

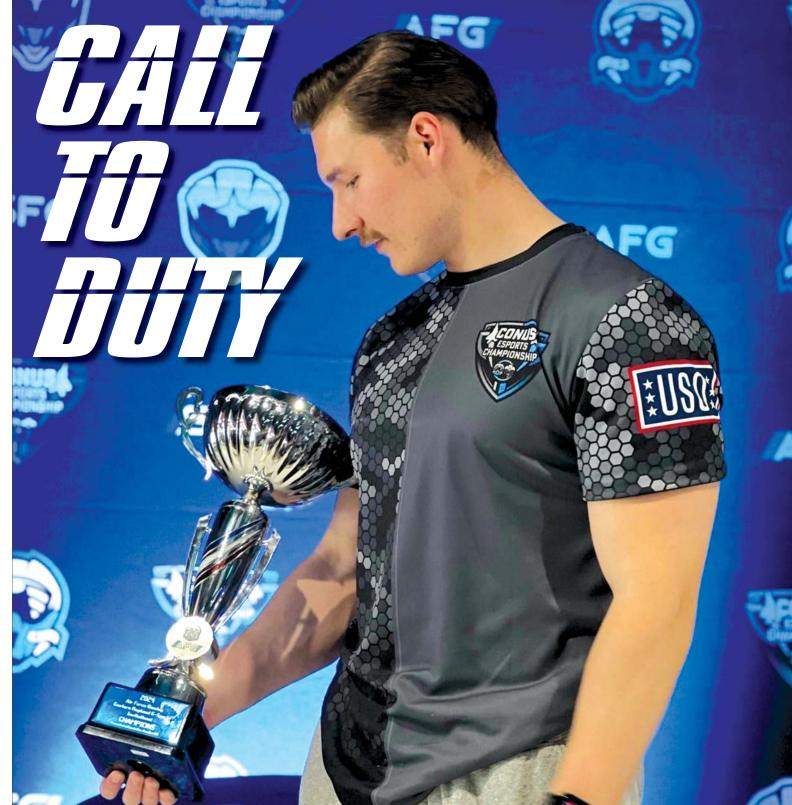

Join the Fight. Supporting those struggling with thoughts of suicide can take time, energy, and effort. Self-care and knowing your limits are key to staying resilient while being there for others.

• Be willing to listen and talk to others.

Learn about suicide prevention resources and tools for prevention, including the availability of chaplain support and services.

• Adopt lethal means safety as a normalized practice in your day-to-day life.

• Spend time with friends and family members — whether inperson or virtually, depending on what works best.

• Seek support from peers, family, or health professionals when you need it.

Connect with Others. There are many ways to #JointheFight for members of your community and strengthen connections. Show your support.

• Check in with friends and family. Let them know you care. • Use de-stigmatizing language

and safe ways to talk about suicide. • Plan activities that you can

enjoy together. • Listen when they want to talk.

• Accept what he or she has experienced without judgment. • Resist the temptation to

problem-solve.

• Reassure them.

• Express care and concern. • Encourage them to get help and stay in touch with friends and family.

Speak Up. If you are concerned about someone, ask if they are thinking about suicide, have a plan, and have the means, such as a firearm, medication, or other method of self-harm.

Listen and Offer Support. Be calm and express concern. Take what they say seriously and ask how you can help.

Act Quickly

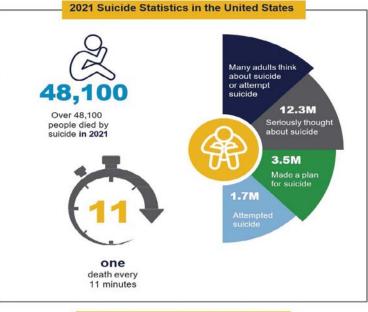
• If you have a concern that they are at imminent risk for suicide, do not leave them alone and seek help immediately. Contact a crisis line, chaplain, health provider, emergency room, or 911. The Veterans / Military Crisis Line is available 24/7 at 988 (press 1). If you are on the phone with an individual who you believe is in immediate danger, try to keep him or her on the line while you or someone else calls 911.

• Ask if there is someone nearby who could offer support and keep talking to the individual until help arrives.

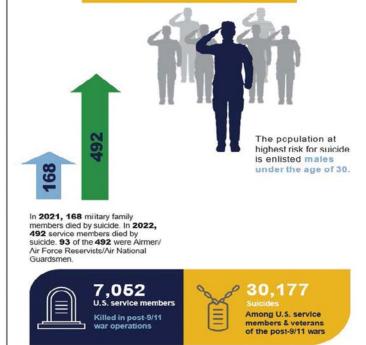
Remember, there is no one "fix," and no single person or organization can prevent suicide alone.

