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# First Responders come to Minot AFB for Hydra Fury 24

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. -- The 5th Civil Engineer Squadron's Explosive Ordnance Disposal flight hosted Hydra Fury 24 at Minot AFB, June 4-6. The joint training exercise was attended by representatives from Air Force EOD flights, Naval School EOD, Federal Bureau of Investigation, Defense Threat Reduction Agency, Nuclear Emergency Support Team and the Department of Energy, and was intended to test the agencies' ability to work together and effectively respond to a variety of incidents.

"This is an opportunity to proactively revolutionize tip-of-the-spear functionalities between Minot and our integrity partners," said U.S. Air Force Senior Master Sgt. Andrew Krueger, 5th CES EOD flight superintendent.

The exercise consisted of accident and incident protocols that required collaboration amongst the different agencies, reach-backs to headquarters and national-level teams, crime scene preservation, evidence collection and consequence-management protocols. The synergy between these agencies ensure the mission set is upheld, protecting the nation.

Each agency briefed their individual roles in keeping the nation and its interests protected. A technical exchange was set up as a way for each agency to hear more about, ask questions, and see the latest in EOD technology. The FBI also conducted a Radiological Dispersal Device Containment demonstration. Hydra Fury 24 consisted of three scenarios that tested different aspects of the EOD mission. Improvised Explosive Devices were used to simulate potential threats against first responders.

Teams were sent to the scenario sites with equipment to safely measure radiation, scan the contents of suspicious objects, and perform

The first scenario was the EOD response to an attack on a weapons movement, the second scenario was an IED found in a silo, and the third scenario was an IED found in a weapons maintenance bay," said U.S. Army Lt. Col. Clay Kirkpatrick, exercise planner for Defense Threat Reduction Agency. The three scenarios collectively were crafted to enable each participant and organization to better understand their respective roles and authorities in a response."

Hydra Fury 24 was unique compared to other training exercises based on the full spectrum of interagency players relevant to the mission space. The exercise enabled each organization's representatives to garner a better understanding of how the other agencies operate when responding to various incidents.

## The New Vulture in Command Lt. Col. Derek Arnholtz Takes Over

It was the Arnholtz family's choice to come back to Minot Air Force Base for a second time. For Lieutenant Colonel Derek Arnholtz and family, the city and base had been a special experience for them, an experience that he was sure would repeat itself the second trip back to Minot. "I was here from 2013 to 2016, and I was a weapons officer in the 742nd, and then moved over to the wing (91st Missile Wing) level for then Col. Lutton" according to Lt. Col. Anholtz.

Having been familiar with the community, when the commander assignments were released "we said that we loved it here our last time and that if we are going to be able to go back (to Minot) and have an opportunity to command, let's go back to Minot" continues Arnholtz.

Taking over command of the 740th Vulgar Vultures is a phenomenal responsibility "for our crew members to accept responsibility of the weapons system, and even more so in my position to not only accept responsibility for the weapons system, but to be responsible for

the individuals who do the mission every day; it's amazing" according to Arnholtz.

For Arnholtz, it was always his goal to be able to command a squadron, and now that he is that position he considers himself extremely fortunate. He also considers himself extremely fortunate to bring his family to Minot. "My wife, Jen, is an RN over at the Med Group. I have two boys, Ethan who is 12 and Wesley who is nine. Wesley was actually born here (in Minot) when we were here last time" says Arnholtz.

For wife Jen, it was an opportunity to move back into basically the same job that she was doing before they left last time "different responsibility, but doing the same thing, so she was excited about that opportunity. The kids are actively involved in the community, especially with the soccer program downtown, so they are definitely enjoying it."

For Lt. Col. Arnholtz, the administrative side of being in command was something that "I definitely did not see that. But from day one it has been absolutely wonderful how squadron members come into my office and start asking questions, and they give me their ideas on how to meet the goals of the squadron going forward."

As with the other two missile squadrons, there are between 80 and 90 Airmen assigned to the 740th. "We get a complete cross section of the Air Force from our facility managers, mid-tier NCO's, some of them on the verge of becoming a senior NCO, as well as those who are Lieutenants coming straight out of their commission source whether it be with the Air Force Academy or other sources, so we really have a broad-brush stroke of the Air Force" says Arnholtz.

