# **5th Bomb Wing welcomes** new commander

Col. Jesse Lamarand assumed command of the 5th Bomb Wing from Col. Daniel Hoadley during a change of command ceremony at Minot Air Force Base, North Dakota, June 28.

Prior to assuming command of the 5th BW, Lamarand was the commander of the 2nd Operations Group, Barksdale Air Force Base, La. leading daily operations for the Air Force's largest bomber group consisting of four operational squadrons, with over personnel. Those in attendance at the ceremony included families of both commanders, North Dakota civic leaders and all of the Airmen assigned to units that make up the

"I've been surrounded by an incredible team for the past two years. This really is a team sport," said Hoadley. "The partnership between us and the 91st Missile Wing is iron clad. That doesn't just happen. We tackled many obstacles together to accomplish our collective mission of securing the nation."

Maj. Gen. Jason Armagost, 8th Air Force commander, gave out some words of wisdom to Lamarand for what to expect as 5th BW commander.

"Spend your time as wing commander leading your leaders, said Armagost. "You went through weapons school, which means that you're a tactical expert. That's not what you're asked to do anymore. Your tactical experts are sitting out here. The more we can do together

the stronger we'll be."

As host wing on Minot Air Force Base, the 5th BW operates the B-52H Stratofortress aircraft to provide global strike and combatsupport capabilities to geographic commanders. To perform its mission, and to support the mission of the 91st Missile Wing, four groups are assigned to the 5th BW: the 5th Operations Group, the 5th Mission Support Group, the 5th Maintenance Group and the 5th Medical Group.

"I'm incredibly honored to be at the helm of the 5th BW," said Lamarand. "I promise to uphold the traditions and high standards set through Hoadley's stewardship; enabling this wing to achieve success at deterrence operations."

# Achieving That Gold Standard of Child Care

Minot AFB childcare is striving to reach new heights. Tena Holmgren, one of MAFB's own Family Child Care (FCC) providers reached those heights by earning her accreditation from the National Association for Family Child Care (NAFCC) back in November 2023. Not only is she one of only two accredited providers in the entire state of North Dakota, but she is also the first ever accredited provider here at Minot AFB. What does accreditation mean in terms of childcare? Well, let's find out.

The NAFCC uses the only national accreditation system created expressly for family childcare providers. Providers who are NAFCC accredited have proven that their FCC program upholds these higher quality of child care standards.

Providers wanting to pursue accreditation need to be an FCC provider for at least one year and have completed all 15 Virtual Lab School modules (an online professional development system required by the Air Force to empower childcare professionals to build their knowledge and improve their practices). They then express their interest regarding NAFCC Accreditation to their

FCC Coordinators who submit all paperwork for self-study fees to be paid by the Air Force and NAFCC Accreditation materials mailed out directly to them. When these materials are received, the provider officially begins the six-month self-study process.

There are six elements to the accreditation process, Self-Study, Application, Observation, Decision, Accreditation Update, and finally the Re-accreditation.

When asked what accreditation means to her Tena Holmgren stated "it's the gold standard of family child care." She went on further to explain how it is, "a dedication to always learn more about the child and be on the children's level." She mentioned how it's awarded to providers who meet the eligibility standards and continue to uphold those higher quality standards, and that "the Air Force already has a very high standard of care and accreditation is just another step higher." She elaborated on how accreditation is about, "celebrating diversity and focusing on the child, valuing them as the capable, resilient, fantastic people that they are. Accreditation comes with a commitment to learning about how

to be a better provider for your child, everyday."

Tena's interest in accreditation started six months into becoming an FCC provider. She stated "I am one of those people that whatever I do I want to be the very best I can be." She continued with "accreditation was another chance to grow and learn and give the children everything I can."

When parents select a NAFCC accredited provider, they can be absolutely sure that their child will be cared for at the highest standards. When asked what makes accreditation so important and why providers should strive to reach that standard of care Tena stated, "because accreditation isn't just a plaque on the wall, it is a dedication to learning more about your child and how to do better for the children everyday." Tena further stated "it comes with a commitment to learning about how to be a better provider for your child everyday. You have to uphold professional development practices, so you are always learning and taking trainings to do better, and dedicating time to make sure that your space and home are exactly what the children and family need."

