Minot AFB encompasses approximately 5,400 Active Duty Military personnel. Within this group, Airmen fall into wings, squadrons, specialties and missions. Every Airman's job is essential to the base, but some may not realize the small tenant training unit also housed within the base. The 373rd Training Squadron, which serves as the 23rd Detachment out of Sheppard AFB in Wichita Falls, Texas, is an integral part of the Minot's structure for training missile maintenance Airmen.

It is from this specific detachment that Staff Sergeant Kevynn Brand and Staff Sergeant Coy Glidewell both hail. These

two instructors and trainers have excelled in their leadership, dedication and knowledge. These standout leaders have excelled so much that the senior-most ranking members of the 23rd Detachment here at Minot AFB, MSgt Garrett Jones and TSgt Calvin Navarro, reached out specifically to the Northern Sentry about highlighting these dedicated Airmen. According to TSgt Navarro, "SSgt Brand and SSgt Glidewell have gone above and beyond in ensuring our continued success."

Both of these Airmen's designated job is to train the trainers who will ultimately develop the new Airmen coming Missile Maintenance into specialties. They have been reported as doing amazing things for their units that well exceed the average expectations. SSgt Brand, for example, notably created an Instructor Handbook for new Instructors. While the information already existed in an Air Force Instruction, according

to SSgt Brand, it was clunky and difficult to find information when needed. So he decided to create a paper guidebook for instructors to find answers and solutions more easily. He said, "A lot of stuff is digital. I have found it alot easier to have a real answer on-hand with a real binder inhand."

SSgt Glidewell brought a whole lot of experience and expertise to the unit as well as a no complaining attitude. His motto is: "Complaining is not going to get you anywhere. Get it done, do it right and you get far." SSgt Glidwell was recently coined by General Thomas Bussiere, Commander of the Air Force Global Strike Command. When asked why he thought he was selected as the one honored he lightheartedly, yet confidently, stated, "Because I do a good job and they recognize hard work.'

Both non-commissioned officers work in sections within the Training Unit, working with specific types of specialties when it comes to the intricacies of missile maintenance. SSgt Glidewell broke it down in simplistic terms: X1= the electronics side, X2= the ICBMS themselves. X3= the facilities that house the missiles. Each of these subsets require specialized training for the missile maintenance Airmen and their Instructors. Both mentioned the importance of getting to know the learning styles and attitudes of each

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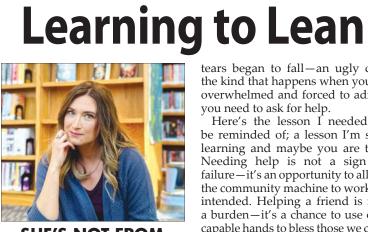
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SHE'S NOT FROM AROUND HERE AMY ALLENDER

Last November, Ι came down with a nasty intestinal infection. The symptoms were as unglamorous as you could imagine. Understandably, after recovering, I was anxious to put the whole experience behind me, never to relive it again.

I hadn't thought about those terrible, dehydrated days in months. Then, last week, I walked into urgent care with an ear infection. Several days later, the antibiotic triggered a relapse of the intestinal infection I had hoped never to see again. It turns out some people are "lucky" enough to be susceptible to it repeatedly after an initial incident. Turns out, I'm one of the "lucky" ones.

The first day after confirming the cause of illness was a blur of pain, dizziness, and dehydration. My husband had recently left for National Guard duty, so the entirety of household and childcare rested on my shoulders. It's a weight all military spouses are familiar with. It's heavy enough on healthy days, but when you're sick, the burden is downright impossible to carry.

After picking up my oldest from school, we came home, and all I could do was sit on the floor, holding back tears. Friends had already stepped in to help by watching the kids while I went to the doctor and picked up prescriptions. As I thought about the hours until bedtime and all the tasks ahead,

tears began to fall-an ugly cry, the kind that happens when you're overwhelmed and forced to admit you need to ask for help.

Here's the lesson \vec{I} needed to be reminded of; a lesson I'm still learning and maybe you are too: Needing help is not a sign of failure—it's an opportunity to allow the community machine to work as intended. Helping a friend is not a burden—it's a chance to use our capable hands to bless those we care about.

One of the best byproducts of being a military spouse is discovering your own capability and resourcefulness. There are endless opportunities to tap into your inner strength and "make it work" when living states away from relatives, and sometimes across the globe from your spouse.

