Minot Presents The State of the Base

No other installation on the planet has that responsibility. I would offer to you where Minot goes the Air Force goes. For Brekka Kramer, President/ CEO of the Minot Chamber EDC and 5th District Senator Randy Burckhard, the mission focus was simple; get the word out about Minot Air Force Base and its missions to the North Dakota State Legislature. Helping them carry that message would be Colonel Jesse Lamarand, Commander of the 5th Bomb Wing and Colonel James Schlabach, Commander 91st Missile Wing.

General Thomas Bussiere had informed those attending the Task Force 21 Nuclear Symposium in Washington, D.C. of the importance of Minot Air Force Base, and carrying that message to North Dakota, and in particular the North Dakota Legislature, was crucial.

"Having my fellow North Dakota Legislators understand the importance of our military installations is critical, especially now with the modernization of our nuclear enterprise underway", said Senator Randy Burckhard. "As an Air Force Global Strike Command Civic Leader and member of Task Force 21, we've been tasked with educating and advocating the importance of the nuclear triad and strategic deterrence, especially as we prepare for Sentinel."

Taking center stage with Colonels Lamarand and Schlabach would be Colonel Timothy A. Monroe, Commander, 319th Reconnaissance Wing, Grand Forks Air Force Base. Helping to orchestrate the special presentation would not only be Senator Burckhard, but Senator Scott Meyer of Grand Forks.

Senator Burkhard introduced the Minot wing commanders;

"Honorable colleagues, it is my great honor to introduce the two Wing Commanders from Minot Air Force Base. Colonel Jesse Lamarand is the commander of the 5th Bomb Wing where he ensures the wing's combat readiness, strategic deterrence, and long-range, world-wide, strike capability. He is a Master Combat Systems Officer with more than 2,300 flight hours primarily in the B-52H, including 279 combat hours. He has deployed around the world throughout his career and took command at Minot in June of 2024. His command also manages the base and provides logistics support to the 91st Missile Wing. Colonel Jimmy Schlabach is the commander of the 91st Missile Wing, leading the land-based Intercontinental Ballistic Mission there since he took command in June of 2024. He is a master nuclear missile operator with more than 7,200 hours of strategic nuclear alert duty in the Minuteman III weapons system. Gentlemen, thank you for your leadership and taking the time to speak to us today.

Each commander spoke in the House chambers for about 15 minutes. Col's Lamarand and Schlabach highlighted their missions and shared important



UPSIDE DOWN UNDER

There's an article in this month's National Arbor Day Foundation newsletter that features a small town in North Dakota alongside New York City.

The article is called "From The Big Apple to a Little-Known North Dakota Town." It's a look into two vastly different communities benefiting from the same iconic Arbor Day Foundation program.

The North Dakota community is Sibley, in Barnes County, near Lake Ashtabula. Sibley was founded in 1959 and has a population of 20 people.

According to the Arbor Day newsletter, "Sibley has been a recognized Tree City for 12 consecutive years, and much of the needed tree care happens within Tootsville Park thanks to support from grant funding.

"And while Tree City USA recognition provides cities with a level of credibility and legitimacy when applying for grant dollars, it's not the only reason they apply each year. Annual recognition is about connecting with the community's history. One of the first things Sibley's founders did was plant trees.'

New York, obviously, is in stark contrast to Sibley in many ways. It has 8.65 million people and it boasts hundreds of parks, including Central Park. New York City has received Tree City USA recognition for 28 years in a row and Tree Cities of the World for five years.

Yes, Sibley, North Dakota and New York, New York and quite different, but they have one thing in common, a tireless dedication to caring for their trees.

The National Arbor Day

Well done North Dakota...

Foundation's Tree City USA program started in 1976 and has recognized a total of 3,577 cities with 998,000 trees planted.

Numerous communities across North Dakota have been designated Tree City USA through the years and some have been doing it a long time. They include Bismarck, 47 years, Bottineau, 36 years, Cando, 35 years, Devils Lake, 44 years, Dickinson and Ellendale, 31 years, Fargo, 47 years, Jamestown and Carrington, 34 years, Hazen, 37 years, Langdon 39 years, Mandan, 48 years, Valley City, 36 years, Wahpeton, 40 years and Williston, 43 years.

In addition to Sibley, other small communities receiving Tree City USA designation include Arthur, 14 years, Cavalier Air Station, 27 years, Cooperstown, 36 years, Granville, 31 years, Kindred, 3 years, Lakota, 14 years, Lankin, 28 years, McVille, 27 years, New Rockford, 33 years, Pekin, 29 years, Powers Lake, 1 year, Rutland, 7 years, Tower City, 6 years, Walhalla, 27 years, Washburn, 16 years and Wishek, 7 years.