Tena stated, "what they are looking for the most is the relationship you have with the children, because that is the foundation of childcare. You can't teach them anything and they won't learn anything until you have that relationship." She expanded on the relationship aspect to say "they want the provider to be somebody

who enjoys being with the kids, enjoys teaching them, who enjoys watching them learn and scaffolding upon their learning."

When asked what her final thoughts about accreditation are, Tena stated "it's a lot of work, there's a lot that goes into being accredited but it's worth it." She knew she wanted to be accredited because she felt "the better I can be for the child the better they can learn and grow. I want my home to be a place where giggles echo and

memories are made and in order to do that you have to have happy children."

While the Air Force already holds all FCC providers to an exceptional standard, NAFCC accreditation goes further by adding on some specialized requirements. To find out more about becoming an FCC provider and the level of standards the providers uphold, check out https://5thforcesupport.com/FCC.



# **Color It- Amazing!**

Not all of us get the perspective of a B-52 flying over the ever changing North Dakota landscape. My conversation with a B-52 copilot who is spending his first summer at Minot Air Force Base turned to a question; "What are those fields of vibrant yellow that are popping up all over?" My answer? Well, it could be one of 2 crops grown in this area, I explain. Earlier in the growing season there is yellow sweet clover, which is an annual plant that is grown by some farmers as a forage crop. It is cut and baled. But more likely what you are seeing is canola, which

will flower first and then produce seed pods that are harvested in August. The seeds are then crushed at local plants to produce Canola oil. Canola oil is one of the best oils for heart health. Canola oil has less saturated fat than any other oil commonly used in the U.S. Cutting down on saturated fats helps cut your cholesterol levels.

While sweet clover is a favorite for local apiaries who position their bee hives near a clover field, so is canola. The only disadvantage in canola is that it flowers for a relatively short time. Beekeeping in North Dakota is a topic for another day. For now, we will once again encourage folks to take a Sunday drive and witness the beauty of the yellow fields of canola, from ground level. I said color it-amazing- because each field of canola is different. The yellow canola flowers seem to accentuate the rolling topography of North Dakota fields. In most fields, especially this year, there will be a slough area, and in that slough area will normally be a family of waterfowl, ducks, or geese, just out of the hatch. Take a set of binoculars to watch the broods of newly hatched babies as they learn to swim by following their mother across the open water.

# Who is the most famous North Dakotan?...



#### **UPSIDE DOWN UNDER**

Lately, there have been a number of lists that have surfaced about who the most famous North Dakotan may be. There are several separate lists from Sports Illustrated to Forbes, but one thing is clear, on every list except for one outlier, the No. 1 person is the same – Josh Duhamel.

Duhamel was born in Minot. His ancestry is German, and smaller amounts of Norwegian, French-Canadian, English, Irish, and Austrian (his last name is very common among Francophones in the world). Duhamel is an actor who made his acting debut as Leo du Pres on the ABC daytime soap opera All My Children and later starred as Danny McCoy on NBC's

Most recently, he has been doing TV commercials for North Dakota Tourism.

Who do you think is the secondmost famous, an athlete, a singer, a journalist, an actor, a politician, an astronaut?

There's obviously dissent with some of the rest of the people and these lists from various sources don't necessarily include the Roughrider Award recipients. But rather than presenting each list, the following is a mosaic of lists determining the top 10 famous North Dakotans.

Most of us can agree, as do most of the lists, the second-most famous is Phil Jackson, who grew up in Williston and became a famous basketball player and later

Jackson was a power forward, playing 12 seasons in the National Basketball Association, winning championships with the New York Knicks in 1970 and 1973. Regarded as one of the greatest coaches of all time, Jackson was the head coach of the Chicago Bulls from 1989 to 1998, leading them to six NBA

championships.

Despite not being on a number of lists, Lawrence Welk should be regarded as the third-most famous. Whether you liked his show or not, you have to admit, he had a lot of fans for a long time. Some independent TV channels still air his show weekly.

Born in 1903 in Strasburg, Welk was an accordionist, bandleader, and television impresario, who hosted The Lawrence Welk Show from 1951 to 1982. His style came to be known as "champagne music" to his radio, television, and live-performance audiences. He passed away in 1992 at the age

No. 4 has to be Roger Maris, who grew up in Fargo, played baseball at Fargo Shanley and later became one of the most famous players the New York Yankees have ever had. Maris was most famous for hitting 61 home runs in 1961, a record that stood until 1998.

