# Economic analysis: Minot Air Force Base's impact on city of Minot

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. - When all factors are considered, the total economic impact of Minot Air Force Base on the city of Minot reaches more than \$651,000,000 annually. This economic output reflects not only the direct contributions of military and civilian payroll but also the broader effects of construction, service contracts, procurements, and indirect job creation. Minot AFB's influence stretches across almost every sector of the local economy, enhancing the city's financial stability and growth.

Minot Air Force Base plays an essential role in the economic fabric of the city of Minot, North Dakota. The base, home to more than 12,000 personnel, including 5,500 military members, 6,300 military family members, and is a place of work for almost 1,000 civilian employees, serves as a major driver of local economic activity. The combined economic footprint of the base creates thousands of jobs, generates significant payroll, and supports various industries in the region, making Minot AFB a cornerstone of the city's economy.

"The relationship between Minot AFB and the City of Minot is remarkably strong, and while the impact cannot be measured solely in quantitative terms, the Economic Impact Report truly does highlight the monetary significance of the partnership between the city and the base," said U.S. Air Force 1st Lieutenant Michael Reissfelder, Comptroller Squadron financial analysis deputy flight commander. "That bond makes our mission possible, provides opportunities to our Airmen, and helps the City of Minot grow and

prosper."

The economic impact of Minot AFB begins with its payroll. The base's military payroll totals \$370,000,000 annually, while civilian payroll adds another \$81,000,000. Together, the base's personnel account for a total annual payroll of \$451,000,000. This sum directly contributes to the local economy by providing income to thousands of individuals, many of whom live in Minot and contribute to the local housing market, retail businesses, and service industries. These payroll expenditures also support local tax revenue, contributing to Minot remaining a vibrant and economically stable community.

Minot AFB also impacts the local construction and service sectors. The base has made many construction contracts for operations and maintenance within the city of Minot, totaling up to \$18,000,000. These contracts help support local construction companies and workers, ensuring that the base operates effectively while stimulating economic activity in the region. Minot AFB also uses base support service contracts and medical service contracts worth approximately \$13,000,000. These contracts help provide essential services, including maintenance, healthcare, and base operations, while also generating revenue for local businesses and creating jobs

for civilian employees. Another substantial component of the base's economic contribution comes from procurement spending, which impacts various sectors in the city. The base spends roughly \$49,000,000 on goods

and services such as privatized housing, healthcare services, education, and expenditures at the commissary and base exchange. This, in turn, supports a wide range of local businesses with further impact. In total, these procurements contribute \$80,000,000 to the local economy.

"Minot is recognized as an exceptional place to live, characterized by a welcoming community that fosters a sense of belonging," said Leanna Porter, budget analyst for the 5th Comptroller Squadron. "The local workforce benefits from employment opportunities, while both children and adults have access to an outstanding education system. These outcomes exemplify the most important effects of the economic contribution made by the Air Force Base, of which we are proud to be a part."

The base's presence creates a ripple effect throughout the local economy, with an estimated two thousand indirect jobs created by the base's activities. These jobs are spread across industries such as retail, hospitality, and real estate, and contribute a total dollar value of \$118,000,000.



Tried and true weather facts that you can live with!


#### **BACK IN SCHOOL**

# March is National MS month...

UPSIDE DOWN UNDER

Editor's note: This is the first of a three-part series about multiple sclerosis, an auto-immune disease that attacks the central nervous system. Statistically, North Dakota and Ohio have the second-highest incidence rates in the nation, followed only by New York state. There are numerous possible triggers including a lack of Vitamin D, heritage and radiation.

Because March brings attention to multiple sclerosis in the United States, it seems appropriate to present information about this disease of which there is no cure.

And just to be clear, North Dakota has among the highest rates of MS per 100,000 people. Nationally, the highest rates are northern latitude states with a couple of exceptions.

MS can strike just about anyone at any age, but the highest statistics, by far, are among women age 20-40. MS rates among men in that same age group are two-times less. There is no definitive reason for this, however, several theories. They include vitamin D deficiency, hereditary and environmental issues such as exposure to unusual amounts of radiation.

Statistically, MS is all over the map. It's very difficult to pin down comparative numbers, although some are available that can shed some light on this mysterv.