Well done, North Dakota!

To qualify as a Tree City USA community, you must meet four standards established by the Arbor Day Foundation and the National Association of State Foresters.

No. 1: A tree board or department has to be established that could include the mayor and/or city council or residents at large.

No. 2: The community must have a public tree care ordinance.

No. 3: A community must have a forestry program with an annual budget of at least \$2 per capita. No. 4: An Arbor Day observation

and proclamation must be observed. For some those qualifications

can be a challenge, but Sibley has met the challenge time and time again. The locals strongly believe in what they are doing and the progress shows.

Several states have similar state programs, but they don't match the rapport of the National


Arbor Day Foundation, with headquarters located in Lincoln,

Any community can become a Tree City USA. Just Google "Tree City USA" and a website will pop up with some pertinent information. Meet the four qualifications and your community too can receive the designation.

There isn't a rule regarding what kind of trees should be planted, but numerous cities encourage the planting of fruit trees such as apple, pear or plum

SHE'S NOT FROM AROUND HERE

As I sit down to type, I'm munching on complimentary Biscoff cookies, sipping strong coffee from a small paper cup, and balancing my laptop on a rickety tray table. We're on a return flight to North Dakota after spending a week in northern Indiana visiting family.

Every time we take this trip, I think about the conversations I've had over the years with other military families, particularly other wives. Building a life in the place where orders have sent us—while also maintaining long-distance relationships with family and friends back home—is complicated and emotional.

We expect deployments and frequent moves. We expect long-distance relationships, FaceTime calls, and cross-country visits. But what comes as a surprise is how difficult it can be to shoulder the burden of making these visits happen.

I've been a military spouse for 15 years, and I've got a confession to make: I love seeing my family, but I get burned out on being the one to make the trip. I love my hometown, but sometimes I resent spending our vacation days traveling to the same place instead of exploring somewhere new. I value family bonds, but I struggle with putting my responsibilities on

hold while we travel.

For military families, keeping these relationships healthy can seem one-sided because we take on the full weight of planning, budgeting, and coordinating these trips. If I'm being totally honest, sometimes I leave Indiana frustrated that others don't make visiting us in Minot the priority we make visiting them. I know I'm not alone in this. It's a conversation I've shared with countless military spouses over the years.

We log thousands of miles in airports and highways, juggling time zones, travel expenses, and work schedules to make sure our kids know their grandparents, aunts, uncles, and cousins. We come "home" for holidays, during deployments, and TDYs. We navigate airports as solo parents while wielding strollers and snacks. We make it work. Because no number of miles can change the fact that family matters.

But it's exhausting. It's expensive. And it's lonely when we realize that we're the visitor more often than the visited.

The point of sharing this isn't to dwell on negativity or complain about a life I'm proud to be part of. But there's power in naming a struggle that often goes unspoken. If you've ever felt the tension of wanting to stay connected while also feeling exhausted from the effort, you're not alone.

While I can't magically grant you extra leave days or pad your travel budget, I can share a few things that have helped me navigate these feelings.

First, let your loved ones know how much it means when they choose to visit. Over the years, I've shed tears over orders—not because I disliked the assignment, but because I knew it meant living somewhere few would want to visit. Sometimes, I've wished for an assignment in a place family would be excited to explore, rather than one that requires extra convincing.

extra convincing.

While we can't force people to visit, we can tell them how much it would mean if they did. Let them know how special it is to have the experience of hosting and how much it would mean for your kids to show off their favorite park, their room, and their routine. Explain how, sometimes in this lifestyle, just staying put is the greatest gift of all. Be honest about how a visit makes it clear that your home and the life you've built matter.

Second, get educated on the unique fun this region has to offer. Find things you enjoy, and talk about them. I've always found that authentic enthusiasm is magnetic. If you need ideas, find me on Instagram and Facebook @HeyMinot where I share fun ideas almost daily, and bookmark eventsminot.com to stay on top of community happenings.

Be ready for fun, but don't stress. A great visit doesn't need to be a grand adventure—togetherness is grand all on its own. Keep nurturing relationships, making the effort, and being honest. The work you pour in to staying connected isn't going unnoticed.

On the Morning of February 20th Mike McCloud, Executive Director at the Magic City Discovery Center, went to unlock the beloved Children's Museum just as he has done on countless other mornings. What he walked into was the sound of alarm bells, half an inch of standing water, and unusually humid air. The museum had experienced a burst pipe on one of its outer walls that had spread across the main floor and leaked down into the lower level. The pipe was later estimated to have been leaking for six hours. And while the valiant effort of staff and contractors meant that museum exhibits are once again up and running, it is not simply back to business as usual for the Discovery Center.