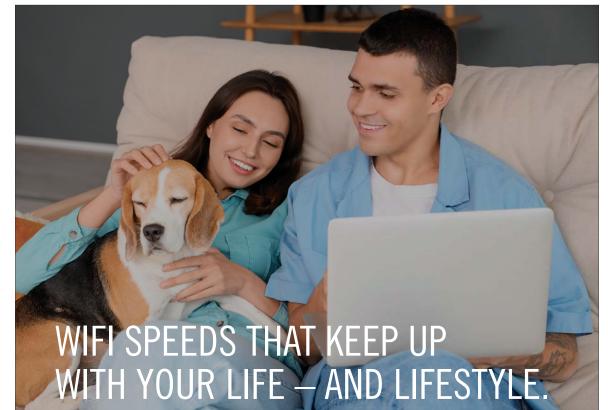

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# **B-52 Bombers Fly to and from Poland for Exercise with Six NATO Allies**

Two B-52 bombers from Minot Air Force Base, N.D., flew to and from Europe in recent days, taking part in a training mission along the way with more than two dozen fighters, tankers, and other assets from six other NATO allies over Poland, aimed at sharpening command and control in a contested environment.

The strategic bombers were joined by aircraft from Denmark, Germany, the Netherlands, Poland, Spain, and the U.K. for an exercise known as F2T2 on Sept. 11. The B-52s returned to Minot on Sept. 12 as part of what U.S. Air Forces in Europe described as a "double transatlantic" trip.

Four Spanish F-18M Hornets joined the exercise, flying in from Mihail Kogalniceanu Air Base in Romania. The base is currently hosting eight Hornets from the Spanish Air Force for NATO's Air Policing mission, along with more than 150 military personnel as part of its PAZNIC Detachment, which began a fourmonth rotation last month.

"These kinds of exercises are an incredible opportunity to train and demonstrate Spanish F-18 Hornet capabilities and determination," Lt. Col. Rafael Ichaso, detachment commander, said in a release. "Almost a six-hour flight with refueling, in coordination with other NATO assets, to deliver our high precision strike capabilities against any possible target is a

big and important challenge for the PAZNIC detachment."

Poland provided ISR assets for the mission, while Germany and the U.K. ensured refueling support along with USAF KC-135 Stratotankers from the 100th Air Refueling Wing, based at Royal Air Force Mildenhall. The Royal Netherlands Air Force's fifth-generation F-35s, the Danish Air Force's F-16s, and Germany's Tornado fighters also participated.

A NATO release noted that the training also included units from air, land, sea, cyber, and space domains, all focused on integrating multidomain effects.

"Executing these multidomain exercises ensures NATO assets are ready to respond to any potential threat to the Alliance," added Hecker, calling the bomber mission "successful."

This marks the second B-52 appearance in Europe in three months. In July, two B-52s from the 2nd Bomb Wing at Barksdale Air Force Base, La., touched down at Mihail Kogălniceanu for the first time, also marking the bomber's inaugural flight through Finnish airspace. After crossing Norway and Finland, the bombers were intercepted by two Russian fighters over the Barents Sea. The intercept remained professional-unlike past encounters over the region.

This latest mission in Poland also coincided with a visit by U.S. Secretary of State Antony Blinken to meet with Polish Foreign

Minister Radoslaw Sikorski on Sept. 12. A day earlier, Blinken and U.K. Foreign Secretary David Lammy were in Ukraine, meeting President Volodymyr Zelenskyy and top officials to discuss continued support for Kyiv's defense against Russia. Poland has voiced its support for Ukraine's ongoing calls for the West to approve long-range missile strikes into Russia to counter Moscow's aerial attacks.

"As the West, we shall continue supplying Ukraine with advanced air defense and antimissiles defense systems," Sikorski said in a joint press conference. "We shall also lift the ban on using long-range weapons.... and we hope that more intense activities will be taken with regard to seizing frozen Russian assets."

Blinken, however, declined to commit to doing so.

"What we learned from our Ukrainian partners will inform discussions that we'll be having with other allies and other partners in the days and weeks ahead, as we work through and think through the coming months," he said. Since Russia's invasion of

Ukraine ignited a full-scale war on Europe's eastern edge, NATO members have been ramping up efforts to bolster their militaries and conduct exercises. While the U.S. began bomber task force missions in Europe in 2018, there has been a steady rotation in recent months.

## UPSIDE DOWN UNDER MARVIN BAKER

You may have noticed the leaves

on the trees in your back yard beginning to change color. And as we go later into September, that foliage is becoming more intense and looks stunning.

Granted, North Dakota doesn't have forests like other places do, so you can't just drive down a road and see what those in New England might see. But you can drive to certain places and see the same thing that is happening in Vermont, New Hampshire and New York, as well as parts of Michigan, Wisconsin and Minnesota. North Dakota has spots, some hidden fairly well, that will provide the same impressive viewing that you would see Down East. About the only thing we don't have that the New England states do, is an abundance of maple trees.

# Vermont's got nothing on us...

Some of the best fall foliage photos I've ever taken have been there. It doesn't even seem like you're in North Dakota. You are. You're only 6 miles from the Canadian border, but it's North Dakota.

• Fort Ransom State Park provides incredible fall foliage. Actually the drive from Valley City south to Kathryn and to the community of Fort Ransom is quite a site to see. In that scenario, you might as well be in Vermont because you are driving close to 50 miles through the fall foliage.

