Building Memories: Gingerbread Decorating at Edgewood Living

On 21 December, in the midst of the final push towards Christmas, the spouses of the 91st Security Forces Group hosted a gingerbread village making event for the Edgewood Senior Living Community in Southwest Minot. An opportunity for music, snacks, fellowship, and fun, it was the first event of its kind put on by 91st SFG.

Organizer Julie Slaton shared that, "It got started from an idea to get military spouses and elderly together..." Julie originally pitched the idea at a spouses' coffee, where it was agreed that they would love to have a spouse event that would give back to the community in some way. Additionally, they knew that the elderly are sometimes overlooked, and need someone to bring them joy during the holiday season. "For [military families,] some can't go home for the holidays so it gave them an opportunity to have a 'grandparent' in their Christmas festivities and for the elderly, most [of whom] can't leave the facility, it just gave them the joy of being around people or 'family' so to speak."

Many individuals and groups helped bring this event together. Edgewood was chosen because Julie's friend Holly, a former milspouse, works with facility to provide art therapies for those suffering from Parkinson's Disease, which she herself has been living with for close to 11 years. She put Julie and fellow 91 SFG spouse Carrie Driver in touch with the facility to coordinate the

event. The facility itself donated their space, cookies, hot chocolate, and also helped residents get to and from the Bistro. Julie shared that the gingerbread house kits were donated by True North, candy was donated by the Minot AFB Dental Clinic, which had bought back Halloween candy to send to military overseas, and the rest of the supplies were donated by the 91st SFG.

The day of the event was sunny, with plenty of light streaming in through the windows at Edgewood's Fireside Bistro. Christmas carols played in the background, while residents trickled in and out to build their creations, enjoy snacks, and make new friends. Families paired up with residents whose hands were not steady enough to assemble the houses themselves or built alongside them. All the while people were sharing stories from their past, such as Edgewood resident Carol, who joked that her creation probably looked about the same as those of her former first graders in Burlington. The children, who were either piling the candy onto their gingerbread like crazy or running around the room playing, also drew plenty of smiles from residents who seemed to particularly enjoy being in their presence. Funny enough, both groups were equally likely to sneak some candy or frosting when they thought no one was looking!

Sometimes, The best events include a bit of spontaneity and do not go completely according

to plan. While the original vision was to build a gingerbread village to put on display in the facility's entry area, most gingerbread architects were so excited by their creations that they opted to bring them back to their rooms instead. Additionally, while this event was put on by the spouses of the 91st SFG, word of mouth and a friendly, inclusive attitude meant there were also families from the 5th Bomb Wing's Mission Support Group, Maintenance Group and Operations Group present. It was an afternoon enjoyed by all, made possible by the hard work and planning of the SFG spouses.

The spouses of Team Minot do a lot to support the base and local community, especially during the holidays. When asked why she thinks people are willing to go that extra mile, even though they themselves are incredibly busy, Julie noted, "I know I jump in and help more because I want people to know that they are cared for and that they have value. The festivities and socials during this time of year just allow us to get more involved with people and events. The holidays are also full of various traditions so it enables more ideas and ways to reach different people that might not be thought of otherwise." She added, "I think it really happens all year, one just sees it more... during the holidays because [they] are a great time to show appreciation and gratitude for [our] community."

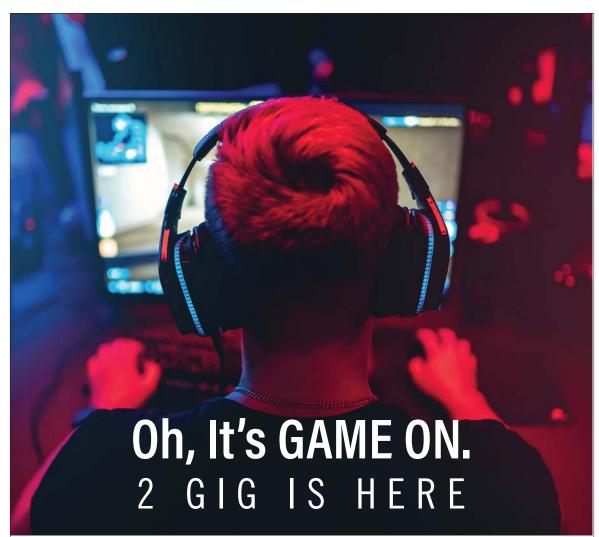

It doesn't matter where you go in North Dakota, you're going to find that retail, health care, government, farming, education and even sports franchises have job openings.