Command of the 740th is not so much a challenge to Lt. Col. Arnholtz "but more of a learning curve. As I look back at my time as a Lieutenant and how I interacted with the squadron leadership, versus how it is now. There's so much more with social media and electronic methods of communication. It's definitely been more of a learning curve to learn where the younger generation of missileers are at personally. That is one of the bigger challenges I can

During his last assignment at Minot AFB, Lt. Col. Arnholtz was limited to only pulling alert at five of the sites. So far, in the short time with the 740th, "I've been to three of the five sites right now, and I'm looking forward to getting out to the rest of the sites.'

As for the missile sites themselves, there are constantly things that are happening topside. Some of the activities are maintenance to upgrade the facilities topside "there's always usually something happening. I know we are in the middle of remodeling the bathrooms at the missile alert facilities right now, and that's a heavy lift when you go on site and see all of the available parking taken up with contracting vehicles and, heavy machinery, because that impacts the quality of life for our Airmen. We need to do what we can to support them while they are

doing the mission."

Lt. Col. Arnholtz understands that Minot AFB will be the last facility to receive the new Sentinel weapons system, and that there will be a continuing challenge to maintain the Minuteman III until the Sentinel

takes its' place later in this decade, or into the next. But Arnholtz knows that with the quality of the Airmen assigned to Minot AFB, that although it will certainly be a challenge, the challenge will be met head on.

Finally, we head back east, and we see signs that commemorate the entrance to the Enchanted Highway. Don't miss this drive, filled with authentic metal structures.



Orlando and Tampa are about 90 miles apart, so if you live in the Minot area and want to spend a week on the beach, you would have to drive either way from Sanford as it's equidistant from Orlando to either coast. Or, worse yet, if you live anywhere in western North Dakota, you'd have to travel.

But let's face it, it's a lot easier driving across the state of North Dakota than it is to drive across the state of Florida on Interstate 4. We drove it in February. 

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# Ensuring aircraft safety with precision: Non-Destructive Inspection

Working tirelessly 24 hours a day, seven days a week, a dedicated team of Airmen strive to guarantee there are no defects in the 5th Bomb Wing's fleet of B-52H Stratofortress. This team is known as the Non-Destructive Inspection unit, a crucial component of the 5th Maintenance Squadron, where technology meets precision to keep the aircraft flying safely.

Senior Airman Jonathan Macias, 5 MXS NDI journeyman, shared insight into his role and the critical nature of the unit's mission. He said the work is intricate and requires a high degree of attention to detail. He stressed that his job is essential for maintaining the safety and readiness of the aircraft.

"Our job is to find defects and discontinuities in aircraft parts, and relay those findings to the crew chiefs," said Macias. "For instance, we analyze oil samples from jet engines to determine if the engine is healthy or needs an overhaul."

The NDI unit has six different inspection methods including fluorescent penetrant, magnetic particles, x-ray, ultrasound, oil analysis and eddy current. Macias described how the process of x-raying is akin to medical imaging, but on a much larger scale.

"Normally, when you think of taking x-rays, you picture going to the doctor and looking at a set of bones," said Macias. "Here we're doing the same thing but looking at the ribs and spars of an aircraft instead. It's all about finding cracks or defects and ensuring everything

is in top condition."

Each airframe presents unique challenges. Adapting to these challenges is a significant part of the job, noted Macias. He says learning the jet, understanding how it operates, and what makes it tick is key to successful maintenance. The B-52H, which the NDI unit here predominantly works on, poses specific logistical challenges due to its size and complexity.

"This aircraft is not like any other, with eight engines and a lot of extra maintenance, it's a labor of love," said Macias. "The biggest challenge is its sheer size, which requires extensive logistical planning to

perform inspections."

Despite the challenges, Macias finds that producing reliable results that keep aircraft flying is immensely satisfying. Macias compared finding defects to snowflakes; no two cracks are the same and every one is unique.

NDI's ability to detect issues using various inspection methods is key to safeguarding Minot's personnel and equipment. These Airmen, through their meticulous work, ensure the 5th Bomb Wing's aircraft maintain high levels of safety and readiness, contributing significantly to overall mission success.

"I just wanted all our family there. It would have meant a lot to my Dad to have been there."- Dawn



Let's congratulate Chief Master Sergeant Broughman on his retirement and wish him and his family the best.





