

Yeah, we all know the nut doesn't fall far from the tree. Sounds like the escapades with my late husband. Flashlight for a taillight. Yep, would have done something like that. Falling from a tractor. If we had one, we would do that. Not run over by the trailer. Many a near miss, check. Home projects are

When I was young, I figured Frank lived somewhere behind the row of houses in our Nebraska city. No, my mom grew up with her mom standing at a window saying the same phrase.

Frank was a farmer near them who swore it never rained on his corn. Her mom always said, "Hope it's raining on Frank's corn," and so we all worried about Frank's corn. To this day, I think of Frank and his corn when it rains.

My dad, sold his small farm, and started his first sales job for New Holland farm equipment selling to dealers. He was excited to join his sales manager for a tour of eastern Nebraska and western Iowa but came home nearly heartbroken

after his first day.

Many dealers had two-year-old uncrated hay balers because it hadn't rained in two years. He told my mom he'd make a big mistake. But with me on the way and a house mortgage, he stuck to his job commitment.

The next week it started to rain, and he started to sell. He started ordering in eight balers to a train car and made \$18,000 in commission. Before you knew it, he was the top salesman in the Midwest. But that was just one success story on the roller coaster that farmers and business owners know too well. He nearly declared bankruptcy twice and he had to reinvent his product line a few times to keep himself afloat.

Most days he struggled with ulcers, migraines and heart disease, all brought on by too many worries. As we enter another season that waivers between drought and spurts of promising rains, the backbone of our region and the mouths of the nation depend on our farmers.

Many will stand at the window wondering if it's raining on Frank's corn. Others will worry about a loved one and whether he or she is safe in the field or traveling to and from in massive equipment that can always go wrong.

Be safe out there. And don't use a flashlight for a headlight.

STATE PARK VISITORS CAN HELP PROTECT PARKS FROM INVASIVE SPECIES

Bismarck – The North Dakota Parks and Recreation Department (NDPRD), in partnership with the North Dakota Game and Fish Department, is highlighting the importance of stopping the spread of Aquatic Nuisance Species (ANS) during the week of May 5-11. ANS Awareness Week in North Dakota is intended to further educate visitors on the potential risk to public health, property and the economy from the negative impacts associated with ANS to ultimately stop the introduction and spread of ANS in the state's waterways.

Nuisance, or invasive, species are aggressive species that grow and reproduce rapidly, displace native species, and cause significant disturbance to the areas they are present. Park visitors play a vital role in helping prevent the spread of invasive species across North Dakota through some quick and easy tasks:

• Clean your gear: Before leaving a body of water, thoroughly clean all equipment such as boats, kayaks, fishing gear, and any other

gear that comes into contact with water. Remove all plants, mud, and debris.

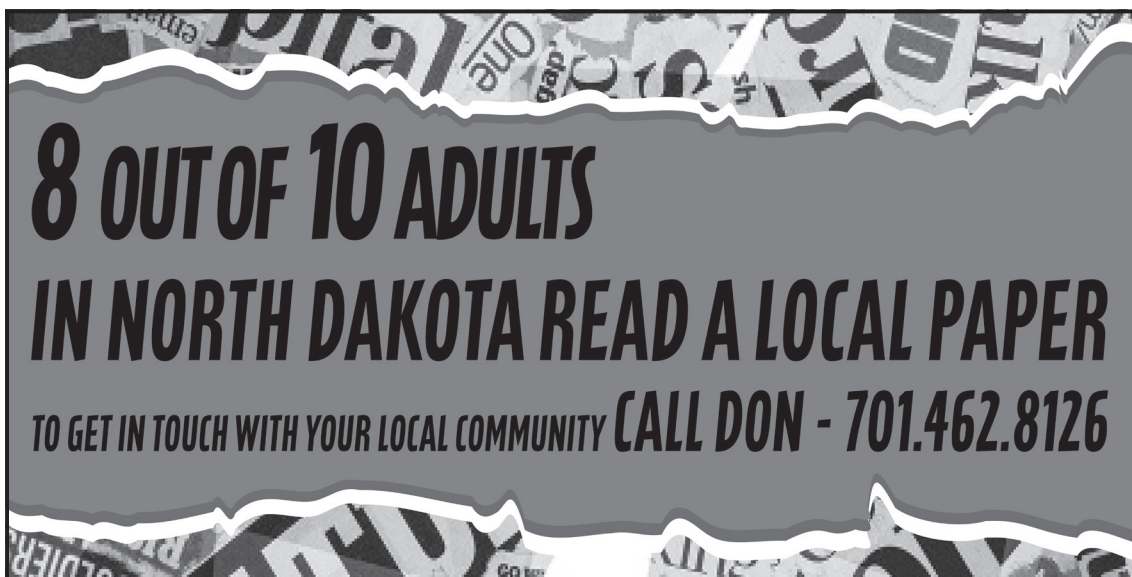
- Drain water: Drain all water from boats, motors, bilges, and live wells before leaving the area.
- Dry gear: Allow all gear to completely dry before using it in another body of water.
- Dispose of bait properly: Never release unused bait into the water.
- Stay informed: Learn about the ANS species in the park you're visiting and follow any guidelines or regulations provided by park staff.

