Airmen from Minot Air Force Base exit an Atlas Air Boeing 767 aircraft at RAF Fairford, England, Feb. 8, 2025. The arrival marks the main passenger movement of Airmen deployed in support of Bomber Task Force Europe 25-2. While deployed, the unit will operate as the 69th Expeditionary Bomb Sauadron and will integrate with NATO Allies and other international partners to synchronize capabilities and assure security commitments across the U.S. European Command area of responsibility.

RAMSTEIN AIR BASE, Germany --

U.S. Air Force B-52H Stratofortress strategic bombers have arrived in Europe as part of a routine Bomber Task Force-Europe deployment, underscoring the U.S.' shared commitment to regional security and NATO's collective defense.

Throughout the deployment, the bombers will participate in a series of exercises and training flights alongside Allied air forces, building cohesion and sharpening collective capabilities.

"Bomber Task Force missions

reinforce ability rapidly project combat power, demonstrating U.S. lethality and readiness in a dynamic security environment," said Maj. Gen. Joseph Campo, U.S. Air Forces in Europe – Air Forces Africa Director of Operations, Strategic Deterrence and Nuclear Integration. "Training alongside our Allies and partners ensures seamless integration, enhancing our collective deterrence and warfighting capability across Europe and Africa."

While transiting into Europe, the U.S. aircraft conducted a

routine mission with France, Sweden and Finland.

While deployed, the bomber aircraft will continue to integrate with NATO Allies and partners, conducting joint training missions designed to enhance interoperability and readiness across the theater. This integration highlights the importance of dynamic force employment, which ensures U.S. forces are strategically postured deter aggression while adapting to the evolving security environment. The missions will also demonstrate the bombers'

ability to operate from multiple forward locations, exemplifying EUCOM's approach to agility and dynamic force employment.

"Training with NATO allies strengthens our ability to operate as one team," said Lt. Col. Joseph Cangealose, commander 69th Expeditionary Bomb Squadron. "These missions reinforce our partnerships and prepare us to deliver decisive capabilities whenever and wherever they're needed."

Minot Air Force Base Announces **Economic Impact of Over \$651** Million for Minot Area in 2024

MINOT AREA CHAMBER EDC (MACEDC)

At the Minot Area Chamber (MACEDC) February 13 Military Affairs Committee meeting, the Budget Office of the 5th Bomb Wing Comptroller presented the annual economic impact analysis report for Minot Air Force Base (MAFB). This annual report is significant as it quantifies the influence that MAFB personnel and their families have on careers, housing, and spending in the Minot area.

The group revealed that the total economic impact in 2024 was \$651,609,473. Minot Air Force Base is the largest employer in Ward County, responsible for 6,479 jobs that include active duty military personnel, air force reserve members, and civilian employees who report in from the base as well as the local area. It is approximated that the total worth of base affiliated jobs was over \$118 million. The report also included information about

military retirees.

"Minot isn't Minot without Minot Air Force Base, and the release of this yearly report lays out just how important the base is to our community and state,' said Brekka Kramer, MACEDC President | CEO. "Military has an economic impact of around \$1.2 billion in North Dakota. Minot Air Force Base provides over half of that, playing a vital role in our national defense and our state economy."


Not only does MAFB contribute a clear economic influence on the local economy, but officials also highlighted the demographic impact on the Minot area. Overall, 12,825 people made up the Minot Air Force Base population including military personnel, their families, and civilian employees. While MAFB has homes available, it was revealed approximately 92% of active duty & reserve members,

along with their families, live off base and contribute to the housing market of the Minot area. The estimated number of indirect jobs contributed to MAFB was 2,015.

Kramer shared that MAFB contributes so much more in its mission to protect our nation. "We are so thankful to all who serve and grateful for those who call the Minot area home, whether it be for a few months

lifetime. We as a community and state continue to do what we can to support military and make North Dakota the most military friendly state in the nation."

By the time you sit down do read the Northern Sentry, hopefully the very coldest weather of this horribly awful cold snap is behind us. I often think that the folks on the national and local TV networks look ahead and give us a ray of hope for improving weather conditions. The fact is...there is no way to go but up, right?

