

NOTES ON BEING SAFE

SLOW DOWN, AND BE CAREFUL

Although it may seem a bit intimidating at first, it doesn't take much time for first-time winter drivers to learn to properly tackle snow-packed and icy roads in the local area. Patience is key when heading out on winter roads for the first time, many people end up in accidents each year because they drive too fast for the conditions. The following are things drivers should remember when the snow and ice starts to fall.

For maximum power when starting cars in cold temperatures, turn off all accessories, including the radio and heater, before turning the ignition key. For carbureted cars, depress the accelerator once and release it. For fuel-injected vehicles, don't touch the pedal. Turn the key and hold it for about 20 seconds. Don't over grind the starter; it can damage it. Let the engine run for at least a minute before driving. Don't accelerate too quickly for at least a mile or two.

Not all vehicles handle in winter weather conditions the same, and it's important for people to know how to handle their vehicle in demanding winter weather. It's a good idea for people to carefully practice slow-speed maneuvers on an empty snow-or ice-covered parking lot. The vehicle owner's manual also outlines handling characteristics.

Front-wheel-drive vehicles generally handle better than rear-

wheel-drive vehicles on slippery roads because the engine's weight rests on the drive wheels to improve traction. The back end of rear-wheel drive vehicles, especially pick-up trucks, tends to slide from side to side when turning on icy roads. To compensate, people with rear-wheel drive should add weight in the trunk or truck bed to give the wheels more grip.

Even a little bit of ice and snow can turn a 2,000-pound car into an unguided bobsled. To avoid accidents, drivers should pay special attention when approaching intersections.

Slow down before approaching an intersection. Scan left, then right, then left again for pedestrians and vehicles cars on cross streets. If you're having trouble stopping, they probably will too. Prepare for drivers sliding into intersections from the side, then decide if you can safely get through the intersection or stop to avoid hitting an oncoming vehicle. After stopping, press the accelerator slowly to get going again. Vehicles with manual transmissions should start in second gear to keep the wheels from spinning.

When approaching an icy hill, find a path with the best traction. Watch the cars ahead of you, and steer clear of spots where people are spinning their wheels or sliding backward. Try driving on unpacked snow; it sometimes offers better traction.

Build speed gradually while you're still on level ground. If you have shift-on-the-fly four-wheel drive, shift into it before you reach the hill. When you reach the crest, begin to decelerate slowly, shifting into a lower gear to allow engine drag versus your brakes to cut your speed.

Slow down before you enter an icy curve. Any sudden acceleration or deceleration in a turn could send you into a skid.

Controlled speed and smooth steering and braking helps prevent skids. If your wheels lose grip, gradually release the pressure from the pedal you're using. Smoothly steer in the direction you want the car to go.

People who get stuck in snow, ice or mud often do the wrong thing and stomp on the gas pedal and end up spinning their wheels and digging in deeper. To free your vehicle, try turning the steering wheel gently from side to side and use light foot pressure on the accelerator. Then rock the vehicle forward and backward while pointing the front wheels straight ahead. It's a good idea to check the owner's manual first because this procedure can damage the transmission on some cars. If you're still stuck, stay with your vehicle and make use of your winter survival kit until assistance



All About Pets

As many Airmen and families already know, military life is not easy. Here are a few tips to help you make manage your busy Air Force life while also taking proper care of your pet!

•Get a low maintenance pet—snakes, certain varieties of fish, hamsters and other rodents, and turtles are just a few ideas of pets that are relatively low maintenance compared to your everyday dogs and cats. It's still important to provide adequate enrichment, environments, and food for them, but if you do all those things, these pets will be just fine during long work hours. Be sure to check with you housing authority first to make sure these pets are allowed.

•Find a "lazy" pet—high energy and working dog breeds are not recommended for owners who are away from home a lot and do not have the time, energy, and resources to keep their dogs fully enriched. You could consider bringing home a characteristically "lazy" breed instead. Basset Hounds, Boston Terriers, Bull Mastiffs, and Maltese are a few dog breeds that pop up often in the conversation around low-energy breeds. However, it's still important to note that all dogs are different. You may find a dog that is a couch-potato by nature, or you may find a "low-energy" dog that wants to go 24/7. Make sure you consider the needs of certain breeds and individual dogs (or cats) before adopting, and even if you have a low-energy dog, you still need to meet their basic requirements. Which is why working people should consider...

•Outside help — for shorter periods (a week in the field, a 12 hour day at work), it would be beneficial to hire a pet sitter, dog walker, or even a neighbor or family member who is willing to help out. While some pets won't go crazy at home all day, they still need to be provided with socialization and enrichment. See if you can find someone to pop in every few hours to play with, feed, and let your pet outside! Doggy daycare is a great option for many canine parents, and while cats and other small pets are usually alright left alone, it's never a bad idea for them to have someone to play with. Don't be afraid to reach out to the base community through Facebook or your friends/family for help if you're feeling overwhelmed with your pet-parental duties. Chances are there is someone out there who is willing to help you and your pet out.