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### SALMON WITH SPRING **VEGETABLES AND PESTO**



#### **INGREDIENTS** 4 (4 OZ EACH) SALMON, SKIN-ON, PIN

- **BONES REMOVED**
- KOSHER SALT AND FRESHLY GROUND BLACK PEPPER
- 2/3 BUNCH ASPARAGUS, BOTTOM THIRDS OF STALKS REMOVED AND SLICED INTO 1
- **INCH PIECES ON THE BIAS**
- 2/3 POUND SUGAR SNAP PEAS, ENDS TRIMMED AND SLICED INTO 1/2 INCH
- **PIECES ON THE BIAS**
- 6 2/3 OUNCE CHERRY TOMATOES, RINSED
- 1 1/3 LEMONS, HALVED

AND HALVED

- 1/3 CUP FRESH PESTO 2/3 LEMON, ZESTED
- FRESH BASIL LEAVES, FOR GARNISH

When ready to cook, set Traeger temperature to 500°F and preheat, lid closed for 15 minutes. Place a piece of parchment paper on a large baking sheet or in a roasting pan. Rinse the salmon and pat dry. Brush all sides of the salmon with olive oil, and sprinkle generously with salt and black pepper on all sides. Place the salmon pieces skin-side up on the sheet tray leaving 2 inches between each piece. Place the asparagus, snap peas, and cherry tomatoes in a bowl. Gently mix the vegetables with the remaining tablespoon of olive oil, 1/2 teaspoon salt and a fresh grinding of pepper. Scatter the vegetables evenly onto the sheet pan. Place the sheet pan on the grill. In addition, place the lemons cut-side down directly on the grill grate towards the front of the grill. Close the lid and cook for 5 minutes. After 5 minutes, remove the lemons from the grill and stir the vegetables. Close the lid and cook for 5 more minutes, or until the fish reaches an internal temperature of 140°F and can be flaked with a fork.

Remove the sheet pan from the grill. Place the fish and vegetables on a serving platter and drizzle with the pesto. Squeeze the grilled lemon over the top of the fish and vegetables. Sprinkle the lemon zest over the fish and add a few basil leaves for garnish. Serve immediately.

Many of these can be fed fresh, frozen, or cooked and can be used in bones or stuffed toys, as well as for training treats. Global Air Force Strike Command's sweeping study of cancer cases in the intercontinental ballistic missile community will expand this summer to include environmental samples from the launch facilities themselves, one of several next steps officials detailed during a virtual town hall June 5.

The study, which began in February 2023, has already looked at hundreds of air and samples from launch control centers—the underground bunkers where missileers work in 24-48 hour shifts—and launch control support buildings. Of those hundreds of samples, four were found to have elevated amounts of a possible carcinogen at two launch control centers at Malmstrom Air Force Base, Mont., and a Launch Control Equipment Building at Minot Air Force Base, N.D.

Now, military bioenvironmental experts are preparing to go into the silos that house the ICBMs.

"We're targeting this between July and September," said Brig. Gen. Dave Miller, director of logistics and engineering at Global Strike Command. "We're working again with the program office and [the U.S. Air Force School of Aerospace Medicine], and the Surgeon General's office to build a sample of locations out in the missile fields. As of the current plan right now, we're going to look at two launch facilities in each of the squadrons at each of the wings, assess that data to take a look at, are we targeting all the right areas, before we go out to the rest of the locations to sample."

The goal is to start collecting samples in July and continue through September, officials said during the town hall, which was open to Active-Duty Airmen and members of the public.

The focus of the sampling will likely be on polychlorinated biphenyls (PCBs), the chemical that was found in the control facilities and are "probable human carcinogens" according to the EPA. Officials said they also study samples for "fertilizers, pesticides, volatile organic compounds," and more.

It's not just missileers who have concerns. A Military.com report published last week shared the fears of maintainers who enter the missile

silos to conduct repairs. Security forces, food service workers, and others are also worried.

While they wait for the lab results from the launch facility samples, AFGSC says it will release the findings from its third round of environmental testing in the control facilities at the three active ICBM bases later this summer.

"Our sampling plan across the three rounds was, we're there looking for seasonal variations in use of industrial, occupational, environmental, and local chemicals or potential contaminants that might be in the environment. And some of those do fluctuate with us depending on the season," Col. Tory W. Woodard, commander of the USAF School of Aerospace Medicine, said.

