractions going on at once. If you really want to prevent hitting a deer this winter, you will want to allow yourself that extra reaction time by being aware of what you are doing, without distractions.

These are just some of the things that you can do to prevent hitting a deer this winter. Unfortunately, there are situations in which hitting a deer is entirely inevitable. If you do feel like you are about to hit a deer, the best thing that you can do

for yourself and your automobile is just hit it. The main reason is because more injuries and deaths occur from those who choose to swerve, ultimately landing themselves wrapped around a tree, telephone poll or even another vehicle. Although your car may have some damage, it is likely that the injuries you may face from hitting a deer will not be half as bad as if you had swerved.

If you hit a deer, you are to contact law enforcement to report the crash if the damage is over \$1,000. Remove the deer to the side of the roadway if it is safe to do so. If you are unable to do so, law enforcement will move the deer.

If the deer is a traffic hazard and you can't move it to the side of the road, and law enforcement isn't involved, you may contact the NDDOT district office in Minot at 837-7625, or North Dakota State Radio at 1.800.472.2121 so they can make arrangements to remove the deer

At an event on Sunday at Anne Nicole Nelson hall on the campus of Minot State University, 4 veterans accepted the call to present colors at The Brass Band of Minot Patriotic concert.

Leading the color guard was Dean Verstraete, a 14 year volunteer who to date has done a number of Color Guard events, along with taking part in 735 veteran's funerals as an Honor Guard member. Dean spent 21 of his 26 years in the Air Force at Minot Air Force Base, joining the Air Force in April of 1967 and retiring in May of 1993. Other volunteers for this Sunday afternoon Color Guard were Millo Wallace, carrying the American Flag, Rob Schutt carrying the North Dakota flag, and John Kinkade, who with Dean carried rifles. Dean, Rob & John are Air Force vets, with Millo having served in the U.S.

"To be honest, we have 10-11 volunteers, and of those volunteers there are 5 that are pretty much full time" says Verstraete, "the color guard can do 10-15 events per year, and the Honor Guard will serve at 70-75 veteran's funerals per year. We never know from day to day or week to week how many we will do, but it keeps us busy."

There are other active American Legion Color & Honor Guard units but Post #26 tries to serve about a 30 mile radius of Minot.

Volunteers to serve on the Honor & Color Guard units are sometimes hard to find, but the need is always there according to Verstraete.

"We give the flag the respect and honor that it deserves" says Verstraete "sometimes when we are short of people we are forced to do the color  $\hat{\text{guard}}$  with only 2people, without rifles. But we don't like to do that because the rifles symbolize protecting our flag and our country.'

There are challenges for the Honor Guard and Color Guard units. "Some churches have taken the American flag out of their sanctuary, and the pastor will request that we don't do any of our ceremony in the church, instead they want us to do everything in a narthex or even outside. We have to visit with some of them and remind them that without the veterans that we came here to honor, they probably wouldn't be able to stand in their pulpit and practice the freedom of religion. Some don't like it, but that's the way it is" says Verstraete.

There is one other member of the team, the bugler who will sound TAPS. "We are so fortunate to have folks like Wayne Schempp, Pat Schwann and Craig Eraas to play TAPS."

So how does a volunteer get started? "Well for me it was my First Sergeant that talked me into doing Honor Guard, and within 4 months, I was leading the team."

Proud to be patriotic and wanting to continue to serve. For Dean, Millo, Rob & John the job is not done. They continue to serve whenever they are called.

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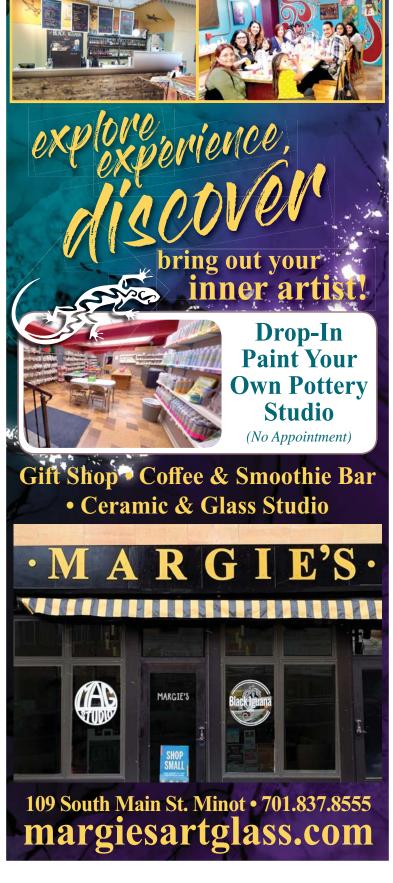

#### **Winter Skin Woes:**

#### How to Take Care of Your Skin During a North Dakota Winter

Whether you have enjoyed the humidity or not this past summer your skin has likely grown accustomed to it. In winter, humidity levels drop dramatically, and the air becomes significantly drier. This can cause your skin's natural oil production to struggle to keep up, leading to dehydration. Because we are fortunate enough to have heating in our homes, the dehydration becomes worse in the colder months. If you thought that was enough to cause drier skin.... that's not all! Let's not forget the seemingly unending winds!