It's always been believed that the higher the latitude, the greater the chance of contracting MS. And that remains true to a point, in the United States. In Europe, that's not always

According to the National Multiple Sclerosis Society, 2.9 million people in the world suffer from MS with 1 million living in the United States. The highest rates per country per 100,000 people include include Germany 303, the United States 288, Canada 250, Norway 248, Iceland 212 and the United Kingdom

The lowest rates in the world include Panama with 6 people per 100,000 and Russia with 3.8 per 100,000 which certainly defies the latitude argument.

Statewide statistics are very similar. New York has the highest rate per 100,000 at 377 with Syracuse having the highest rate of any city in the nation. North Dakota and Ohio have the second highest rate at 353, followed by Michigan 348, Minnesota 343, with Olmstead County including Rochester and Mayo Clinic, with the highest incidence rate of any county in the United States, and Wisconsin 338. The Montana rate is 250 per 100,000.

The lowest rates of MS are in Hawaii and Alaska. Hawaii's rate is 47 per 100,000 and Alaska's rate is even lower at 22 per 100,000, again defying the higher latitude argument.

But because MS incident rates are among the lowest among First Nations people, it could explain the lower rates in Alaska and Russia because of sizable native populations.

In Canada, MS rates are very similar to

those in the northern U.S. Alberta has the highest incidence of any province with 358 people per 100,000 contracting MS, followed by Saskatchewan at 315.

Other provinces use different measuring mechanisms so it would be unfair to compare, although Maritime Canada has similar rate as those in the New England states.

According to the National MS Society, rates have been increasing steadily since 1976 and took a huge jump between 2009 and 2010. But, it's possible part of that increase could be the result of better diagnoses.

In 1976, there were 58 people per 100,000 with the disease. By 1994, it had risen to 85. In 2009, the rate was 209 and it jumped to 309 in just one year. By 2017, the rate had increased again to 362.

It is possible that with an increasing population comes an increased risk. But the increase in cases doesn't seem to match the increase in population levels over the past 50

It has been known that radiation is a cause of MS. In fact, a study of the people who were exposed and survived the Chernobyl explosion in 1986, indicated nearly all of them contracted MS.

However, a stronger belief is in the lack of Vitamin D. Just about every study out there will tell vou there is a link between MS and Vitamin D deficiency. It is also assumed that Vitamin D doesn't prevent MS, but adequate use of it can minimize the risk or even control some of its symptoms, according to Mayo

• Have a Plan: Traveling with a pet can make plans a little more complilcated, so it's best to get things squared away ahead of time. Make sure your hotels are pet-friendly, whoever you are staying with has a space for your pet to sleep and be alone (if needed), and it is never a bad idea to go ahead and find a local veterinarian in case of any emergencies. Make sure you bring any important documents you may need for your pet as well as any medications or special food. # **Return To In-Person Work:** Are Mil Spouses Exempt?

Employment and employability are top concerns for military spouses, who face not just the usual economic pressures impacting the job market, but the stress of having to transfer their skills to new duty stations every couple of years. And with unemployment of mil spouses continuing to hover around 20%, five times that of the general population, the ability to find and maintain remote or transferable work is a top issue for many military families. A recent Executive Order (EO) mandating a return to in-person work for federal employees raised questions as to whether more flexible work arrangements would continue for mil spouses.

In the past few years, federal initiatives have recognized and continued to strengthen employability of spouses through hiring preferences and by easing the transfer of licenses and certifications across state lines. Most recently, in June of 2023, an EO entitled "Advancing Economic Security for Military and Veteran Spouses, Military Caregivers, and Survivors" added initiatives to strengthen existing telework and remote work opportunities and improve the Domestic Employees Teleworking Overseas (DETO) program.

In the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic remote work and telework had become more common for many workers. However, calls for a return to the workplace began as early as 2022. On January 20th, 2025, President Trump's Order to "Return to In-Person Work" mandated that federal agencies finally prepare to

do so. States like California and Texas have also recently followed

The Order stated that "Heads of all departments and agencies in the executive branch of Government shall, as soon as practicable, take all necessary steps to terminate remote work arrangements and require employees to return to work in-person at their respective duty stations on a full-time basis, provided that the department and agency heads shall make exemptions they deem necessary."

On January 27th, the Office of Personnel Management (OPM) issued a memorandum entitled "Agency Return to Office Implementation Plans." In a footnote to the memorandum, it stated that "Agencies should also exclude military spouses working remotely based on the Military Spouse Employment Act." However, some have noted that this verbiage was vague and indecisive, leaving interpretation open to individual agencies. 46% of federal workers had participated in situational or routine telework in 2023 while approximately 10% engaged in full time remote work, according to one OPM report. With 46,000 mil spouses working for the Department of Defense alone, according to a 2024 GAO report, application of new policies would affect tens of thousands of military families.

