He asked Volunteer Coordinator the Representative, Vickie Phippins, to reach back out to him if they were ever in need of specific assistance. Vicki took him up on that offer when they were in need of people to help sort food and contacted Capt Watson, who then gathered up some of his flight to come help out. Capt Jake Jones, Capt Austin Dean, spouse Amanda Dean, Capt Soon Tri, Capt Shane Knowles and Capt Margarita Knowles joined Capt Watson and spent a few hours helping those who needed a little extra support this season.

Capt Watson has been stationed

at Minot for five years and explained that his motivation behind his volunteerism is because he wanted to find a way to help others in what has become his own community. He also mentioned that his drive to help with this particular organization stems from a background of falling on hard times in his childhood. On a personal level, he felt compelled to serve in this specific capacity the Food Pantry when he could.

Capt Watson said he will absolutely volunteer in the future and he encourages everyone in the military community not to be afraid to use their time to help others out. He mentioned that people should look for an organization that means something to them specifically or helps in a way that has meaning

for them.

If you are struggling with food scarcity this season, the Lord's Cupboard Food Pantry is open Mondays 11:00am - 2:00pm, Tuesdays 5:30pm - 7:00pm, Wednesdays 11:00am - 2:00pm, and Fridays - 11:00am - 2:00pm. Their website states: "Our food pantry is available to anyone who is in need and is solely operated by 100% donations from the Minot community and various local and national grants."

Everyone needs a little extra support from time to time, help where you can and remember the reason for the season. As Capt Watson and the OSS show, even actions that seem small, and take only time, can have a lasting impact on others.



A shot in the arm for Ellendale...

community of 1,000, with 227 students attending Trinity Bible College with some renting in city limits.

The city of Ellendale built the infrastructure at Ellendale Acres about 15 years ago, thinking it would become a "suburb" of Aberdeen, given its proximity to South Dakota's third largest city. That didn't happen, but when Applied Digital made its pitch, one Dickey and McIntosh counties, Foxtail Wind Energy in Dickey County, Emmons/Logan Wind Energy and Merricourt Wind Power Project in Dickey and McIntosh counties.

Two pending wind farms include Just Wind in Logan County and Dickey County Wind Farm near Ellendale. If and when they come to fruition, that would be an additional 418 megawatts of Ellendale. After years of businesses slowly closing their doors and the school getting smaller because of shrinking population, it is expected to be a major shot in the arm.

But as anyone in a small, North Dakota community knows, it's hard to find enough employees locally to fill jobs, so it's anticipated that some of the employees will come from nearby Oakes, Fullerton, Edgeley, Ashley, Aberdeen and

Could Ellendale, North Dakota become the next Silicon Valley?

There's a new and interesting development happening there that could completely transform the entire community and all of Dickey County.

A Dallas company called Applied Digital is in the process of building a data center just south of Ellendale, near the South Dakota state line that is expected to bring as many as 85 new jobs to this community of 1,000 and use a whopping 100 megawatts of electricity to power the facility.

There are two issues with this, housing and power, and apparently both are being addressed.

Recent reports on Fargo TV have indicated that 20 new, prefab homes are coming to the area known as Ellendale Acres, because, as you might imagine, there isn't a lot of available housing in a major hurdle was already crossed.

The other issue is power, lots of electrical power. MDU supplies electricity to Ellendale, but it's unclear at this time if MDU will service Applied Digital.

To give you an idea of the scope of 100 megawatts, that amount of power can generate electricity for 60,000 homes in one day. That's the equivalent of power for every home in the city of Fargo for one day.

Part of Applied Digital's business plan is to use renewable energy. There are several wind farms near Ellendale that are expected to produce a lot of the energy needed for this project.

According to the North Dakota Public Service Commission, there are six wind farms close enough with a capacity of 651 megawatts. They include ND Wind I and II near Edgeley, Tatonka in both

. electricity.

So what is Applied Digital? According to a company press release from October 2023 announcing the groundbreaking, it's a designer, builder and operator of next-generation digital infrastructure designed for high-performance computing applications.

The Ellendale facility is designed and purpose-built for artificial intelligence workloads such as generative AI, natural language processing and machine learning. The facility is a gargantuan 342,000-square-foot building.

The Ellendale facility is said to be the first of its kind to meet the demand of evolving AI and high performance computing.

Fully operational, the employees who work in this facility will completely transform the state of the economy of downtown even Jamestown.

Applied Digital hasn't specified what kind of payroll it will have, but did indicate some of the positions will be high-level information technology professionals most likely from Dallas and elsewhere.

The housing project, meanwhile, is the first to use North Dakota's R-WISH program (Rural Workforce Initiative to Support Housing), a program designed for rapidly growing communities and is a partnership between the Bank of North Dakota through Starion Bank and Applied Digital.

There's already talk on Ellendale's Main Street about new businesses coming to town and the school making room for additional students because of Applied Digital's intent. However, many other local residents are approaching this with cautious optimism.

