The room felt unnaturally still as if the world outside had paused, holding its breath. The sterile, cold air of the medical group applying pressure, a weight that couldn't be shaken.

A Major entered the room. A primal instinct began to scream this wasn't a routine visit. Something wasn't right.

"The day I was diagnosed, I will never forget," said Tech. Sgt. Brandee Hahn, 5th Security Forces Squadron Combat Arms and 5 SFS Armory section chief.

In 2021, Hahn received her diagnosis; Stage 3 breast cancer at the age of 31. One could imagine how receiving a diagnosis while being a non-commissioned officer in the United States Air Force at a high-paced, isolated location, such as Minot Air Force Base, would feel overwhelming.

"Initially, I was feeling very small and alone," said Hahn. "Cancer does not run in my family so really the question in my mind was, 'Why me?' Though I still ask myself this question, I know I will never know why."

Many people believe if a service member is diagnosed with cancer they will automatically be discharged, which is a false and dangerous misconception. Instead, the military typically provides treatment and pays for care for the remainder of the service period while allowing the individual to continue performing duties as the diagnosis and job allow.

"That's why it's important to get checked," said Hahn. "When you have it, the military can help you go through it."

Thanks to Hahn's service, TRICARE lifted the financial stress by paying for her treatment including chemotherapy, radiation, double mastectomy and reconstructive surgery. "The first time I got some pretty harsh chemotherapy, they call it "The Red Devil" because it's red in color and, well, it takes a lot from you to include hair and energy," said Hahn. "I went through four rounds of that, eight rounds of Taxol and eight rounds of Carboplatin, all forms of chemotherapy."

of chemotherapy." From there, Hahn had her surgery and then endured 15 sessions of radiation, which Hahn described as, "a cakewalk compared to chemo."

Team Minot has played a big role in the support Hahn needed through her recovery.

"The community of Minot, the people here care so much, it's awesome," said Hahn.

Hahn credits her family, husband, leadership and the nurses at the Trinity CancerCare Center for supporting her through her experience.

"My squadron leadership has also been phenomenal through this whole experience," said Hahn.

Hahn specifically mentioned the commander of the 5 SFS at the time, United States Air Force Lt. Col. John-Paul Adrian. How he genuinely cared and constantly checked up on her meant a lot to her.

"He was like a second dad to me at times," said Hahn.

Over time, Hahn realized talking with Adrian forced her to understand her true feelings about her dire situation.

Although Hahn went into remission, this wouldn't be her last diagnosis. Last April she was diagnosed with Stage 4 breast cancer.

"My family comes from Norway, which deep down makes me a Viking, and one thing I know is that Vikings don't go down without a fight and that is what I set my mind to," said Hahn.

Stage 3 cancer is serious, but

recovery and a long life afterward is possible. When cancer reaches Stage 4, it means the disease has spread to another part of the body. It is an aggressive disease and if not taken under control, it can travel to other locations like the brain which can quickly become fatal.

"With that, I had to learn to appreciate life more and be less angry at things around me. I learned to appreciate smaller things and learned to forgive things in my life that hurt me," said Hahn. "Life is too short and precious to live such a way."

This time around, Hahn is on Trodelvy, a form of chemotherapy for people who have been rediagnosed.

"It's not harsh, though it has taken all my hair," said Hahn.

In between sessions, she takes injections that trigger her body to go into overdrive to reproduce red and white blood cells to help her body recover from the chemo.

"Imagine taking five PT tests in the span of two hours, that's what it feels like," said Hahn. "The only thing you can do is sleep it off."

She spoke about how her journey with breast cancer has strengthened her resilience and given her a new perspective on life.

"It's made me understand and appreciate life more," said Hahn. "My experience in life was just kind of going through the motions and then when this happened, it was like I had to change my life."

Since receiving her diagnosis, she's noticed how going through this experience has made her more understanding,

more compassionate and an overall better leader, passionate about helping her Airmen and community.