Of course, the downside to this is that we military spouses tend to hesitate to ask for help. Or we allow ourselves to burn out because we don't want to burden friends, or admit that it's too much to handle on our own.

I'm talking to myself here, but maybe a few of you can relate.

So there I was, crying on the living room floor when a friend walked in. "Amy, stop trying to do things. Lay down and be still," she said. Her tone wasn't bossy, just matter-offact. She took over for the rest of the night-getting me drinks, bringing things to my kids, and meticulously preparing PB&Js according to their precise specifications.

After 15 years as a military spouse, it's still hard to ask for or accept help-even when things are, frankly, dire. But my friend was right. I needed to stop trying to do things. I needed to let relationships do what they're meant to do: lift the burden in love-not because I'd repay the kindness, but because caring for each other is a gift within the human experience.

So, what does this mean for you? It's a call for all of us to be intentional about forming relationships and

community wherever life leads us. Hardship will inevitably find us. Our best insurance against being swallowed whole by it is to invest in genuine relationships where it's safe to be vulnerable, and asking for help is not a burden but an opportunity to be a blessing.

Next, let's remember to check on each other. Remind your friends you're willing to help—even when things are messy. It's easier to ask for help when someone makes it clear that those requests are welcome.

Finally, understand that learning to lean on your people takes practice. Asking for help may continue to feel awkward, but like

any skill, it gets easier with time. Leaning on your community in a healthy way will hold you up before things implode. It prevents burnout, mental distress, and ultimately allows life to carry on smoothly amidst turbulence. In fact, to lean may be the most important skill we can ever learn. From the right perspective, leaning isn't a sign of weakness, but rather proof that your friendships are working.

Norsk Høstfest is a foodie's paradise...

We often talk about how many of us attend the North Dakota State Fair for no other reason but to sample the food from various vendors.

The Høstfest food is a lot like that, but in my opinion is much more complex. You can find food items that are popular in all five of the Scandinavian countries; Norway, Sweden, Finland, Iceland and Denmark.

It should also be pointed out that knowing the Høstfest is only several days long, many of the vendors have options for you to "take out" for consumption later or to even freeze it for special occasions. example, As an there's Rommegrot, a Norwegian porridge that is eaten with butter and cinnamon. It is made of rice, salt and cream and is arguably the top taste food at the festival year after year.

steamed until it flakes.

It seems to be a love-hate relationship. Either you really like it or you don't. Being of Swiss heritage myself, I'm not sure I want to indulge in translucent fish.

These items, however, aren't at the top of the list in Norway. There, the official national dish is mutton and cabbage stew.

Have you ever heard of Ponnukokur? This is an Icelandic pancake that's a lot more delicious than anything you'll find at I Hop.

Because the ingredients are heavy on the eggs, it is considered a hearty breakfast and usually is accompanied by some kind of fruit some desserts. But, if you don't like pickled herring, you can go for fried herring.

Finland has some interesting food choices, most of which I doubt you'll find at the Norsk Høstfest. They include salmon soup, sautéed reindeer, salty licorice and bread cheese.

One thing is certain, there are a couple of companies that manufacture "Finnish" licorice that is always available at Høstfest.

From Denmark, the most obvious is, of course, the Danish, a pastry that is usually filled with a fruit filling of some type, usually strawberry or blueberry. Pork roast, fish cakes and rye bread are also very popular Danish items. And finally, it doesn't matter what Scandinavian nationality you may be, any vendor representing a Scandinavian background will have chocolate, or heavily promote it. And there is a reason why. You may think German chocolate is the best, or chocolate from Belgium or France. I suggest you try Scandinavian chocolate. You most likely will never go back to your old brand.

If you've never been there, you're missing out on some of the best food you'll ever taste. Numerous vendors have food items as you walk through the halls, but the Høstfest brings chefs in from Norway and Iceland to prepare signature dishes from those countries.

It's a foodie's paradise. If you don't go there for any other reason, go for the food.

Of course, you can't mention Norwegian festival without mentioning lutefisk, which loosely translated, is lye fish in Norwegian. Cod or pollock are placed in a lye brine, then soaked to remove any remaining caustic solution and then like strawberries, raspberries or even lingonberries.

Other Icelandic foods, not always available in Minot, include fish stew, smoked lamb, dried fish and Icelandic lobster.

Swedish meatballs can be found at the Høstfest also. Not quite as popular as Rommegrot, it remains a popular item year after year.

