## 5BW Commander Unveils New Mission

## Watchful Guards of the Missile Fields

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. – The plains of North Dakota stretch out in a vast expanse of rolling hills interrupted only by the occasional cluster of trees; covered in snow and ice or grass swaying in the wind, depending on the time of year. Though seemingly bare, this land is rooted in a vital role to national defense. Nestled within the windswept prairies lies the operational area of the 91st Missile Wing, home to a network of Missile Alert Facilities and Launch Facilities spread out across 8,500 square miles that house the Minuteman III intercontinental ballistic

missile weapon system. Standing watch – 24 hours a day, 365 days a year – ensuring the safety and security of these assets, and the nuclear deterrence provided by them, are the Airmen of the 91st Security Forces Group; fittingly referred to as 'Defenders.'

"Our mission is to secure the MAFs and LFs that are assigned to the 91MW," said U.S. Air Force Col. James Slaton, 91SFG commander. "The most important part of that is having the capability to respond and defeat any adversary that would attempt to access these resources."

To ensure the safety and security of the assets under their watch, the Airmen of the 91SFG regularly conduct exercises and realistic training scenarios to enhance readiness and response capabilities in the event of security threats.

"We are training and exercising constantly," said Slaton. "On any given day, our Defenders are out in the missile complex running through scenarios and working on their skill set to be prepared

to execute the mission.'

In addition to the security provided by Airmen on the ground, the 54th Helicopter Squadron works in tandem with the 91SFG to provide an all-encompassing blanket of security; providing rapid response capabilities and a bird's eve view of the missile fields at a moment's notice.

"The 54HS is a phenomenal partner, they're our eyes in the sky," said Slaton. "They give us the capability to reach any type of scenario quickly, as well as providing aerial fire support."

The Minuteman III weapon system is considered the most responsive leg of the United States' nuclear triad. The safety and security that 91SFG Defenders supply to these assets ensures that the U.S. nuclear deterrent remains credible to adversaries.

"The immediate response that the ICBM fleet provides our



national decision makers a lot of leverage and influence," Slaton explained. "Our Defenders ensure that the Airmen who maintain and operate this weapon system are able to do so in a secure environment."

The Airmen of the 91SFG, always ready and always standing watch over an enormous area of operation, are the lynchpin to ensuring that these assets remain safe and secure from any and all threats.

Slaton explained that if he had to choose one word to describe the Defenders of the 91SFG, it would be the Finnish word 'sisu', which translates roughly to guts, grit, and determination in the face of extreme adversity.

"It originated during World War II to describe the Finnish resistance to Soviet invasion, due to the harsh environments they had to operate in," said Slaton. "Our Defenders operate in one of the toughest environments that Air Force security forces members are placed in, outside of an active combat zone; and they do it day in, day out, ready to respond at a moment's notice."

The 2025 North Dakota Legislature is under way in Bismarck, and while our legislators get to work, we also have responsibilities as residents of this state.

expect our lawmakers to conduct the state's business over the next few months, and each of us has our own thoughts regarding what we expect from those we supported at the polls. But as voters, our duty doesn't end when the election results are certified.

I would argue that our responsibility as residents of this state, and as voters, is just beginning. It's up to us to keep ourselves informed about what is happening at the Capitol in Bismarck, and to reach out to our legislators if we have concerns, questions, or complaints.

There is a lot happening every day of the legislative session. Hundreds of bills will be introduced by senators and representatives, and every bill

elected lawmakers will spend a lot of time in committee hearings, and holding discussions and votes during floor sessions.

There is a wealth of information on the Legislature's website at www.ndlegis.gov. You can track bills, watch live and archived video from floor sessions, read budget information for the 2025-27 biennium, and find contact information for every member of the Legislature.

You can also attend legislative forums held by the Minot Area Chamber EDC during the legislative session. The forums will be held at the North Dakota State Fair Center on Jan. 25, Feb. 1, Feb. 15, March 15, March 29, and April 5 beginning at 9 a.m. Local elected officials in attendance provide information and updates about what's happening at the Legislature, and can help answer questions or address concerns from constituents.

The forums are a great way to reach out to your legislators faceto-face instead of through email or a voicemail. It's a simple and effective way to let them know on a personal level about your concerns or any issues you might

gets a hearing. That means our have with their votes or their support of particular bills. I urge you to attend these sessions for the best access to your elected

> All of us should be involved in the legislative process. The decisions made by our elected legislators impact our daily lives in a wide variety of ways, from the enormity of the state budget to smaller bills that deal with specific items or issues. They have a responsibility to listen to and consider the concerns of residents, even if they don't necessarily agree with that resident's thought process or suggestions on how to vote on a certain topic.