No. 5 is a tie between singer Peggy Lee and actress Angie Dickinson both touting small towns as home. In Lee's case, Wimbledon and for Dickinson, it

was Kulm. If you stop in Kulm or Edgeley, you'll still see tributes to Angie Dickinson.

Here's the rest of a mosaic list of famous North Dakotans. And again, it depends on what list you are looking at, but for the sake of space, we are looking at those who were ranked on most of the lists that were encountered.



Recently, a contractor originally from Washburn came to work on our house. We got chatting, and he offered this day-trip itinerary. Drive down to the Lewis and Clark Interpretive Center (in Washburn, just over an hour south of Minot). Explore the museum, then hike the short trails nearby—he said these were some of his favorite places to explore as a child. On the drive back north, stop at the Garrison Fish Hatchery, grab dinner at Ye Olde Malt Shoppe. If there's time,

4. Bottineau/Lake Metigoshe/ International Peace Gardens. A full day trip can include a stop at Pride Dairy in Bottineau for lunch—and the best grilled cheese of your life-and ample time at the International Peace Gardens. There are also options to rent kayaks or bring your bikes to ride.

If you only want a short time at the Peace Gardens, or you'd like to forgo that altogether, Lake Metigoshe is a treasure trove of trail and water options. 5. Burlington. Last but not least, I insist on taking my family to explore a place that is nearly in our backyard. We'll take in a short hike at Old Settler's Park, then hit the splash pad and playground at Stemen Park. Then we'll wrap up with dinner at Hacienda (don't be fooled, it's not a Mexican restaurant).



# **Team Minot** goes outside

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. -- When Airmen first get orders to Minot, there are a lot of thoughts that come to mind. They usually envision really cold winters and nothing but stretches of farmland. Little is ever mentioned of the summers in Minot, and how the eight to nine weeks of fun in the sun make it all worthwhile.

"To the people saying there's not much to do in Minot, they are not looking hard enough or in the right places," said Juan Vadell, event coordinator for the Minot park district and Minot native. "We have the Air Force base, Minot State, farmers, and lots of industries so it doesn't matter how niche, you will be able to find your community.'

Vadell stated that Facebook would be a good place to go for those looking for a specific community to join while in Minot.

"Odds are you're not away from your cell phones and game systems enough to go outside and really enjoy Minot," said Darrel Kerzmann, retired Air Force 23rd Bomb Squadron Chief and Dakota Air Museum crew member. "Minot has the Air & Railroad Museum, several parks, and if you hunt, boat, fish, and camp you won't find much better than Lake Sakakawea and Lake Audubon."

Kerzmann emphasized the notion that no matter where you get stationed, you have the sole responsibility of making the most

"Minot is the right size city," said Stephanie Schoenrock, executive director of Visit Minot. "People love the small town vibe, the safety, entertainment, restaurants, and outdoor activities."

# Obeying the law, prior planning key to fireworks safety



The Fourth of July is right around the corner and most of us are probably planning a special event of some type, some folks might even be looking forward to setting off their own fireworks display. More than 11,000 people are injured in the United States each year from fireworks. Most injuries are the result of the lack of adult supervision and misuse of the fireworks. If you plan on using fireworks to add to the celebration this year here are some

important reminders: Observe local laws. The sale of fireworks is legal from June 26 until July 5 and they may not be purchased by persons under the age

· Fireworks Permitted on Base Are; Sparklers, fountains, smoke devices, snake and glow worms, trick noisemakers such as party poppers, string poppers or snappers, and toy

· Fireworks Specifically Prohibited on Base Are; Explosive or aerial fireworks, roman candles, and rockets or similar devices. If prohibited fireworks are discovered in your possession on the base, the fireworks will be confiscated and you will face administrative/disciplinary actions.

Fireworks are allowed in Ward County but NOT within in the city limits of Minot. If you are caught within city limits with fireworks you will have to appear in court, pay a minimum \$150 bond and be fined between \$50 to \$75. It is also a Class B Misdemeanor.

Use fireworks outdoors only.

Never let children handle or light fireworks. Even sparklers can be dangerous if unsupervised. 16 percent of those injuries involved sparklers. That number increases to 33 percent of the injuries to children, five or younger, when they used sparklers. Those injuries could've been avoided if adults provided adequate supervision.