When her journey with breast cancer started, she was a staff sergeant and has since been promoted to technical sergeant. She has also become a section chief in charge of two sections within the 5 SFS. Despite her challenges, she continues to succeed much like her Viking ancestors.

October is nationally recognized as Breast Cancer Awareness Month. The goal is to raise awareness of breast cancer signs and symptoms and emphasize the importance of an early diagnosis.

"We don't know when we have it unless you actually have a history of it, or you go get checked and it's found," said Hahn. "It's important to raise awareness about getting checked."

Last October, Hahn hosted a breast cancer 5k to raise awareness and funds. She raised approximately \$1,900 for

a local foundation, supporting chemotherapy patients.

When it comes to breast cancer awareness, one of the things Hahn emphasized is advocating for yourself. Due to the barriers that can restrict access to mammograms before the age of 35, Hahn believes people younger than 35 need to speak up for themselves and demand access when there's a possibility of a disease that can be as fatal as breast cancer.

"Breast cancer is the silent killer," said Hahn. "We have to have this awareness."

Hahn is once again in remission, serving her community, her Airmen and her country.

Throughout her journey, Hahn has been an exemplary Airman as defined by the Airman's Creed. A wingman who supports her Airmen and aids her community, a leader who develops herself and others, and a warrior who continues to fight for her country, for her loved ones and for herself.

to JTF-NCR, a joint service command charged with executing all military ceremonial support for the inaugural period. The JTF-NCR is composed of service members from all branches of the armed forces of the United States, including Reserve and National Guard components.

Nottingham, a 2012 graduate of Boswell High School, Fort Worth, Texas, is assigned to the content production office as a public affairs specialist. He is responsible for documenting members of the task force and the presidential inauguration.

Nottingham is an active duty member of the U.S. Air Force and has served for four years.

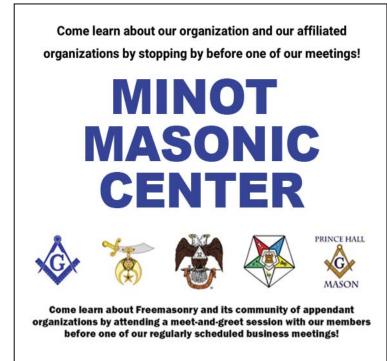
"As a journalist in the United States Air Force, it's an incredible honor to stand here and witness this inspiring moment in history," said Nottingham. "Covering the 60th Presidential Inauguration is not just a career milestone, but a profound reminder of the ideals we serve and the enduring strengths of our democracy."

JTF-NCR is the joint service command charged with planning, coordinating and providing U.S. military support to presidential inaugurations. During the upcoming inauguration, approximately 5.000service members from every branch, including active and reserve components, will provide essential ceremonial and operational support for the 60th Presidential Inauguration.

Since 1789, when a military escort and full ceremonial procession

including a military contingent of 500 members of the Army, local militia and Revolutionary War veterans escorted the newly elected president to his swearingin, military support has played a traditional role in presidential inaugurations. Participation of the armed

forces in this time-honored tradition demonstrates the military's support to the nation's newly elected commander in chief, reaffirms civilian control of the nation's military and the peaceful transition of power which celebrates the principles of democracy.

After searching statistics regarding various coffee brands, obscure entries on websites helped connect the dots about why Tim Horton's locations in North Dakota may have closed their doors.

At one time, there were four Tim Horton's franchises operating in North Dakota; Grand Forks (2), Fargo and Minot. The first to open was a coffee and bake shop across the street from the Alerus Center and Canad Inns in Grand Forks. That shouldn't be a surprise to

states with most of them being in Ohio and New York. The coffee franchise is a corporate sponsor of the Buffalo Bills football team. Minnesota also has five locations.

In reality, there were a variety of reasons for the North Dakota closures with one of the most obvious being competition from Starbucks, Caribou and McDonald's, as well as numerous local coffee shops.