> On an individual level, those who voted in the most recent election chose to support the candidates whose positions and opinions most closely agree with their own. We support specific candidates because we believe they will help steer the state in a direction we agree with in the short-term and for the future. Now, with the 2025 Legislature in session, it's up to us to keep an eye on what's happening in Bismarck and to express our opinions with our legislative

We also have a responsibility, as individuals, to conduct ourselves with proper behavior. When we address our elected leaders, we should show them the same level of respect we expect them to show us. Berating public officials doesn't solve anything, whether it's in person, on the phone, or in a text or email. Our legislators will make hundreds of decisions during the 2025 Legislature, and they will face much criticism from a variety of sources. But we can agree to disagree in a manner that allows us, as residents, to make our point without being disrespectful.

Our elected leaders are in Bismarck doing the work that we elected them to do. It's our responsibility to inform ourselves about the legislative process and it's up to us to be involved with our local legislators. The system works best when we're involved in the process.

#### Diversity at its finest...

We all know what happened during the oil boom. Some communities in the western third of North Dakota exploded with population and although that has now stabilized, some of those growing pains remain.

Williston is one of the best examples. At the height of the boom, the city of Williston, which had a fraction of the population of the city of Fargo, was running neck and neck with Fargo on taxable sales and purchases.

With that kind of robust growth, buildings began popping up like mushrooms and new downtown businesses began emerging to accommodate the growing population. That too has stabilized, along with Williston's population.

The 2010 census reported Williston's population at 14,700. In just 10 years, the city grew 98 percent and is now considered the sixth-largest city in North Dakota with a population of 27,700. During the peak of the oil boom in 2015, the population was estimated at close to 40,000.

Because of that growth, Williston now has the fifth largest high school in the state

Davies for that spot.

Nearby Watford City is another example of mind-boggling growth that was even more intense than Williston. In 2010, Watford City had 1,740 people. By 2020, the population had jumped 256 percent to 6,200. It has since dropped about 200 in population, according to 2023 estimates.

And similar to Williston, taxable sales and purchases in Watford City in 2015, rivaled that of Jamestown, a city with more than twice the population.

Likewise, the Watford City School District saw radical growth and because of it, the sports teams had to move up in class to compete against some of the larger schools in the state. It also prompted a new high school campus that opened in 2016 and brought additional elementary locations because of the overgrowth.

It doesn't stop there. Alexander, also in McKenzie County with Watford City, saw substantial growth, but not as great as Watford City or Williston. From 2010 to 2020, the population rose 43 percent, from 223 to of North Dakota, tied with Fargo 319. It was a much more subtle Dakota throughout history has

growth that also saw an increase in the school population. Its Comet sports teams went from a virtual unknown to competing in high school sports playoffs.

New Town, in neighboring Mountrail County and on the Fort Berthold Reservation, also grew by 43 percent. But unlike Alexander, New Town's 2010 population was much larger at 1,925, jumping to 2,764 following the 2020 census.

communities Other the western third also had substantial population growth. They included Tioga, 79 percent, Stanley, 59 percent, Ray, 25 percent, Berthold, 8 percent and Parshall, 5 percent.

Ray, Tioga and Williston are all in Williams County, Watford City and Alexander are in McKenzie County, New Town and Parshall are in Mountrail County and Berthold, on the edge of the oil boom, is in Ward County.

Minot, also in Ward County, grew by 18 percent from 2010 to 2020. Some of that is attributed to the oil boom as several oilfield companies set up their headquarters in Minot. But the fourth-largest city in North

always sustained growth, so it could be several factors.

One of the unusual things that has come out of this is the growth of the Hispanic population in Watford City. It is now nearly a fourth of the population and has put a unique strain on the school system as few teachers, students or administrators could speak Spanish to the rapid influx of new students.

It is also difficult for Hispanic students to learn in such an environment. But, like the population, the school district has stabilized by hiring Spanish teachers and using translators to better communicate with the students and parents.