• The Pembina Gorge – As you go west from the letrault overlook along Pembina County Highway 55, you descend into the Pembina Gorge which is quite similar to Tetrault, but you won't have the exact vantage point. The interesting thing about the gorge is, it's so deep that the wind doesn't affect it like much of the rest of the state and if you go there in the winter, some of the fall foliage remains. It's one of the prettiest sites in the snow. • The Turtle Mountains are sometimes considered North Dakota's best kept secret. In parallel with Lake Metigoshe State Park, this area feels like your somewhere in the woods in northern Manitoba. As you drive toward Bottineau on N.D. Highway 5, you see off in the distance what appear to be mountains. That's where you need to go and view the

foliage. It's gorgeous every year and you'll most likely see some interesting wildlife as well while your visiting.

• Devils Lake is a great place to see fall foliage; not the community, but the area around the lake. There are several overlooks such as Sullys Hill to see the lake area in the fall. Unfortunately, it isn't as spectacular as 30 year ago as the rising lake has killed a lot of the trees that magnified the beauty of fall.

If you are in the central part of the state, a quick and easy drive will take you to Cross Ranch State Park near Center. This is an area that is covered with Cottonwood trees so the foliage won't last as long as it will in other places that have Oak, Maple or Box Elder trees.
In the northwest corner of the state is the Trenton Wildlife Management area near the Montana state line. It's a large wooded area along Trenton Lake

that is perfect for taking in the beauty of the fall colors. This is a great getaway for people in the Williston area.

• Fort Lincoln State Park south of Mandan, the Denbigh Forest near Towner, Lake Tschida near Elgin, Lake Darling just to the northwest of Minot, Roosevelt National Park North and South units, Beaver Lake State Park near Wishek and the Greenway in Grand Forks are all places that you'll be glad to visit.

North Dakota Tourism also points to the North Dakota state capitol area, Lindenwood Park in Fargo and the Turtle River State Park as must see areas as well. A couple of places Tourism missed are Icelandic State Park west of Cavalier and Seeman Park in Linton.

# Early education, affordable child care are community challenges



DEAR MINOT TOM ROSS, MAYOR CITY OF MINOT

I recently had the privilege of attending the Hunt Institute Early Childhood Leadership Conference, and it was truly an eve-opening experience on so many levels.

The conference also served as a strong reminder of the challenges every community, including Minot, faces when it comes to available and affordable early childhood education and child care.

I learned that studies have shown that up to 90 percent of a human's brain development happens between the ages of 0 to 5 years old. Yet most of us think the people/professionals who care for our children during that period in their lives are simply "babysitters." What I learned this last week at the conference is that nothing could be further from the truth.

This discussion also opened my eves even wider to a potential flaw/opportunity for us as a community.

This conference was a learning experience that will help us here in Minot stay focused on our childcare committee that was put together last year by former Councilman Scott Burlingame and Councilwoman Lisa Olson. I was able to share some of the recommendations by the

committee to a delegation from North Dakota who were attending the conference with me. The week was filled with numerous "take-aways," including;

High quality, affordable childhood education and child care affects so many aspects of our community. And it was mentioned over and over, "Whatever city or state that solves the early childhood and early family support will solve their workforce issues as well as increase their economic development impact."

• One reason it's difficult to attract childhood educators into that field of work is knowing that the salary you earn is potentially below the poverty scale.

• People who work in early childhood care and education are the first ones to show up, yet these programs are often the last ones in line to receive critical funding. • Tomorrow's workforce is

today's 0 to 5 year olds.

• 40 percent of families with young children have problems meeting their monthly bills.

• 1.2 million women have not returned to the workforce since the Covid-19 pandemic.

• Putting a focus on early education and early childhood support is a long term investment for communities like Minot, and

we need to remind ourselves that tangible results take time.

• Another message was stated and reinforced at the conference: Engage the educators, and listen to the parents.

Our local childcare committee has worked hard to be part of addressing this situation in Minot, and I will be asking Alderwoman Olson to carry the torch as we move forward. The investment also needs to have buy-in from every area of our communities. including private entities, public service organizations, parents, and businesses.

Creating affordable and available child care is a complicated issue. But to me, it really boils down to creating a sustainable program, building trust, spending time, and investing in time, talent, and funding. Those types of investments are much more costefficient than funding the potential troubles and issues we deal with as adults.

Addressing early childhood education and quality, affordable child care isn't easy, and there is no simple or magic solution. But I firmly believe that this is something we can do together. It truly will take a village to begin solving this issue, but it's critical to our community on so many

levels that we tackle these issues head-on. There are long term social and economic impacts that we, as a community, must continue to address.

One of my favorite activities as mayor is visiting with school children in the classroom and at all sorts of events. This is what I see on my visits: Staff and teachers are working hard, and have the best interests of their students on their minds at all times. Children are active and engaged, and they constantly want to learn more.

improvements and changes we could make if we, both as a community and as a state, put more focus on early childhood education? Imagine how investing our efforts on an even younger demographic could set future generations up for success?

My challenge is this: Let's not imagine it any more. Let's do it.

# All About Pets

# Pets have allergies t00!

Just like their humans, pets can have allergies too, and they are no fun for your furry friends! Pet allergies can be triggered by a variety of things including food ingredients, bug bites/stings, seasonal, prescriptions, chemicals, and more. Did you know that protein sources (including chicken, beef, or lamb) are some of the most common allergens for dogs? Here are some of the symptoms of allergies in your cats and dogs:

• Hives

 Swelling—in the face, ears, lips, eyelids, etc.