Although Tim Horton's is the third most popular coffee in the U.S. and Canada, Starbucks is No. 1 just about everywhere. It's difficult to compete against that regardless if you are Tim Horton's, Dunkin Donuts or Seattle's Best.

But what it allegedly boiled down to is lack of customer service and poor management.

Unofficial comments from customers about the Grand Forks location didn't paint a rosy picture. I suppose if you wanted coffee, no problem, but customer reviews complained of cold food, wrong orders and employees not knowing what they were doing, or else providing lackadaisical customer service.

There were also some unofficial employee reviews across the board that didn't look good. One of them stated employees had to work without breaks and were constantly being yelled at. The comments aren't verified, but are comments posted from said employees on social media.

It is also known that to get a Tim Horton's franchise, you have to fork out a lot of money up front, not to mention, having a building, or at least be able to share one with someone else, as was the case in Fargo and Minot.

It's only a guess, but the Fargo Tim Horton's was most likely in the poorest financial shape. Seldom were people there even though it was on one of the busiest streets in Fargo near West Acres shopping mall.

Minot and Grand Forks did much

was the draw until that alleged poor customer service trumped the quality of the coffee and donuts.

Tim Horton's remains a popular choice in North Dakota. Its coffee is available at North Dakota Target and some Walmart locations and in some other specialty shops. People living near the border often travel to Canadian locations to get their Tim Horton's fix.

A new location may have opened on 19th Ave. S., in Fargo, but the Fargo Convention and Visitors Bureau isn't aware of it and a Popeye's Chicken is operating in that space in a Petro Serve plaza.

Hopefully lessons were learned, but still the results were unfortunate for customers. Right now, the closest location to Grand Forks is Morris, Manitoba, and Minot's closest location is Estevan, Saskatchewan.

Grand Forks and Minot continue to grow, but at a slower pace than Fargo, so let's hope we see the franchise re-emerge in Minot and Grand Forks so we can get our Timbits and coffee.

Shortly thereafter, a satellite opened in the Ralph Englestad Arena on the University of North Dakota campus and then a third shared a convenience store on 13th Avenue South in Fargo.

Finally a fourth Tim Horton's opened on North Hill in Minot and shared a building with Qdoba.

By the end of 2022, all of those locations had closed their doors despite a 2015 corporate initiative to open 15 locations in both Fargo and Minot.

The official statement of closure from Tim Horton's was vague, saying the North Dakota locations closed so the company could concentrate on its Canadian franchises.

If anyone believes that, there's a bridge for sale in Arizona. There are hundreds of locations in several better with customer traffic, at least initially. Apparently, the brand



A Musical Education in the Magic City

"I would teach children music, physics, and philosophy; but most importantly music, for the patterns in music and all the arts are the keys to understanding the universe." These immortal words attributed to Socrates in Plato's Republic sound less like those of an ancient sage and more like someone who is up to date on the latest research in cognitive development. Mindy Dicken, singer/songwriter, teacher, and, as of March 2024, the newest owner of Children's Music Academy (CMA) of Minot would wholeheartedly agree with his statement.

Mindy's enthusiasm for unlocking a child's musical potential during the period known as the "musical window," approximately between ages four and eight is apparent to anyone who talks to her. She cites not just known cognitive boosts in focus, coordination and memory, but on the emotional and social benefits that come with learning in a small group and becoming proficient at something you've worked hard on. CMA's studio, is not merely strewn with various instruments and the current seasonally themed snowflake decor, but handouts that show all the parts of the brain that must communicate with one another, when someone plays an instrument or sings (it's pretty much all of them.) Mindy's goal is to make these benefits tangible both through CMA and her company Everjoy Music.