So, let's look on the positive side of those -36 degree temperatures:

- 1) We could have been living in Bottineau where according to one local weather monitoring station it was -45 degrees, without wind chill!
- 2) We didn't have a lot of wind. The lowest wind chill I heard was -65 degrees.
- 3) According to Col Schlabach there wasn't a mosquito in site.

Time To Think Positive?

4) There is hope for warmer weather on the horizon, if we can just make it through this week.

5) If your car started on the morning of February 18th, more than likely it will start in almost

6) You probably learned where your engine heater cord is located on your car. And if you didn't find one, take heart in the fact that installing one will now seem to make sense.

7) You can use -36 degrees (or event -45 degrees) as a benchmark for letting folks know you are doing OK. Start with "I lived through -36 degrees, I can live through anything...

8) Not saying that it has never happened, but this is unusually cold for the middle of February.

9) And finally...the conversation about the weather was quickly replaced this morning with conversation about the price of eggs. We can see an end to bitterly cold weather; but the price of eggs may go up, again. Who has ever heard of eggs being \$11.00 a dozen? My Maddock math says that's .92 cents an egg. I heard a guy joking at breakfast that he had to start making one egg omelets.

I kind of look at this cold snap and in my North Dakota survivor mode talk about 2 weeks of temperatures below zero, or -90 degree wind chill, and at my age you can point to a year and say "do you remember the winter of 1965? Boy was it cold!"

I also did a short stint working

in the Northwest Territories when I was younger. Up there, they build power lines in the winter because there are no flies to torment them. You also kind of laugh a bit at the cold in that if you spit, and your spit does not freeze and crack before it hits the ground, it's not - 65 degrees (below zero). It's kind of like this morning where a teacher in a small school in northern North Dakota did the bucket of water test. Through a bucket of warm water into the air, and it's so cold that it turns to ice crystals before it hits the ground. Perspective, right?

My final thought on cold weather is...you never have to stop and think about where you put your hat and gloves? More than likely you are wearing them...

UPSIDE DOWN UNDER

Four days before my birthday and five days before I signed up for my Army pension in 2018, I was diagnosed with small cell renal cell carcinoma, commonly known as kidney cancer.

I was shoveling snow one day and got chest pains. I went to the clinic in Kenmare and x-rays revealed one spot on each lung. I was transferred to Minot for a CT scan and that's when it was revealed; a malignant tumor almost the size of the kidney itself.

It has metastasized into my lungs. My heart was just fine and the pain was caused by the cancer that had now spread.

At 59 years old it was devastating and my wife will tell you I was completely distraught. She almost immediately started making phone calls and set up an appointment to see a urologist at Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn.

Six years later that same urologist, Bradley Leibovich, who eventually removed my left kidney, told me I was cancer free on a cold Friday morning in downtown Rochester. I didn't think my mind or body was capable of being that relaxed.

As you might imagine, I spent a lot of time in the cancer library at Mayo Clinic. Dr. Leibovich told me in the initial consult that attitude is half the battle and that knowledge is power. So I took it literally and burned up any free time I had in that Mayo Clinic campus library.

What it came down to is my message today. My cancer was found accidently because of chest pains. And all too often that's how so many cancers are discovered. I remember the doctor in Minot who crushed me with the diagnosis asking me if there was any blood in my urine. Years later, I asked Dr.

Leibovich that same question and he told me had their been blood in the urine, it would have been

No, there wasn't any blood in the urine, there was no pain, other than the chest discomfort exasperated by the shoveling of snow, there was no pinching, no bulge around my kidneys, no other pain, no lower back pain; absolutely no indication that a tumor was growing on a

Urology and oncology went right to work. I was prescribed a drug called Cabozantinib that created numerous side effects but shrunk the tumor. I took that pill for 10 months and on Good Friday, 2019, urology staff called and said it was time for surgery.

One of the side effects was intense fatigue and I jokingly told my boss one day "don't be surprised if you come back from lunch and find me asleep at my desk." And that actually happened three times during the 10 months I took that drug.