- Red, hot, and inflamed skin
- Diarrhea
- Vomiting
- Sneezing

Runny eyes
Constant licking or other restlessness

If you suspect that your pet might be having an allergic reaction, its best to contact your vet immediately. They can administer quicker solutions for more severe reactions and can also give you advice on how to prevent future allergy attacks. Sometimes it's as easy as cutting out a specific trigger (such as chicken in the diet or a certain dog shampoo), but sometimes it may

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take a lot of trial and error to narrow down a culprit. Make sure you keep accurate tabs on which products you use on and around your pet, as well as all the foods that they ingest and what they are around when outside.

If your pet is showing severe signs of allergic reaction and even anaphylaxis (swelling, hives, itching, excessive salivation/drooling, vomiting, diarrhea, pale gums, seizure, wheezing or trouble breathing, etc.) drop everything and get your pet to the emergency vet immediately! One of the closest émergency vets to Minot Air Force Base is Pinkerton Animal Hospital.

In more mild cases, Benadryl is usually the go-to at home remedy, but do not give your pet any medication or remedies without consulting your veterinarian first as you can potentially do more harm than good without the quidance of a professional.

In order to help our pets live their best lives, it's important to keep an eye on them, their habits and their reactions to catch any allergies as soon as possible. If you got sick every time you ate chicken, you probably wouldn't want to keep eating it every day, would you? Neither does your pet!

# **NOTES ON BEING SAFE** WATCHING FOR THE WHITE TAILS TIPS TO AVOID DEER **COLLISIONS**

There is no doubt that the fall and winter seasons are the most common time for a person to hit a deer while driving, mainly because this is the time of year that deer are out looking for food. As with any other type of automobile accident, however, the good news is that there are many ways for you to prevent yourself from hitting a deer.

The steady increase in North Dakota's deer population has been felt on vehicles as well as driver's pocket books across the state. Vehicle mishaps involving deer strikes have had a steady increase of 34% since 2000. According to State Farm Insurance stats 1 in 136 vehicle operators will have a deer strike this winter season.

Typically the month of November has the highest number of deer strikes crashes. In 2018, there were approximately 31 per day in November. Deer strikes occur most often between 7 a.m. and 8 a.m., and again in the evening from 6 p.m. – 10p.m.

According to Linda Butts, NDDOT Deputy Director of Driver and Vehicle "Drivers should always Services wear a seat belt whether driving on a highway or a rural road, and need to be especially vigilant during the early morning and evening hours.

#### **Avoid Hitting a Deer By Driving Slow**

If you want to avoid hitting a deer, the first thing that you will start doing driving slow - or at least slower t The main reason is because usual. you will be more likely to slam on the breaks and bring the car to a stop before your car comes close to hitting the deer. You will allow yourself more time to react to a deer crossing the road when you drive slower than if you were to drive faster. Following speed limits, or doing lower than the speed limit in areas where you know that deer may be spotted frequently, is one of the best ways to prevent hitting a deer this winter.

your automobile is just hit it. The main reason is because more injuries and deaths occur from those who choose to swerve, ultimately landing themselves wrapped around a tree, telephone poll or even another vehicle. Although your car may have some damage, it is likely that the injuries you may face from hitting a deer will not be half as bad as if you had swerved.

If you hit a deer, you are to contact law enforcement to report the crash if the damage is over \$1,000. Remove the deer to the side of the roadway if it is safe to do so. If you are unable to do so, law enforcement will move the deer.

If the deer is a traffic hazard and you can't move it to the side of the road, and law enforcement isn't involved, you may contact the NDDOT district office in Minot at 837-7625, or North Dakota State Radio at 1.800.472.2121 so they can make arrangements to remove the deer.

He and his team won the Call of Duty (COD) Eastern Regional E-Sports Invitation (EREI) tournament at Keesler AFB, Mississippi on May 3-4, 2024. For Team Minot's E-sports Team, a team of four Airmen from different bases, U.S. Air Force Captain Nicholas Gutierrez, Senior Airman Jacob Bass, Senior Airman Angel Garcia, and Airman 1st Class Luke Townsend competed in the EREI tournament and qualified for the Continental United States (CONUS) tournament. In the EREI tournament, the best Air Force bases in the Continental United States competed against each other in a game called Call of Duty Modern Warfare 2, aka MW2. SrA. Bass received the Most Valuable Player (MVP) award.

E-sports are multiplayer video games played competitively for spectators, typically by professional gamers. SrA. Bass became involved in e-sports when he attended high school because a friend had always told him that he was exceptional and that he could play at a higher competitive level. Since he has been playing for years and dreamed of higher-level play, winning the  $\ensuremath{\text{MVP}}$  for the EREI was a huge, meaningful accomplishment for SrA Bass.

During the EREI, SrA. Bass, or Bruce (his in-game name and his name in the AFG), said that when he would "pop off," he could hear the spectators' reactions. "Popping off" means going on a big kill streak or a quick multi-kill, which is a game changing play. The spectators always get him stoked. In many physical sports, athletes feed off the crowd's excitement. It's no different for e-sports athletes. The 2024 EREI attracted over 1200 attendees, who witnessed eight Air Force Gaming teams compete.