Just walk down the street in almost any community and you will see signs in windows that say "now hiring." Those messages used to say "now accepting applications," if there was a sign at all. Now, it's a little more blunt.

North Dakota is a growing state in economy and population, yet there remains a disparity between jobs available and population. From 2000 to 2022, the state's economy grew by 115 percent, but according to the Department of Commerce, there are now only 30 workers for every 100 jobs.

With a population of about 780,000, there are roughly 23,000 job openings across the state, according to Job Service North Dakota, and those are positions that are advertised. There may be many more such as openings for doctors or professors that don't go out to the general public.

At last report, the state had 9,900 people on unemployment and if every one of those people suddenly went to work, there would still be a labor shortage.

Some organizations are getting more aggressive about handling their local openings. One example is in the fast-food industry. Labor shortages have been so severe that some of these chains close their restaurants during parts of the day and focus only on drive-through business.

That's slowly changing, however, as restaurant chain administrations

are realizing that if they had better salaries, the shortage would be minimal. Recent pay hikes are also attracting many retired people.

Medical has been hit hard. A shortage of doctors and nurses is apparent across the board. In many cases, clinics lack doctors, but are staffed by nurse practitioners. Some clinics and hospitals use traveling doctors and nurses brought in from outside the United States, most notably from the Philippines.

Because farming is largely seasonal, it also has its challenges. Every aspect of farming is effected by this; livestock, sugar beets, grain, rail facilities, trucking and farm education.

Schools have relaxed their standards to participate in teaching. In many cases you can teach in a public school with any degree and in others you can teach as long as you are working toward a teaching degree.

Something is now being done on a larger scale to address these issues. In summer 2023, the Legislature passed a bill establishing the Office of Legal Immigration that is within the Department of Commerce.

It was created solely for the purpose of bringing foreign-born workers to North Dakota to address the labor shortage.

It has a long way to go, but is stepping out in the right direction. OLI was established, it has recognized the problem and now it is working on ways to solve it.

One of the ways to do that is by looking at case studies and one of them is in Utah. Between 2000 and 2019, the number of immigrants in Utah increased by 64 percent, almost double the amount of U.S.born growth.

The top industries for immigrants in Utah include manufacturing, education, health care, construction, professional and retail. So it's much like our state with the only difference being population. Utah has 3.4 million residents with nearly half of them living in the Salt Lake

Utah has created refugee-friendly policies and legal pathways to arrive in Salt Lake City paving the way for attracting immigrants. North Dakota is now analyzing this initiative.

Utah isn't Shangri La, but it has solved a lot of its employment issues since 2000. And as long as

North Dakota continues to grow, so will the labor shortage if the status quo continues. It's good that somebody is taking a look at this on a statewide scale.

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Sharing the Gift of Love: A Military Adoption Story

The many unknowns of military life often present unique challenges for families trying to plan their future, despite a lack of stability. Family planning through adoption and foster care can be challenging to begin with. But while these unique ways of growing one's family may seem out of reach for those who move every few years, there are families here at Minot AFB who have successfully expanded their family through private adoption with a bit of support from their Air Force family along the way!

Major Evan Pittman of the 5th Bomb Wing and his wife Dana have thoughtfully navigated the adoptions process twice. They adopted their daughter Della from her birth mother in April of 2023 and recently finalized the adoption process for her half-sister Nora Joy, who was born December of 2024. This happy ending is only the latest chapter in a series of downs as well as ups, that they have learned to navigate together.

The first question one might ask is 'where would a potential adoptive family begin?' And the answer, like so much else these days, is 'the internet.' Dana shared, "We've found a Facebook community called '{US Military Families} Adoption, Foster Care & Kinship Care Support' that has provided so much information on how these processes work within the military community. It connects us to other families who've gone through the same experiences and helps answer so many of our questions." She added that they've also found a lot of support from military families who have adopted within our own Minot AFB community. Local sources of information

year as a family of three.

are important because adoptive families are beholden to the laws of the state they are stationed in. These laws vary widely from state to state and therefore duty station to duty station.