#### **MMIII Transporter Erectors** retired after 37 years

For the past 37 years the Transporter Erector (TE) has been a fundamental piece of equipment for operational readiness of the Minuteman III (MMIII) intercontinental ballistic missile (ICBM) system. These vital pieces of equipment are responsible for transporting MMIII across vast distances, utilizing public roads to reach strategic locations, and ensuring precise emplacement or removal at launch facilities. Due to maintenance requirements becoming harder to meet with the older model, these units will be replaced with newer, modernized equipment. The 91st Missile Wing is the last unit using the old TE systems, as the Roughriders are regularly relied upon to sunset programs being modernized.

"The retirement of these 'legacy' TE's marks the end of a proud and extraordinary 37

years of service and life across thousands of personnel," said U.S. Air Force Staff Sgt. Ethan Bowman, missile handling section team chief assigned to the 91st Missile Maintenance Squadron.

The retirement of the old TE systems also ushers in an opportunity to transition to more efficient and modernized equipment to support the MMIII weapon system more effectively. The TE's being retired were made to the highest standard when they were designed in the late 1980s. The systems have served nearly four decades, reliably facilitating transportation, erection, and removal operations at critical ICBM launch facilities across the country.

"Milestones such as this demonstrate the commitment of the 91st Missile Wing Roughrider men and women to strategic deterrence," said U.S. Col.

Jimmy Schlabach, commander of the 91st Missile Wing. "Proud Airmen have operated the legacy TE systems, serving the most powerful weapon system in the world, the Minuteman III, admirably for decades."

The decision to phase out the Legacy TE units is not just a practical choice but a strategic necessity. Replacing aging units with modernized transporters ensures the MMIII can remain a credible component of the United States' nuclear deterrence strategy. New units will incorporate advancements in materials, engineering, and technology to enhance reliability reduce maintenance burdens. This modernization will enable smoother operations and better support for hoisting, transportation, and emplacement activities at operational wings and storage facilities.

"These replacements ensure that the 91st Missile Wing will continue to provide always-ready lethal combat capability, without rest, to enable strategic deterrence so critical to our national defense for decades to come," said Schlabach. "President Theodore Roosevelt famously said, 'Speak softly and carry a big stick; you will go far.' The Roughriders have used the TE systems to carry the nation's biggest stick, and will use the new units to

continue that legacy."

The retirement of the Legacy TEs is a moment of reflection, honoring the remarkable engineering and unwavering commitment of the individuals kept these operational for over three decades. Their contributions ensured the continuous support of one of the nation's most critical defense assets, allowing the MMIII to remain a cornerstone of deterrence strategy.

As the Legacy TEs make way for their modern replacements, the Air Force is embracing the

opportunity to improve mission effectiveness and long-term sustainability. This transition represents not only the end of an era, but also the beginning of a more robust and capable logistics infrastructure to support the MMIII weapon system until its eventual retirement. By investing in modernization, the United States ensures its strategic forces remain ready and reliable, reinforcing the principles of deterrence for decades to come.

THIS WEEK IN USAF HISTORY

**B-52 STRATOFORTRESS CREW PERFORMS LAST SORTIE** OF OPERATION ARC LIGHT

January 28, 1973

On January 28, 1973, a B-52 Stratofortress crew flew the last sortie of Operation Arc Light, bombing enemy targets in South Vietnam at 0628 hours local time. Operation Arc Light began on June 18, 1965 as 27 B-52F bombers from the 7th and 320th Bombardment Wings based in Guam attacked a Viet Cong jungle fortification. From its beginning to end, the operation was carried out by personnel from Strategic Air Command bases all over the United States and overseas facilities, who performed temporary duty rotations up up to 179 days, with some Airmen

serving over 1,000 days during intermittent tours on Arc Light. In 1967, U-Tapao Royal Thai Air Base was added to the roster to relieve over crowding in Guam and reduce flight times to Vietnam, and one year later, B-52s were flying out of Kadena Air Base, Okinawa, Japan. Overall, Operation Arc Light and the B-52 bombers flew over 126,000 sorties.

#### MILEAGE-BASED VEHICLE MAINTENANCE INTERVALS

Maintenance is an essential component numbers and put air in their tires when of responsible vehicle ownership. Routine maintenance can help discover problems before they escalate into potentially costly issues. Maintenance also keeps vehicles running smoothly, making them more enjoyable to drive and extending their life expectancy.