While the exact cause remains unconfirmed, the leak did coincide with the tail end of the Arctic Blast that had hit the Magic City that week. This event caused the temperature to nosedive to a record setting 33 below zero on February 19th, the day before the leak was discovered. The museum remained closed through Monday, March 3rd, at which point the main level and second floor were once again opened to the public. This meant that families who had signed up for Dino Camp on March 5th and 6th were able to attend as planned and students were still able to stop by over Minot Public Schools' Spring Break.
Families had been able to take

ramilies had been able to take advantage of a 30% discount due to the lower level being unavailable, however this meant lost revenue for the Discovery Center. Fortunately, as of March 10th, the lower level exhibits are once again operational with the exception of the bathrooms, which had to be gutted and will need to be rebuilt.

Further damage on the lower level included the staff offices. Electronics and paperwork as well as the wiring within the walls were affected by the leak as it poured down into the space. Fortunately, it narrowly missed the adjacent server room. A makeshift office has been set up on the top floor of the building, however this has delayed other scheduled work that was to be done in that space.

Few may be aware that the Magic City Discovery Center, despite its title, is not managed by the City of Minot. As a non-profit they rely on grants, admissions, membership fees, and donations in order to operate. This also means that, despite working with insurance on damages as well as how to recoup lost revenue and wages, they are responsible for much of these costs up front. And while the full financial repercussions are not yet known, in the near term they

are responsible for covering their \$58,000 insurance deductible.

Waves to Wings: A journey through leadership

The path from enlisted service member to a commissioned officer in the U.S. military is one of determination, growth and resilience. Few embody this journey more profoundly than U.S. Air Force Colonel Rofelio Grinston, 5th Maintenance Group commander at Minot Air Force Base, whose career spans the Navy and the Air Force, showcasing the potential for enlisted personnel to rise through the ranks and lead at the highest levels.

Inspired by his grandpa's and father's service in the Navy, Grinston followed in their footsteps and enlisted in the Navy as a Sailor. Like many who take their first steps into military service, he was eager to serve but unsure where the journey would take him. Through hard work and a commitment to excellence, Grinston distinguished himself as an aviation technician among his peers, setting the foundation for his future as a leader.

Grinston's time as an Air Force officer was an exciting one. Hungry for knowledge and how to better serve his people he took on any opportunity to grow, from education, deployments and unique assignments, Grinston strives to become the expert in leadership that his troops deserved.

"We should aspire to learn more and to get a well-rounded education, to understand what's going on in the world around us," Grinston pleaded for others to strive for education. "Schooling allowed me to take on a different level of critical thinking, to think more analytically, and solve our problem sets more critically and more enduringly."

Grinston believes being an officer is about being an advocate for Airmen, being there to encourage their success and celebrate their victories.

"The Airmen who own the process, they know what's going on and they have solutions, but oftentimes their voice isn't heard. As an officer you can help elevate that voice to a higher audience," Grinston described. "I work for my Airmen, they own the process. If I don't come to work tomorrow the jets will launch just fine. If the right seven level doesn't show up tomorrow we're really constrained. So I place value on every Airman, they work to solve problems."

His time as an enlisted member gave him a unique perspective—one that shaped his leadership philosophy and deepened his connection with the Airmen under his command today. His journey is a testament to the possibilities available to those who dedicate themselves to growth. He encourages enlisted service members to set ambitious goals, take advantage of educational programs and never stop striving for excellence.


"The only limits are the ones you place on yourself," he said. "If you want to lead as an officer, take the steps to make it happen. The military provides the resources—you just have to use them."

Air Force, Northrop Grumman achieve milestone in Sentinel ICBM modernization with stage-one solid rocket motor test

The U.S. Air Force and Northrop Grumman Corporation completed a full-scale qualification static fire test of the Sentinel intercontinental ballistic missile (ICBM) stage-one solid rocket motor March 6, 2025, at Northrop Grumman's facility in Promontory, Utah.

This critical milestone further validates the motor's design and paves the way for the production and deployment of a safe, secure and reliable strategic deterrent.

"As we modernize our nuclear triad, the ICBM Systems Directorate is driven to securely deliver America's ICBM capabilities," said Brig. Gen. William Rogers, Air Force program executive officer for ICBMs and director of the Air

Force Nuclear Weapon Center's ICBM Systems Directorate. "This brings us one step closer to fielding the Sentinel weapon system, a vital component of our nation's strategic deterrence and a testament to our unwavering commitment to national security."

This test confirms the accuracy of digital engineering models and brings the stage-one solid rocket motor closer to achieving full qualification. This achievement follows static fire tests of the second and third stages, showcasing clear momentum in the Sentinel program's development.