•For bigger challenges, consider finding a temporary foster home for your pet. Family members, close friends, and even willing community members are always options for long-term pet care instead of rehoming. There are also "deployed pet" help sites that can connect you with temporary fosters, such as Dogs on Deployment and Guardian Angels for Soldier's Pets. If you're thinking about rehoming your pet due to the cost of PCSing with them, consider applying for SPCA International's Operation Military Pets grant.

Taking care of pets is a big responsibility, but when we bring them into our home, it's our duty to treat them with the care and love that they give us as well. Military life can make it more difficult, but there are so many resources out there to help.





UPSIDE DOWN UNDER

As a former Army first sergeant, I know all too well what it's like to be away from home during the holidays and how it affected the morale of my troops.

Fortunately, it only happened to my unit once, but it didn't take long to realize that despite our stoic military bearing, we were all missing the festivities at home.

There are countless personnel in the U.S. military who are on deployments for several years, some in remote parts of the world, sometimes in nations that either don't celebrate Christmas at all or they celebrate in a way unfamiliar to Americans.

Our unit was unique in that we were in three places at one time. That, in and of itself affected our optimism, because cohesion is so important to a unit's efficiency. Some of us were at U.S. Central

Command on MacDill Air Force Base in Tampa, some of us were at CENTCOM forward operating base at Camp Asayliyah in Qatar and some of us were in Atlanta working at a place called Crawford Communication.

Despite those obstacles, we did our best to have holiday cheer in some way in each of our locations; a small Christmas tree on a desk, singing carols with coworkers, taking photographs by the Christmas tree with elf hats and extra days off were all ways to bring a little cheer and/or humor.

Our unit was also unique in that we were in a joint service environment with the Coalition of Nations. And because those troops were in the United States instead of their home countries, together they put on a Christmas feast with traditional food from their homeland that many of us

All those things were great, but didn't and no way could, replace Christmas and New Year's celebrations at home with family. I've been reading about some of the traditions on our air force bases here in North Dakota as well as some of the National Guard traditions around the state.

Stringing Christmas lights on aircraft, going out into the community to distribute wreaths or working in a soup kitchen on Christmas or New Year's Day, office

parties, special religious services and visiting shut-in veterans are all part of the holiday spirit on a military reservation and elsewhere.

Leadership tells us that doing these things helps morale at a time when it's often difficult for troops, especially those who may have young families too far away to be together. Leadership is correct, it does boost morale, but not as much as family would.

Most of us have heard the song "I'll Be Home for Christmas," by Perry Como. That song was written nearly a year after World War II was over, but it was about the war and what many GIs were dealing with during Christmas in 1942-'43

The lyrics, "I'll be home for Christmas, if only in my dreams," was the reality just about every Soldier on the Western Front faced.

Remember Gen. Tom Waverly in "White Christmas?" He was concerned about the morale of his troops at Christmas. OK, it's Hollywood, but it has some reality to it. Officers as high as generals feel that holiday void as well. They're human too. I observed this first hand with numerous high-level officers during the Christmas/New Year's season of 2006.

So how can we fix these holiday

A little good will goes a long way and can help those of us who may be in a place or situation we don't

want to be in on Christmas and New Year's Day. Somehow, some way, recognize the holidays, even if it's something so subtle as to say Merry Christmas to yourself under your breath.

Recognize it, because years later when you are home in front of a warm fireplace beside a huge, welldecorated Christmas tree sipping hot chocolate, you'll remember that tiny, little gesture that helped you reconcile being away.

It's easier said than done, but try it. We had a new grandchild in 2006 and I was 2,000 miles away. But it was that small, straggly Christmas tree a co-worker gave me years earlier that eased the despair. That artificial tree was my link to home for the 2006 holiday

If you've never been in the military, you may not understand some of this. In that case, just know that we were once those little kids walking down the street with our baseball gloves, or spinning around in circles on our figure skates or baking cookies with our grandmother.

Remember the troops, remember the veterans, remember those who didn't come home from the Western Front. Knowing that keeps morale high enough when we're away from home during the holidays.







JANUARY 1, 1988 Up until the late 1970s, the United States Air Force restricted female service members to only noncombat positions. In 1978, women were finally given the chance to serve on Titan II missile crews, and their roles in the missile field only grew from there. However, for some time, missile crews were restricted to all-male or all-female assignments. It wasn't until January 1, 1988 that Strategic Air Command changed the policy for Minuteman and Peacekeeper crew assignments to permit mixed gender crews in launch facilities. This inclusive effort aimed to reduce scheduling issues and increase opportunities for female Airmen.

After the integration, SAC stressed the importance of guaranteeing equal career progression for men and women. This was one major step forward in the journey towards women's equality in the armed forces.



Fishing:

•N.D. Game & Fish Dept. game wardens: No new reports but use caution getting onto and moving around on area lakes.

• Devils Lake, Ed's Bait Shop, Devils Lake: Continued activity on northern feeder lakes, access and weather permitting.