But Swedish tradition also offers numerous other food items that are usually available. They include pickled herring, pea soup and

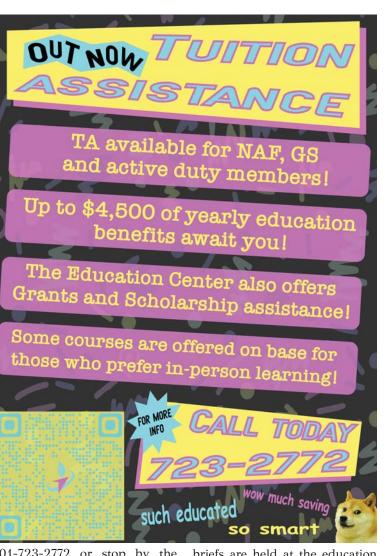

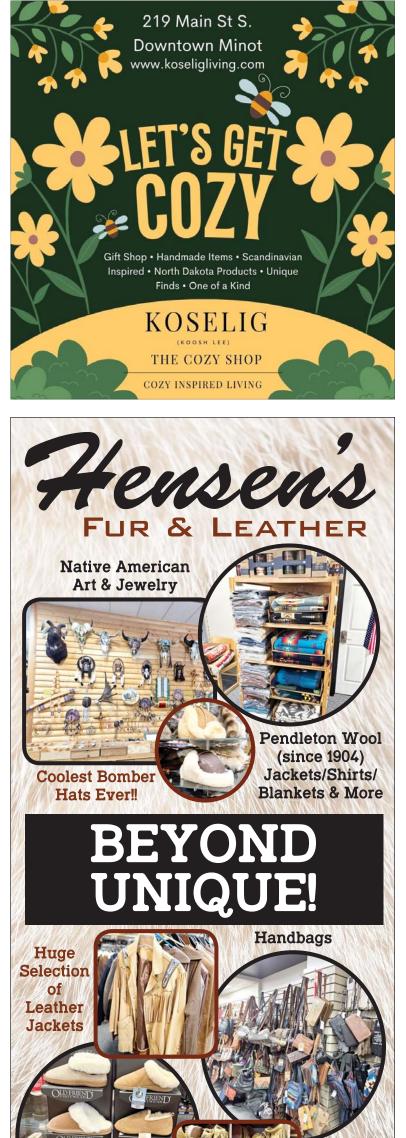

NOTES ON BEING SAFE

HUNTING **SAFETY**

Hunting is a favorite past time of many people in North Dakota and it is upon us! While hunting, we must all ensure we do our part to stay safe and to keep those around us safe as well. So here are a few tips that can help you do that.

Remember to treat every firearm as if it is loaded; never assume it is unloaded. Place your finger on the trigger only when you're ready to shoot. Keep your muzzle pointed in a safe direction, and remember that wherever the muzzle points is in the crosshairs. Don't overlook the possibility of a ricochet and be sure of your target. You're responsible for knowing what's in front of your target, near your target and beyond your target. If you aren't certain, don't take the shot.

Don't forget your protective gear. Hunters' eyes and ears are vulnerable to a number of potential hazards while hunting, so it's important to protect them. Firearms create a high-decibel sound that can damage hearing. The firearm also discharges small particles of the projectile, burning gas and other residue that can damage your eyes. Always wear safety glasses and ear protection. Don't forget the blaze orange! Blaze orange has made hunting safer. Spotting a hunter wearing camouflage is hard, but wearing blaze orange makes you visible to others hunting in the area. Plan for the weather. Hunters can be at risk for hypothermia in cold, wet conditions, but also in temperatures as high as 50° F. Dressing in warm, removable layers, avoiding moisture-retaining cotton and remembering a water-repelling outer layer can help. Before setting out, check the weather report to make sure you won't be caught off guard by other inclement weather. Always check your equipment and stands. Use safety belts to prevent falls off of tree stands. Try

to avoid permanent tree stands as they are more likely to deteriorate. The average fall from a tree stand is about 15 feet. Injuries suffered from those heights can cause broken bones, paralysis or even death. Falls are the most common cause of hunting injuries. They often happen when a hunter is up a tree and startled by animal. Pay attention to your surroundings at all times.