"The entire Sentinel team is laser-focused on ensuring the program delivers on its promise of providing an unmatched strategic deterrent," said Col. Amanda Okeson, senior materiel

leader-upper and Sentinel system program manager. "This test is just one tangible example of the team's dedication and expertise as we move one step closer to completing that promise."

The test results are currently being analyzed by a team of experts from the Air Force Nuclear Weapons Center and Northrop Grumman.

The Sentinel program is modernizing the land-based leg of the U.S. nuclear triad, replacing the aging Minuteman III ICBM weapon system. This modernization effort is essential to ensuring a safe, secure and effective strategic nuclear deterrent for decades to come.

Miles of Support: Minot AFB Runners Powered by Strong Bonds

The Minot Air Force Base Running Club is gearing up for an exciting marathon season, with a little help from the Strong Bonds program. While the running club itself isn't funded by the program, Strong Bonds, a chaplain-led resiliency initiative supported by the Air Force Installation and Mission Support Center (AIMSC), is sponsoring 35 members to participate in the Fargo Marathon this year. This includes 15 full marathon runners, 15 half marathon participants, and 5 runners in the $\hat{5}k$ race. All slots were filled within the first week of registration, a testament to the enthusiasm and support for the

Strong Bonds, which has been supporting military personnel and their families in various ways since 2020, helps foster resilience through activities that strengthen relationships and build community. Chaplain Harris, a key figure in organizing these efforts, explained that Strong Bonds funds a wide range of activities for military members and their families, from marriage retreats to personal fitness events. For this particular event, the program is ensuring that participants are able to take part in the Fargo Marathon, one of the region's most anticipated running events.

"The Strong Bonds program is designed to help military members and their families strengthen bonds in a variety of areas," said Chaplain Harris. "For the Fargo Marathon, we are sponsoring 35 runners of

all levels, from full marathoners to those running a 5k. The goal is not only to promote physical fitness but to foster camaraderie and mental resilience."

The Minot Air Force Base Running Club has been a staple of the base for several years, providing an opportunity for personnel and their families to come together through a shared love of running. The club was originally established by a previous chaplain, and participants would travel to Bismarck for a marathon event that coincided with the Air Force Marathon. In previous years, participants were awarded medals from the official Air Force Marathon, further enhancing the sense of pride and unity among the runners.

Chaplain Harris shared that the running club is open to all and doesn't require participants to be training for an event. The newly built Dome "bubble" at the base has made it even easier to run together year-round, regardless of the weather conditions. Whether they're training for a marathon or simply looking to get some exercise, the club provides a welcoming space for everyone.

1st Lieutenant Cain, assigned to the 5th Civil Engenering Squadron, a dedicated member of the club, is aiming to complete the full Fargo Marathon this year. Lt Cain has been putting in consistent miles every Wednesday at the Dome, steadily working toward the big race day. Additionally, spouses of active-duty members, like Gabrielle

Greco and Lily Almalayousif, are taking part in the weekly run club sessions. Mrs. Greco and Mrs. Almalayousif, both spouses of members from the 5th Civil Engineering Squadron and 5th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron, attend the club to support their spouses while also staying active themselves.

"It's great to have a space where everyone can come together, whether you're training for a race or just out to get some steps in," said one participant. "I've been wanting to run a full marathon for a while, and having this club, along with the Dome to train in, has been incredibly helpful".

Beyond the Fargo Marathon, Strong Bonds is also supporting local races happening later this summer in Medora and Bismarck, North Dakota. 


On March 15, 1967, the "Super Jolly Green Giant," or the Sikorsky HH-53B helicopter, made its initial flight. At the time, the HH-53B was the largest, most powerful, and the fastest helicopter in the United States Air Force. The maiden flight of 66-14428 took place in Stratford, Connecticut and was piloted by James R. Wright and Patrick A. Guinn. The helicopters were then sent to the 37th Air Rescue and Recovery Squadron at Eglin Air Force Base, Florida and Vietnam to perform combat search and rescue missions, as well as special

operations. The aircraft were key participants in the Son Tay Raid, where joint military forces flew a covert night mission to a POW camp in Vietnam to rescue American prisoners. By 1988, the HH-53s were modified to a new special operations configuration. In 2007, 66-14428 was retired to The Boneyard in Tucson, Arizona, and all of the models were withdrawn by September of 2008.





RAF FAIRFORD, ENGLAND – The hum of machinery and the steady rhythm of hands at work fill the night air as the Airmen of the 5th Munitions Squadron execute their mission with precision and dedication.

Deployed from Minot Air Force Base, North Dakota, they are a critical force behind Bomber Task Force 25-2, ensuring that B-52H Stratofortress bombers remain armed and ready at Royal Air Force Fairford, England.