Dana explained, "Adoption can be a wonderful thing, but it will always begin with the separation of mother and child. We never want to forget or downplay this part of Della and Nora's story..." After the initial decision to pursue adoption is made, it is time to select a reputable agency and embark on a next step: the home study. This is a 3-6 month process that assesses whether the prospective family is physically, financially, and emotionally ready to adopt. Depending on the type of adoption there may also be additional classes a family has to take.

Adoption is a significant financial commitment. In North Dakota private adoptions can cost anywhere from \$5,000 to \$11,000 or more just for the agency fee. However what this covers is not regulated and does not reflect the true cost of an adoption. Other costs may include legal representation, travel costs, the home study and background checks, or living costs for the birth mother. And while state and federal tax credits exist, there are fees that must be paid up front. Families have to come up with creative ways to cover these costs, often relying on their social networks to help them. The Pittmans were able to raise additional funds, some of which benefited from the enthusiastic support of Team Minot. "When we put on a bake sale to raise money for our youngest daughter's adoption... our Air Force family

showed up for us in a big way," shared Major Pittman.

They acknowledged that being a military family felt like a huge hindrance when they first started on their adoption journey. They worried that PCSing, deployments and the sometimes challenging work schedules would mean they wouldn't be chosen by families considering adoption. shared, "What happened instead was a connection to a mom who understood all of the great things [about this life.] She saw the travel and the opportunities for our kids to make friends all across the world. She saw the tight knit community our kids will grow up in. And she knew that these people will be like a large extended family when we're away from our own." The Pittmans also expressed gratitude for the support of Major Pittman's commanders, base-wide programs such as FCC care, and unit initiated meal-trains that helped them along the way. He added that they were very thankful paternity leave is extended to adoptive families as

well as foster parents.

When asked how it felt to watch their family grow a second time, Major Pittman shared that " It doesn't feel real yet. We never thought we'd even have one child, so being blessed a second time feels surreal. Watching our

NOTES ON BEING SAFE

STAYING WARM IN THE WINTER

Did you know that cold stress or "hypothermia" could occur any time of the year? In fact, most cases of cold stress develop in air temperatures between 30 and 50 degrees Fahrenheit. People who are exposed to lower temperatures are at risk for injuries ranging from frostbite to serious loss of body heat to which could result in brain damage or death.

Knowing how to dress and keeping dry are the first steps to being prepared. Dress warm and in layers. Choose fabrics such as cotton and wool to which will insulate but also allow sweat to evaporate. Cover the head because over half of your body heat can get lost through it. Your limbs are especially important to protect since they're the furthest things from your heart. Keep extra clothing around in case you get wet, especially for your feet.

Take breaks frequently especially during strenuous activities. If you become fatigued during physical activity, your body loses its ability to properly retain heat. This causes rapid cooling to which can quickly lead to cold stress. During your rest period, it would be wise to replenish your body with liquids or food. Eating a healthy diet provides your body with the right nutrients it needs to withstand cold

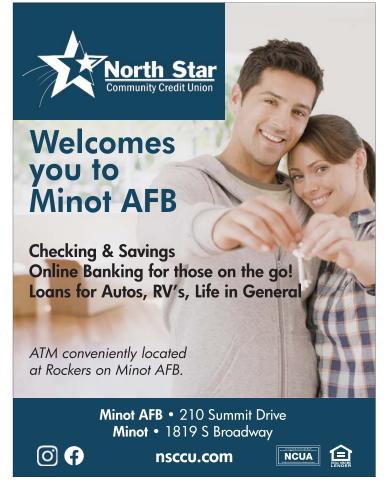
The buddy system in work or play should be used. Look out for one another and know what to look for. A person with hypothermia might not be aware they have it. The first signs of hypothermia are uncontrollable shivering and the sensation of cold. The heartbeat slows down and may become irregular and the pulse weakens. Severe shaking and rigid muscles may be evident and that would be the second sign that the condition is worsening. The victim may slur their speech, the memory lapses and may feel drowsy. Exhaustion, cool skin, slow, irregular breathing occur

as the body temperature drops even lower. Immediate medical attention

With all of the cold winds we have here at Minot, frostbite can occur at any time especially if we're not paying attention to the time limit we are spending outside. Frostbite can happen without hypothermia present. Frostbite is a serious condition where the fluids around the affected area freeze. It can be an irreversible tissue damaging affect and requires attention immediately. The most vulnerable parts are the face, ears, hands and toes. Symptoms of this condition

include coldness and tingling in the affected area, followed by numbness. The skin color may change to white or grayish-yellow. Pain may also occur in the affected area as the condition worsens and possibly blisters.