Never ignite fireworks while holding them. Only light one at a time, and move away quickly.

Make sure there's enough room to ignite fireworks, and keep them away from buildings, vehicles and flammable materials.

· Have a full bucket of water handy for emergencies, and douse used sparklers.

People should watch what

fireworks. Loose clothing can catch fire, and shouldn't be worn while handling fireworks. · Never try to re-ignite fireworks that have malfunctioned. Wait 20

mix. Have a "designated shooter." The transportation and storage of personal fireworks on Minot AFB is prohibited. The fact is there are no safe and sure ways to use fireworks - it's that simple! In 2008, according to the National Fire Protection Association, fireworks caused an estimated 22,500 reported fires. These fires resulted in one death, 40 injuries and \$42 million in direct property damage. Fireworks, even the smallest of firecrackers, are explosives and very unpredictable. Some have very short fuses and some have hard

to light fuses that can suddenly begin a rapid burn. Rockets and cones tend to have no programmed guidance system, making people and buildings unwanted targets.

Each year thousands of Americans, many of them children, are victims of fireworks accidents. In 2008, U.S. hospital emergency rooms treated an estimated 7,000 people for fireworks related injuries. These accidents are not minor; they include the loss or disfiguration of fingers, hands, arms, faces, vision, hearing and severe burns. Sparklers, which can burn as hot as 1000 degrees have caused countless tragic injuries to small children since parents assume they are safe for children to use.

By observing these reminders, people can help prevent unfortunate accidents. Remember, in case of an emergency, call 911.



NorDak North, a publishing and printing company in Garrison, North Dakota, prints the Northern Sentry every Wednesday afternoon. We thought it might be fun, and informative, to take a group of our Junior Journalists, carriers, and their families, to Garrison and do a tour of the production and press facility of NorDak North.


Knowing that the tour would more than likely have to be a summer event, we sent out an invitation on social media. The date would be June 26th, with the production & printing tour starting at 1:30 PM.

Our first stop would be in the graphics department where Karen Krzmarzick and LaVaughn Watson-Rustad who are in production explained to our guests that graphics specialist, Nikki, would actually take all of the ads and stories and organize them into what would be the June 28th edition of the Northern Sentry. Some of the kids had submitted photos for our summer photo contest and displayed in the paper. On our end at the Northern Sentry, we begin to organize next week's edition almost immediately after this week's edition hits the press. All of the pages of the paper are transferred electronically to Garrison and NorDak North by 12 Noon on Wednesday, or earlier if possible.

Once the pages of the paper are electronically downloaded, they go to another area where the printing plates, huge sheets of aluminum, are produced. This area kind of sounds like a scene from Star Wars, with humming and buzzing and mechanical movement as the plates are produced. This is where we met Paul Kolden, who has been running the press area at NorDak North for over 26 years. The kids and parents were able to see the final step of the preparation process, the bending of a small lip on the edge of the plates to hold them in the press.

or in black and white. There are several plates for each section of the Northern Sentry. The plates can only be used once.

And then we are off to the press room, where huge rolls of newsprint get transformed into pages of the Northern Sentry. Darla Mautz, our main tour guide, explains that NorDak North prints 29 different papers each week. The Northern Sentry is a weekly paper. It prints on Wednesdays, gets delivered to Minot on Thursdays, and should reach its' final destination no later than Noon on Fridays. The Northern Sentry prints around 4,700 papers each week. It is the largest paper that NorDak North prints in Garrison. It is absolutely amazing to watch as the large, almost two story, press prints out each page. Once printed the pages are cut and folded.

From the press room, where we see final copies of the second section of the Northern Sentry coming off the press, we go to the assembly area where all of the sections, and the inserts, of the Northern Sentry are assembled into one paper, and organized into bundles of 100, or other amounts needed by the different carriers and other folks who deliver the Northern Sentry. In the old days if there were a special story, you would hear the phrase, stop the presses, which meant we wait for the new story to be inserted into the paper. It would take a new page, a new plate and of course all of the papers already run would need to be thrown away. No stopping the presses today. The Northern Sentry is printed, soon to be assembled and transported to our readers at Minot Air Force Base and the community of Minot.