Their mission is straightforward but essential, assembling and maintaining the munitions that enable global deterrence and combat capabilities. Through long hours and shifting conditions, they work tirelessly to support strategic operations across the region.

"Our job is to build, maintain, and prepare munitions for the BTF mission," said Tech. Sgt. Joshua Richardson, 5th MUNS training section chief. "The bombs we assemble here directly support the United States' ability to project power and assure our Allies."

Executing their role requires more than just technical skill. The Airmen of 5th MUNS rely on adaptability and teamwork to overcome obstacles and maintain efficiency under pressure.

"The builds themselves are simple enough, but sometimes

you have to think outside the box," Richardson said. "During Air Force Combat Operations Competition, we had to improvise solutions, like using a tie down strap in place of a missing spanner wrench. That mindset has carried over to this deployment, where adaptability is key."

The MUNS unit proved itself as a premier team within the Air Force, when they competed fiercely against other Air Force Global Strike Command units during the AFCOCOMP. The team secured second place overall, narrowly missing first by just one point. Their high energy, teamwork and technical proficiency were recognized by senior leaders, solidifying their reputation as one of the top munitions teams in the service.

"The success we had at AFCOCOMP has had a multitude of after effects," Richardson said. "Socially, we are well known throughout the career field. Internally, 5 MUNS now has a 10-person team of absolute professionals ready to be utilized at a moment's notice."

That sense of camaraderie and excellence carried over to their work at RAF Fairford, where they have efficiently completed builds efficiently while maintaining a high level of morale.

"I think the team is doing great. We have completed a lot of our builds quickly, even while pacing ourselves," said Tech. Sgt. Amanda Solis 5th MUNS munitions operations section chief. "That is a testament to our team's capability and efficiency."

For Richardson, the impact of AFCOCOMP and the skills learned from it have been instrumental in making the 5th MUNS team an elite group of Airmen, ready to tackle any challenge thrown their way.

"The experience they gained training for and performing at AFCOCOMP will set them apart from their peers for years to come," Richardson said. "This energy trickles out onto all the jobs these members are involved in, showcasing their expertise in all ways. For example, having an Airman 1st Class lead and teach all the members of his shift how to properly align a strake and belly band on a GBU 54."

Day in and day out the Airmen of 5th MUNS continue to build, innovate, and adapt to meet the demands of their mission. Their expertise, dedication and relentless drive make them an invaluable part of BTF 25-2 and a key component in ensuring the success of global deterrence operations.














BOMBER TASK FORCE 25-2

BTF 25-2 completes inert weapons drop in Türkiye

RAMSTEIN Germany --

On Feb. 27 two B-52H Stratofortress bombers assigned to the 69th Expeditionary Bomb Squadron at RAF Fairford, U.K., completed combined Bomber Task Force mission SPARTAN SWORD.

The bombers were escorted by Turkish F-16s before conducting inert weapons drops with Turkish JTACs about 150 miles northwest of U.S. Air Forces in Europe's Incirlik Air Base.

"Employing weapons alongside our partners and allies demonstrates the collective strength through unity of NATO," said Lt. Col. Joseph Cangealose, Expeditionary Bomb Squadron commander.

SPARTAN SWORD is one of several combined missions scheduled during the current BTF deployment in Europe.

U.S., Italy Strengthen Joint Operations During SPARTAN MACE Bomber Task Force Mission

RAMSTEIN AIR BASE. Germany -

Two U.S. Air Force B-52H Stratofortresses integrated with two Italian Air Force Eurofighter Typhoons and Italian ground forces on March 7 for SPARTAN MACE, a Bomber Task Force 25-2 mission focused on enhancing close-air support interoperability.

Escorted by Eurofighter Typhoons, the B-52s entered an Italian military range near Sardinia Island, where they conducted simulated live bomb drops under the guidance of Italian Joint Terminal Attack Controllers. The mission reinforced coordination between air and ground units, refining precision strike capabilities in a complex training environment.

The B-52s and aircrew are currently deployed with the 69th Expeditionary Bomb Squadron at RAF Fairford, England, where they are executing operations alongside NATO Allies and partners. BTF missions bolster collective readiness, improve

Bomber Task Force mission ' ONYX CROSS' strengthens readiness

U.S. AIR FORCES IN EUROPE - AIR FORCES AFRICA

U.S. Air Forces in Europe integrated with air forces from Romania, Croatia, and Bulgaria for ONYX CROSS, a Bomber Task Force 25-2 mission over Eastern and Southern Europe on March 3.

A U.S. Air Force B-52H Stratofortresses operating out of RAF Fairford in the United partnered Kingdom Romanian F-16 Vipers, Croatian Rafales, and Bulgarian MiG-29s to execute aerial maneuvers and refine combat tactics.