These concerns were heard by National Legislators. On February 5th, Reps. Rob Wittman (R - VA) and Eugene Vindman (D- VA) introduced the seek to codify the exemption from a federally mandated return-towork into the law of the land. The bill is still in the first steps of the legislative process and waiting to be considered by committee before possibly being sent to the House and Senate. Whether or not this proposed legislation was mostly symbolic (congressional tracking site GovTrack.US gave it a 7% chance of making it beyond the committee process), it was a step that may have helped apply pressure for necessary clarifications.

On February 12th the OPM issued a memorandum with additional guidance, stating that military spouses were categorically exempt from the January EO. It defined military spouses as those who are married to an activeduty service member, married to a veteran who separated or retired and had 100% disability at time of discharge, widows/widowers who had not remarried and those married to members of the US Foreign Service on overseas assignments. This has since trickled down and been reflected in agency guidance to include a DOD Memorandum dated March 4th, 2025.

When military spouses are able to maintain steady employment, it is more than just a win for overall family quality of life, or even a matter of retaining talented individuals in the federal work force. Employed spouses

increase the odds of their activeduty partners extending their service, and are therefore key to recruitment and retention within the armed forces. Fortunately, for now, military spouses will remain

exempt from the federal return to in-person work executive order, and will continue to benefit from the flexibility that working remotely or telework offers their



"They were closing and I just wanted to see where they were going" said Sharon "I found out that there was a Hutterite Colony near Milnor, North Dakota, ordering a lot of chickens" and so her next contact would be there.

"A Hutterite Colony usually numbers around 100, and the challenge is to keep them all employed" says Milt. In the case of the Sundale Colony near Milnor, there have a number of other interests including selling whole hogs to customers. "For \$500.00, a customer can get a half a hog cut, wrapped and delivered to Minot" Sharon shares "That

goes along with the chickens (sometimes up to 1,200 per trip), bacon and pot pies."

The Sundale Colony also has a complete butcher shop and feed distribution center. "Their butcher shop is cutting edge" according




The Dental Clinic plans to represent at the health fair with tips to keep a clean

Center (MFRC), Mental Health with True North, New Parent Support, the Red Cross, WIC, Physical Therapy, and more.



#### A LOOK BACK THIS WEEK IN USAF HISTORY

**OPERATION TOMAHAWK** The Last Airborne Operation of the Korean War MARCH 23, 1951



Paratroopers of the 187th Airborne Regimental Combat Team (RCT), the 2d and 4th Ranger Companies, and the Indian Army Parachute Field Ambulance unit jump into combat at Munsan-Ni, Korea, 23 March 1951.

Seventy-four years ago, on 23 March 1951, The Eighth Army conducted a bold parachute assault to attempt to block enemy forces trying to escape north along highway 1 out of Part of a larger Operation COURAGEOUS, the airborne element of Operation TOMAHAWK would drop the 187th Regimental Combat Team (RCT) into a blocking position near the Imjin River.

Meanwhile, an armored Task Force Growdon would conduct a passage of lines and attack north along highway 1 to destroy enemy forces in zone and link up with the 187th. The Task Force was formed around the 6th Medium Tank Battalion of the 24th Infantry Division, with the 58th Armored field Artillery Battalion from the 3d ID added for firepower and two British Churchill bridge-laying tanks included for mobility. The plan was to trap the escaping enemy between the two forces and south of the Imjin River, and destroy them. At 0700 on 23 March, TF Growdon exited friendly lines and attacked north on Hwy 1 (see map). Two hours later, at 0900, the Rakkasans and Rangers dropped into the DZ south of Munsan-Ni and established a blocking position. TF Growdon fought north, clearing several hastily emplaced minefields along the route. Soon afterward, the war became one of fixed, fortified positions backed by massed artillery fires. Lines solidified, and maneuver focused generally on the seizure of key terrain to gain observation and field of fire advantages. Operation TOMAHAWK became the last large-scale Airborne operation of the war.

Lake Audubon remains slower for walleye. Try deeper water in 25 to 30 feet. Decent pike activity in shallow bays in 12 feet or less.