Whether you're working out on the flightline, riding an ATV or snowmobile, or just simply building a snowman, stay alert for the possibility of cold stress. Monitor your coworkers or your children, whatever applies to your situation and remember what to look for. Take these steps to protect yourself and others.

The Holiday Wishing Tree program works very similar to the Salvation Army's Angel Tree in that in the weeks before Christmas, a basewide notification is sent out requesting nominations of families to bless with gifts this year. While people can and are welcome to sign-up themselves, MSgt Hubbard explained that most of the time people don't like to ask for gifts themselves, even if they are struggling. She mentioned that there is no stipulation to be nominated and gift donations are open to all base families of all ranks.

Once nominations are received, the Shirts gather the info about the children's ages, needs, wants and wishes. They then send it out to the base community to help and purchase the gifts for all the kiddos. MSgt Hubbard explains that "AAFES allowed us to put up a tree in the entrance area of the BX as well as a sign at the Shoppette with a QR code for sponsors to sign up. We also posted it on the Minot AFB Spouses Facebook page. This year we did digital sign-ups to help prevent the traditional tags that are usually used from getting lost as that has happened in the past.' She said that this year they have gifts for 84 base kids: "We are overwhelmed with gifts this year,

which is a good thing!" She also mentioned that Operation Warm Heart always covers the cost for gifts that may not have been covered by the base community.

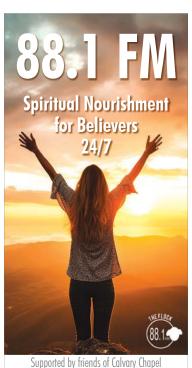

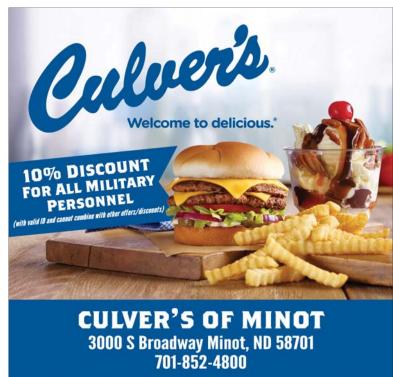

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Mileage-based vehicle maintenance intervals

Maintenance is an essential component of responsible vehicle ownership. Routine maintenance can help discover problems before they escalate into potentially costly issues. Maintenance also keeps vehicles running smoothly, making them more enjoyable to drive and extending their life expectancy.

Various factors can help to determine how often drivers should change their vehicles' fluids and take them in for tuneups. Such variables include how frequently a vehicle is driven, the type of driving (city or rural) drivers do and how many miles are on the car. However, drivers can still rely on this basic car maintenance schedule, courtesy of Advance Auto Parts, to serve as a guide.

3,000 miles/3 months

Advance Auto Parts notes that monthly fluid checks typically are unnecessary with newer vehicles, though older vehicles should be inspected for leaks once a month. Among the fluids to check after every 3,000 miles or three months, whichever comes first, are:

- · Engine oil level
- $\cdot \, \text{Windshield washer fluid} \,$
- ·Coolant
- · Brake fluid level
- · Transmission fluid
- · Power steering fluid

Drivers also can use 3,000 miles or three months as a benchmark to check tire pressure, hoses and belts. Many vehicles now display tire pressure for each tire on the dashboard, and drivers should pay attention to those numbers and put air in their tires when necessary. When inspecting hoses, touch them to make sure they're not leaking and bulging. Hoses should be a little flexible, especially when they are warm.