Last week, I walked into a building many people in town don't know exists. I, for one, lived here for years before I discovered it: the Minot Adult Learning Center (MALC). As soon as I opened the door, the reason for my visit was apparent. The mingled scents of potluck dishes filled the air as the warm atmosphere jarred me in from the cold. A friend on staff at the MALC met me just inside the door and whispered, "They're just introducing their foods-come listen.'

I had come for this potluck. A very special event, indeed. I peeked over the crowd into a large meeting space set with tables, chairs, and a buffet line on folding tables. But this wasn't your average Hotdish Land potluck with a buffet of mushroom-soupbased casseroles and Cool Whipcentric salads.

Many students at the MALC have relocated to Minot from around the globe. On this special day, each was tasked with bringing a dish common or special in their own country. One

by one, the students introduced what they had brought to share.

Here, in this unassuming place, in a town filled with folks not from around here, gathered another kind of "not from around here." Individuals and flavors from faroff places-brought together in this place, at this time. Food has a way of doing that.

I shared a table with women from Mexico, Venezuela, and Indonesia, and men from Mexico, Nigeria, and the son of a missionary raised in Costa Rica. We ate fried tacos, steamed rice, arepas, naan buns, German noodles, and others that were too numerous to fit on one plate. Some of us had been in Minot for several years, others only several months. I wasn't sure what to say, so I listened and offered a simple, "If there's ever anything you need..." After all, what can you say to someone who is far from their version of "familiar," especially at a time of year when nostalgia and togetherness reign supreme?

The humanness of it all was striking-in a beautiful, complicated way.

Several days later, I walked into Thompson-Larson Funeral Home downtown. A different smell greeted me: one of floral arrangements, perfume, and stillness. A staff member met me and pointed ahead to a different meeting room. "They're straight ahead," she whispered.

different crowd was Α assembled. Different sounds filled the air. Different memories were shared. Instead of recalling life in another country, the recollections were of life in another time. Again,

I didn't know what to say. Again, there was the "If there's anything you need ... " After all, what can you say to someone whose version of "familiar" and "Christmas" has just been changed forever?

The humanness struck me again-beautiful, complicated, heartbreaking, hopeful.

The two gatherings have left me thinking hard about the holidays. No matter where we go, there will be people who are not from around here, people grieving, people feeling lost or the sting of loss as the world around them celebrates.

For me, it's been a reminder to open my eyes. Not only to those around me and what they are experiencing—but also to those in the community I may never have noticed before.

If you're established in Hotdish Land, I challenge you to be brave enough to draw someone into your holiday plans who needs a little more togetherness this year. Maybe it's an international individual, a newly PCS'ed airman, or someone grieving.


If you're new, or not from around here, I challenge you to be proactive. I've spent holidays feeling lonely and sad because I wasn't invited into a celebration. Those moments left me feeling isolated and bitter. Everything changed when I got intentional and proactive. Instead of waiting for the invite, I started inviting. A LOOK BACK THIS WEEK IN USAF HISTORY LT. COL. EMIL BEAUDRY RESCUES 12 AIRMEN

STRANDED ON THE GREENLAND ICE CAP **DECEMBER 28, 1948**

On December 7, 1948, a United States Air Force C-47 crashed on the Greenland Ice Cap. The seven passengers survived, but were stranded in temperatures of minus 45 degrees for nearly three weeks. Several rescue attempts were thwarted in the weeks after the initial crash, resulting in two downed aircraft, two crashed gliders, and a total of 12 people stranded in the remote Arctic wasteland.

rescue attempt in a ski-equipped C-47 with jet assisted takeoff. On December 28, he landed the plane on the ice cap and was able to bring the 12 stranded passengers to safety at Bluie West 8, an air base in central Greenland. For his heroic efforts, especially in the wake

We then come home and watch The Muppet Christmas Carol while sipping on wassail and singing along while





Dan's Cream Cheese Sugar Cookies 2 cups white sugar 1 cup butter, softened ¹/₂ cup cream cheese, softened 4 large eggs 1 teaspoon vanilla extract 5 cups all-purpose flour 3 teaspoons baking powder 1 teaspoon salt

Beat sugar, softened butter, and cream cheese in a large bowl with an electric mixer until smooth. Beat in eggs and vanilla. Stir in flour, baking powder, and salt. Cover, and chill dough for at least an hour (or overnight).

Preheat the oven to 400 degrees F. Lightly dust a work surface with flour. Roll out dough to 1/4 to 1/2 inch thickness. Cut into shapes with any cookie cutter. Place cookies 1 inch apart on

ungreased cookie sheets.

Bake in a preheated oven until cookies are lightly browned, 6-8 minutes. Carefully transfer cookies to a wire rack and cool completely before decorating.

Stop into Gourmet Chef this holiday season. You will find a friendly environment, knowledgeable staff, and every single kitchen gadget you could possibly ever need. Don't forget to check out their food and oils section where you can get a variety of gourmet foods to serve for Christmas or even New Years.