But that was the attitude Dr. Leibovich talked about. People who get cancer deal with it in many different ways. Mine was to try to stay as optimistic as the urology staff, use humor when it was warranted and discuss it openly since it was my own belief that was the best way to deal with the trauma.

Mine is only one example of tens of thousands of scenarios that are created from a cancer diagnosis. They all have one thing in common, warning signs. Although mine was quite subtle, nonetheless, it was a sign that something was wrong with my body.

And, as we age, those signs may become more frequent so I implore you that if you have an unusual pain, sore, cough; whatever it is, see a doctor before it may be too late. Regardless of what has to be done, radiation, chemotherapy, surgery; caught early enough, cancer can and does get stopped.

Since March 12, 2018, I've thought a lot about the people in my hometown we've lost to cancer, My mother Agnes being one of them. Like myself, she went to Mavo Clinic, but in her case, it was too late. Colon cancer had spread to her lungs and the technology wasn't available in 1995 to save her. And by the time she was "forced" to see a doctor, it was too late.





Painter with a Passion: **Krystal Kennedy**

What does it take to be called an artist? Let's ask Krystal Kennedy, spouse of MSgt Rorick Kennedy from the 69th Bomber Generation Squadron (previously the 69th Maintenance Unit-Aircraft AMU). Krystal has been proudly called an "Artist" for years thanks to her beautiful, commissioned watercolor art pieces all over the base, the city of Minot, and the

It all started back when Krystal was growing up. As a child, she could often be found in her room, sketchbook in hand, drawing her surroundings. She confirmed by chuckling that, "I drew my bedroom a lot..." Even back then, she knew art was her passion. Her artistic passion catapulted in 1999 when she entered and won a white tiger drawing contest from the boy band N'SYNC. She was awarded a stuffed white tiger toy with all the band members' autographs on the tag. After that win, Krystal was sold on using art to communicate her talent. But it took many years, lots of research and practice later for her to evolve her art into what it is today.

The Kennedy family has been stationed at Minot for five years and they imagine several more years here before retirement. But, it was right as they PCS'd to Minot when Krystal really had the time to develop her artwork and discover her new favorite medium: watercolors. As a busy mom to four kids, Krystal was finally able to hone in on her skills, and devote time to the craft. Since then, she has created an Etsy shop and a website. She also participates in "The Big One Art and Craft Fair" Minot's bivearly arts and craft expo to get exposure for her pieces.

Krystal has created hundreds of watercolor works of art. She explained that her most popular art pieces are those of the B-52. Because this is a local favorite, she also sells cards and stickers of the B-52 prints at her shop. In addition to her Air Force themed work, Krystal also sells and commissions artwork in which customers can request her to paint nearly anything out of watercolor paints.

commissioned pieces, Krystal is very diligent in giving each work the time it deserves. She said a commissioned piece usually takes about 4 weeks. During that time she receives the concept from the client, gives them a basic sketch of the idea, gets approval, and then starts painting. She mentioned that she also likes to send progress photos to the client so they can see how the watercolor is going. As far as pricing, Krystall confirmed that every piece is different based on size, complexity and other factors, but generally a customized 8x10 watercolor piece will run about

Kystal has cherished every custom art piece she is able to create, but a few specific ones stand out to her. She explained about a piece she designed in 2019 to raise money for her niece, who was diagnosed with a rare disease. Krystal also talked about how the artwork that means something special to her clients are the ones she loves to paint the most. A few years ago, she was asked to paint a portrait for a fallen Airman's memorial. She explained how that piece will forever be meaningful for her.

Krystal has now developed into a nearly full-time artist and she lives out her dream with her very

own home studio. Currently, she is taking new commission clients as well as has her online shop open for print sales. She hopes to one day offer watercolor classes to the base community, but for now she loves life as a full-time mom and full-time artist.