All of these factors combine to a breakdown in the skin's protective barrier, leaving it prone to redness, dryness, itch and irritation. The key to keeping your skin healthy when temperatures drop, is to ensure that it is well hydrated.

#### So where do we start?

#### Turn Down the Temperature in the Shower.

I know, I know — we LOVE a long hot shower in the colder months! I get the same reaction when I have given this bit of advice over many years- the long disdainful stare. Unfortunately one of the things that makes us feel good on a winter day actually aggravates the already sensitive winter skin. Instead, try to use a lukewarm or tepid shower and you will see how it will greatly benefit your skin.

At least not entirely. Pat drying and leaving the widespread areas of your body damp while making sure the skin folds and creases are completely dry will help with the next step.

#### Use a Good Moisturizer

While your skin is still damp from the shower, apply a cream moisturizer on your entire body, thereby trapping that moisture within. Look for products with ingredients like alpha hydroxy acid, ceramides, urea, hyaluronic acid, sorbitol and glycerin which will keep your skin hydrated and help protect its natural barrier. Keep a smaller version of a moisturizer to reapply to exposed areas like your hands throughout the day if needed.

#### Water Water Water

Staying hydrated is not just for hot days. Fluid intake is essential for keeping your skin hydrated any time of the year, and especially so during cold weather. Drink water throughout the day and with meals to ensure you are getting as much water as possible to keep your skin healthy and from feeling and looking dry.

#### Wear Sunscreen/Sunblock

Often we forget about sunblock when the temperature drops, but it is essential during cold weather and snowy days. Sun exposure can still cause damage to your skin, regardless of the temperature, so make sure you're applying sunscreen/sunblock with SPF 30 or higher every day- even on the cloudy ones to exposed areas like your face and hands. Just because you work or spend a lot of time inside doesn't mean sunscreen and sunblock don't matter. Newer research has discovered the light that we encounter from indoor, artificial lighting sources are also damaging our skin. Fortunately, it has also been noted that tinted sunscreens and foundations containing iron oxide do offer protection against these longer wave-lengths.

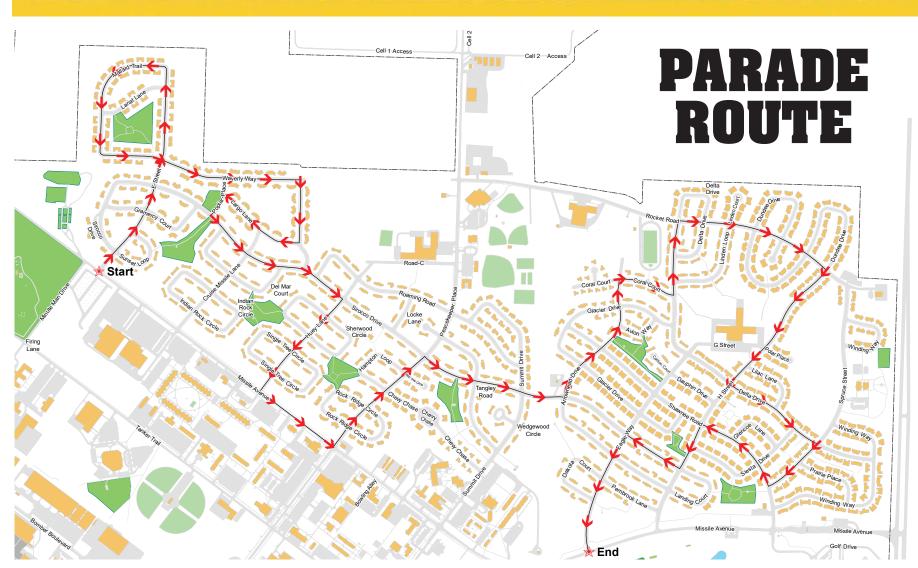
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# **The Minot Minotauros**Weekend Recap for October 7

Despite Niklas Ketonen scoring only 2:45 into the first period Saturday, his first goal of the season for the Minot Minotauros, the Tauros fell 3-1 to the Aberdeen Wings to split the weekend series. The Tauros take two points, but due to Friday being a shootout, Aberdeen takes three points on the weekend.

Ketonen jammed home a bouncing puck from Jack O'Hanisain, his third assist of the season. The Tauros dominated the first period and outshot the visitors 19-6.

However, the second period was a different story. The Wings scored twice with Nikolai Tishkevich tying the game with his third goal of the season before Isak Holstrom scored the eventual game-winner, his fourth of the season.