#### 3,000 miles/3 months

Advance Auto Parts notes that monthly fluid checks typically are unnecessary with newer vehicles, though older vehicles should be inspected for leaks once a month. Among the fluids to check after every 3,000 miles or three months, whichever comes first, are:

- Engine oil level
- · Windshield washer fluid
- · Coolant
- · Brake fluid level
- · Transmission fluid
- · Power steering fluid

Drivers also can use 3,000 miles or three months as a benchmark to check tire pressure, hoses and belts. Many vehicles now display tire pressure for each tire on the dashboard, and drivers should pay attention to those

necessary. When inspecting hoses, touch them to make sure they're not leaking and bulging. Hoses should be a little flexible, especially when they are warm.

#### 5,000 miles/6 months

Oil and oil filters should be changed at this interval. In addition, this is a good time to rotate tires and inspect lights to make sure they're still operating at peak capacity. Drivers also can check their cabin and engine air filters and replace them if need be. Changing these filters is a simple DIY project, and drivers can find an assortment of YouTube tutorials to help them complete these projects. Wiper blades also can be inspected around this time or whenever drivers suspect the blades aren't operating at peak capacity. Replacing wiper blades is another simple DIY project that drivers can complete in a few minutes.

#### 10,000 miles/12 months

Advance Auto Parts notes that synthetic oil is typically used in cars made since 2010. Each manufacturer is different, and drivers should check their manuals for recommendations. Synthetic oil and filters in vehicles that use synthetic oil is typically changed every 10,000 miles or 12 months, whichever comes first. Once a year drivers should ask their mechanics to check the alignment on their vehicles and the condition of their brakes.

Routine maintenance can keep vehicles running strong for years on end.







## Dr. Amanda Capote: Two Decades of Healing and Reflection in Minot

Dr. Amanda Capote has spent the last two decades in Minot, making it her home after arriving in 2005 as a military member. While her story is one of perseverance and resilience, it also speaks to the challenges of military life, career aspirations, and the journey of personal healing through the written word.

Dr. Capote, who was discharged from the military late 2005 due to medical reasons, chose to stay at Minot Air Force Base with her husband, SSgt Richard Capote, as he continued his service. Over the years, the family has made Minot their home, but not without facing struggles along the way. She earned both her Bachelor's and Master's degrees in Criminal Justice/Police Science

from Minot State University in 2014. Driven by a passion for learning and a strong motivation to excel in her field, she pursued and earned her PhD from Capella University. Her doctoral studies focused on Public Safety, with a concentration in Criminal Justice and Homeland Security.

The Capote family, unlike many military families who frequently relocate, has experienced the unique challenge such as career growth and experience by being at the same place their whole career. "We've seen people come and go, friends leave and return years later, and we're still here. My husband has a couple more years on Active Duty, but we honestly do not know where our next journey will take us. Our three kids were all born here,

and this is the only home they've ever known," Dr. Capote shared. "I remember crying on the drive up from Minneapolis when my mother drove me to Minot AFB after tech school, and now after making this place a home for 20 years, I don't know where we would go," Dr. Capote reflected, her voice filled with emotion.

Despite the uncertainty, Dr. Capote has embraced the challenges of life in Minot, finding joy in her work as a music teacher at Northern Plains School on Minot AFB. While it wasn't her original career path—she had aspired to work in the Child Crime Unit—she expressed how fulfilling it is to be able to work with children every day. "Even though it's not the job I got my degree in, I love being able to help kids. It brings me joy," she said.

However, her professional journey hasn't come without difficulties. Dr. Capote spoke candidly about her struggle to find a job in her field, noting that despite her extensive education, opportunities in Minot have been limited. "There just aren't enough jobs in my field here, and that's been a real challenge. While I have plenty of education, I lack experience in my field which also makes it difficult to be selected for a job," she explained.

In the face of these obstacles, Dr. Capote found solace in an unexpected place: writing. She self-published her first memoir in 2021, which she describes as an essential step in her healing

process . "My memoir was a great start to healing, and I sat on my manuscript for an entire month before I told anyone I self-published."

Her memoir, which touches on her life experiences and challenges, has been a source of personal growth and transformation. It's clear that writing has become a powerful tool for Dr. Capote as she navigates the ups and downs of her childhood, working through her journey to her Ph D, military life, career frustrations, and motherhood.

She also encouraged fellow military spouses not to put their careers or personal growth on the back burner. "We often focus so much on our partners' careers and our families, but it's important to grow yourself too," Dr. Capote explained. "Pursue your goals, invest in your education or trade, and remember that your journey matters just as much as anyone else's."