THIS WEEK IN USAF HISTORY

FIRST USAF WOMEN TO ATTAIN PERMANENT RANK OF COLONEL FEBRUARY 29, 1968

After Public Law 90-130 was signed by President Lyndon Johnson on November 8, 1967, Major General Jeanne M. Holm and Colonel Helen O'Day became the first women promoted to the permanent rank of colonel in the United States Air Force. Gen. Holm enlisted in the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps in 1942. In 1949, she transferred to the USAF. She was appointed director of Women in the Air Force, Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff, Personnel, in November of 1965. Gen. Holm helped

to modernize Air Force policies for women and expanded their job opportunities. Col. O'Dayjoined the WAACin July 1943. She was promoted to major in 1951, and became the first woman assigned to the Air Force Legislative Liaison Office in the House of Representatives. For six years, she served in Paris before retiring in July of 1967. She came back to active duty as one of the first female colonels soon after President Johnson signed the new law into effect, which lifted many promotion restrictions for Air Force women. Maj. Gen. Holm and Col. O'Day are two USAF women who broke many glass ceilings throughout their careers, and spearheaded the progress of women in the Air Force to where it stands today. 

Military Families Are Struggling: Challenges with the TriWest Switch

The recent transition for the TRICARE West Region from Health Net Federal Services, LLC to TriWest Healthcare Alliance for military families, effective January 1, 2025, seems to have created significant challenges for service members, veterans, and their families. Tricare is a health insurance program for military personnel and their families, which operates several subtypes. The most popular, Tricare Prime, is known for its strict requirement of Primary Care Manager (PCM) referrals for specialty clinics. In other words, if patients want their specialty care covered by insurance, they must first obtain a referral through their PCM and TriWest. While TriWest aims to provide military families and veterans with access to high-quality care through its network of dedicated community providers, many military families across the country are reporting increased frustration difficulty navigating the new health care contract.

TriWest Healthcare The Alliance referral process and transition are a critical part of patients accessing healthcare, and this has led to complications for those who rely on Tricare Prime. Military families now face new deadlines and complex procedures for obtaining referrals, with some experiencing severe delays or being unable to resolve issues at all. For those with urgent medical needs, such delays have been more than an inconvenience—they've become a significant burden.

According to the Defense Health Agency, the referral process has changed under TriWest management, more stringent introducing timelines and requirements. In the article "Pentagon Scrambles for Fixes as Tricare Beneficiaries in the Western U.S. Hit with Contractor Issues," written by Patricia Kime, Military. com she shared a provider concern, "TriWest published a new directory that did not include many providers under the previous contractor." This means many families who had previous care under providers covered before could lose access if the provider is not included under the TriWest contract. They would also have to get a new referral, establish care with a new provider, and possibly experience delays. However, the agency also acknowledged that these adjustments have not been consistently communicated to beneficiaries, leading to confusion and frustration.

Karlee Tillery, a military spouse from Minot AFB, has been vocal about her struggles with the recent changes to TriWest. Her experience sheds light on the personal frustration many military families are enduring. "TriWest has been awful. The

amount of people having issues right now is astronomical," Mrs. Tillery elaborated by saying, "I tried to call and change our son's referral to the right doctor, and I was on hold for six hours over two days. The first day, they transferred me four times, and not once could they get me to the referral line. Then, the last person I spoke to said, 'Sorry. the referral line is now closed."

Despite her persistent efforts to resolve the issue, Mrs. Tillery was left without a solution, and her

family is now facing the financial strain of paying out-of-pocket for necessary medical tests.

"I still never got it resolved, and we'll likely pay \$750 out of pocket for Abel's tests, even though we have Tricare Prime and had a referral from his PCM on base," Mrs. Tillery shared.

The Tillery's experience is far from unique. Across the country, military families are reporting similar difficulties, ranging from long wait times on the phone to a lack of clarity about new referral processes and deadlines. Many report that, despite having Tricare Prime and a valid referral from their primary care manager (PCM), they are still unable to access care or have their referrals honored. TriWest President and CEO David J. McIntyre in a letter addressed to Tricare Providers acknowledged that the switch to their management system has led to operational challenges, but the organization also reports that they are actively working to improve their customer service response times.

"The referral line is supposed to be a straightforward process," said Mrs. Tillery. "But for so many of us, it's just been an endless loop of waiting and getting transferred, without getting any real help. It's frustrating and overwhelming, especially when our children's health is at stake."