Then just over halfway through the third period, Leonid Bulgakov scored his fourth of the season with a short-handed breakaway.

The Tauros did not fail for trying, putting 44 shots on net but could not solve Wings goaltender Adam Dybal. He finished the night with 43 saves on 44 shots after saving 37 of 39 on Friday. Tauros goalie Brady James saved 20 of 23 Saturday night and 14 of 16 Friday night.

Both nights were full of physicality that poured over into problems. The Wings had two players given game misconducts Friday night and a third on Saturday night. There were a total of 17 penalties Friday night and 18 Saturday night.

The man who opened the scoring Saturday night, the Tauros' Ketonen, was also the man responsible for

sealing the points for Minot after he scored in the third round of the shootout for a 3-2 victory. The rest of the scoring came in the second period. Cayden Casey scored his first goal as a Tauro at almost exactly the halfway point of the period before the Wings responded less than two and a half minutes later through Grant Kohnen.

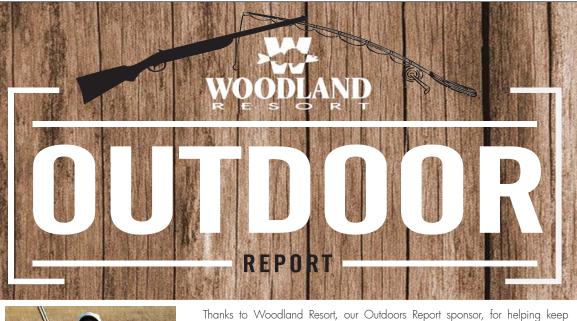
It only took just over a minute before the Tauros retook the lead. Weston Knox sent a long pass out of his own zone to Jack O'Hanisain who got a partial breakaway. As he got hooked down, he slipped the puck past Dybal.

However, with less than two minutes left in the game, Logan Gravnik scored his fifth of the season, his second point of the game after assisting on the Wings' first goal of the game.

That was the only scoring before the shootout. Both teams failed to score through two rounds before Ketonen gave the Tauros the win.

The Tauros outshot Aberdeen 34-14 in regulation and 5-2 in overtime but were only able to get the two goals in open play.

Next up the Tauros head on the road to Mason City, Iowa to take on the North Iowa Bulls. Then the Tauros return to the Maysa Arena for a three game weekend starting on Thursday, October 19th against the Bismarck Bobcats before the St. Cloud Norsemen come in for a weekend set on October 20th and 21st. Saturday the 21st will also be the Minotauros Booster Club Trunk or Treat Tailgate.

Blacktail Dam producing a nice mix of species. Trenton Lake producing some walleye activity.

•Lonetree WMA area lakes, Harvey: No reports from area lakes.

• North-central/central N.D. lakes, Towner Hdwe. Hank, Towner: A little activity on the Souris River but no reports.

- Cranes: A few sandhill cranes starting to trickle into central areas of the state.
- Upland: Nice pheasant numbers in some areas of west-central N.D. but lots of birds still not fully colored.

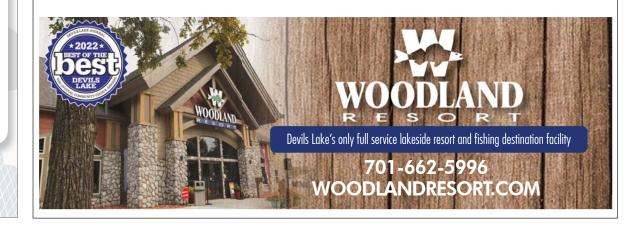

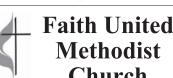

As a point of clarification, Youth Programs transportation will transition to Yellowfin. As a result, please be sure to submit the forms to Yellowfin Bus Transportation at the above email.

Arrival at Bus Stop: The School Liaison Office and Yellowfin Bus Transportation encourages all students to be in place at the designated bus stop 5 minutes prior to pick up. This is necessary to ensure the safe and timely arrival of students to school and home. It is important are students are not missing a moment of precious instructional time with teachers and staff.

Change of Transportation: Communication is key as our students are being transported. Change is inevitable especially as we daily strive to fulfill a mission. USAF RESPONDS TO CUBAN MISSILE CRISIS OCTOBER 16-28, 1962

The Cuban Missile Crisis was a pivotal moment in Cold War history. After US intelligence became aware of the construction of Soviet missile sites in Cuba, Strategic Air Command sent two officers from the 4080th Strategic Wing to verify with the use of U-2 spy planes. The missile sites were only located about 90 miles from US shores, presenting a serious potential threat. President John F. Kennedy was notified of the missiles on the morning of October 16, 1962, and the

confrontation with the Soviet Union intensified as US military forces sprang to action. Within a week, the USAF shifted from peacetime status to full combat alert in preparation. Aircraft from all over the country were mobilized, missiles were placed on alert, and USAF airlift increased to support combat forces. After the military show of readiness and much negotiation over the next few weeks, the Soviets finally agreed to withdraw their missiles on October 28, 1962. Later on, President Kennedy credited Strategic Air Command with contributing greatly "to the maintenance of the peace and security of the United States..."