The opportunity to take over CMA from previous owner and friend, Terri Aldrich, happened by chance as Terri made the decision to retire and move closer to grand-children. CMA of Minot, which first came to the Magic City in 2005, utilizes a copyrighted curriculum to teach keyboard, singing, harmony, rhythm, note reading, theory, ear training, composition, ensemble playing, recorder, guitar and more. The Pre-Junior course includes eight week sessions featuring seasonal themes and is designed for three to four year olds. The Junior and Intermediate courses offer the full CMA curriculum over either 2.5 years for students in first grade up to age 9 or 3.5 years for students as young as 4.5. These longer courses follow the school calendar and are paid for annually or in monthly installments. Classes meet one hour a week and require a parent to be present to learn alongside the student and then guide them at home.

Military families may wonder about the commitment involved when faced with the uncertainties of TDYs, deployments, and the PCS cycle. Mindy's first piece of advice is to simply jump in and join for

whatever amount of time you do have in Minot because, "the brain benefits are there for that age, and you only get busier later in their lives." She notes that families with similar age kids can enroll both in the class and that those with busier work schedules have utilized friends, sitters and extended family to make lessons possible. She also shared that, while they are not ideal conditions for learning to take place, for a committed family there is the option to do zoom lessons when a parent is sick, the roads from base are less than optimal, or a family is temporarily away from Minot for a TDY. She has even had a military family continue to finish up the program via zoom after moving away.

Families pay for the multi-year program one year at a time and Mindy noted that, for those who pay in installments, she would not apply the dis-enrollment fee for military families faced with a PCS. She added, "for military families who prefer full-pay rather than installments (which will save them some money,) I offer a prorated tuition and full-pay discount [families] who know they will be moving during that year's tuition period." In short, when it comes to making the most of a child's musical education, Mindy's chief focus is to help as many families as possible succeed. She noted that even if there is not a CMA program at the next duty station, there are similar enough programs out there that she is confident there will be ways to continue forward, even after just one year with CMA.

With the next set of preschool classes opening up in March, and a few openings left for the next Junior/Intermediate Course, which start the third week of January, CMA has plenty to offer Minot's military community. Mindy concluded, "if you're a human being, music is for you. So why not enjoy it and understand it and develop a basic skill set that you can do something with. Most people don't grow and say they wish they had been better at math, but almost everyone wants to be better at music!" 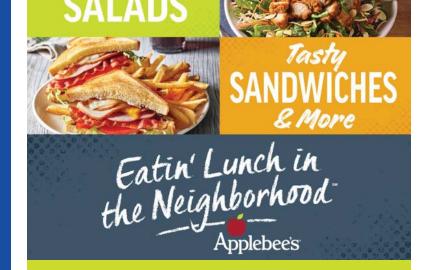
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Crafting Memories: The Atypical Geodome Experience

"In a hole in the ground there lived a hobbit. Not a nasty, dirty, wet hole, filled with the ends of worms and an oozy smell, nor yet a dry, bare, sandy hole with nothing in it to sit down on or to eat: it was a hobbit-hole, and that means comfort." So began J.R.R. Tolkien's The Hobbit. And it is this image that is conjured up every time one drives past Atypical, a microbrewery right in the heart of the Magic City. Located on 510 E Central Avenue, just outside of downtown Minot, one might find it hard to believe that just seven years ago this space that aesthetically hearkens back to an older world was being utilized as nothing more than a storage facility complete with dirt floors and, before that, a gas station dating back to 1927!

Atypical Brewery & Barrelworks began as a joint venture between co-owners Nick Holwegner, brewer Eric Johnson, and two additional, silent partners in August 2018. They grew their business, their space, survived the Covid pandemic, and have become a well-loved local destination known for their craft beers, barrel aged sours, and cider. Their products can be enjoyed at the brewery itself as well as in restaurants across not just the Magic City but the state.