"BTF missions serve as an assurance and deterrence initiative – they aim to provide a strategic element to NATO's collective defense," said U.S. Air Force Capt. Aaron Gurley, U.S. Air Forces in Europe - Air Forces Africa BTF

The complexity of missions like ONYX CROSS demands agility from all participants, requiring

coordination adaptability across air forces.

The mission began with B-52s integrating with F-16s for a standoff weapons simulation, practicing an advanced missile release while staying outside an adversary's threat range. The bombers then executed a simulated bomb drop on preplanned targets, integrating with Bulgaria for a dynamic targeting objective as MiG-29s provided close-air support.

"The B-52 integrates seamlessly with Allied and partner forces through combined operations like ONYX CROSS," said U.S. Air Force Capt. Jacob "Crash" Carlson, Expeditionary Bomb Squadron pilot. "We refine tactics, communication, and operational coordination. Using networks, we share real-time data, ensuring close integration

for strategic deterrence, closeair support, and precision strike missions."

Since arriving at RAF Fairford, the 69th Expeditionary Bomb Squadron has flown seven missions, working with Allied and partner forces across multiple

NOTES ON BEING SAFE

The Second impact is often the deadliest



thrilled about wearing seat belts. In fact, according to statistics compiled by the Department of Transportation, in 2017 (the most current data year) there were 17,452 fatalities in which restraints were not used, or an average of 349 deaths annually per state.

What many people fail to realize is that during most vehicle accidents, occupants experience two separate impacts. First, there is the initial impact. This occurs when the vehicle hits another object, but this impact alone may not be enough to cause serious harm. The second impact is the culprit behind most

Sir Issac Newton's first law of motion comes into play here. Simply put, the law states that every object will remain in motion until acted upon by an outside force, and the results can be deadly.

The second impact occurs inside the vehicle after the force from the initial impact turns the occupants into flying projectiles, slamming them into the dashboard, windshield, or other hardened parts of the interior. Imagine this: A car traveling at 50 miles per hour (MPH) hits a stationary object and comes to a complete and sudden stop. An unbelted occupant and everything inside the car not secured will continue to travel at 50 MPH. Go a step further and compute the force with which the occupant will hit a stationary object inside the car--the vehicle's dash for instance. An occupant weighing 160 lbs traveling at a speed of 50 MPH, the force generated at the point of impact will be 8,000 pounds! Not too many bones in the body can withstand that kind of punishment; you can only imagine the damage to internal organs and soft tissue from a blow of 4 tons. Unlike a vehicle that can be repaired or replaced, the human body isn't easily repaired and is

collision; it's a law of physics. The only thing that can be done is to reduce severity. Fortunately, there is a device inside your car that is designed for just that purpose: your

torso and waist of the driver and passenger to give the body something softer to absorb the impact. It also helps protect your body from being injured by the unyielding hard surfaces of metal and plastic on the inside of your car. wheel where you can continue to drive and possibly take further evasive action, and also prevent you from being ejected from the vehicle--one of the biggest causes of motor

vehicle fatalities. Many new cars come with airbags and this feature gives some motorists a false sense of security. Airbags are passive devices, not active systems like seatbelts that require your action to latch. Passive can be good, because it's easy, but may not necessarily be as effective. Statistically, fewer injuries and fatalities occur in crashes of vehicles equipped with airbags, (overall, airbags reduce driver deaths by 14 percent and passenger deaths by 11 percent) but the deployment of an airbag alone during a high-speed collision may not be enough to save the life of an unbelted occupant.

Although some new cars offer side airbags, many do not. Dash mounted airbags offer no protection at all from side or rear collisions, only from the front. Supplemental don't offer during roll-overs, either. Wearing a lap belt keeps you anchored to the car seat and your shoulder belt keeps your upper body

from pitching forward and hitting the airbag as it deploys. Remember, airbags are designed to compliment seatbelts, not replace them.

Seat belt compliance rates on most bases is over 99%, but the fact that Airmen continue to lose their lives off base by failing to buckle up suggests that off-base use still has massive room! for improvement. Supervisors are often faced with a tough job changing the ingrained habit patterns of Airmen who may have spent 18 or more years of their lives not wearing seatbelts. Persistence, sincerity, example, and constant awareness are the keys to

> What choices do we have? Without the belt, people can look forward to skull fractures, facial lacerations, broken teeth, ribs and other nasty internal injuries and in the worst case, even death. The final decision is up to you. I know the choice I'll make. Remember, if the first impact doesn't get you the second one just might.