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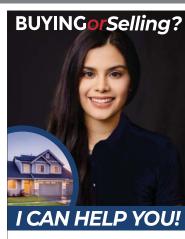

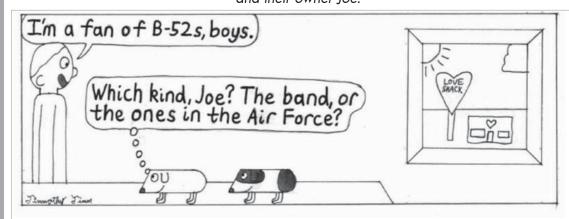

#### **SPICY SHRIMP SKEWERS**



#### **INGREDIENTS**

2 LBS SHRIMP, PEELED, AND DEVEINED **6 OZ THAI CHILIES** 6 CLOVES GARLIC 2 TBSP WINEMAKERS BLEND

I wasn't sure I really wanted to admit what my dangly earrings were made of when someone recently asked me. But I paused and 'fessed up that they were lynx claws purchased while at a writer's conference near Fairbanks, Alaska.

His response caught me by surprise - That's what I thought. I was stationed in Alaska.

Whew, I wasn't quite sure what reaction I would get and was relieved knowing he understand, not only what animal it was, but the importance of using as much of a harvested animal as possible.

That's especially true when living in Alaska's remote regions. Using as much of a harvested animal is resourceful, responsible, and a necessity. It was also the belief of the artist crafting my earrings.

It's more respectful of the animal by not wasting it, plus the earrings are unique — and beautiful.

I have lynx and coyote claw earrings, pheasant feather earrings that appear as if they're fly-fishing ties because they really are tied on barbless fishing hooks, and an array of handcrafted elk "ivory" jewelry, essentially the canine tooth from elk - bracelet and matching necklace, watchband, earrings, and wedding rings.

There is another set of earrings made from the base of a tiny antler — the burr - in my jewelry box, as well.

When it comes to turkeys, though, I don't have jewelry from their feathers or claws.

Others crafted my jewelry because, honestly, artistry isn't really my strength.

What I am capable of crafting, though, is much less intricate than my jewelry.

I can make a turkey wing bone call.

Admittedly, it's still on my to-do list but the point is that it's hopefully less challenging for my limited artist ability. Plus, it's practical.

Let's face it; calling turkeys is important, even though it's probably more critical in the spring season than in the fall. And calling in a turkey from something one crafted themselves creates a special memory to a

So this winter — assuming I get my turkey this fall and don't have to wait until the spring season — my "to do" list includes making my very own turkey wing

My search to learn how to craft my own turkey wing bone call led me to a variety of websites and online videos.

One that I found especially interesting and easy to follow was from an article on the NRA Women website, (www.nrawomen.com/content/how-tomake-your-own-wing-bone-turkey-call/).

The first step is to remove wing feathers, deboning it to use the radius, ulna, and humerus, and remove as much meat and cartilage as possible so there are the three separate bones.

Boil (less than 20 minutes so they don't get brittle) to complete the cleaning process, adding a few drops of Dawn® dish soap to help with degreasing. Carefully cut the ends of both the radius and ulna with a hacksaw or Dremel® tool and remove the bone marrow. Cut the larger end of the humerus, as well.

Lightly sand, gently boil again for just a few minutes, adding more detergent along with hydrogen peroxide to whiten.

The final step is assembling the three bones into the call: The flat end of the radius is what becomes the mouthpiece while the round end goes into the ulna. The other end of the ulna goes into the humerus, although not all call makers add the humerus. It might be necessary to lightly sand the ends so they fit

While it's a smaller call with just the radius and ulna, adding the humerus helps sounds carry farther distance.

Use epoxy glue to seal the pieces together once there is a tight fit, filling any gaps with glue for an even tighter seal. Let dry.

Some things to keep in mind once the beautiful new call is ready to use: The sound differs between bones from toms, hens, and jakes. Sound from tom wing bones will likely be more raspy and deep. A hen wing bone call probably is higher pitched and crisper, while a jake call will be somewhere in-between.

Using a wing bone call is different but that's another topic for another day. The trick is to practice, just like it is with all turkey calls,

Hopefully the turkey wing bone call becomes a reality this winter. It won't be as elegant or eyecatching as jewelry but it's practical and resourceful. Then maybe I can turn my attention and imagination into deciding what beautiful item could be crafted from feathers.

Or claws.