SrA. Bass's, or Bruce's, stats were as follows: 1.39 Overall K/D, 1.40 Hardpoint K/D, 1.09 SND K/D, and 1.51 CONTROL K/D. The kill record in any match was 47, and the team's overall record was 21-10.

What SrA. Bass likes most about playing e-sports is "No matter how old I get, I always stay super competitive and

wanna win so bad, making me love playing and competing at a high level." His favorite e-sport is Competitive Search and Destroy within the Call of Duty game because, to him, it's like a chess game. Every move you make on the map is very important, along with the in-game IQ. The team plays together, and ultimately, teamwork is what it takes to win, but sometimes there must be individual moves to push the team to victory.

SrA. Bass doesn't just play video games; he enjoys physical sports too. He likes to play softball for the 791 MSFS but says that he bonds more with his teammates in e-sports. He explained saying, "I would say truthfully that I have bonded with others more through e-sports compared to a regular sport. Not everyone is going to feel that way, but I have always been able to play at a high level of sports year-round vs. seasonally with regular sports. The camaraderie is always higher through e-sports." The Call of Duty Eastern Regional E-Sports Invitation has existed for several years, and SrA. Bass says that participation continues to grow.

The Team Minot's E-sports team did not win the CONUS tournament but placed 2nd in the Best Air Force Bases. So, congratulations to SrA. Bass and Team Minot's E-Sports Team for their accomplishments in the EREI and the CONUS tournament!

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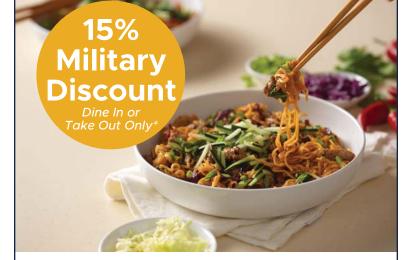


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# Secretary of Defense announces seven new initiatives to enhance well-being of military force and their families

SECRETARY OF THE AIR FORCE PUBLIC AFFAIRS

WASHINGTON (AFNS) --

Secretary of Defense Lloyd Austin III announced seven initiatives to improve the quality of life for service members and their families today. These actions build on the extensive and unprecedented actions that Department of Defense leaders have taken over the past four years as part of Austin's Taking Care of People initiative.

Secretary Austin directed the implementation of the following:

Health Care Flexible Spending Accounts for Service Members: To reduce out-of-pocket health care costs for service members, the DoD will make HCFSAs available to Service members for the first time through a Special Enrollment Period in March 2025. HCFSAs are an optional benefit that enable Service members to set aside up to \$3,200 in pretax earnings per Service member to pay for health care costs, such as co-payments, contact lenses, glasses, dental care, and annual deductibles.

Access to Wi-Fi Pilot: To reduce out-of-pocket expenses and improve quality of life for junior enlisted Service members, the DoD is implementing a series of pilot projects to provide highspeed Wi-Fi internet access at no cost to Service members living in unaccompanied housing, which will form the basis of a long-term plan to build a Wi-Fi connected force.

Making Moves Easier: Building on previous expansions of moverelated payments to Service members, the DoD will increase Temporary Lodging Expense reimbursement to 21 days (up from 14 days) and allow Temporary Lodging Allowance to be authorized for up to 60 days when it is necessary for a Service member or dependent to occupy temporary lodging immediately before leaving a permanent duty station outside the continental United States. The DoD will also initiate a study to review and evaluate increasing the household goods weight allowances for Service members.

Further Expand Spouse Eligibility for My Career Advancement Account Financial Assistance: To support career advancement for military spouses, eligibility for MyCAA financial assistance will be expanded to spouses of active-duty Service members and spouses of National Guard and reserve Service members on Title 10 orders in the E-7, E-8, E-9, and W-3 ranks. Financial assistance may be utilized to pursue a license, certification, or associate degree as well as testing for college credit and continuing education units. This initiative aims to reduce barriers to employment for military spouses.

Childcare Investment in Workforce: To improve access to childcare for military families, we must invest in our childcare

workforce to ensure we can recruit and retain childcare providers. The DoD is working closely with Congress to fund compensation increases for childcare providers and to add key positions — lead educators and special needs inclusion coordinators - that will enhance the developmental and educational support provided to children served by DoD child development centers.

Quality of Life at Remote and Isolated Installations Review: The DoD will conduct a review on risk and protective factors, and prevention capabilities of harmful behaviors at three remote installations. The results of the review will be used to inform and improve quality of life at those locations.

Uniform Costs Review: The DoD will review the quality of standard uniform clothing items issued to the enlisted force and the enlisted monetary uniform replacement allowance rates to ensure they are sufficient.

The Department continues to collaborate with Congress and state partners to ensure the successful implementation and ongoing support of these initiatives.