# B-52s Practice Bombing Missions in Estonia, Finland, and Italy as Busy Bomber Task Force Continues

U.S. Air Force B-52 Stratofortresses continued a busy bomber task force deployment to Europe by participating in multiple drills with NATO partners last week, including simulated weapons targeting exercises and a live munitions drop in Finland.

On March 6, B-52s flew a mission with Dutch F-35s, German KC-30 tankers, alliance-owned NATO's E-3 Airborne Warning and Control System (AWACS) aircraft, and U.S. and U.K. Royal Air Force RC-135 Rivet Joint signals intelligence aircraft in Estonian airspace, according to NATO Allied Air Command and U.S. Air Forces in Europe. The mission simulated a Find, Fix, Track, and Target mission in which the aircraft practiced locating, identifying, and engaging a simulated threat.

"The exercises are designed to improve interoperability by integrating ISR assets with strike-capable aircraft in real-time targeting scenarios," NATO Allied Air Command said in a March 10 news release.

According to NATO, Estonian ground forces also participated with the Guided Multiple Launch Rocket System (GMLRS)—surface-to-surface missiles that can be fired from M270 and HIMARS mobile launchers.

"Participants were tasked with locating and tracking potential targets and then coordinating a simulated strike within a specified timeframe, both pre-planned and dynamic targets," NATO AIRCOM said.

The goal was to enhance NATO's ability to conduct counter-anti-access/area denial, known as counter-A2AD—the ability to roll back enemy defenses to allow aircraft to get through contested airspace—and improve its integrated air and missile defense.

The Find, Fix, Track, and Target exercise of "potential threats from the ground shows that NATO, as a defensive Alliance, is prepared to timely respond to any possible challenges," Gen. James B. Hecker, the commander of NATO Allied Air Command and U.S. Air Forces in Europe (USAFE)

said in a release.

The two B-52s then proceeded to Rovajärvi Range in Finland, where they dropped GBU-38 JDAM guided bombs, supported by Finnish Army and American Joint Terminal Attack Controllers (JTACs). The B-52s were escorted by Finnish Air Force F/A-18 Hornets, which captured video of the bombing practice.

A day later on March 7, two B-52s practiced providing close air support with the Italian military. Escorted by Italian Eurofighter Typhoons, the B-52s conducted simulated bomb drops on a range on the Italian island of Sardinia, guided by Italian JTACs, according to USAFE.

Four B-52s with the 69th Expeditionary Bomb Squadron from Minot Air Force Base, N.D., are currently deployed to RAF Fairford, U.K. for the bomber task force.

Two B-52 crews plan to fly over Sweden on March 11, marking the one-year anniversary of the country's accession to NATO.

RAMSTEIN AIR BASE, Germany --Two U.S. Air Force B-52H Stratofortresses assigned to Bomber Task Force 25-2 will conduct a lowpass flyover in Sweden on March 11, observing the one-year anniversary of the nation's accession to NATO.

"Sweden's partnership has been crucial to the success of our Bomber Task Force operations," said U.S. Air Force Lt. Col. Kendall "Spartan" Smith, U.S. Air Forces in Europe - Air Forces Africa Bomber Task Force chief. "Access to their airspace, logistical support and seamless integration with U.S. bomber aircraft have made joint missions more efficient and effective."

The flyover, coordinated with Swedish defense officials, highlights the strong security cooperation between Sweden, the United States, and other NATO air forces. Bomber Task Force missions provide critical opportunities to integrate and train with regional partners.

"Through detailed planning and deliberate coordination, we've built a stronger coalition with our Arctic Allies to hone our collective ability to deploy large, combat-credible forces and strengthened NATO's deterrence capabilities in the High North," Smith said.

Two U.S. Air Force B-52H Stratofortresses and aircrews conducted intercept training with Royal Netherlands Air Force F-35 lightning IIs, Royal Danish Air Force F-16 Fighting Falcons, and Swedish JAS 39 Gripens during Bomber Task Force 25-2 mission TOWER CITADEL in the Arctic

region, March 17.

The training enabled the Allies to test rapid response protocols and power projection capabilities, addressing simulated airborne threats and aircraft incursions.

## SPRING MOTORCYCLE PRE RIDE CHECK

For those of us that live in an area where we have to winterize our bikes and put them up for several months, this article is about getting our bikes dusted off and "ready to ride" for the upcoming riding season.