McIntyre also acknowledged complaints and the steps being taken by TriWest: "At TriWest, we are committed to ensuring the highest quality health care services, and we are currently undertaking a plan to remedy items that impact the provider community. Immediate steps we've taken include adding more staff to our operations, assessing and tightening up our data, improving provider information in the provider directory, updating our portals, and streamlining our authorization and referral processes. Improvements to these and other items are our primary

The transition to TriWest has been far from seamless. As the deadline for certain referrals and appointments approaches, many military families have been left anxiously wondering whether they'll be able to access the care they need in a timely and affordable manner.

On January 23, 2025 according to Military.com "DHA issued a waiver that allows Tricare Prime beneficiaries to receive

outpatient specialty care without preapproval from TriWest. Individuals still need to get a referral for care from their primary care provider, but they don't need TriWest's approval through March 31".

As TriWest works to address the concerns raised by military families, the hope is that those who rely on the system will soon be able to experience the high level of service they were promised when the changes were first introduced.

Lieutenant Rachel Folsom, the Tricare Operations and Patient Administration Flight Commander for Minot AFB shared for information for Minot AFB service members and families having referral or payment issues with TriWest Alliance, Heathcare issues with referrals members and family members can come to the Minot AFB Medical Facility Tricare office located on the first floor of the or call at 701-723-5633." Lt Folsom also shared that a post with updated referral information was posted on the AFMS-Minot-5th Medical Group Facebook page on January 28, 2025 regarding the referral process and date extension. Members can also reach out to Tricare TriWest Healthcare Alliance through their TriWest website if they have any questions or their phone number 1-888-TRIWEST (1-888-874-9378) if they want to go directly with the contractor.

Lieutenant Rachel Folsom, the Tricare Operations and Patient Administration Flight Commander for Minot AFB, shared important information for Minot AFB service members and families who are experiencing issues with referrals or payments through TriWest Healthcare Alliance. "If there are any issues with referrals and/or payments, service members and their families can visit the Tricare office located on the first floor of the Minot AFB Medical Facility or call 701-723-5633.'

Lt. Folsom also mentioned that an update regarding the referral process and date extension was posted on the AFMS-Minot-5th Medical Group Facebook page on January 28, 2025.



The MAFB Club: From Heritage Based to Family Focused

The Army established its first "mess clubs," in the early 19th century. But military clubs and social organizations for military members and their families, did not come into prominence until after World War II. These clubs offered a sense of exclusivity and prestige to the officers and enlisted who remained in the armed forces after the conclusion of the conflict at a time when active duty pay was relatively low. They also began to serve an important informal function: they acted as a "third place" that minimized rank hierarchies in a way that enabled mentorship to thrive and heritage to be passed on. However, financial and cultural changes meant that clubs, such as the Jimmy Doolittle Center (JDC) and Rockers Bar & Grill here at Minot AFB, look a little different from those of the

Starting in the 1980s, congress removed funding for clubs from the defense budget, forcing them to have to operate out of their own profits. This shift to non-appropriate funds (NAF) was followed by other changes such as a push to de-emphasize alcohol as part of military culture. Military clubs also experienced greater competition from off-base dining options in the ensuing decades. Those who have been around for a while might still recall the monthslong "member drives" of years past. Those drives were an effort to help keep the old club system profitable and able to continue to provide the services members and their families expected.

The most significant change, however, has been that most military installations now offer an "All Ranks" or combined club. While 2001 is often mentioned as the date where Officer and Enlisted Clubs combined here at MAFB, Julie Reiten, Supervisory Librarian at the MAFB library, suggests that, based on old newspaper articles, it appeared to have been a more gradual transition. She noted that, "Even before the enlisted club became J.R. Rockers on June 23, 2000, they start referring to the JDC as the JDC, not the Officers' Club though they left the "Officers" designation on the Ground Zero Lounge for longer." From then on, more and more events became designated as "All Ranks" and by 2004 Airmen were directed to go to either facility to join the club. Over time, less events were held at the JDC, and most of the fun shifted over to the renovated Rockers Bar and Grill. The JDC is still available to rent for private events and utilized for military functions such as Changes this: Fun Fridays (previously known as First Fridays.)