As the Capote family continues their time in Minot, they face an uncertain future, but one thing is clear: Dr. Capote's resilience, dedication to her family, and passion for helping others remain unwavering. Her story is a testament to the power of healing, the importance of finding joy in unexpected places, and the strength of a family grounded in love.


Whether in Minot or beyond, Dr. Capote's journey is far from over, and her memoirs offer a glimpse into the strength that has carried her through life's challenges.





School Boards are responsible for the education of local children and address a wide array of issues to include establishing spending priorities, approving budgets, adopting school calendars, approving staffing changes, responding to changes in education law, and advocating for the needs of students, families, teachers and staff. Members work closely with the district superintendent and other administration and serve as public figures to support and respond to the needs of their communities.

For the Minot Air Force Base, School Board District #160 serves in this capacity. School board member duties include, using state and federal funds to ensure that the students on-base continue to receive the best education possible within the laws of the North Dakota Century Code, addressing concerns or questions from district families, and voting on matters that affect schools both on and off the installation. The Minot Air Force Base School Board is a coterminous school board that works alongside Minot Public Schools, School Board, District #1 with the mission of "Empowering all

learners to succeed in a changing

Minot Air Force Base, School Board District #160 and Minot Public Schools, School Board, District #1 consist of five board members, each member serves a three-year term. For the Minot Air Force Base, School Board, District #160 there are three position requirements for members. These include 1) Member must reside on the installation 2) Member may be active duty enlisted, a reservist, or a dependent family member. Officers are not eligible to serve as school board members pursuant DoDD 1344.10, Para 4.2.2.4. 3. Members cannot be an employee of Minot Public Schools.

The Minot AFB School Board often has to fill vacancies due to member resignations related to the military lifestyle. If a member of the board resigns that position is filled to serve out the remaining portion of that term. Currently, the Minot AFB School Board has open positions. #### **Discover Your Voice: Jr. Journalism Is Back!**

While most Northern Sentry stories come from your local Northern Sentry reporters, some will be surprised to hear that this paper also has a program that is just for youths age 7-17. The Jr. Journalism Program is an opportunity for students to develop their writing skills, learn about the craft of journalism, and share stories that matter to them with the greater base community. Begun in the summer of 2022, the program is ready for submissions from Minot kids who are eager and ready to learn more about the craft of writing!

The Jr. Journalism program is open to all MAFB affiliated youths age 7-17. It's for anyone with a story to tell, from the personal such as their favorite playground, how they spent a snow day, or where they went on a family trip, to the practical such as kid to kid PCS advice. Sometimes the hardest part is getting started, but fortunately some former Jr. Journalists have lots of advice to get aspiring writers started.

Leon Rivera, age 8, chose to write about the Hostfest. When asked why he chose that topic he noted, "I thought it would be a great festival, and I wanted to learn stuff about Norse history, so that I could learn more about Minot itself." When asked for his advice to aspiring journalists, Leon shared, "Go for the thing you like the sound of! Choose whatever [topic] you like best."

Molly and Julie Sullivan, ages 13 and 11, shared, "We wrote about our visit to Assiniboine park zoo. Our mom assigned us to write an article as part of our homeschool. We had just gotten back from a trip to Canada [and] thought the zoo was a lot of fun. We also liked the animals there and so we decided to write about it." They added, "We learned that it actually wasn't that hard writing an article once you got started and it was a lot of fun." They mentioned that it was a fun surprise to receive a framed copy of their published article after the fact.

The prevailing advice from Jr Journalists: read what others have written for inspiration, and then go for it! In some cases, particularly for older writers, the Sentry will work with them on an opportunity to write a more in-depth piece. This may involve a bit of research or even the opportunity to do an interview. Tristan Noel still remembers getting the opportunity to write about comedian Terry Fator. He shared, "I chose Terry Fator because I like comedy and talking to him was one of two interview options I was offered. I had to research about his life and watch some older videos of his to get my questions ready. The best part was that a few weeks later I got to see his show." When asked about the writing process itself, Tristan noted that, "If you write about something you are interested in or already know something about, then it's a lot easier to get words down on paper. It's okay if your first draft is terrible. Just take a break and come back to it later."

Being published in the paper and receiving a framed memento, as well as the opportunity to practice an important skill are reason enough to give writing

for the Northern Sentry a try. However, it's also a unique and fun way to share more about what matters to kids with the community. 