Always let family members or friends know where you'll be hunting. Take two-way radios or loud whistles along in case help

is needed. A surprisingly large number of hunting accidents involve family members and friends who have gone out together, but they do not remember or know where their party has gone. Never head out on a hunting trip without letting a friend or relative know where you'll be and when you expect to return. All Enlisted, Officers, Civilians (adults only), and Spouses are welcome.

For the last two years and in different capacities, TSgt. Garland has worked in theatrical shows with several members from the base to include 1st Lt. Michael O'Keefe of 5th SFS, TSgt. Christine Cherry of 5th FSS, and Staff Sergeant David Becker from the 5th LRS. TSgt. Garland worked with SSgt. Becker in I Hate Hamlet but worked with 1st Lt. O'Keefe and TSgt. Cherry not only on stage, but also behind the scenes in a technical role in Clue the Musical. TSgt. Garland wants to create an opportunity for Airmen to express themselves in a constructive way and to let them know that there are people on MAFB that have gotten involved with the arts. For personnel who don't know where to go or what is available, the Minot Theatre Buffs will be there to help people who aspire to learn skills in any aspect of theater arts, whether artistic or technical. TSgt. Garland stated:

"At the end of the day, I want

to create a community who can grow and help to get people out of the dorms or houses and find a way to get involved with the community. I want to be able to create a pipeline of talent between the base and Minot. I know we

have talented people on base and maybe some who may need it awakened in them, and I hope this is a place to give [it] that push. I would think of the group more of a training ground/networking club."

While having fun and engaging with other people, TSgt. Garland wants members to feel welcome, to feel free to be themselves, and to be able to either hone their skills or develop public speaking habits, stage presence, and confidence. Several purposes of the club are to expose members of the base to what is available in the theatrical arts/music arts, to open opportunities to network, and to interact with people in the community, which will provide a chance for potential theater buffs to learn from them and to educate potential buffs on workshops or Q&A.

At the theater buff meetings, new buffs will be provided with a list of upcoming auditions with local theaters, complete workshop classes and games that focus on developing acting skills with local actors and directors, go on backstage tours with the local theaters in town, sit in on rehearsals, attend Q&A's with the cast and crews of the shows in season, and ultimately attend a regional show in Fargo or Minneapolis. Also, club members will work on simpler skills, such as cold readings, audition and stage direction, and volume and projection.

To direct new club members with different talents to their area of interest(s) in the theater, the club needs to learn where the new member's interest(s) lie. For example, a member's primary talent might be singing, so the club would try to find upcoming musicals where a member could use that talent, while another's primary talent might be into set building and design, so the club would try to find an upcoming show that needs a talented carpenter or painter to create a set for the show. It's TSgt. Garland's dream to create a cast containing

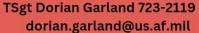

90% military-affiliated personnel in a local show, but right now, to stage a show on base, it's a matter of determining logistics, type of play, and the commitment that comes with staging a show.

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Air Force realigns to ensure readiness, future competitiveness

ARLINGTON, Va. (AFNS) --

The Air Force is organizing its major commands, or MAJCOMs, into Institutional Commands, responsible for organizing, training, and equipping Airmen, and Service Component Commands, responsible for preparing Airmen for warfighting in a combatant command's area of responsibility.

The changes are part of the Department of the Air Force's Great Power Competition initiative.

"Over the last three decades, our Air Force has incrementally become more fragmented," said Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. David Allvin. "This gradual diffusion was the result of decisions made in the context of a different strategic environment. After some deep introspection, it has become clear that to dominate in this challenging strategic environment, we must have a force structure that is better aligned, clearly understood, and agile enough to exploit the rapid pace of change."

The current major command structure has significant variances in how the U.S. Air Force organizes, trains and equips, and how it presents forces. Some MAJCOMS have the responsibility of capability development (e.g., Air Force Materiel Command), some strictly for presenting forces as a service component to a combatant command, and some MAJCOMs have both responsibilities. Some service component commands are also Numbered Air Forces, or NAFs, that report through MAJCOMs, while other service component commands are themselves MAJCOMs.

While this has been made to work in practice, it has evolved with new entities being bolted on, instead of baked in. Through the Reoptimization initiative, the U.S. Air Force has the opportunity to reset both definitionally and structurally. The foundation of the senior command structure in the Air Force will consist of two types of commands: Institutional Commands and Service Component Commands. Institutional Commands will

serve as enterprise integrators for capability modernization, acquisition and sustainment, developing human capital and generating readiness, while Combatant Command-aligned Service Component Commands will employ operational forces in pursuit of Combatant Command missions.