NDPRD has 12 state parks that have water access available for recreation purposes. Therefore, it is important that visitors utilizing and transporting watercraft clean, drain and dry all equipment between uses. In partnership with ND Game and Fish Department, Lake Metigoshe State Park has a watercraft cleaning station at the park. This allows anglers to easily rinse their boats off to help prevent the spread of nonnative plants, animals or pathogens

that threaten North Dakota's waterways. Grahams Island State Park has an Internet Landing Installed Device Sensor at its boat ramps which plays a recording when a watercraft is detected, reminding boaters to remove any aquatic plants and animals from their watercraft. Not draining water can be extremely hazardous and may cause negligent transportation of ANS to various locations.

"Our best defense in the fight against the introduction and spread of unwanted invasive species is when water users commit to clean, drain and dry all equipment after every use," said Kathy Duttonhefner, ND Parks and Recreation Natural Resources Division Chief. "These are simple steps that make a big impact to keep our state's waterways, forests and animal habitats safe from ANS."

The mission of the North Dakota Parks and Recreation Department is to enrich generations through experiences that connect people and places.

Managing earthworm damage in lawns

April showers bring May flowers. Spring rains also brings the first sightings of earthworms on driveways and sidewalks. While this is good fortune for the hungry robins, homeowners often express dismay at the appearance of numerous earthworm castings in lawns.

Earthworm castings are conical-shaped mounds of soil and excrement that are left at the burrow entrance. During heavy rains, earthworms sense raindrop vibrations and leave the soil. Scientists used to believe that they left their burrows because of a lack of oxygen. However, scientists now theorize they take advantage of the wet above-ground environment to look for new habitat and mates.

Numerous earthworm castings in lawns can be unsightly in spring. I wasn’t always appreciative that these castings might cause anguish to conscientious homeowners. I was focused on the numerous soil ecological benefits of earthworms such as thatch decomposition, water infiltration and soil aeration. However, one annoyed homeowner hammered his point home that

his lawn was as bumpy as the Badlands and he was afraid that he might trip and break his ankle.

Yes, homeowners can take steps to manage lawn damage. However, the first step is to make sure that earthworms are the issue. Solitary ground-nesting bees can also cause soil mounds in the spring. These native bees are valuable pollinators and not aggressive unlike the pesky yellowjackets that are prevalent in late summer. Ground-nesting bees should not be eradicated.

Fresh earthworm castings are frequently shiny and darker in appearance than the underlying soil. In contrast bee mounds are usually the same color as the soil or even lighter if the underlying soil is sandy. One clear way to differentiate between ground-nesting bees and earthworms is to look for a hole that is about the size of a pencil eraser. Bees leave a prominent hole to allow them to return to their underground nest. Earthworms do not.

Earthworm management strategies are focused on improving turfgrass health, smoothing out

the bumps, and overseeding the lawn. No pesticides or chemicals are labeled for use in managing earthworms.

Castings can be masked by a healthy lawn. Mowing at a taller height of 3 to 3.5 inches, fertilizing the lawn, and proper irrigation practices can help. Frequent, shallow watering is detrimental because it keeps the earthworms at the soil surface. In contrast watering deeply but infrequently will force the earthworms deeper as the surface soil dries.

If your lawn is thin, wait until late summer (August 15 to September 15) to core aerate the lawn and overseed with the appropriate turfgrass mix to increase turfgrass density. For this technique to work, the soil cores should be left on the lawn to fill in the low spots. When repeated for multiple years, this technique can help smooth the bumps and increase grass density.

Mechanical processes such as powering raking or verticutting can reduce the bumpiness of the soil. Avoid either process during the heat of summer.

Prayer

The National Day of Prayer was on May 2, 2024. It was established by congress in 1952 and signed by President Truman to be proclaimed annually by the president that, “The people of the United States may turn to God in prayer...”

In 1988 President Reagan signed a law declaring the first Thursday in May as the designated National Day of Prayer.

President Clinton signed the latest bill into law stating, “The President shall issue each year a proclamation designating the first Thursday in May as a National Day of Prayer on which the people of the United States may turn to God in prayer...” President Biden issued that proclamation this year.