B-52H Force Stratofortresses from the 69th Expeditionary Bomb Squadron Fairford, England, participated in FORTRESS HAIL, a Bomber Task Force 25-2 mission that included a dynamic targeting exercise over the Baltic Sea involving NATO F-35 Lighting IIs and a live weapons drop with Finnish F/A-18 Hornets, March 6.

The dynamic target exercise, also referred to as a Find, Fix, Track, Target (F2T2) mission, integrated U.S. aircraft with Dutch F-35 Lightning IIs, NATO's Airborne Warning and

Sensational Sentibot! Syber Sentinels Forge Ahead

The parking lot at Minot North High School was mostly vacant as most students were enjoying their March spring break time. An exception to the rule was at Door 19 on the Northeast corner of the building. Quite a group of vehicles were parked there as the robotics club known as the Syber Sentinels gathered around computers and what appeared to be an extra-large collection of wheels, aluminum and electronic parts.

As I walked forward one of the young men must have seen the questioning look on my face as he quickly said "Hello Sir. Are you from the Northern Sentry?" I gave them a shake of the head and he quickly responded with "I want you to meet Sentibot. We're working on a few things, so we have it up here on the workbench."

It all made perfect sense that a club named the Syber Sentinels would be in a workshop area paying a lot of attention to their robot project. The Northern Sentry had been given a tip from Col. John Burrell of the 5th Operations Group that not only did the Syber Sentinels construct a robot, but the weekend before the interview had been in a robotics competition in Duluth, Minnesota and had been named the All Star Rookie team at the Northern Lights Regional First Robotics Competition.

Col Burrell's older son, Will, had been in on an FRC (First Robotic Competition) team when they were in Virginia "we got here and with the new Minot North High School it seemed like a perfect time to start a team right here" according to Col Burrell who is one of the advisor/ mentors for the Syber Sentinels. "We are responsible for being mentors and probably more important to get sponsors and donations for the team. So far we've been able to collect about \$50,000.00 so that the team can travel to competitions like we just had in Duluth" Burrell continues "and I am sure you can imagine that there's quite a bit of expenses when you consider travelling to Duluth with 16 team members.'

Borgen Instructor Byron introduced me to a couple of team members freshmen Izzie Burrell and Senior Scott Tollefson.

Izzie Burrell explained that "first you have to get registered as a team, and then you join a group like FRC, which is what we are doing. The experience teaches students how to do STEM (Science, Technology, Electronics & Math) and later how to apply and get scholarships at colleges for engineering...it's pretty

When asked about interest in engineering Tollefson explained that he was more "on the carpentry side." As with any team there are different interests and skills that make up the team "we have about 15 on the team and 5 mentors."

Minot (North) has never had a First Robotics team, and once the team was registered they received a starter kit for building their robot. It didn't take long for the team to make the decision to start ordering parts "like we ordered an elevator so we can hit different levels. We based our design off of another team, adding our own improvements along the way and I guess that's kind of how we got the robot we have now" according to Izzie Burrell. Did their design come out kind of how they thought it would. Both Burrell and Tollefson laughed and said "No..." Burrell added "it is completely different."

Looking at the current robot, I was amazed at the number of moving parts, but according to Tollefson "we started building our robot in January. We got kind of a late start."

Not knowing what to expect, the team headed for Duluth ready to compete with other teams, some with more members, most with a lot more experience. "It was basically a practice round for the next round, the regionals in Grand Forks" according to Burrell. "We really wanted people to notice us, and maybe they're thinking that we're good at this, or we need to improve on something.'

The students run the team according to Tollefson and Burrell, "but the mentors certainly help out when we need advice on things" says Tollefson.

How did the team get started? "Well, we moved here in the summer" said Burrell "so we went to our parents and knowing that we wanted a team they said that they would make it happen."

When asked to explain a little more about competitions Burrell said "there is a drive team. There's a coach, first driver, second driver, a human player and a technician. As with any mechanical competition, there can be issues and that is where Tollefson steps in "I'm the pit manager" and as such it is up to him to fix what goes wrong, if possible, and procure replacement parts in any way possible. "During the competition we burned up a motor and a team next to us said, hey, we've got a motor, and they gave it to us to use." But that, according to Tollefson is what makes the competition so special. "We're kind of in it together, and we help each other out. Everyone wants everyone else to do their best."

Because the Syber Sentinels are a club, they welcome team members from other schools. "I'm from Minot High" shares Tollefson "but really any high school student could ask to join, and we'd welcome them."

It was Will Burrell, now a senior at Minot North and Mikiyas Asmamaw, also a senior, who joined me next to talk about the



Syber Sentinel. "It's been 3 years total, including this year" says Will Burrell that he has been involved in the First Robotic Competitions, and Asmamaw was asked to join because of his programming experience "someone asked me if I wanted to come help with this robot, and that got me started learning a new programming language."