The key to success for Atypical has been their ability to provide not just delicious beverages, but innovative, communal experiences. These include the

presence of food trucks, trivia nights, a dog friendly atmosphere, and various live events all of which are well advertised through their social media pages. To get an idea of what is coming at Atypical, one just has to head over to Facebook and check out their monthly calendar. Recently they were one of the beneficiaries of the Destination Development Grant, intended to expand tourism experiences in North Dakota, which has enabled them to continue to develop their already inviting space.

While this grant will go toward various improvements, including a much anticipated indoor event venue, the most immediately noticeable has been the appearance of the igloo-like structure known as the Atypical Geodome. Inspired by similar domes throughout the state, Atypical's dome was designed and built by Nick Holwegner and Brady Dixon of B.A.D. Creations, a custom woodworking and cabinetry business. The dome seats up to ten and boasts enough internal heat to keep a group comfortable, with temperatures getting to just over 50 degrees. The Northern Sentry tested this out recently, and it remained pleasant inside of the dome for a group of nine, even as the outside temperature plummeted to below zero. With cafe lights providing gentle illumination from above, a wooden table in the center, and a personal speaker on which patrons can play their own music, it is a more intimate variation on the noisier pub



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experience. Additionally, if you are lucky enough to rent it while it is snowing outside, the effect, according to Nick, is very much like that of a reverse snow globe.

How to enjoy the Atypical Geodome Experience? Reservations can be made online and currently cost \$75 for a two hour time slot or \$50 for one and a half hours. The link can be found through their Facebook and Instagram or the many QR codes that are posted around the brewery itself. And while drink service is not included, it is just a hop, skip and a jump to get back to the bar itself. When asked

about the reception the geodome has had, Nick shared that it has remained fully booked since its launch, and will continue to be available Friday, Saturday, and Sunday evenings for the duration of the winter season and into the Spring. If the enthusiasm

continues, its hours may expand and an additional structure might MAFB, ND also be in the works. The best way to stay up to date on all the happenings at Atypical and on the dome's availability is to follow the brewery on social media or through the Visit Minot web site.

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How to make driving in inclement weather more safe

Impaired visibility can be a safety hazard while driving. Everything from sun glare to hail can affect a driver's ability to see the road and navigate it effectively. Before drivers get behind the wheel, they should make note of their local forecast and make a plan for what to do if rain, snow or other conditions make it challenging to drive.

The International Association of Traffic and Safety Sciences indicates that, based on an examination of crash test data conducted by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, the "likelihood of a crash increases during periods of low visibility, despite the tendency for less traffic and for lower speeds to prevail in the spring and summer. Use the front and rear defrost if condensation fogs up windshields and windows. Slow down. Foul weather can reduce drivers' ability to see far into the distance. Drivers should always drive slower in inclement weather in order to improve reaction time.

• Top off fluids. Always keep the windshield washer reservoir full and keep extra fluid in the trunk. In addition, look for a fluid that does not freeze in very cold temperatures.

· Learn how to drive in fog. Each year, more than 38,700 vehicle crashes occur in fog, states the Federal Highway Administration. Travelers Insurance recommends



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during these times."

Drivers can take several steps to improve their visibility when driving in poor weather conditions.

• Inspect and change windshield wiper blades. Wipers are instrumental in clearing precipitation away from the windshield. If they're not functioning properly, wipers cannot do their jobs. Drivers should replace their wipers at the first indication that they are no longer effective. In some conditions, wipers can freeze or stick. Drivers should then pull over and clean the wipers manually.

• Clear obstructions. Always make sure the windshield is clear before driving. This can include removing ice and snow in the winter and cleaning off mud or bug splatter

slowing down, staying focused and using regular headlights and not high beams when driving in fog.

• Go out only if necessary. In snowy or icy conditions, drive only if it's absolutely necessary, as snow and ice can impair visibility and make roads slick, says AAA.

• Avoid driving at dusk and dawn. The human eye can have trouble adjusting to rapidly changing light and darkness conditions, which are common at dusk and dawn. If possible, drivers should make trips during the heart of the day, especially if poor lighting conditions typically make it difficult for them to drive.