In the few facilities where PCBs were detected above EPA limits, Global Strike officials said they took immediate steps to conduct cleanups. Beyond that, however, Miller said the command is taking steps to deep clean its facilities, standardizing the process across all locations. A finalized contract for that cleaning is coming soon,

In addition to the environmental sampling, the study is also comparing cancer rates among missileers and other ICBM-related jobs to those among the rest of the military and the general population. Preliminary data released in March showed elevated rates of prostate and breast cancer.

However, that data only covered Department of Defense electronic medical records from 2001-2021, capturing those who were diagnosed with cancer through the Military Health System (MHS), including through the Tricare health insurance program. The Air Force anticipates the initial data makes up fewer than 25 percent of the total cancer cases that make be captured during the study.

A second release of data, planned for September and dubbed "Phase 1B" of the epidemiological part of the study, will include more records, including:

Those diagnosed with cancer through the Veterans Affairs health system back to 1991

Those diagnosed through the military system and put in the DOD's cancer registry back to 1986

Those diagnosed through the VA and put in the DOD cancer registry back to 1976

Another batch, "Phase 1C," will follow in the fall and include death records from the National Cancer Institute

"Our future will include Phase 2, which is where we get a virtual pooled registry where we pull cancer statistics from a pool of data from 45 different states," Woodard said. "What we are learning from that and that will be a little bit delayed, probably into 2025, is that it takes us months and months and months to get that data from those multiple states."

Elsewhere in the town hall, the first opened to members of the public, many former service members who worked with ICBMs were eager to know how the study would capture their experiences, especially given that many installations and facilities are now closed or decommissioned.

"If you had one of the AFSCs that placed you in the missile community from 1976 going forward, those AFSCs are all involved," Woodard said of the epidemiological study. "It's not just those that worked at our current bases, but it's anybody who worked at our previous bases.

Hundreds of participants logged on for the town hall, reflecting the intense interest in the study. For vears, the Air Force dismissed concerns among the missile community about connections between their work and cancer. In early 2023, those concerns were raised again as a result of possible increased cases of non-Hodgkin Lymphoma, a blood cancer, at Malmstrom Air Force Base.

AFGSC commander Gen. Thomas A. Bussiere has pledged to take an expansive approach with the study and reiterated to town hall participants that he does not intend to sweep the issue under the rug.

"I will tell you that it's personal to all my commanders in the field, it's personal to my deputy commander sitting to my right, and it's personal to me," Bussiere said. "Because we all have experience over our lifetimes, in our careers with dealing with the various different levels and aspects of cancer both inside the department and outside the department.

"From a personal perspective,

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# **USAF B-52 Bombers Fly Over Baltics Near Russian Territory**

Two B-52 Stratofortresses from a U.S. Air Force bomber task force flew over the Baltics and Eastern Europe on May 28, U.S. Air Forces in Europe said.

The two B-52s are deployed to RAF Fairford, U.K., as part of a four-aircraft bomber task force from Air Force Global Strike Command's 5th Bomb Wing at Minot Air Force Base, N.D. The BUFFs, operating as the 69th Expeditionary Bomb Squadron, took off around 8:30 a.m. for a roughly eight-hour flight.

A spokesperson for U.S. Air Forces in Europe (USAFE) told Air & Space Forces Magazine that the pair of B-52s were escorted by two Spanish F-18 Hornets, two Polish MiG-29s, and five total German Eurofighter Typhoons at

different points in the exercise as the strategic bombers "flew over the Baltic region" during the mission on May 28.

According to publicly available flight tracking data, at one point, the B-52s flew roughly a few dozen kilometers from Russian territory in Kaliningrad, a Russian exclave between Lithuania and Poland, and flew around the territory again on the way back to the U.K. The B-52s circled over Lithuania and also flew through Dutch, German, and Polish airspace.

The bomber task force mission is "a demonstration of NATO allies and partner nations' ability to seamlessly operate together to maintain a stable and prosperous Baltic Sea region," the USAFE spokesperson said. "This sends a strong message to potential adversaries, deters aggression, enhances stability, and assures Euro-Atlantic publics."

NATO Allied Air Command said on May 24 that the BTF was operating in "a NATO context with one focus on the Baltic region." Another bomber task force made up of B-1s is operating in the Pacific out of Anderson Air Force Base, Guam, but the Air Force has released few details about that deployment so far.