5,000 miles/6 months

Oil and oil filters should be changed at this interval. In addition, this is a good time to rotate tires and inspect lights to make sure they're still operating at peak capacity. Drivers also can check their cabin and engine air filters and replace them if need be. Changing these filters is a simple DIY project, and drivers can find an assortment of YouTube tutorials to help them complete these projects. Wiper blades also can be inspected around this time or whenever drivers suspect the blades aren't operating at peak capacity. Replacing wiper blades is another simple DIY project that drivers can complete in a few minutes.

10,000 miles/12 months

Advance Auto Parts notes that synthetic oil is typically used in cars made since 2010. Each manufacturer is different, and drivers should check their manuals for recommendations. Synthetic oil and filters in vehicles that use synthetic oil is typically changed every 10,000 miles or 12 months, whichever comes first. Once a year drivers should ask their mechanics to check the alignment on their vehicles and the condition of their brakes.

Routine maintenance can keep vehicles running strong for years on end.

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She Gives the Gift of Music; SrA Jessica Salguero

Did you know that some famous musicians such as Elvis Presley, Ice-T, Jimmi Hendrix, and Kris Kristofferson served in the military? Consequently, the Minot Symphony Orchestra has its own musician too. Her name is Jessica Salguero. Salguero serves in the 5th Maintenance Squadron, a journeyman for the Aerospace Ground Equipment team (AGE) team that delivers support equipment to the aircraft. SrA Salguero earned her degree in Music Education in 2020 from the University of Redlands and hails from Bloomington, California. Salguero's sister also serves in the Air Force, and Salguero credits her sister for motivating her to join the Air Force. When asked about what she learned from juggling a military and music career, she explained that it helps her to spend her time wisely and not to feel guilty on those days when it feels as if she hasn't accomplished anything.

SrA Salguero enjoys writing, playing video games, learning new cooking and baking recipes, and playing bassoon. She doesn't only play the bassoon; she dabbles with other instruments too such as the clarinet and saxophone. Her favorite instrument is the French horn. When asked why she prefers this instrument over the others, she said, "I just enjoy listening to it and a lot of my favorite pieces have wonderful French horn solos, which has definitely endeared me to the instrument." SrA Salguero got into playing the bassoon in high school.

SrA Salguero got her start playing music in the fifth grade. She was simply excited to get out of regular class for a while, but then music class unexpectedly changed her tune. She said, "once I started actually learning and playing, it became something that I enjoy and looked forward to doing." In 2010, when she was a junior in high school, she began to play the bassoon. Her high school music director, John Zambrano, in her words, needed a "guinea pig." At the time, Mr. Zambrano was earning his master's degree and completing a class on double reeds—contain two pieces of cane that vibrate against each other when a musician blows against them. He needed a student to teach bassoon techniques to, and Salguero was up for the challenge. She has played the bassoon since then and hasn't regretted it.

Her performance, along with the two other bassoonists, in

When asked about the audition process for the Minot Symphony Orchestra, SrA Salguero stated, "[The audition was] pretty straightforward. You get the excerpts and scales they want you to play, and you just work them up to the best of your ability. Probably the worst of it is actually playing and hoping your nerves don't get the best of you." Since getting stationed at Minot AFB, it has given Salguero the opportunity that she wouldn't have gotten in her hometown of Bloomington, CA. She further explained that being stationed in Minot gave her the chance to be part of an orchestra like the MSO

and to have the time to dedicate herself to music; two aspects that surprised Salguero the most about serving in the military and being a musician. Minot is a small city with a big art scene.

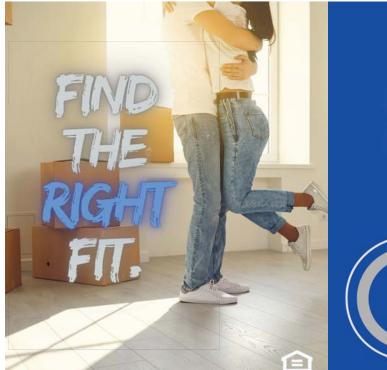

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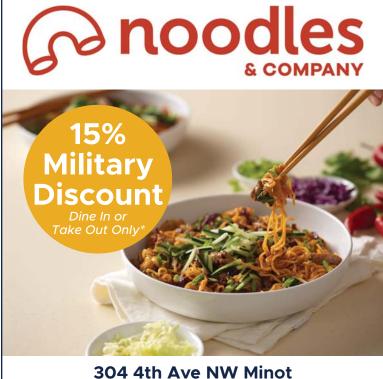