Drivers can take steps to improve visibility when inclement weather makes roadways hard to navigate.



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NOTES ON BEING SAFE

DON'T FORGET ABOUT YOUR PETS!

Pet owners should be made aware of winter's dangers, which include harsh weather; leaked antifreeze and road salt. Following are recommendations on steps you can take in order to ensure that the season is not marred by disaster.

One of the hazards a pet may face in winter is exposure to extreme cold. A pet's feet, ears and other areas of the body not covered by much hair get cold and can very well become frostbitten. Signs of frostbite include skin that is pale and cool to the touch and decreased sensation in the affected area. After thawing, there may be pain and the skin may look as though it was burned. If frostbite is suspected, gently thaw the area with warm water; then take your pet to a veterinarian.

The National Humane Education Society agrees with other humane organizations in advising owners of cats to keep them inside all year round. The cat can get enough exercise inside and won't get lost or injured. An enclosed "outdoor" environment such as a screened porch is certainly ideal for fresh air and sunshine but windows with a ledge or built-on perch can also provide much all-season pleasure.

During the cold weather, it is a good idea to knock on your car's hood or sound the horn before starting the engine, as cats permitted to run free can climb up inside the engine seeking warmth.

Deciding on whether to keep your dog outdoors depends largely on the dog's coat and the outside temperature. Ideally, the dog should live indoors, as part of the family. However, if the dog must live outdoors, adequate preparation for the cold months is essential. Be aware that large, long-haired dogs fare better outside during the winter than others.

HAZARDOUS SUBSTANCES

Ethylene glycol, the major ingredient in antifreeze, attracts both dogs and cats because of its sweet taste. But it is extremely poisonous. A tablespoon can kill a cat, and half a cup can be fatal to a 25-pound dog. Within two days, a fatal dose will cause prolonged vomiting, severe kidney pain, ulcers in the mouth and excruciating death from kidney failure. If your pet should swallow any antifreeze, call your veterinarian at once.

ROCK SALT UNDERFOOT

Rock salt is another substance to be wary of in winter. As it is abrasive, it may cut into an animal's paws and burn their mouths. Dogs may eat rock salt which will cause vomiting. When bringing in a pet from the outside during an icy-cold day, check its feet. Remove ice balls between the animal's toes and wipe its feet with a damp towel, especially after walking on heavily salted pavement.

Never let your dog off the leash on snow or ice, especially during a snowstorm--dogs can lose their scent and easily become lost. More dogs are lost during the winter

than during any other season, so make sure they always wear I.D. tags

Thoroughly wipe off your dog's legs and stomach when he comes in out of the sleet, snow or ice. He can ingest salt, antifreeze or other chemicals while licking his paws, and his paw pads may also bleed from snow or encrusted ice.

Own a short-haired breed? Consider getting him a coat or sweater with a high collar or turtleneck that covers the dog from the base of the tail on top to the belly underneath. While this may seem like a luxury, it is a necessity for many dogs.

Never leave your dog or cat alone in a car during cold weather. A car can act as a refrigerator in the winter, holding in the cold. The animal can freeze to death. If your dog is sensitive to the cold due to age, illness or breed type, take him outdoors only to relieve himself. Never shave your dog down to the skin in winter. Leave the coat longer for more warmth. When you bathe your dog, completely dry him before taking him out for a walk. Make sure your companion animal has a warm place to sleep away from all drafts and off the floor, such as in a dog or cat bed with a warm blanket or pillow in it.

Taking good care of your pets in winter and protecting them from the hazards of the season will bring a little warmth into the long, cold days of your own hibernation.