Fun Fridays are a once-a-month base celebration where old school Air Force culture and heritage intersect with the modern emphasis on quality-of-life programming. Active duty members can stop by at the bar for a quick drink with co-workers before heading home or gather to celebrate major unit achievements. This was the case at February 7th's event, where many gathered to celebrate a successful end to MAFB's Nuclear Surety Inspection (NSI) and those who were lucky may have even enjoyed a drink courtesy of their leadership, who will often put money on the bar when celebrating unit milestones. In addition to bar service on Fun Fridays, which is available until 9:00 pm, families can enjoy dinner service from 4:30 to 6:30, bouncy castles, and

additional crafts and activities put on by various base organizations. While a club membership is not required to participate (dinner is \$10 for individuals or \$30 per family,) club members and their families eat for free, one of many membership perks.

Club membership these days is less about exclusivity and formality and more about meeting the needs of the base community through quality-of-life programs. Like the dinner at Fun Fridays, these services are available to the community at large, but come with additional perks for those with a club membership that extend across all Air Force Installations. A complete list of MAFB member benefits can be found at the 5th Force Support Squadron Website https://5thforcesupport.com/ club-membership/) and include things like a monthly free lunch at Rocker's or the Bomber Bistro, and discounts at establishments such as the Arts & Crafts Center and Rough Riders Lanes. Monthly rates are based on rank which makes club membership within reach of anyone who hopes to support their club and the base

community.

Choosing to support the Club and other businesses on base such as the Arts and Crafts Center is a way to invest back into the base community as NAF funds also support operations such as the base library, pools, and other quality-of-life programs. To join your local club or transfer an existing membership from a previous club, individuals can visit their local FSS Website or head directly to the Member Planet Website.







B-52s Fly Across Middle East, Drop Live Munitions

Two U.S. Air Force B-52 Stratrofortress bombers over the Middle East in a "force projection" demonstration Feb. 17, U.S. Central Command (CENTCOM) announced.

The two B-52s began their mission at RAF Fairford, U.K., before flying across Europe and through the airspace of nine partner nations, according to CENTCOM. The command did not specify which nations those were, a common practice given regional tensions and sensitivities.

The B-52 mission also included "live munitions drops at ranges in several partner nations," the command said in a news release. The B-52s flew with American F-15E Strike Eagles, which are based in the Middle East, and "four partner nations provided fighter escorts for the bombers throughout the mission," CENTCOM said. Again, those partner nations were not publicly identified.

"Bomber Task Force missions demonstrate U.S. power projection capability, commitment to regional security, and ability to respond to any state or non-state actor seeking to broaden or escalate conflict in the CENTCOM region," Army Gen. Michael "Erik" Kurilla, CENTCOM's commander, said in a statement.

The B-52s involved in the Feb. 17 long-range mission over the Middle East are part of a Bomber Task Force deployed to Europe, BTF 25-2, which kicked off last week.

The B-52 mission came after the Navy aircraft carrier USS Harry S. Truman, which had been operating in the Red Sea and Gulf of Aden since mid-December, recently left the region. On Feb. 16, the U.S. Sixth Fleet said the Truman is currently in Souda Bay, Greece, for repairs after colliding with a merchant tanker off the coast of Egypt on Feb. 12.

Since Hamas' Oct. 7, 2023, attack on Israel, the U.S. has maintained an increased force presence in the Middle East, primarily to deter Iran and its proxies. U.S. aircraft have defended Israel against direct attacks from Iran, conducted airstrikes against the Houthis in Yemen, and attacked Islamic State targets in Iraq and Syria.

In November, the U.S. temporarily deployed six B-52 to the Middle East, along with extra F-15Es, following the departure of the USS Abraham Lincoln aircraft carrier to provide additional airpower. Those B-52s conducted combat missions, including participating in airstrikes against Islamic State in Syria in December, before returning home before the end of the year. The deployment was the first time B-52s had been based in CENTCOM since 2019. The Pentagon has also surged additional assets, including more fighters, to the region during acute periods of tension over the

past year and a half.