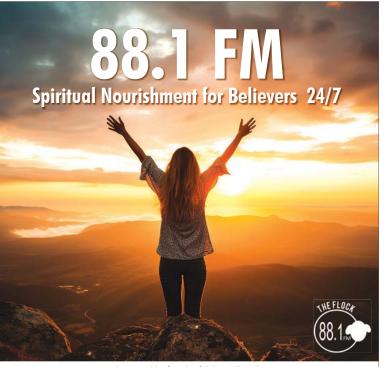

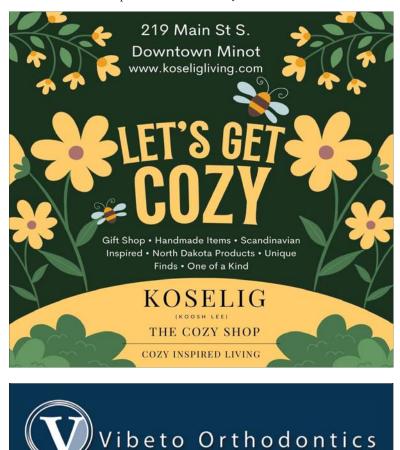

# **AUTUMN AND SALMON**

It's already beyond mid-September and North Dakota is heading full speed into hunting season. However, a unique fishing opportunity it also in full gear.

It's time to try one's hand at a shore-fishing for salmon as in Chinook, AKA King, salmon.

Admittedly, the state isn't what comes immediately to mind when thinking about salmon as a fishable species. That's understandable because salmon, like all members of the trout family, are not native to North Dakota waters.

Any North Dakota lake, river, or creek.

The N.D. Game and Fish Department stocks salmon in Lake Sakakawea.

It's there that they cherish its deep, cold waters and lurk around in search of rainbow smelt for their main meal.

While they're typically in deep water throughout most of the year, they move shallow in the fall in an attempt to spawn, searching for fast current and congregating in areas along the face of Garrison Dam on the east end of the big lake.

The problem they face, however, is adults can't get over the dam into flowing Missouri River waters and can't spawn. They're not alone – none of the other members of the trout family stocked anywhere in North Dakota lakes and rivers naturally spawn.

It's from about mid-September into October when anglers should try their hand at shore-fishing for salmon, Scott Hobbs, owner of Scott's Bait and Tackle, Pick City suggested.

While they've been lounging anywhere from 80 to 105 feet over deeper water throughout the summer, they typically move into shallower water by mid-September, he described.

Be prepared for a good fight, Hobbs advised, even with smaller salmon like those in the 4-pound range. This year he anticipates anglers could find salmon in the 8-pound range and larger based on success anglers experienced throughout the summer. That could planning on eating them. Shore-fishing for salmon provides anglers with an opportunity to try a variety of techniques, Hobbs explained.

But for starters, using heavy line is especially important. "At least 10-pound test," he described. Then try casting anything from Mepps spinners, Little Cleo's, Krocodile spoons, or "some crankbaits...you can also use a bobber and a nightcrawler," he continued.

Or try plastics (think Gulp®) and a variety of scents.

And if a person really, truly wants a fight and a ride when it comes to landing a salmon, try fly-fishing for them.

In other words, experiment and mix those presentations up. You never know what might work on any given day.

Some areas to go include the Garrison Dam Spillway turnout just across the spillway on the east side of the dam as well as Lake Sakakawea State Park's Scoria Bay (it's the location with the park's swim beach) or the side of the park's main boat launch.

Salmon aren't stocked in the Missouri River but some make their way through the dam's massive hydropower generation turbines, miraculously surviving what's likely the ride of their life to swim another day in the tailrace. That's also a good spot to try, fishing from shore along the tailrace boat ramp or just off of the rocks.

Some salmon facts:

• The Game and Fish Department collects salmon eggs in the fall with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Garrison Dam National Fish Hatchery raising the eggs to maturity and rearing them until large enough to stock in Lake Sakakawea and elsewhere in the United States.

• Chinook salmon are the largest member of the trout family stocked in North Dakota and are only stocked in Lake Sakakawea even though they get into the Missouri River tailrace through Garrison Dam.

• While Chinook salmon are spotted similar to rainbow trout, they have 15 to 17 rays on the long anal fin and

While condition of adult salmon begins to deteriorate later in October the meat is still in excellent condition in September. Simply filet some salmon steaks and toss them on the grill with one's favorite seasoning, Hobbs offered.

• Throughout the summer they're silvery in color but adults will darken almost to black as their body condition deteriorates.

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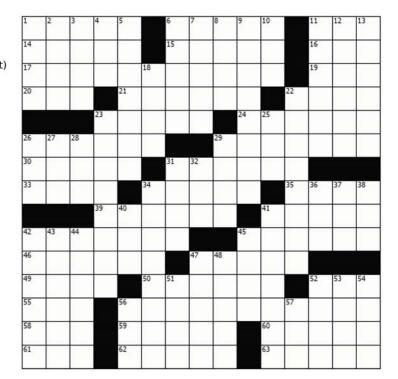

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# Barksdale enhances combat readiness with new Bomber Generation Squadrons

BARKSDALE AIR FORCE BASE, La. --

In a significant shift towards enhancing combat readiness, the 2nd Bomb Wing at Barksdale Air Force Base, Louisiana, activated two new bomber generation squadrons (BGS) on August 22, 2024.

The 2nd Aircraft Maintenance Squadron was deactivated and split into the 20th and 96th BGSs. This move is part of a mission-specific maintenance transformation aimed at increasing operational efficiency and combat capability.

The BGS concept was first developed by Maj. Ian P. Rohde, outgoing 2nd AMXS commander, during his time at Air Combat Command.