Two B-52s from the BTF flew north over the Baltic Sea to launch the bomber task force on May 24. The Swedish military announced that the bombers practiced striking





land-based targets in an exercise with Sweden's Navy.

On May 29, two B-52s flew circles over the North Sea. USAFE

did not immediately provide details of the mission.

JUNE 24, 1996 During a global power mission on June 24, 1996, Secretary of the Air Force Dr. Sheila E. Widnall had the opportunity to fly on a B-52 Stratofortress assigned to the 5th Bomb Wing, Minot Air Force Base, N.D. Three of Minot's bombers were involved in the exercise which began at Andrews AFB, Md., and was a joint operation with Canada and the US Navy. The mission took eight hours and included Long Range Anti-Surface Cruise Missile operations in the north Atlantic, live Mark 82 bomb drops at Gagetown Range in Canada, an aerial refueling over western New England, and fighter intercepts. The mission was a successful

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demonstration of the Air Force B-52 bomber fleet's capabilities. Widnall, who was previously a Professor of Aeronautics and Astronautics at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, became the first female Secretary of the Air Force in 1993. Also accompanying Widnall on the mission was another female figure to make history, Lt. Kelly Flinn. Flinn, a copilot of the 23rd Bomb Squadron at Minot AFB, was the first B-52 combat-qualified woman in the nation's history. Widnall's focus as SECAF was on emphasizing Air Force values, supporting its mission in space, F-22 Fighter funding, and the development of women in the Air Force and other professional fields. # **Second Minuteman III test** in week's time showcases readiness of U.S. ICBM fleet

For the second time in a week, a joint team of Air Force Global Strike Command Airmen supported by Space Force Guardians launched an unarmed Minuteman III intercontinental ballistic missile equipped with one re-entry vehicle June 6 at 1:46 a.m. Pacific Time from Vandenberg Space Force Base,

This test launch is part of routine and periodic activities intended to demonstrate that the United States' nuclear deterrent is safe, secure, reliable and effective to deter 21st century threats and reassure our allies. Such tests have occurred over 300 times before, and this test is not the result of current world events.

"The fact that we were able to complete two operational test launches in one week is a testimony to the excellence and professionalism of the Airmen and Guardians who do this mission every day," said Col. Chris Cruise, 377th Test and Evaluation Group Commander. "This morning's demonstrates commitment to deterrence as we serve as the cornerstone of security for our allies and partners across

The ICBM's reentry vehicle traveled approximately 4,200 miles to the U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command's Ronald Reagan Ballistic Missile Defense Test Site on the U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll, Republic of the Marshall Islands. RTS sensors, including high-fidelity metric and signature radars, as well as optical sensors and telemetry, support the research, development, test and evaluation of America's defense and space programs. For these tests, RTS team members collect radar, optical and telemetry data in the terminal phase of flight to evaluate system performance.

The test launch is a culmination of months of preparation that involve multiple government partners.

Airmen from all three missile wings were selected for the task force to support the test launch, and maintainers from the 341st Missile Wing at Malmstrom Air Force Base,

Montana, provided maintenance support. The missile bases within Air Force Global Strike Command have crew members standing alert 24 hours a day, year-round, overseeing the nation's ICBM alert

"Our ICBM force provides 24/7 strategic deterrence and stand ready to respond at a moment's notice as the most responsive leg of the nuclear triad," said Gen. Thomas A. Bussiere, commander, Air Force Global Strike Command. "These test launches demonstrate and confirm our readiness to deliver a safe, secure, effective, and credible, global combat capability."

The ICBM community, including the Department of Defense, the Department of Energy, and U.S.

Strategic Command, uses data collected from test launches for continuing force development evaluation. The ICBM test launch program demonstrates the operational capability of the Minuteman III and ensures the United States' ability to maintain a strong, credible nuclear deterrent as a key element of U.S. national security and the security of U.S. allies and partners.

Air Force Global Strike Command is a major command with headquarters at Barksdale Air Force Base, Louisiana, in the Shreveport-Bossier City community. The command oversees the nation's three intercontinental ballistic missile wings, the Air Force's entire bomber force, to include


The Minot AFB School Board often has to fill vacancies due to

Yes, North Dakota has four seasons. It's just that residents may know them not as spring, summer, fall,

Nope, instead these are the state's unofficial four seasons: Too-hot-for-tick season, getting-chillier-fortick season, too-darn-cold-for-tick season, and TICK SEASON.