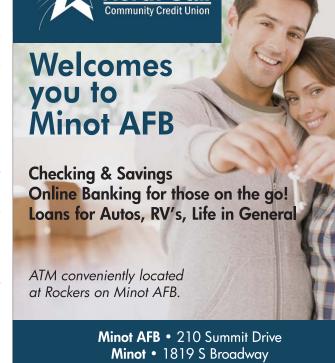

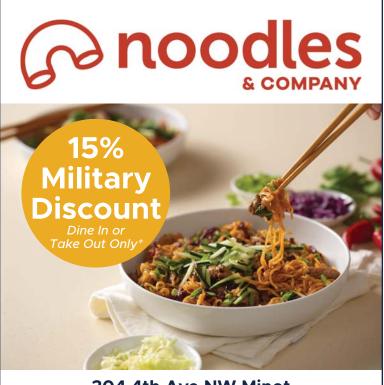
New store brings in Mexican and Latin American essentials to the Minot community.

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A LOOK BACK THIS WEEK IN USAF HISTORY

OPERATION POWER FLITE PUTS B-52 BOMBERS IN THE RECORD BOOK **JANUARY 16, 1957**



The three B-52s that completed Operation Power Flite, grounded at

March, AFB, CA. (USAF Photo) from Castle AFB, California at 1:00 PM on January 16, 1957. Two of the bombers experienced equipment malfunctions and had to land in the USA and England for maintenance. Each plane held the normal six man crew, as well as an extra pilot, navigator, and the crew chief of each plane. Nearly 100 KC-97s from air bases all over the world took part in the operation, providing essential air refueling for the B-52s. The planes landed at March AFB, CA on the morning of January 18 and became the first jet powered planes to circumnavigate the globe without landing to refuel. Information courtesy of: afgsc.af.mil

After a disheartening string of crashes in the 1950s, USAF Strategic Air Command wanted to re-ignite public confidence in the B-52 bomber and reiterate their powerful capabilities to the world. SAC initiated Operation Power Flite, in which three B-52B Stratofortresses and their crews circumnavigated the globe in a historic flight that took 45 hours and 19 minutes. The original five planes, which were stationed with the 93rd Bomb Wing, departed

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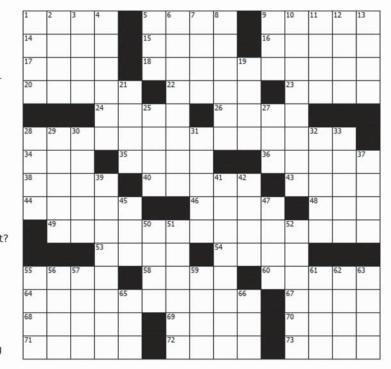

Lake Audubon also producing some walleye. Try the east end or west side by Totten Trail in shallow water out to 35 to 40 feet depending on time of day and location. •Lake Sakakawea/Lake Audubon, Hwy. 83 Lawn & Leisure, Garrison: No new reports.

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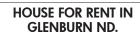

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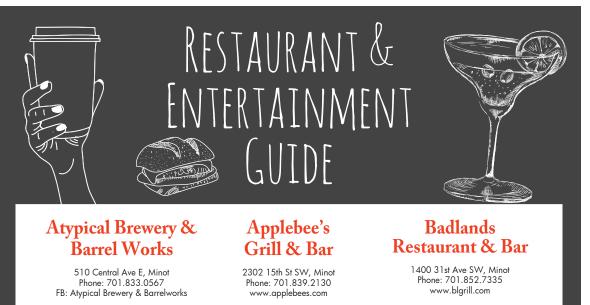
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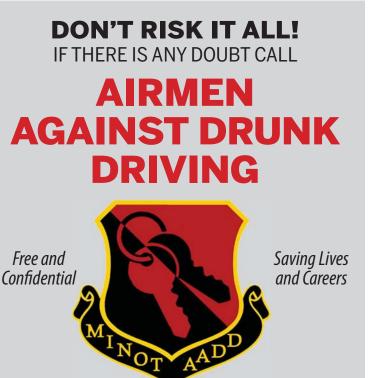

At first it may seem weird North Dakota, a state some 1,500 miles from the State of New York has a deeply rooted love for Pres. Theodore Roosevelt.