Institutional Commands will include the existing commands with the following modifications:

- Air Education and Training Command is expected to evolve Airman Development into Command, which will train and develop Air Force personnel across the entirety of their career.

The new Integrated Command Capabilities is planned to accelerate force modernization by aligning capability development efforts to a singular, prioritized demand signal for future airpower capabilities, aligned with the Force Design. The transition of capabilities development into one institutional command will enable the service component commands to focus on readiness.

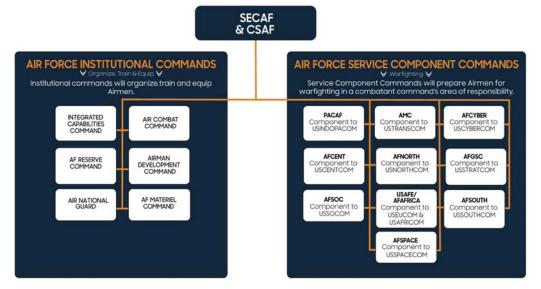

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Air Force to establish Global Strike wing at Offutt AFB

ARLINGTON, Va. (AFNS) --

The Department of the Air Force intends to activate a new wing headquarters, the 95th Wing, at Offutt Air Force Base, Nebraska. This new wing is one of the many efforts underway to reorganize the department for Great Power Competition.

The creation of the 95th Wing under Air Force Global Strike Command will enable effective command of forces to ensure readiness, and in time of conflict, the delivery of strategic and national-level capabilities to multiple combatant commanders and warfighters.

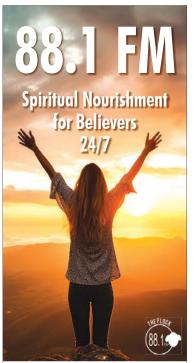
The wing will provide a unified command path to assure the readiness of the 595th Command and Control Group's National Airborne Operations Center, or NAOC, and Nuclear Command, Control, and Communications, or NC3, mission. It will also establish a Total Force partnership to better resource the 253rd CACG, and 610th Command and Control Squadron unique missions to other combatant commands. The consolidation will provide an enterprise view of broad Command and Control, or C2, capabilities and improve the ability to lead, advocate and provide for resources, training



and readiness.

Additionally, the 95th Wing will establish a Total Force command relationship to associate Air Force Reserve Command and Air National Guard units with the regular Air Force under AFGSC to improve C2 and normalize funding paths to organize, train and equip units.

The wing will incorporate existing positions from 595th CACG at Offutt AFB, Nebraska; 253rd CACG, Wyoming Air National Guard at Cheyenne Air National Guard Base; 610th Command and Control Squadron, AFRC, at Davis-Monthan AFB, Arizona. No manpower will move from 253rd CACG or 610th CACS. The new mission will add approximately 70 military authorizations at Offutt AFB over the next few years with personnel expected to begin arriving in spring 2025, with full operational capability in 2027.

Few, if any, reporters get the opportunity that we at the Northern Sentry do, that being direct contact and interviews with both wing commanders and both of the Command Chiefs. It is an opportunity that I am blessed to have, not only once, but usually once a year.

There is so much activity on base that having the commander of either the 5th Bomb Wing or the 91st Missile Wing sit down and give you an uninterrupted hour of their time to ask them questions about their job, the base and the community, makes me feel very special, even though we are just on small cog in a huge wheel of media that the base deals with on a daily basis. Recently CNN made its' way to Minot Air Force Base to report

Minot Air Force Base to report on how changes in political climate have affected the only dual nuclear mission base on U.S. soil. If you haven't had an opportunity to watch these segments, take time to google them on You Tube. It will certainly be worth your time. Colonel Jimmy Schlabach did an on-camera interview. His comments were very re-assuring that the mission at Minot AFB goes on 24/7, whether the political climate around the globe changes or not.

That brings me down to the mission, or missions, of Minot Air Force Base. Even though much of today's war machine is computer controlled, the mission is accomplished every day by Airmen. I would like to share a couple of comments from my recent interviews, hoping that you will appreciate them as much as I did.

First, Minot Air Force Base has the most first-term Airmen of any base in the U.S. Air Force. Wow! Imagine yourself at age 18-19. You make a life choice to join the Air Force, and in less than a year you are in Minot, North Dakota, working with older than average systems, that being the B 52 and the Minuteman III, and you are part of a mission to be the head of the spear in deterrence of world powers, small or large, from attacking the United States.