Over 400 people attended the Prairie Warrior Auction. In total the auction raised over \$111,000.00



HOLIDAY FIRE AWARENESS

The holiday season is up on us again! That time of year when friends and family travel, decorations are hung and festive meals are prepared. In the mist of the holiday cheer and sprit, let us not forget about safety. This is something that must be on the forefront of the activities we have planned and are engaged in. When comes to lights and decorating; inspect the condition of the electrical cords for frayed wires, kinks and cracked sockets. Only use appropriate replacement light bulbs. Do not over load wiring with more than three light strands connected together unless the safety label for the lights states otherwise. Overloaded and poorly maintained electrical circuits and cords present a serious fire hazard. Decorations should be nonflammable or flame resistant and placed away from heat, electrical or ignition- source. Paper chains, strung popcorn garland, homemade or crafted items are great. However, this is could become a problem is not displayed and cared for properly! Live trees should be freshly cut and not dried out. Once your tree is in place, away from a heat source, ensure that it is kept well hydrated and the needles are hard to pull out of the branch. Should a tree catch a fire, it can quickly engulf a room and fill the air with toxic smoke and fumes. One more tip to leave you with, scented candles fill the room and air with smells that places you





Šakakawea/Lake Audubon, •Lake Hwy. 83 Lawn & Leisure, Garrison: Increasing activity on Lake Audubon with best success in dark hours. Use extreme caution when traveling on the ice, though, especially at night.

•Lake Šakakawea, New Town: No reports with limited activity on the Van Hook Arm as anglers generally wait for

better ice conditions.

Hispanic Allies Council translation team builds community bonds

The Hispanic Allies Council at Minot Air Force Base has founded a translation team in July 2024 to support the diverse community of service members and their families.

The initiative aims to provide crucial support for individuals facing language barriers, whether it's navigating military paperwork, engaging with the local community or simply communicating with others. The team, made up of volunteers from the HAC, is available to help both military personnel and their families who may not be fluent in English.

According to Airman 1st Class Diego Colon-Santos, an HAC member assigned to the 5th Logistics Readiness Squadron, this initiative was born out of both the need for better inclusion and accessibility and a desire from the volunteers to give a community to those that might be far from home, thus ensuring that all members, regardless of language proficiency, can fully participate in the military and local community.

"As I got better at the English language, I was able to help transfer students back in high school," said Colon-Santos. "I related to their situation and it sparked a flame in me in terms of being dedicated to helping home and unfamiliar with their new surroundings.

In addition to paperwork and official communication, the translation team also provides support in more informal settings, such as helping families connect with local organizations, understanding base services and participating in social and community events.

"As the HAC itself was coming together, it was crucial for us to make a team for the purpose of translating," said Colon-Santos. "We knew that it is one of the most important parts of what we are, a way to communicate and connect with others."

The initiative has not only helped improve the daily lives of non-English speaking service members and their families, but has also fostered greater understanding and cooperation across cultures within the base. As the program continues to grow, it is expected to serve as a model for other military bases with similarly diverse populations.

For Minot AFB, the translation team represents a key effort in building a more inclusive, supportive and connected base where every member can thrive.



The folks over at Lewis and Clark State Park have a mystery to solve as they tie a ribbon around their anniversary celebration: Their Christmas star went missing.

The park staff has enlisted Mr. and Mrs. Claus to help in the search and they, in turn, are asking visitors for their assistance – the more help, the merrier in their efforts to return the Golden Star.

An abundance of puzzles and clues abound and they're wondering who will solve the conundrum to help bring their star back home. Activities take place Dec. 28 beginning at 10 a.m. Hot chocolate will be served at the Visitor Center after the mystery search.

Audubon National Wildlife Refuge is part of the National North Country Trail (NCT), which covers about 4,800 miles of non-motorized hiking trails across eight states, including its culmination in North Dakota.

Several bear paw snowshoes are available for people use at no charge if snow conditions permit, she added.

Cross Ranch State Park south of Hensler along the Missouri River is gearing up for its Dec. 31 Last Day Hike at 4 p.m. Plan to enjoy a winter campfire and hot chocolate after the evening adventure to close out 2024.

While the year-end activities at the three North Dakota state parks are free, there is a \$7 daily entrance fee. People can also purchase their 2025 annual pass, which provides entrance to all of North Dakota's state parks in the coming year.

Yes, there really are outside things to do yet this year - go celebrate at Fort Stevenson, Lewis and Clark, and Cross Ranch state parks, hike – or maybe snowshoe - and check out the 12 Days of Christmas at Audubon National Wildlife Refuge from a wild critter point of view. Enjoy hot chocolate and friends and family.

And celebrate life in North Dakota, the end of one year, and the coming of a new year.

And speaking of a new year, Fort Stevenson kicks off 2025 with its annual First Day Hike. Meet at the Visitor Center Jan. 1 at 6 p.m. to hike – or snowshoe and cross-country ski adventures if snow conditions allow -one of the park's laminated trails. It's also traditional to gather back at the Visitor Center for hot chocolate.