THIS WEEK IN USAF HISTORY

B-52 STRATOFORTRESS FROM MINOT AFB PERFORMS RECORD-BREAKING OPERATION "PERSIAN RUG"

JANUARY 11, 1962

On January 11, 1962, an eight man crew from Minot Air Force Base's 4136th Strategic Wing flew a record-breaking flight from Kadena Airbase, Japan to Torrejon Air Base, Spain. The flight, which was nicknamed Operation Persian Rug, broke several non-stop distance and speed records, some of which are still active. The B-52H Stratofortress and crew completed a nearly 22 hour non-refueled flight that spanned about 12,500 miles across the globe. It traveled at approximately 604

miles per hour. This historic flight, which took place nearly a year after the B-52 Model H was first unveiled, demonstrated the continual power and mission-ready capabilities of the bomber. The crew received awards for their accomplishment and were invited to Washington D.C. to be personally congratulated by President John F. Kennedy.

On any given day, a boat could slip into the Missouri River below Garrison Dam, head down river, and catch a walleye or two.

Granted, during the summer it's a common sight in the chutes, tailrace, and downstream. But the guirky thing about North Dakota and its anglers is that they don't let a little thing like winter deter them from river fishing.

During any normal — not that there is anything normal about North Dakota winters — it could be possible to see a boat or two dotting the Missouri River below the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers tailrace boat

Weather permitting, that is.

It's just that in the winter anglers have to take a few extra precautions: Little things like strapping down a Mr. Heater, handy to occasionally warm one's feet and

Always – and that can't be emphasized enough – always, wear a lifejacket when on the river. Winter fishing, though, makes it especially important.

While N. D. Game and Fish Department requirements designed to reduce the potential spread of aquatic nuisance species require emptying one's boat of water before leaving a water body, it's an absolute must in the winter. Failure to do so will likely crack a boat motor's lower unit when the water freezes, especially on larger boats with bigger, deeper lower units. Speaking of damaging things, don't put water in a live well.

Depending on the weather, at times the ramp can be ice-laden because slack water away from the chutes can ice in around the ramp area even if the river itself is wide open.

In addition, Garrison Dam releases fluctuate depending on the amount of water flowing from its hydropower plant release tunnels as it produces electricity.

Just because daily average water releases may be 16,000 or 18,000 cubic feet per second, for example, doesn't mean it's a steady flow. Sometimes getting a boat in the river can be difficult because of low releases or ice making it difficult or impossible to get down river.

Just as winter access onto North Dakota lakes doesn't come with a guarantee anglers can get to their favorite ice-fishing spot, there is no guarantee anglers can get their boat in at the tailrace boat ramp in the winter, whether it's low water or if the ramp is iced in.

The ramp itself can become icy as vehicles pull boats and trailers out of the water, leaving a slithering, slippery layer of icy concrete.

That's an accident waiting to happen, slipping and sliding on the icy ramp, let alone trying to get traction with a vehicle.

Winter techniques mirror summer techniques minnows and jigs - with most anglers anchoring down river around the first or second coal veins and stumps in the winter. Jig size varies with the amount of current. Start with a light, ¼-ounce jig and 4- or 6-pound test line. Experiment from there with jig size.

The tailrace chutes typically have less activity in the winter, especially considering the combination of colder winter temperatures and stronger current.

Shore-fishing along the tailrace boat ramp rocks can also be popular year-around, weather permitting. Casting crankbaits from shore along the rocks is a staple anytime of the year.

Another tip — cast crankbaits away from any ice so they don't catch on it. If it does catch, don't go onto the ice attempting to retrieve it. No crankbait is worth breaking through into the water and endangering oneself – or others.

Just as the tailrace boat ramp can ice in with low water and cold temperatures, shore-fishing can be curtailed under those same conditions. The rocks can be slippery and icy, as well, so extreme caution is always a must from shore or boat.

With an extra cautious, safety-conscious approach, extra gloves, warm clothing, a Mr. Heater, and cooperation in the form of calm and sunny skies, people driving on U.S. Highway 83 or N.D. Highway 200 shouldn't be too surprised if they see someone pulling a boat.

They just might be heading to the Missouri River for some fishing.