It's almost like turning on a light switch when seasons change. One day it's bitter cold and the unending season officially known as winter just won't go away. The next day it seems spring has arrived and the ground is crawling with nasty, dreaded ticks.

Just ask Garnet and Eider, the two resident four-legged Hunting Maniacs, how much they love tick season. Even with the appropriate canine tick protection, the offenders still manage to find the dogs.

Oh, sure, it starts out kind of nice when they notice they are the recipients of an abundance of pets and scratches, especially after any outing.

Until, that is, those loving fingers suddenly latch onto a creature that, in turn, latched onto Garnet or Magnum. Or, if it hadn't already latched on, was exploring the best place to do so. While those fingers snatch the offending wood tick, it seems more often than not they also snatch a bit of dog hair in the process.

Suddenly the Hunting Maniacs determine the abundance of pets, scratches, and massaging fingers aren't all they're cracked up to be. Rather than lie down and soak up the attention, they seek the nearest hiding spot.

It's amazing the places two 40-plus-pound hunting dogs can sequester themselves if there is any hint of a pending "tick check".

Sadly, though, ticks aren't much to laugh about. The Purina Outdoor Wire aptly described the concerns dog owners have when it comes to dealing with ticks: The bottom line is the distribution of tick species, prevalence, and infectious pathogens fluctuate based on weather, rainfall, and climate.

It seems ticks can be here, there, and everywhere. It's not one's imagination, though, because dogs — and people – could be at increasing risk as tick distribution spreads geographically.

People traveling in other regions of the United States with dogs can find different ticks from those in North Dakota. Every state has some type of highly prevalent, tick-borne disease.

Here are some Purina Outdoor Wire tips to follow in helping to deal with ticks and North Dakota's four unofficial tick seasons:

- Learn what ticks are common in North Dakota, as well as what tick species could be in area you're when traveling with your dog.
- Learn what diseases are associated with the ticks in North Dakota and the region a person is going with their dog.
- Be aware that an infected tick transmits the pathogen to the dog it bites. Because many pathogens are also zoonotic, they can also infect people. It's important to protect humans from ticks as well as pets.
- Tick-borne diseases can be transmitted in as little as three to six hours. Always perform a head-to-tail body check on dogs after they've been outside.
- Admittedly, the most common reaction when removing a tick is to want to simply grab it with one's fingers – and likely grabbing dog hair in the process. However, it's better to remove the tick with a tweezers and firmly pull upwards to get its entire body, especially in removing the head and offending incisors biting into the dog.
- Don't twist or squeeze a tick when grabbing it.
- A variety of tick repellents for dogs are available. Use them. And only use one recommended for dogs on
- The type of tick repellents oral, topical preventative, or collar – and how it's used varies by exposure risk, safety, and how often they swim or are bathed.

In addition, it doesn't hurt to have one's dog screened annually for an infection by a veterinarian. Even though it's officially Tick Season, don't harbor oneself or one's dogs inside. Getting outdoors is the healthiest thing for humans and dogs alike – just be tick savvy.

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

# **AFGSC conducts first-ever Command Chief Change of Responsibility**

AIR FORCE GLOBAL STRIKE COMMAND PUBLIC AFFAIRS

BARKSDALE AIR FORCE focused on taking care of our BASE, La. --

For the first time, Air Force Global Strike Command held a Change of Responsibility ceremony to mark the transfer of senior enlisted leadership responsibilities to its new Command Chief, Chief Master Sgt. Shawn Aiello, today at Barksdale Air Force Base.

Receiving the command's colors from Chief Master Sgt. Melvina Smith, Aiello became the 8th command chief of AFGSC, which is responsible for two-thirds of the United States' nuclear triad, and the 33,700 total force and civilian strikers who make the mission happen.

Gen. commander, U.S. Strategic Command, spoke about the critical role the Smith played as Global Strike's command chief.

"Chief Smith is the most compassionate leader I've ever come across," said Cotton. "Everybody gets a chance. There were plenty of times when she was my command chief, proved me wrong. That's what you need in a wingman, someone to be able to do that, and I couldn't be more proud to call her a wingman."

AFGSC commander Thomas Bussiere presided over the ceremony, receiving Chief Aiello's first salute as the new Command

"Shawn, welcome to the team, my charge to you is going to be simple," said Bussiere. "Get laserfocused on our mission, get laserAirmen, and get laser-focused on taking care of our families."