#### **BUT THEN WHAT?**

What do you do when the snow begins to be more of a pain than a joy, when bundling your kid up in a million layers just to get on the school bus is making you go a little crazy? Or when the frigid wind is making your nose hairs freeze well into what should be springtime? Well, you make the best of it, that's what. Because when it boils down to it, that's all we can do right?

So, here are a few things you can do and create for (mostly) free and enjoy right here in the freezing darkness of winter in the Northern Plains when the season is dragging on. Try something new, take a few pics and post it to social media, and we bet your hometown friends will think Minot isn't so bad with these unique and cool winter tricks and treats.

#### 1. MAKE MAPLE SYRUP SNOW CANDY

#### 2. SEE BOILING WATER FREEZE INSTANTLY





North Dakota is 1,000-plus miles from Ithaca, N.Y., Cornell University, and the nonprofit organization Cornell Lab of Ornithology.

But that's OK because birds are a universal thing. It's just that North Dakotans don't get to see as many birds in the deep depths of winter.

Cornell Lab of Ornithology grew from simple beginnings when Arthur A. Allen came to the university as one of the country's first professors of ornithology, The story goes that he posted a sign "Laboratory of Ornithology" by his office door and that's how one of the world's leading conservation organizations — Cornell Lab of Ornithology — evolved. Today, it focuses on all things birds.

Bear with me, this really does tie to North Dakota - or anywhere, for that matter: The organization has umpteen ways to bring people from all over into the world of birds.

It's do-able in North Dakota even in the winter. For example, the 2025 Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC) will be held Feb. 14 through Feb. 17. Just go to (www.birdcount.org) for details.

That's just one way the Lab involves everyone from scientists to avid bird enthusiasts to the casual public. The organization has an array of projects through their citizen science programs, which links information provided by people to scientists using the information for research, population trend data, etc.

In addition to the Great Backyard Bird Count other citizen science programs include Global Big Day, Christmas Bird Counts, NestWatch, and eBird, for example.

Global Big Day is really two big days, one coming up in May and again in October. The timing is perfect for North Dakota because that's when a lot of birds are migrating into and through the state. Essentially, folks from anywhere in the world simply get outside and bird for a day - part or all day, depending on one's inclination. Sightings are logged into the eBird website, (ebird.org), and observers quickly see what birds were observed and where.

While the next Christmas Bird Counts won't take place until December 2025 into early January 2026, people can find results from North Dakota counts — or anywhere a count was held - on the website, (www.audubon.org/community science/christmas-bird-count).

Upper Souris National Wildlife Refuge northwest of Minot hosts a count each December, for example, along with counts in Minot and Theodore Roosevelt National Park in western North Dakota.

The Christmas Bird Count launched the citizen science concept more than a century ago and it's still hugely successful.

Project FeederWatch just might be the most amazing of all of the citizen science programs because participants don't even need feeders. Plus, it's super flexible. All it takes is a few minutes to note what birds are observed anytime between November and April: Look out a building window and check out what flies into a nearby shrub. Or look at what might be flying around trees, feeders, and heated birdbaths while walking to a store, school, or work. Whether it's for five minutes, five hours, or anything in between, just submit observations.

While Project FeederWatch has a participation fee, the funds are strictly used to support the program and its data collection.

This spring when nesting gets underway the Lab's NestWatch program is an amazing way to observe and learn about birds, nesting, and chick rearing. Participants learn how to become certified NestWatchers, reporting their information as well.

Thankfully people participating in any or all of Cornell Lab or Ornithology programs don't have to be ornithology experts. They don't really even have to know much about birds.

All they need is curiosity and a link to the Cornell Lab of Ornithology's website, (www.birds.cornell.edu). Clicking "Get Involved" links to their citizen science programs and other ways to get involved with birds and birding, while "Birds" is a link with a wealth of information about birds throughout the world, as well as ways to report sightings and more.

So even though the organization is more like 1,500 miles away from North Dakota, it still brings birds close to home theirs and ours.

The other nice thing about researching Laboratory of Ornithology resources is it helps make winter nights feel shorter, bringing warm thoughts of spring - and birds -

In addition, it's another way to involve children in the outdoors, wherever that may be.