There is good reason, however: Born in New York City, Roosevelt retreated to a ranch in what is nowadays North Dakota's western Badlands after the death of his wife. Back in 1884 it was a little slice of Dakota Territory.

It's been said he credits his nearly two-year experience in the Badlands as shaping much of what would later follow in his life, including as United States president. He wrote about those experiences in a book, "Hunting Trips of a Ranchman".

North Dakota unofficially adopted the 26th president and the national park named in his honor, Theodore Roosevelt National Park, near Medora, N.D. has become a major destination for residents and nonresidents alike.

His time on that western North Dakota ranch solidified his love of the land and of hunting. It also solidified his strength as a leader, defender, and advocate of his country.

En route to Yellowstone in 1903, friend and fellow passenger John Burroughs recalled traveling via train with Roosevelt through the Badlands: "Had he (Roosevelt) not gone West, he said he never would have raised the Rough Riders Regiment, and had he not raised the regiment and gone to the Cuban War, he would not have been made governor of New York; and had that not happened, the politicians would not unwittingly have made his rise to the Presidency so inevitable," Burroughs is quoted as saying.

To read some of Roosevelt's writings such as "Hunting Trips of Ranchman" is to understand Roosevelt and his love for what understandably might be perceived as rugged wasteland. It's brutal winters and summer heat, however, wasn't daunting — it was career and lifechanging for Roosevelt. nights tend to be long. Reading "Hunting Trips of a Ranchman" and two other books authored by Roosevelt in what could be considered a trilogy – "Ranch Life and the Hunting Trail" (published in 1888) and "The Wilderness Hunter" (1893) - provide insight into a man who could easily earn the honor of being called "The Conservation President".

Understanding Roosevelt's dedication to conservation and his conservation philosophy is chronicled in the book "President Theodore Roosevelt's Conservation Legacy" by W. Todd Benson.

It provides insight into how Roosevelt was influenced in his conservation and hunting ethics through friendships with some of America's early and greatest hunters and conservationists. Roosevelt hosted a dinner pitching the idea of an organization dedicated to protecting the country's big game species that gave birth to the Boone and Crockett Club.

Roosevelt served as Vice-President under Pres. William McKinley, assuming the presidency after McKinley's death in September 1901. During his tenure in office he advocated for strong public land stewardship for future generations. From April 11, 1902 with the establishment of San Isabel and Santa Rita National Forests through the end of his presidency in 1909, Roosevelt was responsible for establishment of hundreds of national forests, parks, monuments, and national wildlife refuges.

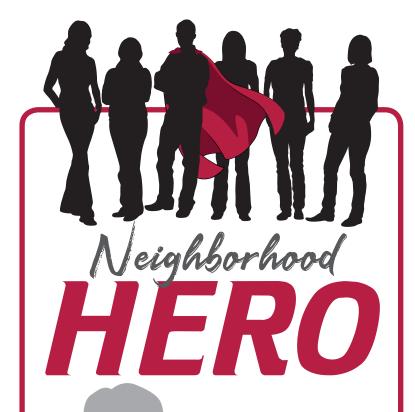
Roosevelt established Sully's Hill National Game Preserve near Devils Lake in 1904 as a national park. It became a National Game Preserve in 1914 and would later come under U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service management. In 2019 its name was changed to White Horse Hill National Game Preserve.

Five islands within Stump Lake, also near Devils Lake, were designated as a National Bird Reservation in 1903. The Fish and Wildlife Service now manages the islands as part of the National Wildlife Refuge system. However, high water flooded the islands and the refuge is closed to the public.









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Roosevelt's time in North Dakota admittedly wasn't Let's face it, winter in North Dakota and its winter a lengthy stay. Yet what he absorbed during that time stayed with him forever.

There is some great reading to provide insight into the nation's "Conservation President". A North Dakota winter is a good time for just that.