Is Will Burrell surprised at the progress that the team has made based on where they are today? 'Yes, I am surprised how far we managed to get and how much we've managed to pick up on and catch up with other teams. When we were in our first competition in Duluth we had members of other teams tell us they were surprised that we have come this far just starting in January and I kind of agree with them."

Burrell is also quick to point out that every member of the team has their own expertise, and they have worked together greatly to achieve what they have done. "If it was just by me" he continues "we wouldn't have gotten near as far." Asmamaw

adds that "we have people who were willing to learn new skills to make it work. People learned these skills, even if they had never done it before. It's a special group of kids, and the stars kind of aligned when we all came together."

Keeping team Syber Sentinels going requires being able to order from different stores that supply specialty robotic parts, and like any specialty stores. The mentors are responsible for continuing to raise money, and according to Col Burrell 'we are short of our long term goal and could always use more sponsors to help these kids out."

Forging ahead, and not looking back...that would seem to be important to a robotics team like the Syber Sentinels. Yes, there certainly is a lot of learning based on past experience, but every member of the team has the same dream, to be on the First Robotic Competition World Stage in Houston later on this year. With a little luck, and a lot of teamwork, that dream could certainly become a reality.



AWAITING SPRING'S ARRIVAL

Hmm, we're about a week from the official start of spring, although in North Dakota that could still mean a blizzard, wind, cold, and more

Or it could mean exactly what folks got to appreciate the end of February and beginning of March: Melting snow on area lakes, snowdrifts becoming a distant memory, and the wearing of sandals and shorts even if temperatures aren't much above the freezing mark. It is better than minus 30 degrees, after all, so it's worth celebrating in sandals and shorts, right?

The nights are still fairly long and while there are outdoor opportunities – hiking or biking, for example, the long, lingering days of what seems like endless summer sun are still well into the

Rather than simply wish for spring to truly arrive so a person can be out enjoying the weather, let's spend some time thinking about what spring brings to the Great North Dakota Outdoors:

For starters, spring will bring crocuses, AKA pasque flower, wind flower, or prairie crocus. It's North Dakota's earliest blooming flower, appearing in unbroken prairie typically from mid-April to mid-May. A member of the buttercup family, it can range in color from white to light yellow, pale blue, and even mauve.

Spring means northern pike spawning and, depending on how early ice goes off area lakes, it's the time of year pike anglers typically treasure the most. Pike are native to many North Dakota lakes and even though walleye have become the kingpin favorite among angler, northern pike remain the state's official State Fish.

Spring pike fishing is a great shore-fishing opportunity as soon as that ice slips away and doesn't require an expensive boat with the latest technology. Instead, it often simply means a lawn chair, sturdy fishing rod and good line, and some large crankbaits or spoons to cast into chilly waters.

Just find a back bay on Lake Sakakawea or check out some local lakes such as Lake Darling, Lake Audubon, or Buffalo Lodge Lake to name a few

Speaking of spawning, rainbow smelt spawn on Lake Sakakawea early in the spring. The small silvery fish, while native to many North American waters, isn't native to North Dakota, Since its introduction into Lake Sakakawea in 1971 it has become the premier forage for predator species such as walleye, pike, and salmon.

Anglers can only use live rainbow smelt as bait when fishing the Missouri River System the river, Lake Sakakawea, and below the river in Lake Oahe. It's legal to capture them only if taken with a dip net, minnow trap, or by hand and used in the Missouri River System as live bait. They can be frozen and used as dead bait in lakes where they are legal bait.

Look for rainbow smelt to spawn as soon as it's

Another sign of the coming spring is when Upper Souris National Wildlife Refuge northwest of Minot opens its auto tour route. The 3-mile, self-guided interpretive drive offers vistas of rolling native prairie hills, coulees adorned in brush that provides shelter and food for wildlife, and marshes along the Souris River. Look for a gate a mile south of Lake Darling Dam.

The road is closed in the winter, during the state's deer gun season, and if it's muddy, however. But it's still something to anticipate when spring weather cooperates and the auto tour route becomes available.

While Lake Darling is open year-around for fishing, adhering to all state regulations, accessing Lake Darling and the river below the dam with a watercraft has to wait until May 1.That's typically past the heart of spring migration and many waterfowl, shorebirds, and other migratory species have moved onto their nesting locations. Users of all watercraft - fishing boats, fishing float-tubes, canoes, and kayaks – need to be patient for that May 1 access

In the meantime, there are 14 designated shore-fishing locations dotting Lake Darling. Just look for the "Public Fishing Area" signs. And the arrival of spring.