Four B-52s from the 69th Expeditionary Bomb Squadron at Minot Air Force Base, N.D., deployed to RAF Fairford for the task force, and some of the B-52s have already flown missions with European NATO allies in addition to the CENTCOM sortie. The B-52s that conducted the flight over the Middle East were tail number 60-0023 and tail number 60-0044, according to open-source flight tracking data.

In a separate action Feb. 15, the U.S. conducted a "precision airstrike" in northwest Syria, in northwest Syria, targeting a senior official in Hurras al-Din (HaD), an al-Qaida affiliate, CENTCOM said. The U.S. military has stepped up its airstrikes against that group as well as the fighters and infrastructure from the Islamic State as it tries to prevent militants from taking advantage of instability in Syria following the fall of the regime of Bashar Al Assad in December. The U.S. has also taken advantage of the newly permissive airspace above Syria after the collapse of the Syrian military and the withdrawal of many Russian forces. President Donald Trump praised the recent airstrike in Syria and congratulated CENTCOM in a post on social media.

"We will continue to relentlessly pursue terrorists in order to defend our homeland," Kurilla said in a Feb. 16 statement.





School Boards are responsible for the education of local children and address a wide array of issues to include establishing spending priorities, approving budgets, adopting school calendars, approving staffing changes, responding to changes in education law, and advocating for the needs of students, families, teachers and staff. Members work closely with the district superintendent and other administration and serve as public figures to support and respond to the needs of their communities.

For the Minot Air Force Base, School Board District #160 serves in this capacity. School board member duties include, using state and federal funds to ensure that the students on-base continue to receive the best education possible within the laws of the North Dakota Century Code, addressing concerns or questions from district families, and voting on matters that affect schools both on and off the installation. The Minot Air Force Base School Board is a coterminous school board that works alongside Minot Public Schools, School Board, District #1 with the mission of "Empowering all

learners to succeed in a changing

Minot Air Force Base, School Board District #160 and Minot Public Schools, School Board, District #1 consist of five board members, each member serves a three-year term. For the Minot Air Force Base, School Board, District #160 there are three position requirements for members. These include 1) Member must reside on the installation 2) Member may be active duty enlisted, a reservist, or a dependent family member. Officers are not eligible to serve as school board members pursuant DoDD 1344.10, Para 4.2.2.4. 3. Members cannot be an employee of Minot Public Schools.

The Minot AFB School Board often has to fill vacancies due to member resignations related to the military lifestyle. If a member of the board resigns that position is filled to serve out the remaining portion of that term. Currently, the Minot AFB School Board has an open position. 

Minot Task Force 21 Forms Sentinel Working Group in Preparation of Modernization Project

The Minot Area Chamber EDC (MACEDC) has formed a Sentinel Working Group under Task Force 21 (TF21). The Sentinel Working Group consists of four TF21 members that include Mark Jantzer, Jason Zimmerman, Brekka Kramer, and Cassidy Hjelmstad as the group's chair. This working group will be crucial as TF21 prepares the state and our community for this major

"Sentinel is one of the largest modernization projects that has ever been undertaken by the Department of Defense, and we know a focused effort is needed to support this project. What's unique about Sentinel is the scale and scope of construction off-base," said Pete Hankla, TF21 Chair. "The working group is the go-to for information regarding Sentinel updates and details for the local community and state leaders."

Sentinel is the weapon system proposed to replace the aging Minuteman III intercontinental ballistic missile system. It represents the modernization of the land-based leg of the U.S. nuclear triad and would extend its capabilities. On-base construction will focus on construction or modifying facilities and infrastructure as necessary to support Sentinel maintenance, training, storage, testing, and support at Minot Air Force Base.

Off-base construction includes the missile alert facilities, renovation of all 150 existing launch facilities in the missile fields in North Dakota, launch centers, utility corridors, communications towers, and more.

"I'm thrilled to have the opportunity to lead this group as the United States ushers in a new era of nuclear deterrence," said Cassidy Hjelmstad, TF21 Sentinel Working Group Chair. "It's crucial that as technology advances, we stay ahead of the curve to ensure the strength and reliability of our nation's nuclear deterrence. At Task Force 21, we remain committed to educating the public and advocating for the resources necessary to support this mission. Keeping our community informed and engaged is essential as we move forward with this nextgeneration deterrence system."