Once our tour of NorDak North ended, we were invited to board the very unique, Wally Trolley! The Trolley was purchased in Florida, and would be our transportation to Fort Stevenson State Park, and the Fort Stevenson guard house area. In the distance we can see the Garrison Dam and powerhouse area. But the tour



Melvina worked on her bachelor's degree to fulfill her lifelong dream of becoming a teacher, and Avaris started his transition to become an Air Force commissioned officer through Officer Training School (OTS). Also during this time, the couple began growing their family, first welcoming son Michael and then son Avery a year later. Eventually, the couple were stationed at Vandenberg AFB and then Minot in 2020. During the last seven years Melvina has earned her Bachelor's of Science in Early Childhood Education, Master's of Science in Elementary Education with a Reading Endorsement, Executive Certificate in Curriculum and Instruction and is currently working on her doctorate dissertation with plans to finish her Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) in Curriculum and Instruction ABD by 2025. Melvina explained that, "ABD means 'all but dissertation' which just shows that I am all done with the coursework for the degree and am currently writing my dissertation to complete the degree." Her next goal is to someday teach at the collegiate level. Additionally, she has earned and kept valid her teaching credentials in Georgia, Wyoming and North Dakota, where she currently teaches at Dakota Elementary. She has taught elementary school every year and continued to excel in her field by winning the Presidential Award for Excellence in Mathematics and Science Teaching this past year. Capt Murray said he was inspired by his educational wife's drive

and began to see just how much education benefits adult individuals and students alike. The couple's mixed knowledge of her education experience and his military experience in missiles as a Evaluator in ICBM Standardization and Evaluation allowed for the perfect combination to "launch" a unique program at Dakota Elementary.

"Launch into Literacy" activated a school-wide program where Active Duty members come into the school and spend time reading and interacting with the students. Capt Murray explained that when he was younger, he didn't love reading very much, but that through his lifetime he has begun to understand the importance of it and wants to share that with children today. He said, "Reading is always an easy way to get involved with students." The program has been a huge success at Dakota Elementary and the Murrays hope to be able to grow the program to sister-school North Plains and even the off-base elementary schools. Together they hope to be able to offer reading and literacy encouraged by people outside the classroom. They both want to demonstrate the importance of reading and education as a lifelong learning and not just something you do within the bounds of school building.

Their education goals aside, it is important to both of the Murrays

to demonstrate their love of learning to their own two children as well. Melvina explained that she absolutely loves to read and will consciously make sure to read more on a Kindle or an actual book, rather than her phone, because she wants her kids to see her reading and learning, not just pasted to a screen. Although she enjoys a wide range of genres, she discussed her favorite books saying, "I would think that my "Forever Favorite [Book]" would always be the Twilight series! I read them in high school and have probably read them a hundred times since then. My favorite books are And Then There Were None, The Lovely Bones, Fourth Wing series, and almost any fantasy paranormal/ supernatural fiction books." Capt Murray admitted that he is more an audio book fan and mostly sticks to leadership and finance genres. His most notable reads are Rich Dad, Poor Dad and Start With Why.

Melvina's determined and hard working work ethic mixed with Capt Murray's supportive nature and ambition have led this family to become a huge educational blessing to Minot AFB.



# **Escape to the Escape Room**

Escape rooms have become a popular form of entertainment, capturing the interest and imagination of people everywhere. These immersive experiences offer a unique blend of puzzles, teamwork, and storytelling. When anyone mentions an escape room, commonly used phrases when discussing escape rooms are, "Oh. I've never done one before, or "I can't do those." Escape rooms can be intimidating if you've never tried one before, but they are great family fun and fun to do with your friends, and everyone works together toward the same goal. Escape!

Escape rooms do have many benefits, such as encouraging critical thinking, enhancing teamwork and communication, giving stress relief and entertainment, and stimulating problem solving skills, and boosting confidence just to name a few. Escape rooms encourage critical thinking skills because they use puzzles, riddles, and challenges to make participants think critically and use their analytical skills to find the answers. To succeed, teams must work together to unravel clues, to decipher hidden messages, and to share the information to find the solutions. This can improve your problem-solving skills in various aspects of life, such as work, academics, and daily decisionmaking. Many times, in escape rooms, props and clues co-mingle and may lead team members down the wrong trail or make them fall into a rabbit hole, but many pairs of eyes are better than one.


Apart from the mental benefits of escape rooms, escape rooms serve as an excellent source of stress relief and entertainment, allowing participants an "escape" from everyday life. From the unlocking principal's office to catching a thief who stole Grandma's prized bread recipe, the immersive storylines transport the participants to a different world with a suspenseful atmosphere, giving the team an adrenaline rush and lasting memories with friends and family.