During the American Revolution, General George Washington is pictured in a well-known painting praying at Valley Forge, Pennsylvania, for God to help the Continental Army during the winter of 1777-1778.

Benjamin Franklin in June 1787 made a motion that prayer

be said every morning to open the Constitutional Convention to bring the delegates together.

President Abraham Lincoln said this about prayer, “I have been driven many times upon my knees by the overwhelming conviction that I had nowhere else to go. My own wisdom and that of all about me seemed insufficient for that day.”

President Franklin D. Roosevelt prayed on national radio the evening of D-Day June 6, 1944, as Allied troops invaded Nazi occupied Europe. “Almighty God: our sons... this day have set upon a mighty endeavor... to preserve our Republic... and to set free a suffering humanity.”

The book of 2 Chronicles states the importance of prayer this way: “...if my people who are called by my name will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, I will hear from heaven and forgive their sins and restore their land.”

PRAIRIE FARE

Enjoy garlic? Please take our survey

"I smell garlic," I said when I returned home after a conference a few years ago.

"When my husband came closer, the aroma increased.

"Have you been eating garlic?" I asked.

"I went to your friend's party when you were at the conference," he noted. "Almost all the food had garlic in it."

"They served garlic hummus, roasted garlic, garlic bread and garlic soup," he continued with a grin. "It was really good."

"That sounds like quite a party," I replied.

He must have eaten his share of garlic-infused food. He had turned into a giant clove of garlic, and the aroma was emanating from his skin.

We enjoy using garlic in cooking. We always have a jar of chopped garlic in our refrigerator for easy addition to recipes.

I often add garlic when we saute onions for various dishes. The aroma fills our house.

However, I have not eaten enough garlic to become a walking scent diffuser.

Garlic has been tied to some

health benefits throughout history and found use in traditional medicine. Culinary garlic is available in various forms, including fresh garlic bulbs in the produce section, canned garlic, dried garlic flakes, garlic powder and garlic salt.

You can use garlic in soups, stews, stir-fry, salads and sauces. It can be added to marinades to add extra flavor to grilling. You can roast it as a whole bulb with some oil and use it as a spread on crackers. Garlic butter on French bread is a tasty side dish.

However, garlic-infused oil made at home could pose a food safety risk. Garlic may contain Clostridium botulinum spores. When fresh garlic is placed in oil in an air-free, warm environment, it can produce a toxin. If you decide to infuse oil with garlic, store the flavored oil in the refrigerator and use within a week.

Garlic is in the same plant family as onions, leeks, scallions and shallots. We eat about 2.5 pounds per person per year in the U.S., which pales in comparison to Korea's 22 pounds per person per year.

To store fresh garlic, keep the cloves intact with the bulb head and store in a cool, dry, dark location in a mesh bag or in a garlic keeper. Store in a well-ventilated area. Garlic may be stored three to six months in the right conditions. You also can store fresh garlic in the refrigerator if your kitchen or other storage area is very warm.

Here's a colorful recipe with a wide variety of colorful vegetables with numerous health benefits.

Roasted Vegetables with Garlic
2 cups sweet potato, diced into 1-inch cubes

1 red onion, cut into 1-inch cubes

1 red bell pepper, cut into 1-inch cubes

2 cups broccoli florets

1 yellow squash, sliced and quartered into 1-inch cubes

1 zucchini, sliced and quartered into 1-inch cubes

2 cups white mushrooms, halving larger pieces to match other cuts

2 tablespoon olive oil, divided (or use your favorite cooking oil)

2 tablespoon balsamic vinegar, divided

2 teaspoon Italian seasoning, divided

4 cloves garlic, minced, divided

Salt and pepper (to taste)

Preheat oven to 425 F. Line a baking sheet with foil. Place sweet potatoes in bowl and add 1 tablespoon olive oil, 1 tablespoon balsamic vinegar, 1 teaspoon Italian

seasoning, salt and pepper. Toss to combine. Transfer sweet potato mixture (reserve bowl) to sheet pan and spread in single layer. Roast for about 30 minutes, then stir. Place remaining vegetables in bowl and add remaining olive oil, balsamic vinegar, Italian seasoning and all of the minced garlic. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Toss to combine. Add to sweet potatoes on sheet pan. Roast 10 to 15 minutes longer or until tender. Roasting time may need to be adjusted depending on size of vegetables. Serve immediately.

Makes 12 servings. Each serving has 80 calories, 1 gram (g) fat, 2 g protein, 10 g carbohydrate, 2 g fiber and 30 milligrams sodium.