Second, the quality of the young men and women we are seeing at Minot Air Force Base is top notch, much better than when I joined some 25 years ago. (Comment from Command Chief Wayne Sharp). I have often sat in line at the main gate of Minot AFB and looked at the sign that says, "Only The Best Come North." It isn't lip service folks, nor is it a slogan line that Minot AFB uses loosely. I work with a staff of around 20 Airmen in Public Affairs. Kind of like the B 52 and the Minuteman III, I have been around a while. Yet, these young Airmen are ready to be deployed at moment's

notice in support of a Bomber Task Force hallway around the world. They are the face of the Minot Air Force Base when VIPs arrive, as they do every week, to get the story of Minot Air Force Base firsthand. When they arrive in Minot, they have to hit the ground running. They are true professionals in what they do. And I can repeat this story about the many other Airmen that I meet. The mission is being accomplished 24/7, and the mission is being accomplished well. Not with new technology, but with weapon systems that are both over 50 years old. What makes the difference? The same as with your car or home. Attention to details. Application of knowledge and finally, the determination to "get it done!" That's what keeps Minot AFB on the point. Airmen, whether it be first year or experienced, staying on task and getting it done.

All of the Airmen at Minot Air Force Base made a choice. A choice to step up and serve their country, to accomplish a mission, and be ready 24/7. Thanks to Col's Jesse Lamarand and Jimmy Schlabach, and to Chief's Sharp and Thomas for their time. Quality at the top will always mean good things happen all the way down. Only the "Very" Best Come North.

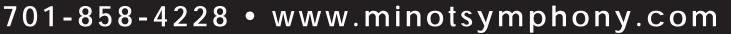

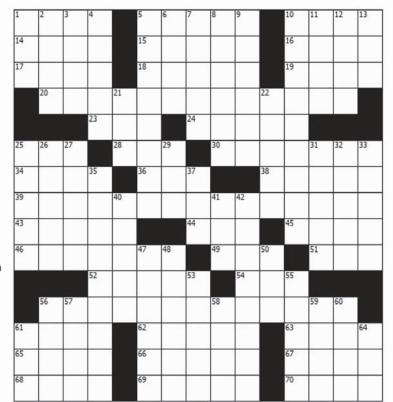

- Air Combat Command will integrate readiness for CONUSbased service-retained forces and prepare and present missionready forces to combatant commands.

- Air Force Materiel Command will consolidate and establish new centers to rapidly develop, procure, field and sustain a pipeline of competitive capabilities to deliver decisive advantages to the force.

- Air Force Reserve Command and the Air National Guard will provide strategic and operational depth and surge capacity by developing and managing an experienced, modernized and accessible Reserve Force.

Service Component Commands project air power to the joint force combatant commands through theater-assigned and rotationally allocated Air Force units in each of the CCMDs.

To streamline how the Air Force presents force offerings to Combatant Commanders, the Component Numbered Air Forces listed are planned to become Service Component Commands, reporting directly to the Secretary of the Air Force through the Chief of Staff of the Air Force. This alignment ensures the Air Force better prepares, presents and generates airpower effects for the Joint Force and enables service component commands to focus on preparation and presentation for their combat

missions.

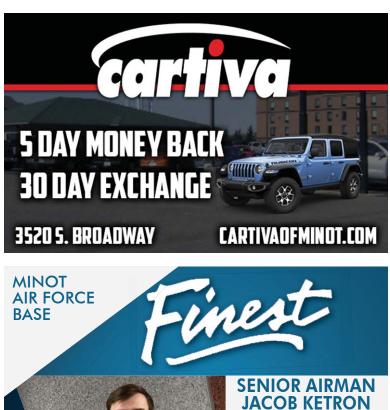

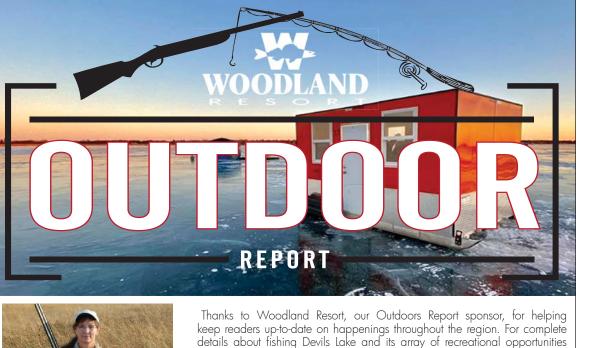

Pacific Air Forces; U.S. Air Forces in Europe - U.S. Air Forces Africa; Air Force Special Operations Command; Air Mobility Command; and Air Force Global Strike Command will be considered SCCs and will retain their current Combatant Command force alignment and readiness-related roles, responsibilities and authorities.