#### Born to Bake: Jenetta Sawyer ERIN BEENE, NORTHERN SENTRY

Some people know what they are meant to do by the time they take their first steps. Some people change career paths a multitude of times through adulthood before landing on the final project. Some people have a career fall in their laps that surprises even them. Mil Spouse Jenetta Sawyer was born to bake, but didn't discover it until 2022 when she was mixing cupcake batter for the very first time. It was her son's first birthday, and out of nowhere she was filled with an unexplainable joy, peace and sense of purpose. She had found a new pasionin life and later that night her epiphany of opening a bakery started to become a reality.

Today, Jenetta runs a very successful cottage bakery (a bakery without a storefront, and from one's home) called Jenetta's Simple Treats. But, only two and half years ago she was a first-time mom struggling with severe postpartum depression and crippling anxiety. At the time, Jenetta and her spouse, 2d Lt Jason Sawyer, 741 MS, were stationed at Nellis AFB in Las Vegas, Nevada. In 2021, she had just given birth to her son, Jenson, and was having a hard time dealing with the realities of new motherhood. Though she received treatment in the following months, Jenetta explained that she still felt like something was missing from her life. A few days before her son turned one, Jenetta decided to do something she had never done before: bake and pipe cupcakes. She gathered supplies from thrift stores and online yard sale pages and took to Pinterest to help guide her. She proceeded to watch a few decorating videos and then gave it a try when something unexpected happened. "My brain quieted, my heart rate slowed, it was a weird sense of peace."

Jenetta explained that at that moment, she just knew that baking was what she was meant to do in life. The birthday cupcakes turned out great, and in fact Jenetta was enjoying herself so much that she ended up making way too many for her family alone. So, she decided to sell them on Facebook for \$1/ dozen. Surprising herself, she made quick sales and even had customers asking her for more.

This sudden peace and the fact that there was a demand for baked goods, caused Jenetta to start planning her bakery business that very evening. Thus, Jenetta's Simple Treats was

Currently, Jenetta still does not have any formal training on baking or decorating, but she does very closely follow all of the laws and regulations in the state of North Dakota for operating a cottage bakery. She confided that she has never taken a class and that she is completely self-made, learning everything from online YouTube videos and from A LOT of trial and error. She attributes her determination and success to the never-ending support from her husband.

While Jenetta bakes and decorates many things, including cakes, cookies, pretzel sticks, and lots more, she said that her favorite item to bake is

still cupcakes since that's what started it all. When asked what motivated her to go from never having baked in her life to opening a business, she joked that it was "blind confidence" that propelled her.

Jenetta's Simple Treats has been so successful that it keeps growing. She already owns a small treat trailer, which will make its Minot debut once the weather has warmed, and this vear Jenetta has decided to offer cake and cupcake decorating classes out of her home. She is also in the works of getting the use of a local business so she can host larger decorating groups.

While forever a baker at heart, or for however long it continues to fulfill her, Jenetta wanted to make sure the Northern Sentry readers were aware of more than just her passion for baking and decorating. She talked about the importance of getting involved

#### OKAY I'M STUCK. NOW WHAT?

North Dakota winters have a tendency to be severe, and bad weather came come on very fast, with little or no warning!

Even the experienced and safest drivers can find themselves temporarily stranded on North Dakota roadways, whether they be interstates, highways, or county roads. The Safety Office offers the following life-saving tips drivers should remember if they're trapped in their vehicle during a blizzard or stranded on the road during severe cold weather.

Stay in the vehicle. Don't leave the vehicle to search for help. The highway patrol advises to stay put. It is very easy for people to get disoriented when battling blowing and drifting snow. Being lost in open country during a blizzard is extremely dangerous. In a vehicle, people have shelter from the elements and are most likely to be found a lot faster.

Be seen. Display a trouble sign on the vehicle. Hang a brightly colored cloth on the vehicle's radio antenna and raise the hood. Using the headlights also makes the vehicle more visible to emergency crews, but use them sparingly to avoid draining the battery.

Avoid overexertion and exposure. Overexertion from trying to push a vehicle out of a snow drift, shoveling heavy drifts and performing other difficult tasks during strong winds, blinding snow and bitter cold may lead to a heart attack -- even for people who are in good physical condition.

Beware of carbon monoxide poisoning. Run the engine sparingly. Keep a window open

for ventilation, and ensure the vehicle's exhaust pipe isn't blocked with snow.

Conserve your vehicle's fuel. Allow the vehicle to run only long enough for the interior to get warm.


Keep moving. Use minor exercises to keep up circulation and stay warm. Try not to stay in one position for too long.