Before you set out to ride your bike, you should do a quick visual pre-ride motorcycle inspection of the chassis. Look for cracks, bent or missing spokes, loose nuts and bolts, missing nuts, bolts, clips, or pins, and fluid leaks in hoses, seals, or gaskets. Do a quick inspection of the throttle and levers. Ensure that all cables are secured and in good condition. If your motorcycle is chain driven, make sure it is lubricated and not rusted. If your motorcycle is belt driven, make sure there are no cuts or tears in the belt. Refer to your owner's manual to make sure you are not coming due on any scheduled maintenance for mileage or time. Examples of maintenance could be adjusting brakes, clutch or changing fluids.

Always, check the tire pressure before going out on the road. Ensure that the valve stems are seated correctly and are tight. Check to ensure the tire pressure matches the recommended manufacturer air pressure for your specific tire. Usually, you can find this information in your motorcycle user manual or the tire manufacturer's website. Check the tread depth; look for foreign objects, or uneven wear.

Check the fluid levels. Always check the oil and make sure you have a full tank of gasoline. One tip I can pass on is to also go by your miles, rather than the float on the gas tank, because often it can be off by as much as 2 gallons. I make sure I keep track of my miles, that way I know when it is time to fill up. If you have a locking tank, take your key with you in case you run out of gas. Don't assume that all tank keys are made the same because they aren't, take this from the voice of experience.

Check the battery to make sure the terminals are clean and tight fitting. A battery that has discoloration or bulging is a sign of a bad battery needing replacing.

Test your horn, turn signals,

headlights, instrument lights, and brake lights to ensure proper operating order. Replace any burnt out bulbs before riding.

Check to make sure your safety features of your motorcycle are working properly. Make sure your engine kill switch works when used. If your motorcycle won't let you put it in gear with the kick stand down, make sure the motor shuts off when you do. If your motorcycle is equipped with a neutral indicator, check to verify if it indicates when you are in neutral.


Check the mirrors to ensure they are securely bolted and crack free. Adjust the mirrors to the proper position before riding and make sure they are clean and streak free. It isn't easy to adjust your mirrors while riding, nor is it safe.

Do a visual inspection of your exhaust system. Making sure connections are tight and no baffling is loose or missing. You can then start the motorcycle

to make sure nothing sounds abnormal. Examples would be a ticking engine, loud exhaust, or something vibrating that could come loose.

Lastly, when you are on your bike and "ready to ride" and you take up the kickstand, check to make sure that the spring in the kickstand has enough tension to hold it in position. There is nothing like everyone getting in line to ride and when they make the left hand turn out of the parking lot, the one motorcycle that either didn't check their kickstand for faulty springs or left it down, goes belly up in front of everyone.

All of this may sound like it will take a long time, but in reality, once you do it a couple of times, it takes about five to ten minutes each ride. The time invested in a pre-ride motorcycle inspection is certainly better than paying for a tow home or being stranded on the side of the road

# B-52s conduct first live weapons drop in Sweden since nation joined NATO


On March 11, two U.S. Air Force B-52H Stratofortresses participating in Bomber Task Force Mission VIKING NEBULA conducted the first live weapons drop in Sweden since the nation joined NATO.

During the mission, the aircraft were escorted by two Swedish JAS 39 Gripens to the Vidsel Test Range, where they released GBU-38 joint direct attack munitions. Ground support was provided by U.S. and Swedish Joint Terminal Attack Controllers. The mission reinforced coordination between air and ground units, refining precision strike capabilities in a new, complex training environment.

The mission also included a low-formation flyover of the Swedish Parliament to celebrate the one-year anniversary of Sweden's accession to NATO.

The B-52s and aircrew are currently deployed with the 69th Expeditionary Bomb Squadron at RAF Fairford, England, where they continue to execute operations alongside NATO Allies and partners across Europe, Africa, and the Middle East, bolstering collective lethality and improving integration.



# National Children's Dental Health Month Outreach

On Thursday, February 20th, 2025, 12 members from the 5th Medical Group's Dental Clinic spent the day at the Minot AFB Child Development Center and North Plains Elementary School. During this time, approximately 200 children were taught the importance of daily oral hygiene and healthy nutrition. students were able to participate in hands-on activities, highlighting proper oral-hygiene techniques and choosing wholesome, nutritious foods. The fan-favorite of the day was definitely "Rex", the dental dinosaur puppet. After learning the proper brushing technique, each child was able to practice on Rex's big smile.