The Change of Responsibility ceremony is a traditional event rich in symbolism and heritage within the military. The core of the ceremony is the passing of the command's colors, which symbolize the soul of a military unit and represent not only the lineage and honors of the organization, but also the loyalty and unity of its personnel. The custodian of the colors is the command chief.

The ceremony also culminated 32 years of an illustrious Air Force career for Chief Smith, who served two-and-a-half years as the command's senior enlisted leader.

"To the Strikers, this thanks goes beyond you. It includes your significant others and loved ones," said Smith. "There is no greater honor than to represent you...none. You are the ones who provide the drop-the-mic moments. Your service, your dedication, your pride in all you do...I get to witness that every single day. You are a unique, and significant community who provides strength, and security for our nation. You make a difference because we're at the tip of the spear, thank you."

Chief Aiello's first remarks as Command Chief highlighted the contributions Strikers bring to the global stage.

"Today, the valuable gift of security is upheld worldwide by the dedicated efforts of Air Force Global Strike Command," said Aiello. #### **NOTES ON BEING SAFE**

### WHAT IS LOCK OUT/ **TAG OUT?**

Have you ever been to a job site, or even a local business when you hear someone call out "Hey Joe, be sure to lock and tag out that piece of equipment?" or "You better deenergize that system before you work on it!"

This common practice is known throughout the industrial and non-industrial world as Lockout/ Tagout, better known as LOTO. So what is LOTO?

Lockout-Tagout is a safety procedure which is used in industry and research settings to ensure that dangerous machines are properly shut off and not started up again prior to the completion of maintenance or servicing work. It requires that hazardous power sources be "isolated and rendered inoperative" before any repair procedure is started. "Lock and tag" works in conjunction with a lock usually locking the device or the power source with the hasp, and placing it in such a position that no hazardous power sources can be turned on. The procedure requires that a tag be affixed to the locked device indicating that it should not be turned on.

Modern machinery can contain many hazards to workers, from things like electrical, mechanical, pneumatic or hydraulic sources. For example a typical industrial machine may contain things like hot fluids, moving presses, blades, propellers, electrical heaters, conveyor belts with pinch points, moving chains, ultraviolet light, etc. Disconnecting or making sate the equipment involves the removal of all energy sources and is known as isolation. The steps necessary to isolate equipment are often documented in an Isolation Procedure or a Lockout Tagout Procedure. The isolation procedure generally includes the following tasks:

- 1. Identify the energy source(s)
- 2. Isolate the energy source(s) 3. Lock and/or Tag the energy
- 4. Prove that the equipment

isolation is effective

Modern safety manufacturers provide a range of isolation devices specifically designed to fit various switches, valves and effectors. For example most modern circuitbreakers have a provision to have a small padlock attached to prevent their activation. For other devices such as ball or gate valves, plastic pieces which either fit against the pipe and prevent movement, or clam-shell style objects, which


completely surround the valve and prevent its manipulation are used. A common feature of these devices is their bright color, usually red to increase visibility and allow workers to readily see if a device is isolated. Also, the devices are usually of such a design and construction to prevent it being removed with any moderate force. That is to say that an isolation device does not have to stand up to a chainsaw, but if an operator forcibly removes it, it will be immediately visible that it has been tampered with.


With all this information, you are probably asking yourself " How does this program apply to me?" Employees can be seriously or fatally injured if machinery they service or maintain unexpectedly energizes, starts up, or releases stored energy. OSHA's standard on the Control of Hazardous Energy (LOTO), can be located in Title 29 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Part 1910.147. This regulation spells out the steps all employers must take to prevent accidents associated

standard addresses practices and procedures necessary to disable machinery and prevent the

release of potentially hazardous energy while maintenance or servicing activities are performed. With this being said you may ask yourself "if I unplug a radio or microwave oven after use, do I need LOTO?' No you do Exposure to hazardous energy is controlled completely by unplugging the equipment from an electric outlet and where the employee doing the service or maintenance has exclusive control of the plug. This applies only if electricity is the only form of hazardous energy to which employees may be exposed. This exception encompasses many portable hand tools and some cord and plug connected machinery and equipment.

In closing, when dealing with LOTO and you are not sure, do not hesitate to ask for assistance. The shop supervisor, the person doing the actual work, or the Wing Safety office can provide more extensive detail concerning