The Minot Public Library hosts escape rooms in the spring, summer, and fall. Some past themes were Harry Potter, Percy Jackson, and Grandma's Kitchen. Sometimes, the escape room clues are written collaboratively between Pam Carswell, the teen librarian, and the students at Minot State University's First Experience, and the students decide on a theme.

The base library hosts mini escape rooms, which last about 15 minutes, and regular escape rooms, which last about 45-60 minutes. There aren't as many clues in a mini escape room as a regular escape room. Julie Reiten, the base library's director, says that the mini escape rooms occupy a table in the middle of the library and an appointment time is needed, unless no team is scheduled for that time

Some themes for the base's escape rooms are Where in Time is Carmen Santiago, library history, and Harry Potter, which is once a year in February. They welcome families and kids. For any child under 12 completing an escape room for the first time, they must be accompanied by a parent. The base library also hosts escape rooms at the Minot-A-Con, and the themes will be Five Nights at Freddie's and

In downtown Minot, Escape Point, owned and operated by professional player Danielle Duncan, offers a fully immersive experience. Escape Point's games are a form of interactive escape rooms where everyone can use their talents and achieve their own specific moment to shine. Ms. Duncan has the perspectives of creator and of player. "Personally, I love solving puzzles, and it's a positive outlet for my creativity because the games are so detailed. As a game player, I love being immersed in the game's environment, and I hope players who play our games get to experience the same thrill as we do when we play in other places." # **Team Minot serves with pride**

Every June, Pride Month offers Americans a chance to honor the contributions LGBTQI+ (lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer/questioning and intersex) people have made to society. The Department of the Air Force takes this opportunity to recognize and honor the noteworthy contributions made to the Air Force by LGBTQI+service members during June.

"Pride Month is for everyone," said Tech. Sgt. Zade Vadnais, president of the Minot Air Force Base LGBTQI+ Alliance. "It's primarily an opportunity for the LGBTQI+ community and its allies to recognize and celebrate the progress that has been made since the Stonewall Uprising in 1969, but it's also an opportunity for those who are unfamiliar, fearful, or misinformed about what our community stands for to see that some of their family members, friends and neighbors they interact with every day belong to the LGBTQI+ community, and hopefully they can realize we have more similarities than differences."

The Air and Space Force is better equipped to carry out the mission with a force composed of people with various experiences, backgrounds and skill sets. With that, Pride Month allows visibility and recognition to better carry out the mission.

"The U.S. military's strength lies in its people, and the strength of its people lies within their differences," said Vadnais. "If everyone in the military came from the same background and we all thought, behaved, and solved problems the same way, we would not be the lethal and innovative force we are today."

Pride Month is significant to the U.S. military considering the anti-LGBTQ+ policies that heavily

impacted U.S. service members in the past.

"Pride Month observances within the military community are especially important because the right for LGBTQI+ U.S. servicemembers to serve openly was established less than 15 years ago," said Vadnais. "There are people still serving today who began their military career under policies that forced them to lie or hide facets of their identity from coworkers, neighbors, and friends. These policies are luckily a thing of the past, and their repeal is cause for celebration."

This year, the Minot Air Force Base LGBTQI+ Alliance hosted several different events for Pride Month. The month was kicked off with an opening ceremony, during which commanders from the 5th Bomb Wing and 91st Missile Wing signed a proclamation in support of LGBTQI+ Pride Month. They also had a presence at the City of Minot's Pride in the Streets event downtown, put on

a few community-building social events, hosted three community-focused mentoring sessions with the 5th BW command chief and other senior leaders on base and partnered with the 5th Force Support Squadron to host a color run 5K on base.

These events were held to celebrate Pride, recognize the history, contributions and achievements of LGBTQI+ U.S. service members, familiarize people with the LGBTQI+ individuals in their community and give people a space to talk and ask questions about LGBTQI+ topics.

"When a community like Minot shows marginalized people that it cares about them, they feel respected and supported, said Vadnais. "When people feel respected and supported by their community, they pass those good vibes on to others, and the entire community grows stronger."