It is very important to introduce the concepts of oral hygiene to children while they are young. According to the American Academy of Pediatric Dentists, it is recommended to visit the dentist when a child turns one years-old or gets their first tooth (whichever occurs first). This early-age visit allows for disease prevention and familiarization with a dental clinic. Parents should continue to help their children brush their teeth twice per day, once in the morning after breakfast and one more time before bed. Common pitfalls to avoid include giving a bottle of milk to a child as they go to bed, excessive juice/sports drink intake, and frequent snacking of high-sugar foods. Each of these habits can increase the risk for cavities in children at a young



age. As National Children's Dental Health month comes to an end, it is important to continue to teach young children about the importance of keeping their teeth clean. Happy Children's Dental Health Month from the 5th Medical Group!





#### **COME DANCE WITH ME**

It begins with a subtle face-off, two competitors squaring off. Then a pitter-patter of feet begins slowly at first, building to a crescendo as each competitor tries to wear down its opponent with a flurry of feet pounding the

These two boxers don't wear gloves. They don't swing upper cuts or jabs. There are no knockouts.

Instead, these competitors have survived and thrived on the prairie for thousands of years, in part, because they

They're sharp-tailed grouse and each spring several males square off in a flurry of dancing feet, wings outstretched, tails pointed upright towards the sky, and "eyebrows" flared in an effort to out-display a competing male for the attention of the ladies, who are watching

They dance; their feet furiously in motion as they move - sometimes in place; sometimes in circles. They taunt their competitor (or several, for that matter), sometimes leaping into the air one or both at a time.

At times, as if exhausted from their efforts, they merely stare at their competitor, poised to burst into action yet toying with each other to determine who blinks first.

It's a mind game, as well, much like a boxing match.

And the ladies simply watch. Perhaps they're silently cheering for their favorite jouster, who knows? Some saunter in as if they're crackerjack experts in a

poker game, while others fly to their windswept dancing grounds, honing in on their mission as grand king of a prairie knoll. It begins before dawn, slowly at first. Activity from any

number of competitors squaring off increases as morning sun pierces the sky. Sometimes it's a solo dance, other times two or three may participate in a tag team match. Sometimes there are just a handful of participants, other times dozens grace the prairie.

As morning hours progress, it seems they determine the day is better suited for a siesta as one or two decide "enough" and merely walk away. Others agree, following obediently. While some stay or come and go throughout the day or evening hours, most revel in the morning.

Maybe they're saying "Spring is here, come dance with me. Let's celebrate. Winter is waning Let's dance. We must

And dance they do, returning to the same area year after year. It's all part of the courtship display taking place on what is officially known as a lek.

A longtime, beloved lek is often scattered with feathers, dislodged as the result of a tussle or simply because of the flurry of pounding feet and hobbing heads of busy feet pounds vegetation flat.

While grouse may visit a lek any time of year, spring is truly the height of its glorious activity, increasing in March and flowing into the warmth of April.

Three area U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service National Wildlife Refuges (NWR) offer grouse viewing opportunities near leks to photograph, video, or simply soak up a spring ritual's experience: Upper Souris NWR northwest of Minot, Lostwood NWR near Stanley, and J. Clark Salyer NWR near

Upham.

Birds are often more active in the morning but evenings can provide wonderful photographic lighting opportunities, suggested Patty Bloms, Upper Souris Administrative Support Specialist. Try to arrive at least 30 minutes before sunrise when going in the morning or a couple of hours before sunset in the evening. No fears if birds are present, though – just go quickly and quietly into the blind and be patient.

They'll return.

The details:

•Upper Souris NWR: Three permanent blinds on active leks. Contact Bloms for reservations and directions, (701) 468-5467, or email (patty\_bloms@fws.gov). The blind comfortably holds three or four adults. Make reservations early, Bloms added - it's a popular opportunity for enjoying spring in North Dakota.

·Lostwood NWR: A blind along the refuge Auto Tour Route. Contact Refuge Complex Biologist Laurie Richardson, (701) 848-2722, or email (laurie\_richardson@ fws.gov), for reservations, directions, and access.

• J. Clark Salyer NWR: Several active leks are on the refuge but the largest is on N.D. Trust Land (public land) adjacent to the refuge along Nelson Prairie Road. While it doesn't have a permanent viewing blind the lek is readily visible from a vehicle or use of a pop-up, portable blind. Stop at refuge headquarters two miles north of Upham during business hours for a map or contact Maintenance Coordinator Joseph Guariglia, (701) 768-2548, extension 123 or email (joseph\_guariglia@fws.gov) for more information.