• Devils Lake, Woodland Resort, Devils Lake: Try shallow water in 12 feet and less jigging with rattling presentations for walleye. Lots of walleye activity continues on northern feeder lakes, including Lake Irvine.

• Lake Ďarling, Karma C-Store, Ruthville: A few anglers out on Lake Darling by Grano but no reports on success.

• Lake Metigoshe, Four Seasons, Bottineau: A few bluegill starting to show up but they're schooled and anglers need to move around and drill a lot of holes. Try wax worms. Continued fair walleye success. Continued pike spearing activity and water clarity remains good. Use caution if moving around and avoid getting stuck at access areas or on the lake itself.

•Lake Sakakawea/Lake Audubon, Cenex Bait & Tackle, Garrison: Check access conditions when trying to get onto area lakes after earlier wind and snow. Weather and snow conditions permitting, Lake Audubon producing a few walleye along the 9-Mile Bay or the south shore but ice depth varies even in

• Lake Sakakawea/Lake Audubon, Hwy. 83 Lawn & Leisure, Garrison: Increasing activity on Lake Audubon with best success in dark hours. Weather and access permitting try Velva Point, Car Body Island, 9-Mile Bay, or Nelson Bay. Use extreme caution when traveling on the ice, though, especially at night. A few anglers walking onto Centennial and Sportsmen's bays on the east end of Lake Sakakawea but test the ice along the way and check access conditions.

•Lake Sakakawea, New Town: No new reports.

•Lake Sakakawea/Missouri River, Scott's Bait & Tackle, Pick City: Weather permitting anglers are working from boats down river on the Missouri River tailrace for walleye using jigs and minnows and finding numbers of small fish. Also try casting crankbaits off the rocks at night from shore but use caution

Magnum is mad at me.

I can tell by the way she looks at me. And the way she

Just like a child anticipating Christmas or a birthday, Magnum anticipates cool fall weather, the joy of sniffing birds, running, pointing, and retrieving feathered things like grouse, partridge, pheasants, ducks, and even tackling a goose.

Magnum is the younger of the family's two four-legged Hunting Maniacs. Like her older compatriot, Garnet, this Brittany at the ripe old age of 2 ½ lives and breathes for hunting season.

And that, in a nutshell, is why she's mad at me.

She felt the warm September days; those short outings so she could avoid overheating and overworking that still brought tantalizing partridge and grouse aromas.

She felt the October chill and she's fully aware of when the focus switches from prairie, field edges, and grouse to those oh-so-aromatic pheasants.

Wow, do they smell wonderful.

And their feathers don't stick to the roof of one's mouth as much as the ones from doves or grouse are apt to do.

Plus they might run and hide, offering the game of searchand-retrieve.

And Magnum — like Garnet — is going to win.

She felt the crisp November air when a hint of winter arrived. She raced through the snow with the grace of an Olympic downhill skiing champion.

And, yes, she really noticed those aggravating snow and ice balls that have a tendency to locate themselves in the pads of one's furry feet, not to mention the feathery hair flowing from

That can be a bit annoying but it's all part of life as a North Dakota Four-Legged Hunting Maniac. Sometimes a little annoyance has to accompany all of the good.

But the snow and ice will melt - usually on a chair, the couch, the floor, or the bed – but it will melt.

Magnum is mad at me because Four-Legged Hunting Maniacs have a weird sense of the calendar. They know when it's

They know when it's time to lounge alongside a wetland or field edge waiting with nearby decoys for ducks and geese.

They know when it's the crown jewel of bird hunting pheasant season.

And she knows the calendar is about to turn to January and another year.

That means she knows – even at her tender young age - that she only has a few more days until the 2024 hunting season is over. One week – Jan. 5, 2025 – is the dreaded date. Both she and Garnet sense the end of another season is near.

But she doesn't know, nor does she understand, why she can't hunt every day. She just wears a quizzical look as she watches shotguns, shells, hunting vests, and other goodies associated with what is her world being placed behind doors and drawers.

And she's mad.

OK, actually it seems she's more sad than mad.

The other reason Magnum is mad (or sad) is that she didn't get to go afield as much as she wanted. Granted, that would be every day from the Sept. 1 dove season opener to the closing day of pheasant, grouse, and partridge season, the first Sunday of January each year.

Or every day, Jan. 1 through Dec. 31 but for some reason the N.D. Game and Fish Department doesn't agree with Magnum,

This year, though, our Magnum (AKA Pistol for her "go get 'em" attitude and approach to hunting and life in general) had a small foot injury sidelining her for a few days. Nothing serious, thankfully, but just enough so it bled profusely whenever she was in the field.

She needed some time off and she didn't understand why. While she lost some hunting time, we're thankful it wasn't

But on the bright side, she had a good season. She's an amazing Four-Legged Hunting Maniac: fun to hunt with and she got birds.

Living in the country spoils them, though, because they still get to "hunt" – weather permitting – although it's just as companions to the humans on cross-country skis, snowshoes, or just walking down a lonely prairie trail (if there's not too much snow to warrant snowshoes).