The concept works by transforming traditional aircraft maintenance squadrons into mission specific generation squadrons. Those squadrons are then organized, trained and equipped for combat in any theater where the unique capabilities of bombers are required to meet the combatant commander's objectives.

A key component of the concept is allowing squadrons to operate independently from their host wing to align with their partner operational bomb squadrons throughout deployment cycles.

"Today's threat requires us to move away from the static concept of sanctuary bases where we traditionally have large numbers of maintenance and munitions personnel," said Rohde. "The way ahead is to reorganize the aircraft maintenance squadrons into bomber generation squadrons."

Rohde says operational wings will apply these concepts by dividing and dispersing nuclear forces and conventional agile combat employment operations. With the increased flexibility, bombers can provide better integration and protection for allies and partners, even when landing in austere locations that otherwise might not be able to host bomber operations.

These changes will allow for standardized operations, whether at home or deployed, to allow for junior leaders to develop in the arts of aircraft production and maintenance generation, Rohde explained.

"There are several capabilities bomber generation squadrons will provide the combatant commander," Rohde said. "We're going to develop leaders much earlier in their careers. Our mission generation teams will operate with delegated mission command authorities, making our forces lighter, leaner, and faster, without the reliance on a traditional maintenance group force structure."

The concept will also be applied across other Air Force Global Strike Command bomber bases as the command continues to innovate and prepare for the future.

"Tomorrow's fight will be hotly contested, and we no longer have the luxury of assumed air superiority in the battlespace," said Gen. Thomas Bussiere, commander, AFGSC. "This new capability will prepare our units to operate autonomously without the need for extensive command structure while giving us more flexibility in how we position our bombers. I absolutely believe this will be a key factor in future conflicts."

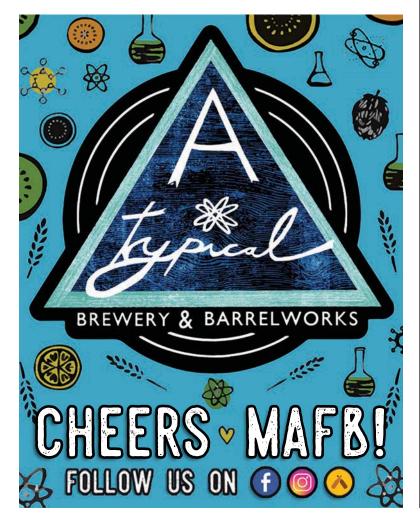

Scouting brothers Dallin Chapman and Haydn Chapman worked diligently together to complete their community projects and reach the prestigious rank of Eagle Scout for the Scouting of America (previously known as Boy Scouts of America). D allin, age 17, and Haydn , age 15, have been scouts since they were both 8 years old. The two brothers worked tirelessly to climb up the seven different scout ranks.

Scouts often spend months or even years fulfilling all the necessary requirements needed to achieve the next rank. Both Dallin and Haydn persevered and after all their years of challenging work they succeeded in making it all the way to the Eagle Scout rank . For these two new Eagle Scout achieving this monumental goal was not just about the honor, but about keeping up with a family tradition.

The Chapman family has a family tradition of family members including brothers, cousins and uncles who achieved the Eagle Scout rank too. Haydn mentioned that "On both sides of our family it has been a goal for all the boys to earn their Eagle Scout. My dad got his Eagle Scout, my grandpa has gotten his Eagle Scout, and most of my uncles have gotten their Eagle Scouts. It's kind of been an ongoing thing for a long time."

Reaching the Eagle Scout rank takes many years of dedication, hard work, and perseverance. Dallin and Haydn needed to collect 21 merit badges as well as complete their community service projects to earn their Eagle rank. There are 14 required merit badges some of which are First Aid, Citizenship in the Community, Citizenship in the Nation, Cooking, Personal Fitness, Family Life, Camping, Personal Management, Citizenship in the World, Citizenship in Society and Communication.

For his final project, Dallin noticed the poor conditions of multiple bird houses in the grassy field behind the North Plains Elementary School on Minot AFB. Only 8 out of the 10 bird houses he found were in functioning condition. Many were missing roofs or floors or were barely attached to their stands. After doing more research, he also noticed that the bird houses were not properly spaced apart from one another. Dallin decided to remove the old bird houses completely and replace them with new ones that would be better placed to accommodate the local bird wildlife. He gathered around 20 volunteers to help him build 16 brand new bird houses. The volunteers even added some extra flare by wood burning some designs onto the outside of the new houses. For his final project, Haydn noticed trash surrounding the grassy area behind the North Plains Elementary School where his brother was fixing the old broken bird houses. His community project included cleaning up the trash, as well as mapping out a nature trail and campsites for families to utilize. The map included placing post markers so that the lawn mowers knew where to make the trail and the 5 open spaces for tent camping that are set up along that half mile trail. Now what was once was a field filled with trash is instead a nice area for the residents

of Minot Air Force Base to use.

When asked what the most challenging part was of being a Scout was, Haydn explained that it was often difficult to get people to listen to a leader who was considered young. This is due to the fact that people often believe a younger leader is too inexperienced to know what they are doing. Although he mentioned being an older leader can at times be just as challenging as it isn't always easy to communicate one's ideas in a manner that everyone can understand.