Streamlining Air Force into organizations either Institutional Commands or Service Component Commands will allow them to focus solely on developing Airmen, generating readiness and sustaining and delivering capabilities, or projecting airpower to the Joint Force, respectively.

Air Forces Southern, or AFSOUTH, will become the first Service Component Command under the new construct. AFSOUTH's operational mission as the Air Force Component to USSOUTHCOM will not change. However, as a Service Component Command, AFSOUTH will be better positioned to advocate for service-related matters such as personnel, administration and unit training.

With muscles terse and quivering, the dog seems to know the day is special.

The morning air has a hint of crispness. Swallows dart back and forth and the shrill cry of a hawk announces its distant presence.

Spider webs, woven like a tapestry with intricate jewels among fading grass, glisten with dew in the brilliance of the rising sunlight. Even the most stunning of diamonds shrivels with jealousy compared to the shimmering, web - nature's own dream catcher.

The dusky, pale green leaves of a buffaloberry bush stand in sharp contrast to its rich, crimson berries, its laden branches drooping with the bounty.

For now, food is plentiful but the berries will be a critical for the day's quarry in the coming months as early autumn gives way to winter.

Today, the opening day of grouse season, offers all that is right about the prairie and a new hunting season: The companionship of a good dog and a meandering trek across the prairie, exploring a buffaloberry patch, musing at the discovery of a gray, weathered hornet's nest among its branches and anticipation as the dog freezes in a staunch point just as a sharp-tailed grouse flushes.

The first one bursts off to the side, then another in a different For he is one of us. direction and perhaps a couple of more for good measure.

A few decades ago, the opening day of grouse season was time for celebration, a much-heralded event signaling the beginning of many hunting opportunities to come.

But it seems nowadays some hunters forsake grouse season in favor of pursing a glitzy import in October.

After all, a hunter often logs fewer miles on shoe leather before a limit of pheasants is in the bag.

Some hunters even profess that the gaudy ringneck tastes better, too.

And, really, there is only so much time a person has to spend afield - why not pursue a glitzy ringneck rather than a drab gray bird that clucks when it flies?

Oh, it's OK to downplay the treasure that is native grouse, but my dog knows better and so do I.

While my dog would vehemently disagree with me, grouse hunting isn't all about the birds.

True, it's nice to get a bird or two but in all honesty, they're

So off we go, over one hill, across another to a clump of silverberry. Oh, wait, there's more buffaloberry and chokecherries off in that other direction. That's a good place to explore, especially as the morning hours warm and birds seek cool shade.

Another hawk screams overhead and more swallows zip by. The dog is in her glory, investigating every clump of little bluestem and buck brush. She's oblivious to cockleburs, buffaloberry thorns and annoying little "sticker weeds" that must be combed out later that evening.

Every patch of cover must be analyzed. And don't forget, sharpies love to lounge on the downwind side of a hilltop in the breeze.

The dog knows that, as well...because it's grouse season and it's the prairie at its best.

Perhaps author John D. Taylor in his book of history and hunts afield, "The Wild Ones: A Quest for North America's Forest & Prairie Grouse", summed up his – and those of like minds – love of grouse the best: "There is a reverence, a passionate relationship, with this continent's forest and prairie grouse for those who have come to know these birds."

Yes, he gets it – he understands his dogs and fellow grouse hunters.

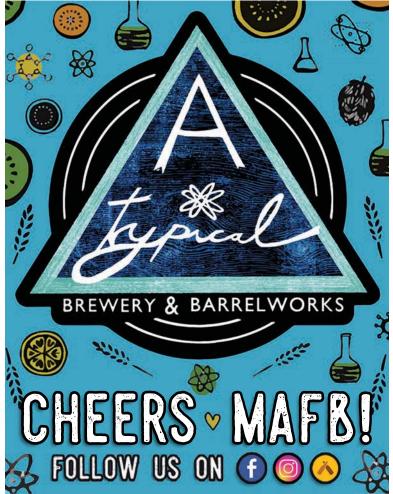