TF21 is looking toward the future as the military continues to modernize its nuclear enterprise. TF21 will continue to educate the local community, state officials, members of Congress and the public on national security issues, particularly ones that affect Minot Air Force Base, Air Force Global Strike Command, and the U.S. Air



They glistened like hidden treasures awaiting discovery.

Lying in the bottom of a coulee, they beckoned to be released them from their fate, which would probably have provided food and nourishment for a happy rodent.

The treasure? A pair of bull moose antler sheds.

The sheds were precious, they begged to be appreciated because, given their size, they probably were this bull's most valuable set of antlers. They meant this young moose survived his first winter on the North Dakota prairie.

That little set of moose sheds now lay nestled on an end table. Perhaps that's an indication they're not exactly the biggest moose antlers when they fit neatly on a piece of furniture. That's OK; they're a matched set of antlers, shed side-by-side by a bull moose.

That's what makes shed hunting such an amazing activity. Well, that and other things.

Things like being able to get outside after winter eases into spring, getting exercise, and watching warmth and longer, lingering days eek their release from winter's grasp. Granted, that welcome warmth may come in February or it may arrive in May...time will tell.

It's taking the dogs along so they get exercise, hoping they don't find too much mud and icky things to roll in on their own personal treasure hunt.

It's the opportunity to marvel at creatures that each year grow and shed antlers. Think about the energy and nutrients needed for a bull moose or elk to grow antlers of any size in a matter of a few months. Even growing those little sheds on that table put demands on that young bull.

It's not a minor feat for deer to grow antlers, either.

There is an art to shed hunting. It involves knowing and understanding deer, elk, and moose movements in winter; knowing what to look for — things like game trails or perhaps across from a fence should antlers pop off as a deer lands, for

But with the enjoyment of shed hunting comes a huge responsibility to the wildlife and habitat they call home wherever one meanders in search of antlers.

Yet there can be - and sadly is at times - a deep, dark, disgusting side to shed hunting.

While the true art of shed hunting is doing it properly and appreciate nature and wildlife, there are those who drag shed hunting into an ugly pit.

Winter is typically the most stressful time of year for wildlife of all sizes, shapes, and types. Consider that it's tough on people to be out in wind, cold, snow, and ice - even with proper

And, yes, wildlife is usually well-adapted to life in the Northern Great Plains but that doesn't mean it's easy in even the mildest of winters. There are always challenges, whether it's from predation, a sudden unrelenting storm, or a vehicle

encounter.

Some shed hunters show no regard to the stress cold temperatures and snow place on all animals as they struggle to move through snowdrifts, scratch and paw ice-crusted snow for food, and are pushed from valuable winter shelter providing much needed thermal cover in brutally cold temperatures and wind.

Perhaps worst of all are those who scout areas where deer and elk congregate, even pushing animals so they can be present when antlers drop.

Oftentimes, those people are merely looking for the dollar signs attached to a detached antler.

There is a reason the Wyoming Game and Fish Department closed some Hunter Management Areas (HMA) to all public access in the winter. Similar to N.D. Game and Fish Department Wildlife Management Areas, several Wyoming HMAs play a critical role in providing essential big game wintering habitat. Those vital areas congregate wildlife where they can survive a Wyoming winter. But they also drew countless shed hunters, innocent and unscrupulous alike, pushing some wildlife to the brink of death and beyond.

While North Dakota's Wildlife Management Areas allow public access in the winter, activities such as snowmobiling and things that could harass and push wildlife are illegal.

Other public lands are closed to the taking of sheds any time of year, including all U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service lands, whether it's a National Wildlife Refuges or Waterfowl Production Area. Find out what is and isn't allowed on other public land, including shed hunting — U.S. Forest Service National Grasslands, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers land along Lake Sakakawea and Lake Audubon, or Bureau of Reclamation areas, for example, prior to venturing out.

Ask landowner permission if shed hunting on private land.

It's true shed hunting can be a great spring activity and a chance to reconnect with nature.

But it's equally true the dark side of shed hunting is all too common - and can be deadly for wildlife whether it has antlers or not.