Dallin shared that what he found most challenging was "The dedication to stick with it." Dallin further explained that he has been in the Scouts for almost 10 years now and that "After a little bit, it starts getting tough. Especially once you get into high school because there are a lot of other things that require your attention. So the dedication to stick with Boy Scouts is probably one of the most difficult reasons because usually [most] Scouts will go for the first couple years and then drop out because they need to do other things."

Dallin explained how he was able to stick with it all these years by saying "Seeing all the hard work and effort that you've put in actually goes to valuable life skills. The 21 required Eagle Scout merit badges are not just electives, they are skills that you carry with you throughout life. Right now I am working on the personal management merit badge which is teaching me how to manage finances. There is also the personal fitness merit badge which teaches you how to live a healthy lifestyle."

Dallin said Scouting has "Taught [me] leadership skills, especially with this Eagle Scout project and with some of the positions that you can hold within Scouting. It teaches you how to manage large groups of people. With this Eagle Scout project I've had to organize a time and place for these volunteers to meet and I had to get the supplies. It taught me how to plan it all out. And also, within certain positions in the troop, like patrol leader, you manage a smaller group of scouts and you get to work with them and learn how to be a leader." Haydn added that he noticed himself "Stepping up whether it be in school or church where they asked for things to get done but no one is moving around because they don't know what to do. I will find myself stepping up and helping to guide people, because that's what we are here to do as leaders. We are not there to tell them what to do. We're there to be by their side and help guide them."

Haydn and Dallin's father , Col. George Chapman, has been a huge help in them being able to get their projects done. Haydn said that their dad "has been a really big helper in us getting this done. He is the one that showed us this area and he helped get us in contact with people to get things done. He's been there to push us to do what needs to happen and help support us through the way."

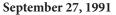

On September 27, 1991, President George H.W. Bush ordered the termination of the Strategic Air Command alert that had been initiated in October of 1957 as a result of the Cold War. This halt signaled the end of the war, which would officially come in December with the collapse of the

communist state. As a result of the Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty with Russia, hundreds of B-52 Stratofortresses were dismantled at Davis-Monthan Air Force Base, Arizona. In the years following the Cold War, the Air Force implemented a downsizing trend that permanently closed many bases around the country. Because of its strategic location and continuous support of the nuclear triad, Minot AFB remained a pivotal location for strategic deterrence, and while the 5th Bomb Wing B-52s

# **Free Search and Rescue Tour Saturday**

Minot's local search & rescue team have invited the community to visit and see how to save lives through Civil Air Patrol this coming Saturday 10 - noon at Avflight, 2400 N. Broadway in Minot, ND. Tours are planned to see the Civil Air Patrol's aircraft and hear from members about Emergency Services provided, Aerospace Education opportunities, and Cadet Training programs at the morning's free open house.

Many flight opportunities have been provided this summer for both adults to hone their search skills and cadets to take an accelerated start into the world of aviation. The squadron added another mission-ready pilot starting in August, better enabling the search team to launch quickly when called upon. Full aircrew search teams consisted of three adults only one of which required to hold a pilot license. Members were able to use the squadron's Cessna 172 to practice skills nearly every week, based on individual schedules.

Cadets experienced a variety of training both on the ground and in the air. Over half of locally assigned cadets received training flights and performed basic aircraft maneuvers under the supervision of a skilled pilot at a safe altitude. "I'm excited to say, not many 12-year-olds can say they've

flown an aircraft," new member Cadet Caleb Haun said while returning to the airport during his first flight. Four cadets, from Magic City, attended the state's week-long military-style training encampment at Camp Grafton, Devil's Lake, and one cadet returned to train on ground search and rescue operations. Some of the additional ground training was at members' cost for food & lodging while weekly ground training and flight training was included with the yearly cadet membership of only \$30.

Volunteers found more than just a way to serve the community. "I enjoy CAP for the social aspect," said Capt. David West when asked about why he stays with CAP. West received North Central Region's nomination for best Aerospace Education instructor for 2023 across seven states. He also served as aircrew, ready to search for missing aircraft or vehicles and provide aerial photographs during disasters such as mitigating flooding.

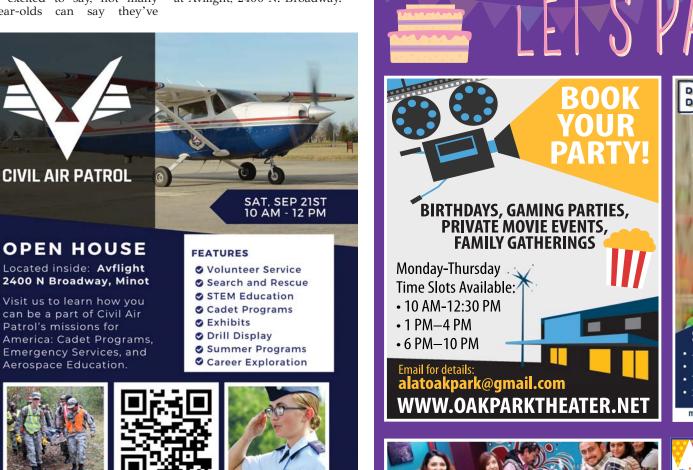

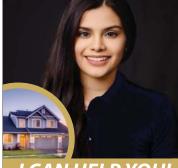