# Strategies to Beat "Summer Slide": Part 2

The summer is in full swing and ensuring our K-12 students retain the knowledge and skills acquired in the previous school year is critical. Summer slide is defined as a loss of academic skills and knowledge that can occur during the summer break. Last week, I shared 5 strategies to beat summer slide. These strategies were 1) Read regularly 2) Visit the library 3) Engage in educational activities 4) Set learning goals and 5) Incorporate learning into daily activities.

Today, I want to share a key factor in ensuring these strategies are implemented and this is establishing a routine. A routine is important because it helps maintain a structured environment that fosters continuous learning and retention of social and academic skills. The routine does not have to mimic a school schedule but can be flexible and predictable for your K-12 student to know what to expect daily.



North Dakota is fortunate having only one native venomous snake— the prairie rattlesnake.

Plus, even though they're poisonous it might be somewhat of a consolation that the prairie rattlesnake isn't quite as nasty as, say, desert rattlesnakes. Plus, they're seldom found "east river" — in other words, prairie rattlesnakes are less common east of the Missouri River. That might help explain why the first snakebite to any family four-legged hunting companion came as a complete surprise: Our Brittany, Huni, came up limping after going through a brushy draw while grouse hunting on a balmy late September evening.

Her foot began swelling. She must have sprained it, we thought, so we iced her lower leg.

The next morning, this small, fine-boned Brittany had a leg swollen larger than a person's arm. It looked like she was wearing a blimp. A quick call to the veterinarian confirmed she needed immediate medical attention.

Our veterinarian quizzed us about the evening events. After telling him we were grouse hunting, he queried as whether or not we were "west river" (west of the Missouri River) or "east river". As he examined her, the rattlesnake's bite marks weren't visible. Had we been "west river", it probably would have been an easy call to make that she, indeed, had a rattlesnake bite.

However, given her swelling and massive amount of black-and-blue skin under her "armpit", all symptoms pointed to a rattlesnake bite. The veterinarian said Huni was lucky in large part because we iced her lower leg — not the bite location - the evening she was bitten. Its location was close to her heart and increased swelling could have been much more dangerous for her.

The second snakebite could have and should have been avoided: Denali, a six-month-old Brittany, was on an August Badlands hike with us. A sharp yip, and the little 18-pound, six-month-old pup came barreling back to my husband in agony. He quickly found the culprit — a few steps later, a small rattlesnake struck his boot.

Too bad Denali wasn't wearing boots, too.

We were in a remote area of western North Dakota's Badlands when that incident occurred. After a slow, agonizing trip on prairie trails, we made it so we could at least try to locate a veterinarian in western North Dakota on a Sunday afternoon. That would determine which direction we would go.

Denali was equally lucky, in part because it bit her paw, not closer to her heart or throat.

Snakebites and dogs can be a deadly combination. Our dogs were both extremely lucky.

But that doesn't underscore the fact that they're dangerous to dogs.

Huni's situation also underscores the fact prairie rattlesnakes aren't just found "west river" or in the Badlands. We were hunting along the north shore of Lake Sakakawea only about 20 miles west of Garrison when Huni was bitten. Unlike Denali's situation, she wasn't in an area where one thinks of rattlesnakes.

The incident brought rattlesnake awareness "east river" to our attention — heightened attention, actually. Some of the rugged places along Lake Sakakawea might be considered "east river" but that doesn't mean rattlesnakes can't be present.

Both situations underscore the importance of preparedness.

Some snakebite tips when dealing with dogs:

- They can occur on land or water.
- Many variables determine the severity and outcome of snakebites, including size and age of the dog, bite location, type of snake, and — perhaps equally as critical — how the human handles the situation.
- •If traveling in areas with snakes including outside of North Dakota find out what types of venomous snakes could be in the area, their preferred habitat, and "personality."
- Recognize the signs: Bleeding, bruising, and swelling around the bite and color changes from red and blue to black as tissues die around the wound. Pale gums, cool skin, tremors, weakness, lethargy, confusion, lack of coordination, vomiting, and slow respiration could also mean a snakebite.
- Keep your "snakebite kit" handy: The kit contains one thing and one thing only your vehicle keys. Don't ice or warm the wound area. Don't try to cut into the wound and suck out venom or apply a bandage. While Huni was iced, it wasn't placed anywhere near the bite location.

The only thing to do is try to keep the dog calm and restrained as gently as possible, helping slow the spread of venom as you high-tail it to the nearest veterinarian.






